SEEDS PLANTS BULBS TREES

FROM F. J. Ellis, Esq., Jerusalem, we hear that 'The plants arrived in splendid condition', and from D. Reece, Esq., Axim, Gold Coast 'The Roses and Chrysanthemums were excellently packed—there was not one failure'. In Canada our Pansies, a customer informs us, took two first prizes, and our Dahlias one first and one second prize. An important customer at Johannesburg reports: 'The Government Inspector remarked that he had never inspected plants arriving in better condition'.

SUCH testimony is only possible when the great difficulty of export orders is efficiently overcome—the difficulty of transport. The Foreign Parcel Post is a good method which we use whenever possible, but it will be seen that choice of medium must be left to us. It is often impossible to estimate the transport cost, but any balance will be placed to a customer's credit.

WE give below a list of the best times for despatching the most familiar orders—they need not be strictly adhered to: but we handle orders entirely in the customer's interest, sometimes holding back parts of his order which are likely to travel better at a later moment. Due allowance has to be made for the reversal of seasons in the Southern Hemisphere. Where there is risk of frost, it is essential to the success of Bulbs to plant them immediately upon arrival. Plants should be planted at once, and if they have sprouted and made blanched growths during the journey, a few days' shade will harden and make green the shoots. Under our system of packing Roses, trees seldom arrive dry, but if they do, stand or immerse them in water for a few hours, or entirely cover them with damp earth for a few days, and water them well after planting.

FOREIGN ORDERS must be accompanied by a remittance sufficient to cover the cost of goods, packing, and transport: or arrangements can be made for the payment of our account, at the time of despatch, by a resident in England. On no other terms can we undertake orders from abroad.

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The Making of a Lawn Sowing Lawn Grass Seed

THOUGH it is not difficult to make a lawn, it can be truly said that lawns have one satisfaction additional to their beauties of colour and texture—that they amply repay time and trouble. Renovating old Lawns is work similar to making new Lawns, and we would especially draw your attention to the importance, and at the same time the ease, of making your lawn look just as well next season as it did before the hard wear and trying heat of the summer. The site chosen for a lawn should be properly drained and as level as possible—at least it should have no irregularities of surface. An uniform depth too should be maintained for the top soil: the plot should be dug at least 9 inches all over, and made quite firm by rolling before sowing. Prepare the ground some months before if possible. Bad soil may be improved by applying correctives, such as sand or charcoal for heavy clay, lime, etc. The best times for sowing are March and April, or from late August to the end of September (before the ground gets too cold): showery weather in the months between is also a possible time. Distribute the seed evenly and well rake the plot transversely so that every seed possible is covered—none that is visible will grow. A lawn sown in the autumn may be safely used the following summer if it is carefully tended and not overworked. When the grass has grown to 3 in. high, it should be cut carefully with a scythe or shears, not too short. Afterwards mow and roll often and regularly, once a week if possible, choosing not too dry nor too wet a time for the latter. Grass must on no account be allowed to run to seed. Birds should be kept off newly sown lawns by black threads stretched across the site, or netting raised above the ground.

Weeds

EARLY preparation of the soil makes it possible to remove all weeds before sowing starts. Seedling indigenous weeds are bound to appear after sowing, though Carter Page's Lawn Grass Seeds are guaranteed free from weeds: cut these out or pull them up as young as possible. Moss and coarse weeds are frequently caused by poorness of soil, which can be bettered by our 'Special Lawn Manure'; a stimulant to the grass often helps to destroy the weeds, and of such a kind is Carter Page's 'Eureka' Lawn Sand, which destroys plantains, daisies, and other turf weeds while it invigorates the grass.

Worms D

THOUGH there is a well-supported view that a small number of worms inhabiting a lawn improve it, their casts acting as something of a top dressing, worms are nearly always so numerous as to be unpleasant and harmful. and a lawn is best rid of them. Carter Page's Worm Killers are of two kinds, Soluble and Insoluble: either will totally remove all worms from a lawn. The Insoluble Worm Killer should be applied as a powder at the rate of half-a-pound to the square yard, and thoroughly watered in with can or hose; of the Soluble one pound mixed with water will dress about 50 square yards.

REQUENT small dressings of manure do very much more good than big doses only at renovating time and in the spring. Carter Page's 'Special Lawn Manure' is the best and safest preparation for stimulating and thickening the growth of grass; it does not have such action upon weeds, but improves the soil and therefore the grasses have less opportunity of being starved out by the weeds. It should be applied at the rate of 1½ oz. to each superficial yard.

Quantities and Measurements

SOW Carter Page's Lawn Grass Seeds at the rate of Six to Eight Bushels (140 to 190 lbs.) per acre: for small plots about one ounce to the square yard is the right amount. As a general rule, use half the quantity for renovating a lawn. A Tennis Court's dimensions are 78 × 36 ft. (or for a single court 78 × 27 ft.); you therefore need about 18 lb. (or 12 lb. for a single) of Lawn Grass Seed. The thicker you sow, the thicker and finer will be the turf. Use our 'Eureka' Lawn Sand at the rate of 3 oz. per sq. yd., and our 'Special Lawn Manure' 1½ oz. to each superficial yard or Bone Meal at rate of ¼ lb. per square yard. For Tennis Lawns use 40 lb. of our 'Special Lawn Manure', and 80 lb. of our 'Eureka' Lawn Sand. Clover is not added to our Lawn Grass Seeds, but it may be separately bought, 1 oz. to every 3 lb. of grass seed being ample.





WHEN TO SOW PEAS

THE first sowing of Peas should be made on a sheltered border about the end of January—for this early date choosing a very hardy variety such as 'Pilot' or 'Blue Bird'; another in February, and after the beginning of March successional sowings every three weeks until the end of May, and for very late crops until the end of June or the beginning of July, 'Achievement' or 'Captain Cuttle' being the best for such extra late crops.

GARDEN PEAS, FIRST EARLY

Sow Peas in deeply dug and well manured ground. The tall-growing varieties should have plenty of room between each row, with slightly more space between the rows than the height to which the variety grows, thus—3 feet apart for $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet sorts. A mulching of manure close to the stems at each side of the row for the later crops prevents the rapid drying of the ground in hot weather; the plants then bear for much longer. A pint of peas will sow a drill 4 inches wide at the bottom and 40 feet long. The practice of soaking Seed Peas in water to hasten germination or in paraffin to keep away mice, often destroys the germ of the seeds and cannot be recommended. A coating of Red Lead is a safer protection against vermin. Pints and Half-Pints of Peas and Beans are supplied at Quart rate.







SOW in March, April or May in drills I ft. apart and 2 in. deep spacing out the seedlings to 8 in. The following spring transplant into permanent beds, allowing at least 18 in. between each root. In preparing Asparagus beds, manure sufficient to cover the bed 6 in. and a few barrow-loads of old lime (if procurable) should be trenched into the soil to the depth of 2 ft. When ready for planting the bed should be 9 in. above the level of the garden to ensure good drainage. This is not so essential on light soils. The plants should not be cut during the first year, and but sparingly the second. On the approach of winter cut down the stems and clear off all weeds; then cover with a dressing of manure, to be forked in with a good quantity of salt early in spring. Should the summer be a hot, dry one, mulch the surface with dry litter or lawn mowings.



CELERY

A N early sowing should be made in February in small, shallow boxes, inside a frame or greenhouse, and the main sowings in March or April. Transplant either into boxes or a nursery bed of light rich soil. At 6 inches high plant out 9 inches apart into deep trenches which have been heavily manured at the bottom. Water well, and occasionally sprinkle Nitrate of Soda between the plants, but not on the foliage. Earth up as growth progresses, but each time loosely tie the stalks of each plant together to prevent the soil getting between them. White varieties of Celery are very good for Autumn and early Winter use, but for late use the Red kinds are more hardy.







When the tubers arrive, lay them out thinly in boxes in a cool, light position away from frost At planting time take care not to injure any sprouts the Potatoes have made, but reduce

their number to the three strongest.

We grade the tubers as uniformly as possible, and in accordance with the current Seed Act the dressing, which in no case exceeds $2\frac{1}{4}$ by $1\frac{1}{4}$ inches, with the exception of 'Majestic' which may have to be graded rather larger, will be specified in every sale.

Of the Immune varieties we would draw your attention especially to 'Great Scot', 'Majestic', 'The Ally', 'Tinwald Perfection', and 'King George': of the Non-Immune British Queen', also to 'Di-Vernon' and 'Katie Glover', recent introductions destined to become

HINTS ON CULTIVATION

Sprouting—

is extremely important. A much larger crop can be obtained from tubers thus prepared,

and the yield is increased in many instances by 15 to 20 per cent. The tubers should be boxed at least six weeks before planting time; any shallow box will do and it should be kept in an airy, moderately lighted position, entirely free from frost. Care should be taken when planting to avoid breaking the shoots; careful placing in the drills being essential.

A well-sheltered position should be selected, and the ground double dug and manured, if possible in the autumn.

If in the south, plant in March, and in the north in early April.

Make drills not less than five inches deep, two feet apart, and place the Potatoes every ten or twelve inches. A small quantity of artificial manure should be sprinkled along the drills before planting.

Second Early

Are as a whole heavier croppers than the earlies. If planted in April these can be lifted from about the middle of July in the warmer districts, until September in the colder, and follow on the earlies. The direction given for planting the first earlies also apply to the second crop, except that the drills should be not less than 27 inches apart.

Main Crop and Late

The best time for setting is during March and April, but planting can be undertaken as late as June with the assurance of a satisfactory crop being obtained. Always, when possible, thoroughly dig and manure the ground in the autumn, as manuring whilst planting, other than a sprinkling of artificial, does not improve the quality of the crop.

Spraying

It is advisable to spray thoroughly Main and Late-crop varieties in July, with Burgundy or Bordeaux Mixture; no trace of disease will be shown at that time, but it is a necessary precaution. The crop should be sprayed again to ensure greater immunity.

When ready for planting the bed should be 9 inches above the level of the garden to ensure good drainage. The roots should be well spread out horizontally, placed 18 inches apart, and covered with 2 inches of soil. The plants should not be cut from during the first year, but very sparingly during the second year, and never later than the middle of June. On the approach of winter cut down the stems, and clear off all weeds; then cover with a dressing of manure, to be forked in with a good quantity of salt early in spring.

Hardy Annuals— — a few Suggestions

- HARDY ANNUALS are easy enough to grow and adaptable for nearly all soils. Many of the kinds known as suitable for pots may for earlier effect be sown in moderately-heated greenhouses in September. For this purpose, as for outdoor sowing, the best results come from a very thin sowing, which gives these plants an opportunity to attain the full development of their true natural but usually unknown beauty. A mistake is often made in considering it necessary to grow certain annuals under glass for planting out in May. Asters, Stocks, Phlox, Marigolds, Zinnias, and Antirrhinums are some of these kinds, which may be very successfully sown direct in the open ground in April for transplanting or thinning. The first two are commonly grown for market in this way, but the last four will tend to flower later than usual, though not less profusely.
- BEDS are capable of infinite design, and we offer only a few hints. Single Mauve Asters look very well with an edging of White Alyssum, and Single Pink Asters with an edging of Ageratum. Clarkia 'Vesuvius' combines well with Alyssum too, and Phlox Drummondi Mixed with Tagetes. Godetia 'Crimson Glow' may be edged effectively with Limnanthes Douglasi. Nasturtium 'Queen of Tom Thumbs' makes a good edging for Stocks. For bedding or borders Annuals are better used in conjunction with Perennials than alone.
- A S CLIMBERS the following Annuals are suitable:—Sweet Peas, Convolvulus major, Nasturtium, Humulus Japonicus, Cobæa scandens, Maurandya Barclayana, Eccremocarpus scaber, Ipomæa, Mina lobata, and Tropæolum. FOR POTS use Alonsoa, Balsams, Brachycome, Calliopsis 'Beauty', Celosias, Delphinium 'Blue Butterfly', Dimorphotheca, Globe Amaranthus, Linaria, Mimulus, Nemesia, Petunia, Phlox Drummondi, Rhodanthe, Schizanthus, and Viscaria. SHRUBBERIES the best Annuals are Eschscholtzia, Lavatera, Larkspur, Nasturtiums, Malope, Love-lies-Bleeding, Calendula, Cosmea, Prince's Feather, Ricinus, Sweet Rocket, Sunflowers, and Scabious. FOR BEDS we suggest Antirrhinum, Clarkia, Godetia, Petunia, Phlox Drummondi, Salpiglossis, Stocks, Verbena, Zinnia, Asters, Balsam, and Nemesia among others. FOR EDGINGS, besides Lobelia and those mentioned above, we suggest Phlox Drummondi, Anagallis, Marigold 'Legion of Honour', Kaulfussia, Nasturtium 'Empress of India', Candytuft 'Tom Thumb', Clintonia, Leptosiphon, and Tagetes. A few of the SWEET-SCENTED KINDS may be noted: Alyssum, Candytuft, Martynia, Mathiola, Mignonette, Stocks, Sweet Peas, Scabious, and Sweet Sultan. FOR THE ROCK GARDEN use Alyssum, Anagallis, Ionopsidium, Kaulfussia, Phacelia Leptosiphon, Portulaca, Thunbergia, Linaria, Calandrinia, Silene Compacta, 'Venus's Looking-glass' and Clintonia, Nemophila.
