

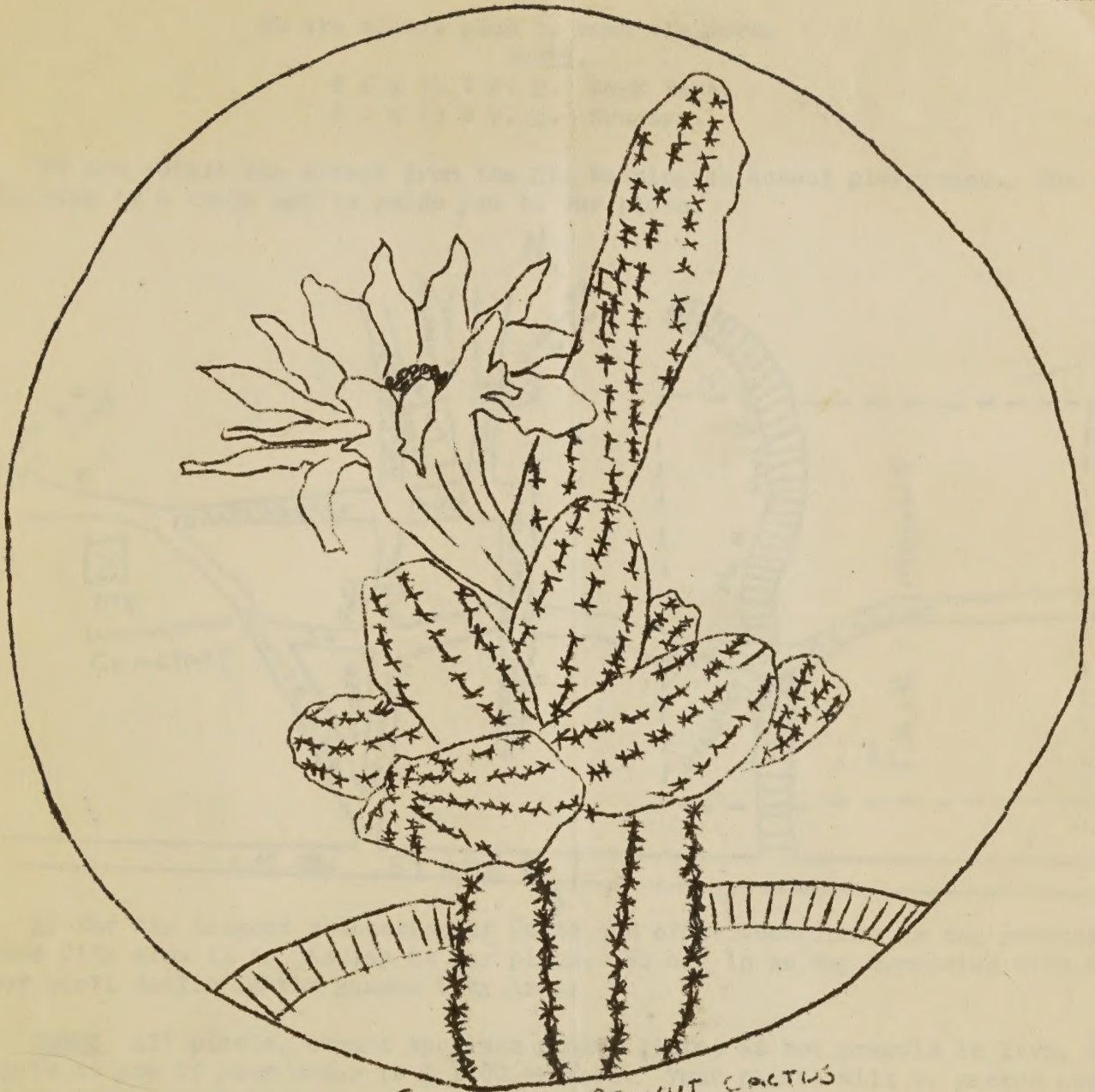

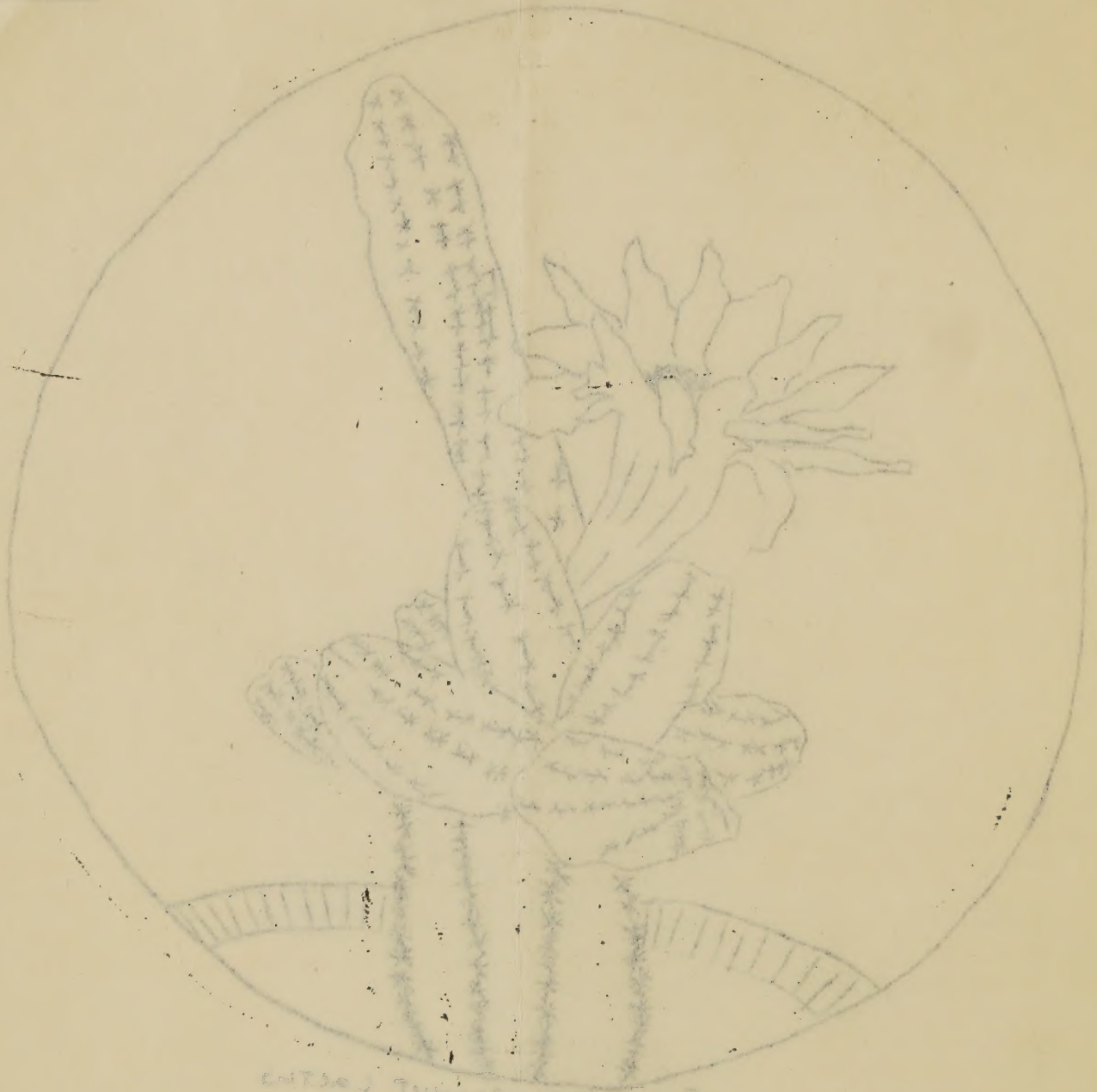


GRAFTED PEANUT CACTUS

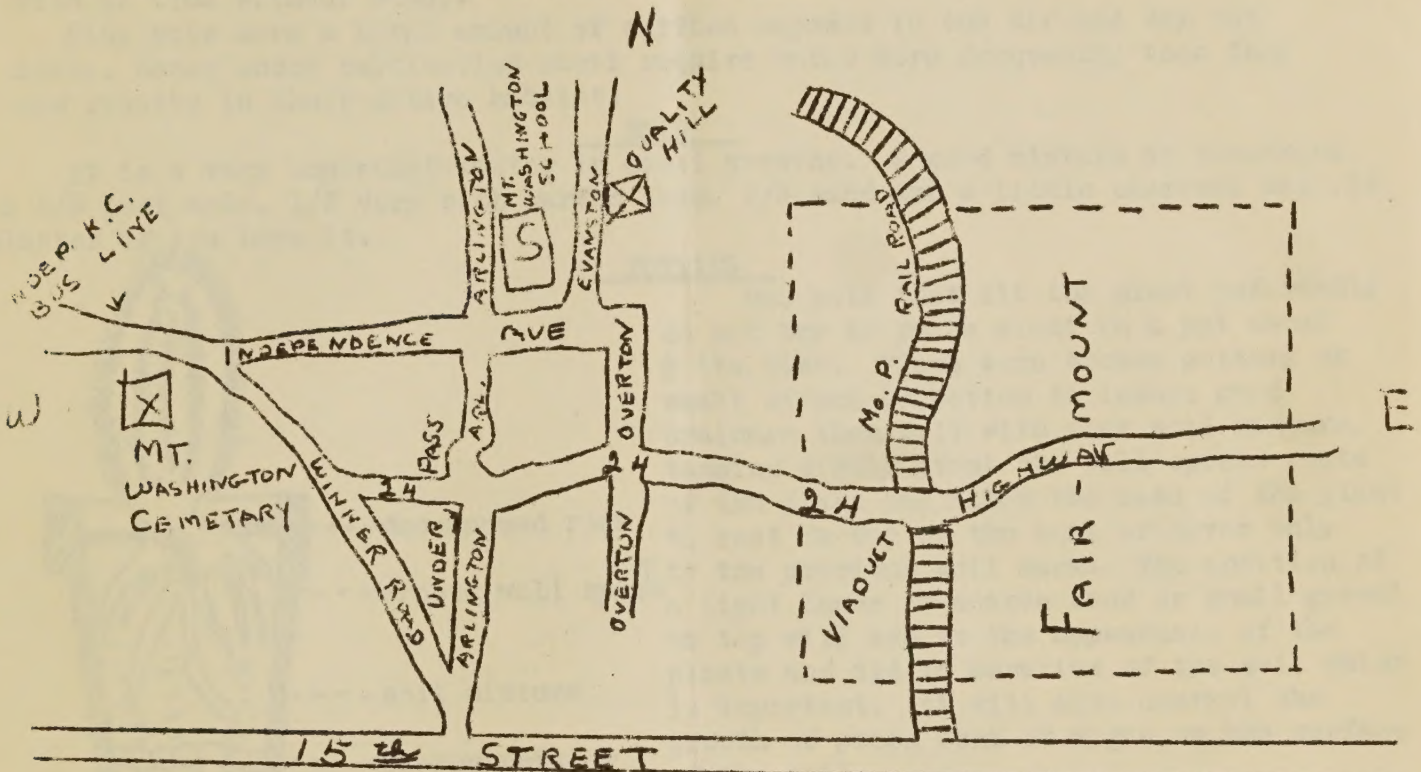

TERMS All plants, except specimen plants listed as not prepaid in list, are prepaid to you if your order is \$ 1.00 or more. Your plants will be packed and sent by parcel post to you. On specimen plants we pack them and send them Express collect unless you state otherwise. NOT prepaid in Canada.

WARRANTY We guarantee safe arrival at any time of the year.
Your plants are guaranteed to live for two weeks or we send you other plants free.
All of our shipments will pass horticultural inspection.
We want you to be satisfied.

Please mention one or two alternate choices if possible in case an item is out of stock. All items are offered subject to stock on hand. Some items are limited.

Culture of these interesting plants is quite easy if a few simple directions are observed. They are mostly native to desert climates and grow in coarse rocky soil, usually on sloping or mountainous country. These regions are subject to heavy rainfall at some seasons of the year, but often with long periods of drouth in between. The plants absorb water quickly through the roots when it is available and store it in the succulent tissue so that they can maintain like for a great period of time without water.

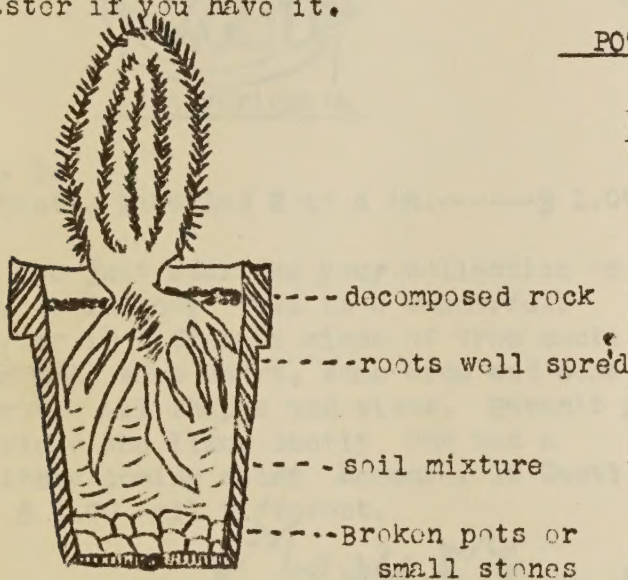
Clay pots have a large amount of surface exposed to the air and dry out quickly, hence under cultivation cacti require water more frequently than they would receive in their native habitat.

SOIL

It is a very important factor in cacti growing. A good mixture we recommend is 1/3 leaf mold, 1/3 very rich garden loam, 1/3 sand and a little charcoal and old plaster if you have it.

POTTING

Use pots that fit the plant comfortably do not try to put a plant in a pot about $\frac{1}{2}$ its size. Place some broken pottery or small stones in bottom to insure good drainage then fill with your soil mixture, tamping firmly about the well spread roots of the plant and allow the base of the plant to rest on top of the soil or cover only to the previous soil mark. The addition of a light layer of coarse sand or small gravel on top will add to the appearance of the plants and aid in aeration of the soil which is important. It will also control the growth of green scum or algae on the surface of the soil.



WATERING

They should be watered as often as the soil becomes dry. This may be daily in very hot weather or only once or twice a week in cooler weather. About every 10 days or two weeks with small collections it is a good thing to get a pan of water and set the pots in and let the water soak up through the hole in the bottom of the pot. Thus making sure the roots have some water.

SUCCULENTS

Require practically the same treatment as cacti except that they require water more frequently than cacti.

EPIPHYLLUMS

Are shade loving plants from tropical forests and require somewhat different treatment from the desert types. A good soil mixture is 1/4 good rich garden loam, 1/4 sand, 1/3 peat moss, and 1/5 well rotted manure. These plants thrive in lath houses in summer and inside in shade in winter.

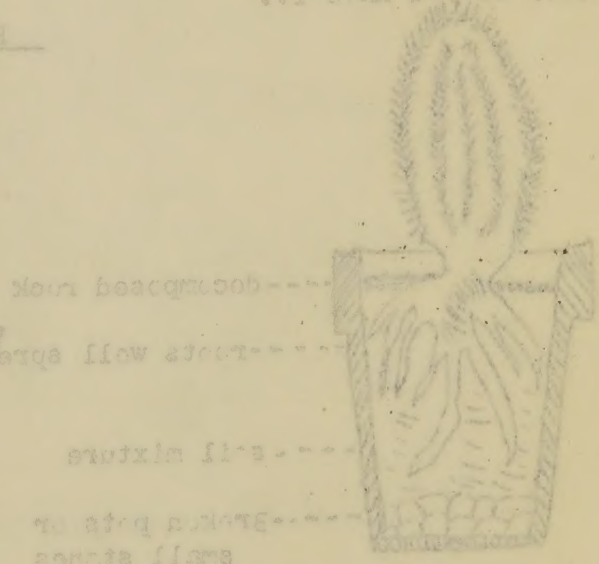
They grow in a large amount of sunlight exposed to the air and dry soil. They, however, under cultivation require water more frequently than they do in their native habitat.

SOIL

It is a very important factor in their growth. A good mixture we recommend is 1/2 part coarse sand, 1/2 very rich garden loam, 1/8 sand and a little charcoal and 1/8 peat moss if you have it.

POTS

The pots that fit the plant perfectly do not try to put a plant in a pot about 1/2 inch deep. Place some broken pottery or small stones in bottom to insure good drainage then fill with your soil mixture. Keeping fairly even the soil spread roots of the plant and allow the base of the plant to rest on top of the soil or cover only to the previous soil mix. The addition of a light layer of coarse sand or small gravel on top will add to the appearance of the plants and aid in retention of the soil which is important. It will also control the growth of green moss or algae on the surface of the soil.



WATERING

They should be watered as often as the soil becomes dry. This may be daily in very hot weather or only once or twice a week in cooler weather. About every 10 days or two weeks with small cacti it is a good thing to get a pan of water and set the pots in and let the water soak up through the hole in the bottom of the pot. This soaking sure the roots have some water.

REPLANTING

Replanting is usually the same treatment as cacti except that they require less water frequently than cacti.

REPLANTING

The shade loving plants from tropical forests and require somewhat different treatment from the desert type. A good soil mixture is 1/4 coarse rich garden loam, 1/4 sand, 1/8 peat moss, and 1/8 well rotted manure. These plants thrive in shade houses in summer and shade in winter.

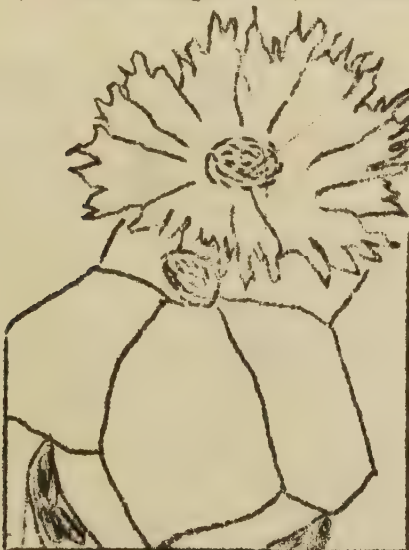
