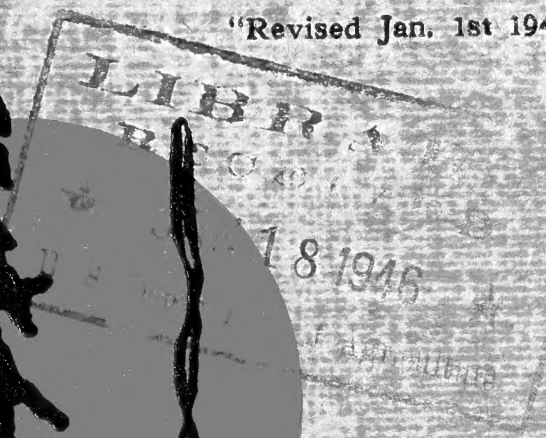

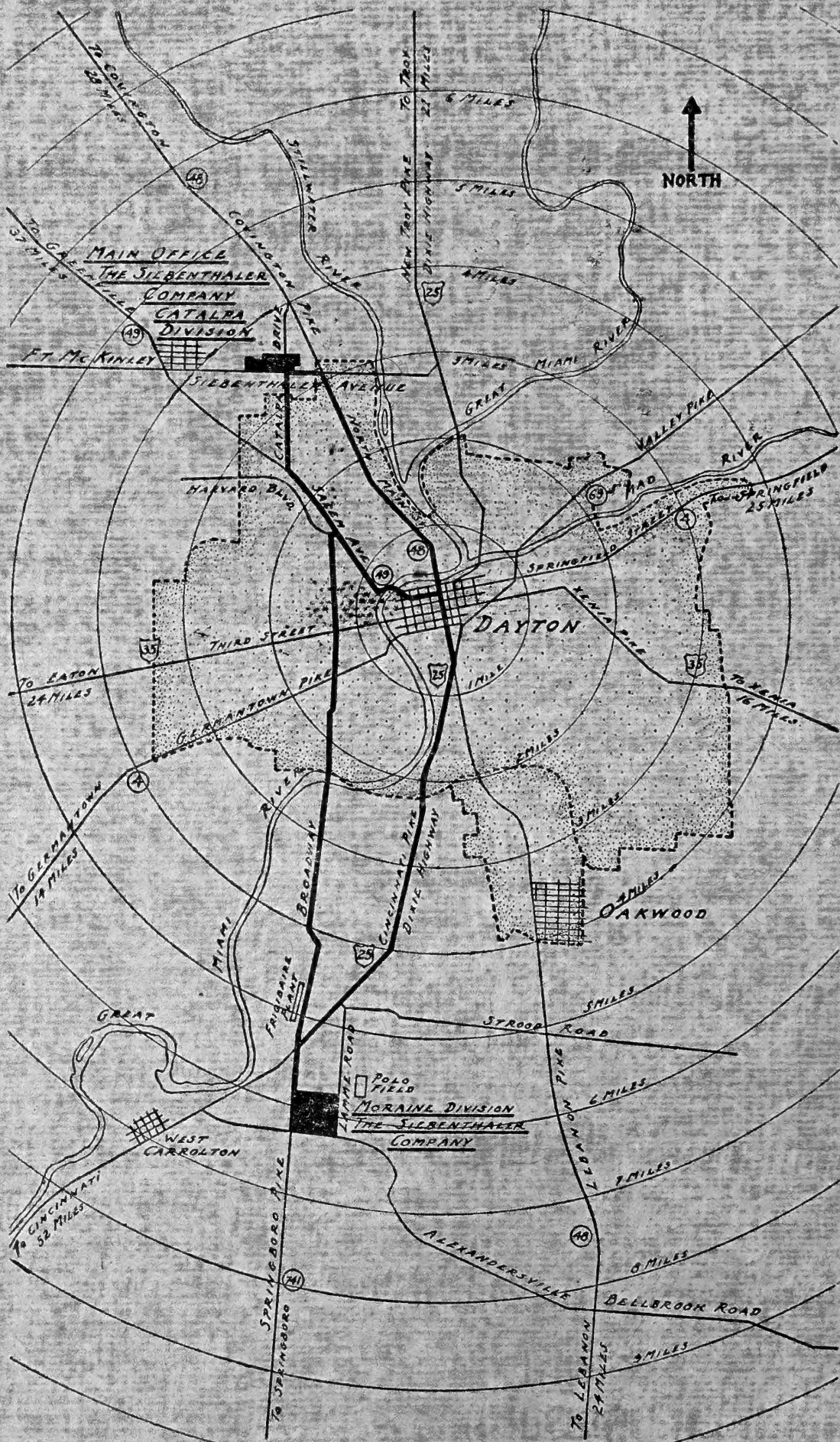

LOCATION

The CATALPA DIVISION of our Nurseries is located at the corner of Siebenthaler Avenue and Catalpa Drive, which is three and one-half miles northwest of the center of the city of Dayton.

May be reached by going out Salem Avenue (S. R. No. 49) to Catalpa Drive, and then north one mile; or out North Main Street (S. R. No. 48) to Siebenthaler Avenue and then west one-half mile.

Our MORaine DIVISION is located six miles south of Dayton at Moraine City.

May be reached by going south on U. S. No. 25 out of Dayton to Springboro Pike (S. R. No. 741) and then left one-third mile to entrance of Nursery; or down Lamme Road to Polo Field which lies opposite the east entrance to the Nurseries.

Our MAIN OFFICE is on Catalpa Drive at Siebenthaler Avenue, and may be reached at all times by local or long distance telephone.

DIRECTIONS FOR ORDERING:- Write name and address plainly and advise time and method of shipment; otherwise we will use our best judgment and ship by the shortest and safest route.

PRICES:- Prices in this list cancel all previous lists and quotations. They are subject to change without notice and to stock being unsold upon receipt of order. They include packing costs, except on excessively bulky material and are f.o.b. our freight or express station. For local orders they include delivery to customer if within ten miles of our Nursery. Cost of delivery by truck to more distant points will be quoted upon request.

SUMMER PLANTING:- An extra charge is made for balling deciduous plants not marked B&B either in dormant season or in full leaf for summer planting.

TERMS:- Cash with order, except to persons who satisfy us as to their financial responsibility, when accounts will be due in thirty days from date of invoice.

INSPECTION:- A certificate of inspection by the Ohio Department of Agriculture will be attached to each shipment.

LANDSCAPE SERVICE:- We maintain a thoroughly trained landscape organization fully equipped to handle any landscape project including designing, consultation, and planting. Ask for special quotations on such work.

GUARANTEE:- All plant materials are warranted to be true to name, up to size specified and in good healthy condition when delivered, otherwise replacement will be made or original amount paid will be refunded. We cannot, however, guarantee the growth of plants not planted by us. This is due to the perishability of such material and the fact that their care and up-keep is beyond our control. Any plants planted by our Landscape Department and given proper care by the owner are guaranteed to grow and thrive satisfactorily for one year from date of planting. Those failing to do so will be replaced without charge the following planting season.

Please Read Carefully

This list of hardy ornamental nursery stock comprises all the worth while varieties of plant material adapted to this section, and will fulfill practically every need for landscape development.

Those items marked "B&B" include the price of balling in the price quoted. During certain seasons of the year other varieties may be successfully transplanted by digging with a ball of earth, for which an extra charge will be made. See schedule below.

This stock is all well grown, frequently transplanted or root pruned, properly sheared and trimmed to retain the natural character of the plant and to improve its density and form and to facilitate transplanting.

In addition to the usual sizes listed herein, we grow many varieties of shade and evergreen trees into large finished specimens. These are well spaced and carefully grown, and are not to be confused with left-over trees in old nursery rows. These involve the use of special moving equipment and are quoted on pages 49-56, which price includes moving and planting with a large ball of earth.
