## DAFFODILS

Daffodils are very easy to grow, requiring no summer care and, as they are not eaten by gophers and have few diseases; they are an excellent garden investment.
Plant Daffodils deeply. Mcst varieties thrive when put four to six inches under ground.
Dig the soil eighteen inches deep before planting if possible. This allows for ample development of the roots.

Irrigate the soil thoroughly as soon as the bulbs are planted so as to start root growth at once. Natural rainfall is normally sufficient to keep Daffodils growing up to blooming season. They should never be allowed to become dry, however.


After blooms have withered, cut off dead flowers, cultivate the soil and stir in bone meal, Gaviota, or any good commercial fertilizer. Irrigate often enough to keep the foliage green and growing for four to six weeks longer. Do not sut foliage until it turns yellow.

Daffodil bulbs do not need to be divided oftener than once in three to five years. They may be safely left in the ground all summer and covered over with shallow-rooted sum-mer-flowering annuals.
Our Narcissus bulbs are of the largest size and are all "Double-nose;" that is, each bulb will produce two or more flower stalks.

GARDEN COMBINATTON
One of the big thrills in bulb gardening comes from working out effective combinations of spring flowering trees and shrubs, bulbs, annuals and perennials. A garden calendar of blooming dates is essential, and easily kept. We suggest as a starter that you make several trips to our gardens at Niles during the spring flowering season (March and April) and take notes. We attempt to keep our garden well labeled so that you can ask our salesmen for the exact variety and its planting season.

Ideal for rock gardens and tight little sunny garden nooks.

## Success With Tulips

From October to December is the best time for planting Tulips, although planting may be done up to the early part of January. If planting is done late in the winter, it is best to plant where the Tulips will receive partial shade, as too much sun may cause the late planted Tulips to open too soon, which will result in short-stemmed flowers of inferior size.

Plant Tulip bulbs 6 inches deep in sandy soil and 5 inches deep in heavy soil; that is, the top of the bulbs should be covered with that depth of soil. Place a handful of sand under each bulb and water thoroughly after planting. Tulips do best when the soil is cool and moist. Do not mix any fresh manure or chemical fertilizer in the soil where it will come in contact with the bulbs. If the soil is of poor quality, dig in some well-rotted cow manure several weeks in advance of planting.
The quality of the flowers your Tulips produce will depend more on the size and vigor of the bulbs you plant than on any other one thing. When you consider the time and labor that you put into growing your Tulips it is wisest to plant only the best grade of bulbs.
