

They represent the best selection of yellow and white fleshed varieties ever offered by the Peach Council. There are varieties for every purpose and covering a harvesting season of approximately three months.

# New Varieties Recently Named Extra Early -- Yellow Flesh -- Before Golden Jubilee EARLY EAST (N. J. 134)

This is a large, yellow fleshed peach of high quality. It ripens about ten days before Golden Jubilee. The fruits develop an attractive red color, while still firm, and in long distance shipping condition. They remain in good condition for several days after they appear to be ripe. The dormant fruit buds are hardier than Elberta. Tree ripened Early East at New Brunswick have been freestones. It has hardiness, productiveness and attractiveness combined with good size, color, and quality. A promising new variety for the home or commercial orchard.

#### JERSEYLAND (N. J. 135)

This large, firm, attractive, yellow fleshed freestone peach ripens a few days before Golden Jubilee. It resembles J. H. Hale, hangs well to the tree, and is an excellent shipper. It is far superior to Golden Jubilee as a commercial variety for shipment to wholesale markets. The tree is hardy, sets fruit buds freely, and comes into bearing early. The fruit freezes exceptionally well. Jerseyland should be a profitable variety in any well managed commercial orchard.

## JUST BEFORE ELBERTA REDCREST (N. J. 126)

This large, firm, yellow fleshed freestone ripens just before Elberta, or with Summercrest. It is more attractive than Summercrest with a skin color equal to Sunhigh and smooth as velvet. The tree is a vigorous grower, and productive. The fruit is excellent for freezing and canning. This promising variety is a real competitor for Summercrest.

#### JUST AFTER ELBERTA

#### LATEROSE (N. J. 109)

A large, firm, attractive white fleshed freestone of high quality, ripening with Afterglow, or immediately after Elberta and White Hale. An excellent variety for canning and freezing. The trees are vigorous, hardy, and productive.

#### Additional Promising Named and Commercially Tested Varieties

#### RARITAN ROSE (N. J. 97)

A firm, attractive white fleshed freestone of good quality ripening a few days before Golden Jubilee. The tree is vigorous, hardy, and productive. A good, white fleshed variety to precede Triogem. Popular with roadstand trade and in local markets.

#### TRIOGEM (N. J. 70)

A firm, yellow fleshed freestone of high quality ripening two or three days later than Golden Jubilee. Very attractive and an excellent shipper. It should replace Golden Jubilee in most commercial orchards.

#### **NEWDAY (N. J. 79)**

A firm, yellow fleshed peach of good quality ripening about a week later than Golden Jubilee. It resembles Elberta in color and shape, and the average size is larger than Triogem. Resistant to bacterial leaf spot.

#### SUNHIGH (N. J. 82)

A large, firm, attractive yellow fleshed variety of good quality ripening a few days earlier than Goldeneast. Generally it is a freestone, but sometimes the firm flesh adheres slightly to the pit when the fruit is hard ripe. The fruit buds are somewhat hardier than Goldeneast. A very popular variety to precede Goldeneast.

#### GOLDENEAST (N. J. 87)

A very large, firm, attractive yellow fleshed freestone of high quality ripening about two weeks before Elberta. This has been a profitable variety in New Jersey because of its firm flesh, large size, and attractive appearance.

#### REDROSE (N. J. 98)

A firm, attractive, highly colored white fleshed freestone of high quality ripening with Goldeneast. The trees are vigorous, productive and hardy. A promising white fleshed variety to replace Hiley.

#### SUMMERCREST (N. J. 94)

A large, oval, yellow fleshed freestone of high quality ripening just before Elberta. A popular home canning peach. The tree is vigorous and hardy. An excellent variety to precede Elberta.

#### WHITE HALE (N. J. 63) (U. S. Plant Patent 31)

A large to very large firm, white fleshed freestone of good quality ripening with Elberta and J. H. Hale. The tree is more vigorous than J. H. Hale and the flowers are perfect. It meets the demand for a large, showy, white fleshed peach during the Elberta season.

#### AFTERGLOW (N. J. 84)

A large, high quality, yellow fleshed freestone ripening immediately after Elberta. The trees are vigorous, hardy, and productive. An excellent variety to prolong the Elberta season.

These prices include truck delivery to some central point in New Jersey, such as Moorestown, Hammonton, or Glassboro, if the number of trees ordered makes such delivery practical. Trees also may be secured at the C. H. Steelman farm on the Clarksville-Port Mercer Road, about one-quarter mile from State Highway Route 26, or U. S. Route 1. Telephone Princeton 1935-J-1. Small shipments to distant points, including all orders for less than 25 trees, will be sent by express collect unless otherwise specified on the order blank. Write for special prices on orders for over 1,000 trees.

#### PLACING ORDERS

All orders for trees should be sent to the New Jersey Peach Council, Inc., R. F. D. No. 2, Princeton, New Jersey. Orders for Fall delivery will receive first consideration.

A deposit equal to 10 per cent of the total cost of the trees is required with each order and the balance before delivery.
