

## Asparagus, Green Broccoli and Brussels Sprouts—For More Vitamins A and B 1

### ASPARAGUS

Asparagus Beetle.

CULTURE—After soaking seed in warm water 1 to 2 hours, sow in drills about 18 inches apart during Spring or Fall. Thin plants out to 3 inches apart and give frequent thorough cultivation, keeping them free from weeds. The roots should be transplanted when 1 or 2 years old into a permanent bed of the richest soil you have. Open a trench 15 inches deep and put in 8 or 9 inches of well rotted manure; cover with 2 inches of soil; then place the roots 12 inches apart, with the crowns facing one way; cover with 4 inches of soil. ### BROCCOLI

CULTURE-Same as Cauliflower or Cabbage

EARLY GREEN CALABRESE-Have broccoli in your garden, it is a splendid green vegetable that continues to bear for several weeks. For two crops plant early in spring and July. This variety produces a bluish green head at center of plant in about 90 days. After this center head is cut, the plant produces many branches, each bearing small heads that are as desirable as the first. Usually continues to bear until freezing weather. #### BRUSSELS SPROUTS

CULTURE—Sow seeds in cold frames or open ground. Transplant the same as cabbage in the early Spring and up to July. Make rows 3 feet apart having the plants standing 15 inches apart in the row. Cultivate the same as cabbage. An ounce will produce about 2,500 plants. Matures in about 125 days.

CULTURE—Sow seeds in row 24 to 36 inches apart, dropping the beans 3 inches apart in the row, cover 2 inches deep. Hoe as soon as seedlings appear. When the second or third pair of leaves begin to form, hill the rows slightly toward the plant. Repeat the hilling process as the plants grow larger. Never cultivate while the bushes are wet with dew or ram. For succession of young tender pods, sow every two weeks up to August 15th. A frequent picking of pods will keep the plants bearing. If the soil is not fertile, drill B-B Grower in the rows before seeds are dropped.

### WAX-POD, SHELL-OUT and POLE BEANS

#### POLE OR CORNFIELD BEANS

#### 1 Pint Will Plant 250 Hills

CULTURE—Pole beans should be planted in hills 4 feet each way and about the same time as the dwarf varieties. If not convenient to secure poles, a trellis can be made by placing a good strong wire 6 feet high between two rows. As runners begin tie small twine to the wire and run down to the bean stalks and tie loosely just above the ground. If planted in corn, wait until the corn is 4 to 5 inches high before planting the beans as the bean is the fastest grower of the two. Plant 2 beans to each hill of corn; thin out to one.

**\*\*\*IMPROVED KENTUCKY WONDER**—(65 days). Kentucky Wonder combines size, quality, and productiveness. The long pods are generally borne in clusters of two or four individual pods averaging 8 to 9 inches long, deeply saddle-back and very fleshy. 

CULTURE—These should not be planted until the ground is thoroughly warm, then sown in well enriched soil, with the rows 36 to 42 inches apart, dropping the beans 10 inches apart in the row, eyes down. The beans should be well hilled to hold the pods off the ground. B-B Lawn and Garden Grower applied at the rate of 10 lbs. to every 100 feet of row will materially increase the yield. This can be done before or after planting.

**\*\*\***\***BUNTON'S BUSH LIMA**—(70 days). One of the earliest. The pods will average about five inches long and are filled with large beans of excellent flavor. The plant is a strong grower, holding the pods well off the ground. It is very prolific and continues to bear for a long season. 

### POLE LIMA BEANS

#### One Pint Will Plant 100 to 150 Hills.

CULTURE—Sow when the soil becomes warm and dry. They are more tender than the snap beans. They should be planted with the eyes down, about 3 to hill, the hills about  $3l_2$  by  $3l_2$  feet each way. These should be trellised the same as the Snap Pole Beans. Unless the ground is very fertile, each hill should be supplied with at least a half gallon of well-rotted manure.

**\*\*\***KING OF THE GARDEN—(88 days). Vines of strong, vigorous growth, setting many pods, which are closely filled with large, flat beans, much thicker than those of the ordinary pole lima. 

Deduct 45c as the cost of the Semesan Bel for treating 20 bushels of seed per acre and the gross return is \$17.25 — a well worthwhile return on the small cost for disinfectant (excluding labor). Repeated tests indicate that over a period of years you may expect Semesan Bel will usually increase the yield and improve the quality of the crop.—See page 24.


