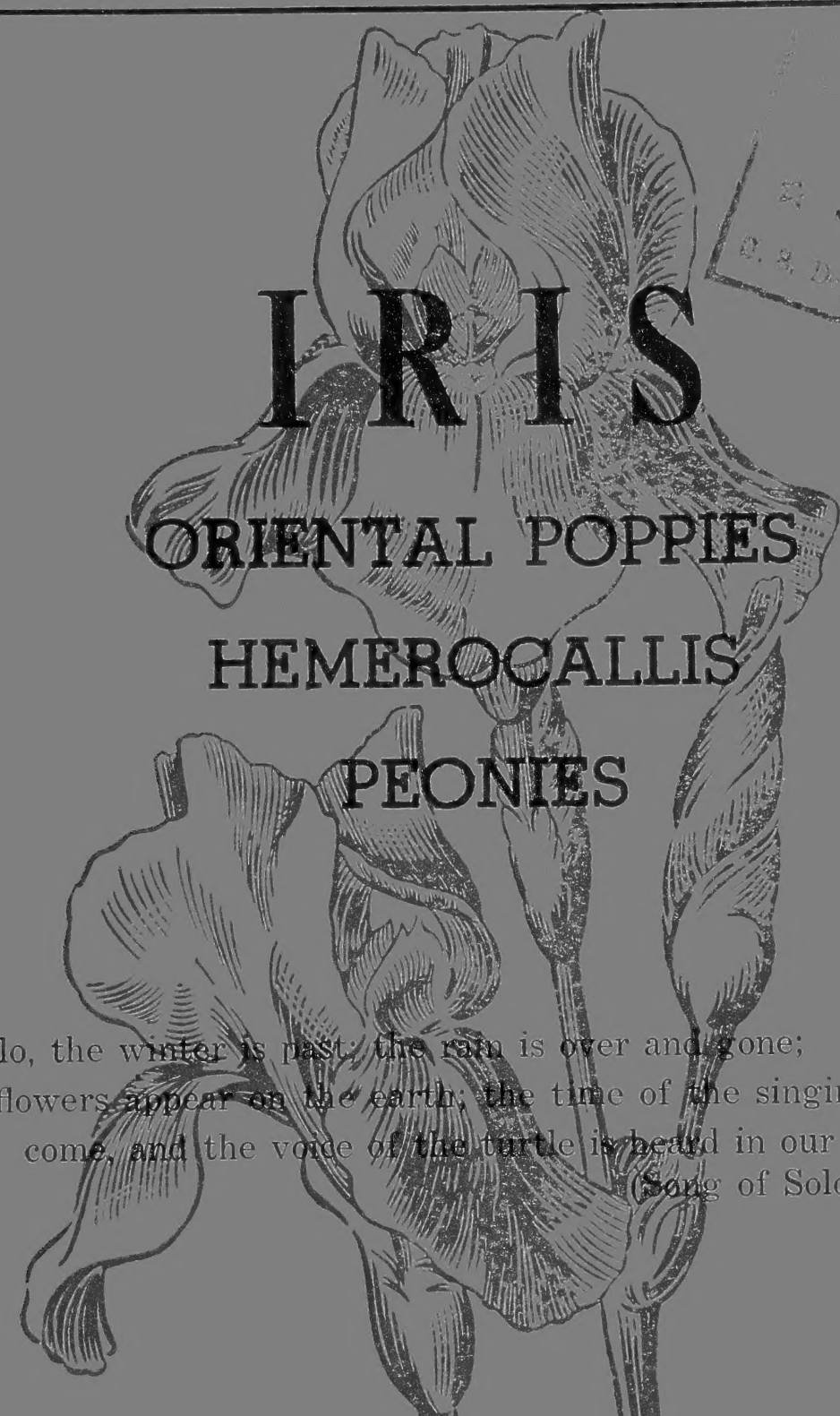
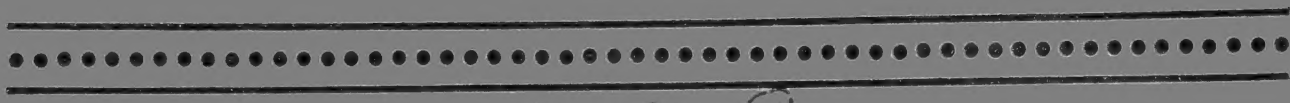

LOCATION:

The geographical location of the Imperial Iris Gardens is a definite factor in the success of your planting. It is neither east nor west, north nor south, but a happy medium. Therefore our plants find themselves "at home" in all parts of the nation. The growing season is long, giving the plants plenty of time for development. The rain supply is plentiful, ample moisture for natural growth without resorting to irrigation. The dry summer ripens and also toughens the rhizomes; and subzero winters with sudden changes, severely test their hardihood. A trial order will convince you of the merit of our plants.

PLEASE READ BEFORE ORDERING.

SHIPPING—Orders of \$2.00 or more are shipped postpaid in the United States. Add 25c extra if orders are below \$2.00.

SHIPPING SEASON—We begin shipping Iris the last week in June. Hemerocallis and Oriental Poppies in August. Peonies and Siberian Iris in September.

TERMS—Remittance must accompany order.

SUBSTITUTION—If variety wanted is sold out, please tell us whether we shall substitute similar or better variety.

ORDER EARLY—Some varieties are always sold out before the end of the season.

GUARANTEE—We ship healthy thrifty plants, freshly dug, disease free, and true to name; however we are not responsible for their cultural success after they leave our hands.
