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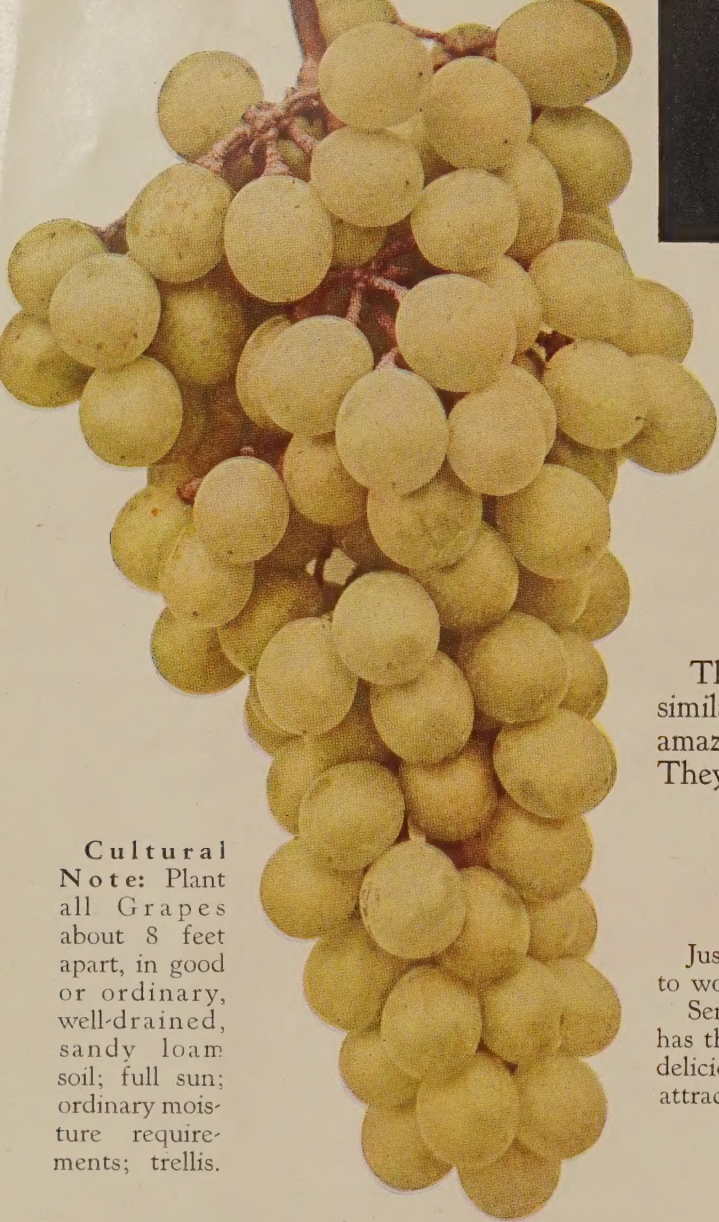

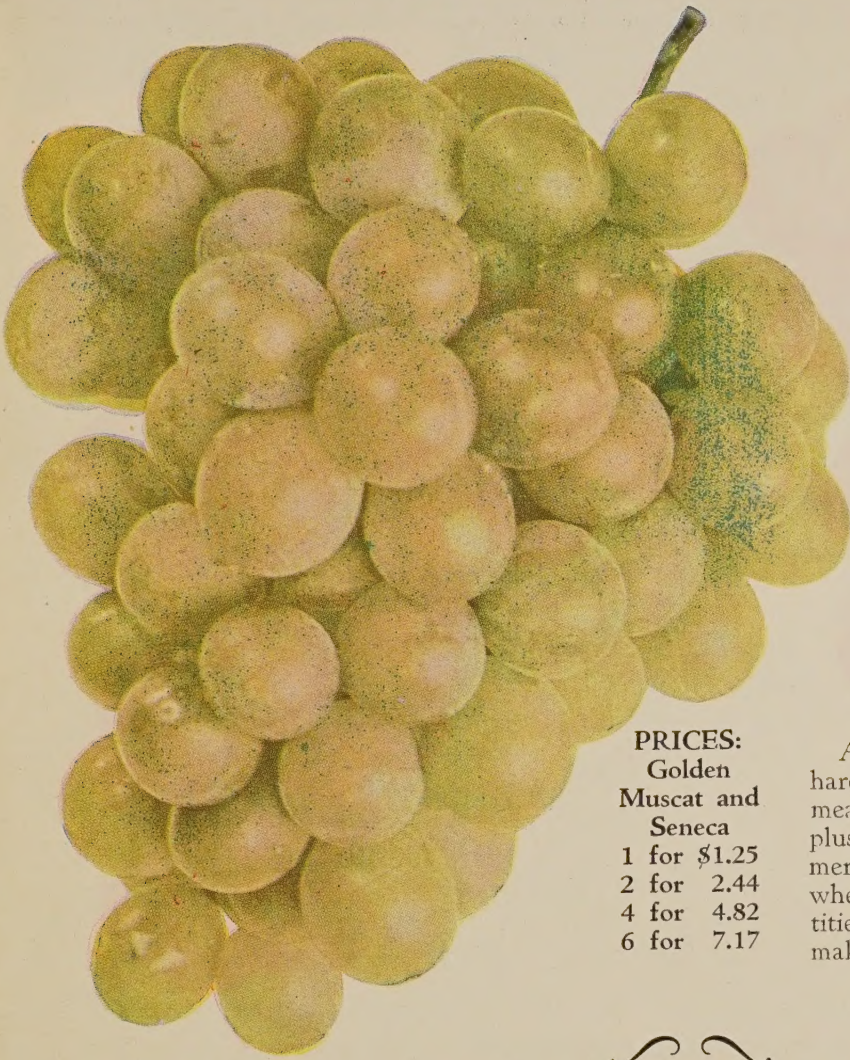

You'll be Prospecting for Gold

Throughout this book, you will find here and there various new varieties of Grapes, Strawberries, and other fruits. We agree that you should not plant these in commercial quantities at once, but you should set a few of any that sound interesting to you, to see how they will do under your conditions.

You will be prospecting for gold when you follow this plan, and you have a much better chance for actually finding it than the Old Sourdough shown here. By planting the new varieties, you can learn for yourself, from your own experience, what they are and how well they do for you; then if they do well, you can order them in commercial quantities, and make real profits. You will have the jump on your neighboring fruit growers.

We recommend three to six plants for such items as Grapes and Blueberries, and 200 to 500 plants for Strawberries. Don't overlook the new Nectarena Strawberry shown on pages 16 and 17.

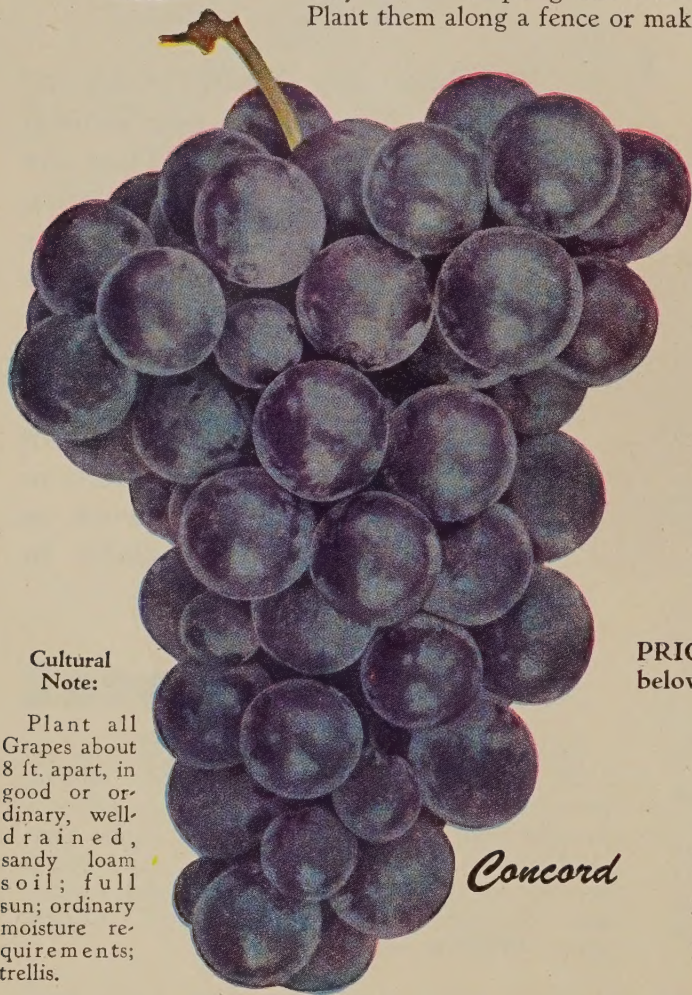

Standard Grapes

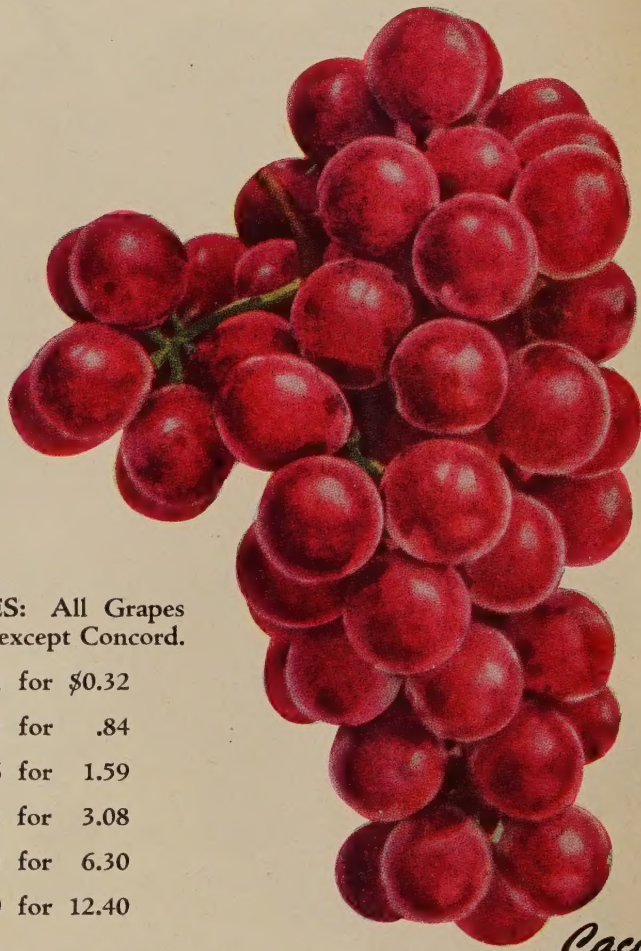
Plant these "old standbys" this spring and have your own Grapes next year. Grapes are a healthful fruit that everybody loves. The "kids" will eat them right off the vines, they are so tempting and delicious. Require less work and attention than most fruits. Plant them along a fence or make a Grape arbor over a walk in your back yard or garden.



Cultural Note:

Plant all Grapes about 8 ft. apart, in good or ordinary, well-drained, sandy loam soil; full sun; ordinary moisture requirements; trellis.

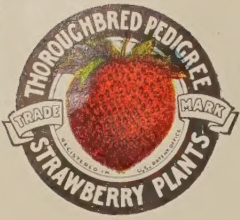
CULTURAL NOTE

Plant Boysenberries at least 5 to 7 feet apart, 8 to 10 feet for commercial planting. Train new growth both ways on wires or trellis. For winter, mulch with straw or coarse stable manure. Ordinary sandy loam best; good drainage.

Shipping Time

We usually start shipping Raspberries, Blackberries, and Boysenberries about February 1st, and continue until about May 5th, depending on weather and the condition of the plants. These plants can be packed and shipped two to four weeks ahead of planting

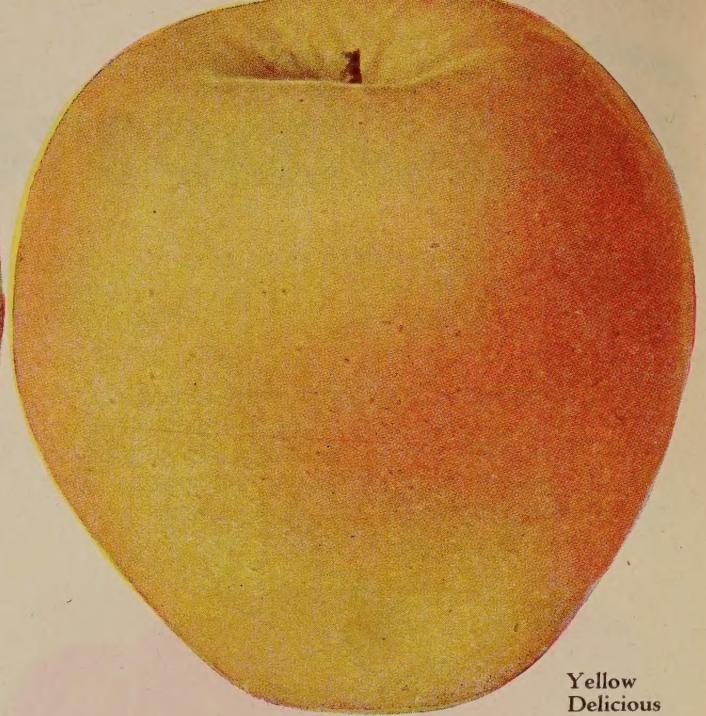

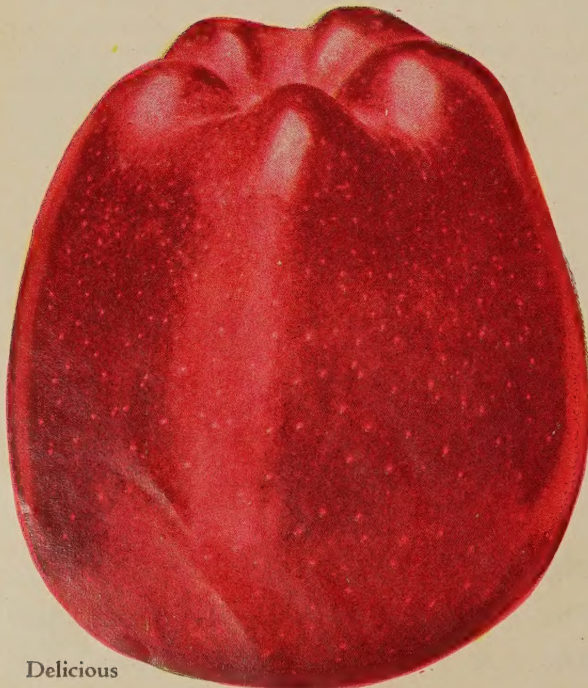

Asparagus

The Early Spring Money-Maker

Smart growers plant a series of crops which will bring them money from early to late. This not only spreads their income, but spreads the work, too, making a large income easy to manage. Much more of the work can be done by the grower himself by this method.

For the earliest of spring money-makers, we recommend Asparagus. It appears very early and is most succulent and appetizing then, and people will pay high prices to get it. Further, it is very easy to harvest, and requires but very little care after it is once set. Produces year after year.

Remarkably free from disease. Produces large crops. Stalks unusually tender and juicy. Plump stalks in one year from planting; continues for about 20 years.

We can guarantee our own packing only; hence, for states that stop plants for inspection, we agree only to deliver plants in good growing condition to Post Office or Transportation Company, and thereupon our responsibility ceases. Specifically these states are: Washington, Oregon, California, Arizona, District of Columbia, Utah, Wyoming, and Minnesota.

GUARANTY: We guarantee stock to be just as represented or order refilled free; we further warrant all stock to be carefully packed and shipped in good growing condition, and if this stock is properly and carefully planted, watered, and cared for, it will grow and give satisfactory results.

We cannot guarantee continuous growth since this depends upon the care you give the plants and also upon your local conditions. However, where failure of plants to grow is due to arrival in poor condition, we will replace the unsatisfactory plants without charge, providing reports are received prior to June 10th.

No refills will be made for failure of plants after June 10th unless a preliminary report is received prior to that date.

It is mutually agreed that we will not be liable for more than the purchase price of the stock.

In case of inability to fill an order, return of the customer's money shall release us from any further liability whatsoever.

Why Not Be An Early Bird?

Two years ago, we had orders for three times as many Strawberry plants as we could supply, and those customers who ordered late were disappointed. Observe the early bird and you'll get yours.



This bird is getting his share of the good things, and the reason is that he gets out early. We are showing him to you just to emphasize the advantage of early ordering. Even with supplies of labor, nurseries often run short of many items, and the customer who orders late is then disappointed. Don't order late and then get the sad word that our supplies are exhausted.

Order early and be sure of getting what you want.

For Best Service, Observe the Following:

Plants are reserved from estimated supplies. We try to make estimates conservative, but unusual conditions may cause shortages. It is now difficult to protect customers by purchasing from other approved nurseries, so should estimates fail, or should other conditions beyond our control prevent us from filling your order, we reserve the right to return your money and cancel your order.

Size limit for orders. We reserve the right at any time to limit the size of orders, without notice.

Proper shipping time shall embrace a period of about 30 days, and is determined by a forecast service to which we subscribe, about 65 per cent accurate.

We cannot agree to ship exactly on a certain date, or so that plants will arrive at a certain time. We cannot notify before shipment, or give orders other similar special handling. Sorry!

We cannot agree to delay shipment beyond May 20th. Strawberry plants, May 10th.

Because of difference in climate we cannot ship orders in exact rotation as received. However, orders booked early are given preference within their proper shipping time.

HOW TO ORDER

Send money by safe means. Unregistered currency sent at your risk. Add 5c exchange on personal check.

No C.O.D. or Open Accounts. Send cash with order.

Shipping Charges. Express shipments, you pay upon delivery; parcel post, pay us after shipment is complete.

If there is no express office in your town, give name of nearest office and distance from you on order blank. If distance is great, we will ship parcel post.

Please don't try to guess the weather. It simply can't be done. Do not specify any shipping date unless for some special reason other than weather. In such cases we will ship as near as possible to your specified date, but can make no guarantees as we are still controlled by weather and labor conditions here.

Quince

Of all the spreads for children's bread, Quince honey is the best, and adults like it, too. Suggestion: If you can't get your favorite maple syrup for your waffles or pancakes, try Quince honey. Ummm! Don't make my mouth water!

Here's how: 3½ pounds Quinces, 1 orange, 4½ pounds sugar, 1 cup orange juice, 2 cups water.

P.S.—Don't worry about the sugar. By the time the tree fruits, rationing will be over—WE HOPE.

Quince trees: Bear August and September. Bear young. Prices above.

Apricot

We used to think that Apricots couldn't be grown in the North, but now here is a variety that can, and the fruit is exceptionally good, too. Not at all difficult to grow, and you'll get good prices for the fruit. Grow them just as you would Plums, but if possible give them a northern exposure, to delay blooming, and thus eliminate danger from late frosts. Have one in your back yard instead of the old-fashioned Apple tree. Prices above.

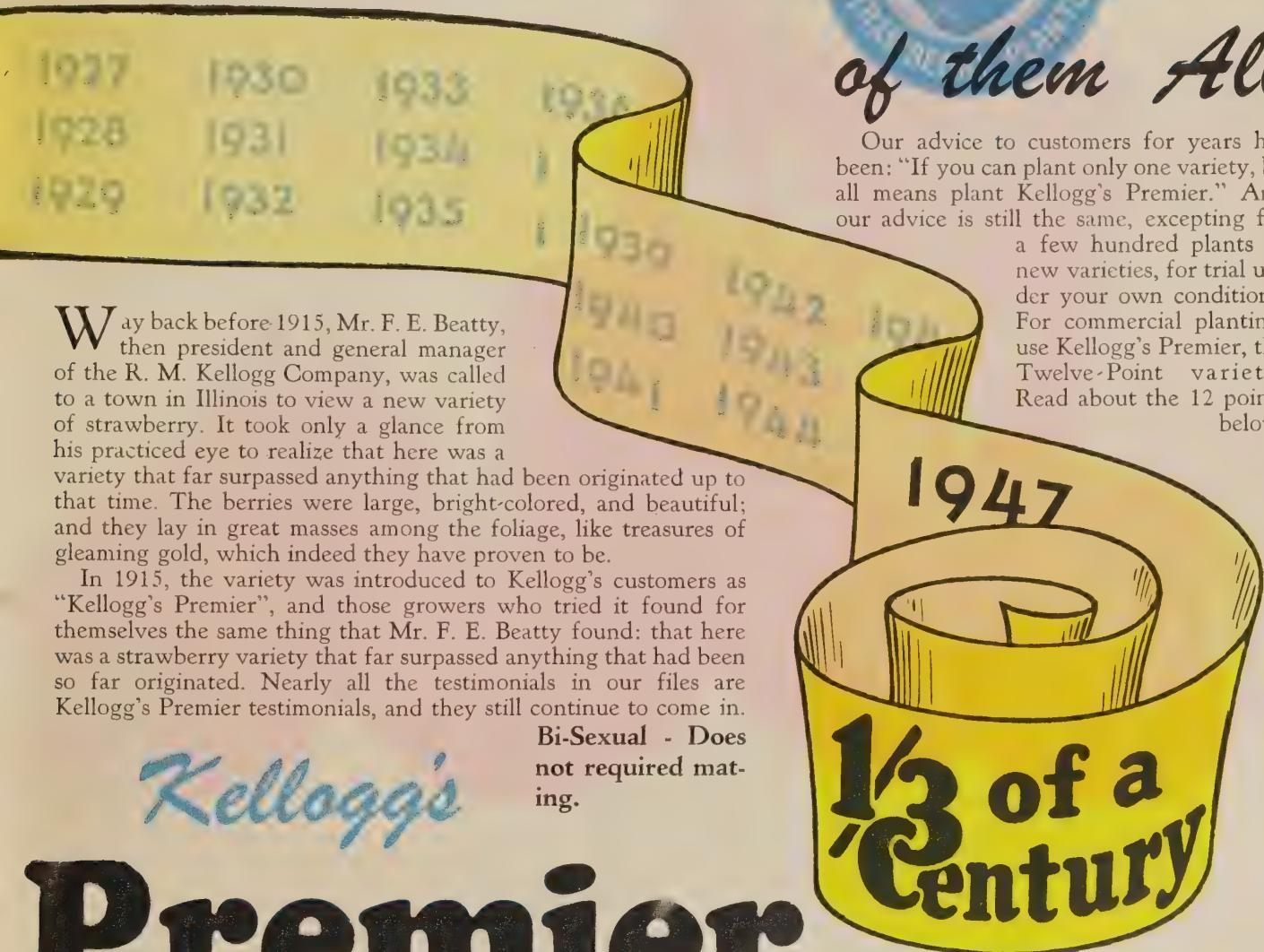

We once planted in March, then the ground froze solid for two weeks. Every plant lived.
