DESCRIPTION—As it is very difficult to describe the beauty of these flowers on paper, I have simply mentioned the color and habits of each.

CLASSIFICATION—I have classified the glads into three different groups or types. First, the exhibition or commercial type, which consists of the large flowering, wide open bloom. Second, the Grandiflora type, which consists of glads the size of the first, or slightly smaller, some with slightly hooded petals, and with the beauty and gracefulness of the slender Primulinus types. This flower is very beautiful. Third, the Primulinus type, which is a hooded bloom, on slender, graceful spikes. They are especially fine for decorating, etc.

PRICES—You will find my prices very reasonable for high quality bulbs. Six bulbs will be sold at dozen rate. One hundred bulbs at six times the dozen rate.

POSTAGE—I pay postage to all parts of the United States.



DAHLIAS

Just a word in regard to the Dahlias I offer. They have been classed as nearly as possible to the type which they belong, as follows: decorative type, consists of full centered, broad petaled, large varieties. Hybrid Cactus type, very large usually, produced from decorative and cactus types. Peony type, open centers, showing the pollen. They are semidouble. Pom Pom type, the very small, ball-shaped Dahlia, should not be disbudded.

It is very difficult, in fact impossible to describe the color and beauty of the Dahlia on paper. I urge all who possibly can to visit my gardens or see my flowers at the fairs.

GREEN PLANTS

I recommend Green Plants, such as I furnish. They are nice, stocky, well-rooted plants, and will give as good satisfaction as tubers. They, as a rule, produce as good, or better flowers than tubers, as well as better tubers.

Plants will be ready for shipment May 15.

I guarantee safe arrival of plants to any part of the United States or Canada.

CULTIVATION

LOCATION—Open, sunny or partial shade. Cultivate soil thoroughly. Plant May 1st or June 20th. Plant bulb about four inches deep. Lay bulb flat with eye up. Work a little fertilizer or manure in soil. Cultivate at least once a week. After plants are well above the ground, water thoroughly about once a week. When buds appear, it may help to add a little fertilizer and lightly rake it into the soil.

DISBUDDING—To obtain best results. Cut off all the side shoots on each stem above the second set of leaves. In this way you will obtain better flowers and can cut longer stems.

DIGGING—After the frost has killed the plant, the clump should be lifted, and the stock cut off about two inches from the crown.

STORING—Tubers should be stored in a dry, cool cellar. They should be covered well if there is heat in the cellar, to keep them from shrivelling.

In the spring, divide the clump, so as to get an eye with each tuber.
