## Asparagus

## 1 oz. to 100 ft., 4 lbs . per acre.

CULTURE-When starting an Asparagus bed from seed, it is advisable to soak the seed for 24 hours before planting. This makes germination more rapid and cermain. Sow in Spring in rows about 18 inches apart, allowing 15 to 20 seeds to the foot. Cover 2 inches deep. When plants are foot. Cover 2 inches deep. When plants are well established, thin to about an inch The plants will be ready to set in a permanent bed the following Spring.

GIANT WASHINGTON, A rust-resisting asparagus. This splendid new asparagus which has been bred up under U. S. Government supervision, has proven to be of unquestioned merit both for the home garden or for production on a large scale. The color is good and quality excellent. The rows should be 2 to 3 feet apart and the seeds covered $11 / 2$ to 2 inches deep. Thin the young plants to 3 to 6 in . apart in the rows. Shallow cultivation should be frequent until blossoming then stop to avoid injury to roots. Root injury causes the blossoms to fall off. For sucsummer. CULTURE-Seed should be sown at the rate of one ounce to 100 feet of row. The rows should be spaced 141 to 24 ins. apart. Work the soil well and cover the seeds about an inch deep. A rich sandy loam is most favorable, but nearly all types of soil will provide Beets if sufficiently fertilized and properly tilled.

EARLY WONDER. A new variety that is an improvement over the old Crosby's Egyptian, from which it originated. It is very nearly globular in shape and the flesh is dark red, sweet and tender. CULTURE-For plants of early kinds, sow seed in January under glass, and put out into flats about 2 inches apart. Transplant to open ground as early in the plant to open ground as early in the $11 / 2$ to 2 feet apart, in rows, which should be 3 feet apart. Cultivate frequently, and be during dry weather water copiously. Late during dry weather water copiously. Late Cabbage seed should be sown in drills in open ground during April and May, and transplanted in June or July. Fertilize heavily, using 400 pounds nitrate of soda per acre in three dressings, one-third when plants are set out, and two-thirds a month apart later.

## LAWN GRASS

## How to Have a Good Lawn

Spade the ground deeply and see that it is thoroughly pulverized. Work in a good commercial fertilizer. Sheep guano or peat commercial fertilizer. Sheep guano or peat
moss will add humus and improve the seed moss will add humus and improve the seed bed. Rake level and water thoroughly so
the ground will settle. The seed bed should the ground will settle. The seed bed should
be allowed to stand for about two weeks, watering from time to time so the weed seeds will sprout.

Roll the ground before seeding, to prevent it from settling unevenly, and then rake the surface lightly. Sow the seed so as to cover the ground thoroughly, and then cover it lightly with soil. Roll again so as to press the seed in firmly.

Grass seed will germinate in from 8 to 15 days, according to the weather. If a lawn is made during the summer, the ground should be covered lightly with peat after the seed has been rolled, so as to retain the moisture. ## TREATMENT OF GLADIOLUS BULBS FOR THRIPS

To treat your Gladiolus Bulbs for thrips use Napthalene Flakes at the rate of 1 oz . to each 100 large or 250 medium size bulbs. Cover the containers, preferably a shallow box or tray with newspaper. Perforate the paper with small holes to allow excessive gas to escape. After three weeks sift out the flakes. This treaiment will kill both thrips and eggs. Do not treat the bulbs with napthalene after the roots begin to show, as it will burn them.

Another good treatment to give the bulbs just before planting is the use of Lysol solution. Mix 4 teaspoonfuls of Lysol to 1 gallon of water. Soak the tulbs in this solution for 16 hours or more. The bulbs may be dipped and left for as long as three weeks before planting.


## PEONIES

Peonies do not bloom well the first year but improve rapidly when established.
The following twelve double peonies are considered among the best in their class. Many of them are very fragrant.

Peonies are easily grown almost anywhere in ordinary garden soil, the principal thing to remember in planting is to see that the eyes are not more than an inch or two below the surface. While Peonies give best results when fall planted, in this climate they may be planted any time during winter up until about April 1st, with average weather.
