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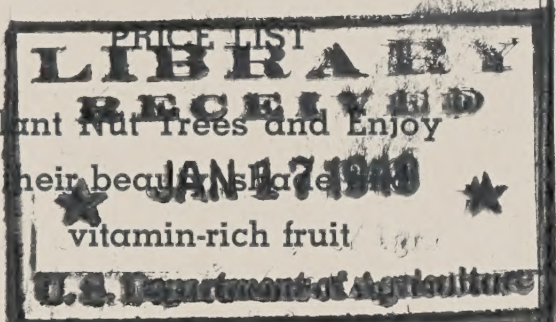

All Our Nut Trees Are Grafted on Native Black Walnut Stock . . .

. . . which assures you of hardy trees that
will adjust themselves to almost any soil con-
dition. In order that these trees will have
proper roots to promote rapid growth and
early productivity, we scientifically develop a
strong and vigorous root system. A small
tree with heavy roots will attain greater height
in a shorter time, than a newly-set-out tree
which is taller, but lacks sufficient root fibres.

PLANTING GUIDE

When trees are received unpack them with care. Immediately heel them in the ground. As soon as possible dig the holes where the trees are to be planted. This hole must be large enough to spread all the roots out. Plant nut trees as deep as they were in the nursery. A dirt line will indicate where on the bark. If they are set a little deeper no harm is done, but do not set them shallow. The best fertilizer is well-rotted cow manure mixed with one good handful of agricultural lime for each tree. Mix this into the soil you use for planting the tree. Put a layer of this mixture into the hole; spread the roots on this and continue to fill the hole until top level is reached. While putting soil in, firm it around the tree and finish up by building a saucer-shaped ring around the tree for water.

Nut trees need water and good air circulation. Choose a high elevation if possible and do not fear cold weather. It will not harm them. Any place you would consider proper for a peach orchard will be ideal for nut trees also. Spring is the favorite planting time.

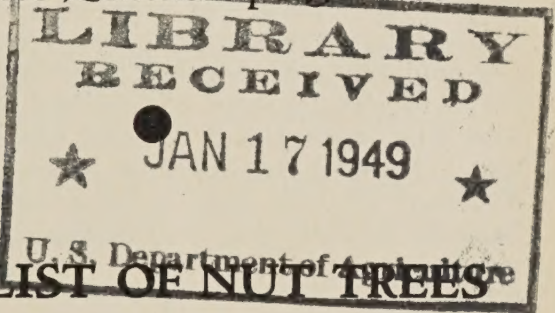



Recently a new and justifiable interest has sprung up in the matter of Nut trees as valuable ornamentals in landscaping. For the benefit of those who are not well acquainted with nut trees, I want to say that they have a majestic beauty peculiar to themselves. The foliage which is generally of a lighter green than other trees gives a somewhat tropical effect when used as landscape material.


The nut tree produces a fruit with a definite marketable and edible value. You can choose your favorite nut tree and enjoy its beauty as part of your landscaping and then in the fall also enjoy its fruit.

The Carpathian Walnut which makes a magnificent shade tree with its broad flat leaves has a very interesting history. It originated on the cold sub-zero slopes of the Carpathian Mountains in the Ukraine region and was introduced into this country and Canada less than a decade ago. Here it has already made many friends. The nut of this tree is akin to the California English walnut and its lumber is of surprising value.

Another choice might be the Black Walnut, a native, which is a large growing specimen and makes excellent shade. There are perhaps a dozen named varieties of the Black Walnut—all fine ornamental trees that produce a thin shelled nut.

Heart-nut trees are rapid growing. Their form is low, broad top and tropical in effect while the nut retains the flavor of the Butter-nut.

The Hickory-nut tree does not need a lengthy introduction as most everyone in this country is familiar with it. In recent years some very fine thin-shelled varieties have been grafted.

BLACK WALNUT (Juglans Nigra)

Benton — This variety won second place in the New York and New England contest in 1934. While the nuts are smaller than some of the other varieties they crack well and are of good quality.

Snyder — Won first place in the New York and New England contest in 1934. Large, thin shelled nuts that crack out well.

Stambaugh — Won first place in Northern Nut Growers' Contest of 1926. Nuts are large, thin shelled and crack well.

Thomas — One of the oldest and most nearly standard variety of Black Walnut.

Stabler — One of the best and hardiest of Black Walnuts. Nuts are thin shelled and of fine quality.

Price of all Black Walnuts — \$3.00 each.

ENGLISH WALNUT (Juglans Regia)

Broadview — The nuts of this variety are as large as the largest English walnuts. They mature in Michigan climate, and in their quality they equal the best of California English walnuts.

HART NUT (Juglans Cordiformis)

Fodermaier — A form of Japanese walnut. They are very rapid growers of ornamental type and an excellent shade tree. The nuts have the flavor of the Butternut. These trees bear young and are consistent bearers. Price.....\$4.00

Wright — Similar to Fodermaier in habit, but not well known in this part of New York State. Price.....\$4.00

HICKORY

Davis — A true shagbark. First prize winner in the New York and New England contest of 1934. Nuts are of medium size and their cracking quality the very best.

Fox (Shagbark) — First prize winner in the Northern Nut Growers contest of 1934. Nuts are larger than the Davis and their cracking quality excellent.

Murdock (Shagbark) — A variety of far northern origin. Cracking quality of nuts is good, flavor is excellent, size of nut above the average.
