## How New Varieties are Born

There is no phase of flower growing more fascinating than creating new varietios. All that is needod is a keen sonsc of observation, a well devoloped curiosity and a pair of deft hands. Of course a yen for keeping records and e few simple tools will aid in the scientific aspects. As most gardeners are vell supplied with these qualities, the only other thing nooded is a knowledge of the mechanics of hybridization which are so casy thoy can be performed by a child.

Flowers have two essential sexual parts, the stigma and the anthers. The stigma is the female part. The throe anthers are the malo parts carrying tho pollen. These parts in the center of every glad floret are quite discornable and casily distinguished from one another.

To properly cross glads one should have a supply of the small blank price tags with strings attached, like those used by department stores, a pair of tweezers, a supply of small envelopes and paper bags and a soft lead pencil.

Go into the garden early on the morning the florets you intend to use first open. With the twoozors remove tho anthers from the nevly opened floret. Thoso may be dropped into a properly labeled envelope and used to pollenate other specimens. Mext, tie a label (price tag) to the floret loosely so as not to interfere rith future grovth of tho scedpod. The label is applied now to aid in finding the prepared floret the next day. To be thoroly accurate and scientific, a paper bag should now be tied ovor the floret so the boes and hunning birds cannot roach the stigma with unvanted pollon. Bagging is not alrays done as it has bcen found that if all but the top hood potal is cut or broken array the boes and birds seldom bothor it. lany breeders morely romove the anthors, hoping that the fev chence crosses may give as good or better results as their own.

The stigma is seldom receptive the first day so When the desired number of florets are prepared you wait until the next day to do the actual crossing. Crosses are most successful if made during the warmer part of the day, from shortly before noon until about 5 P. M. They seldom take during rainy or damp weather. Upon returning the next day, pollen of the desired variety is dusted carefully upon the three tiny prongs of the stigma of the previously prepared floret. When properly receptive these tiny prongs will be open and covered with a slightly sticky substance. Close observance will soon teach you the proper time to apply the pollen. Now, write the name of the stigma or seed bearing parent followed by the name of the pollen parent on the label.

If your crosses are successful, in three or four weeks there will be fat seed pods that must now be watched so that they may be harvested as soon as the pods begin to split open. Place the pods in properly labeled bags then store them in a dry cool place. When dry clean the pod shells and the thin wafer-like disks off the seed during spare time. In the spring plant the seed one inch deep in Well prepared fertile beds, again labeling properly. Keep well watered thruout the season for once they start to grow, only a few hours dry will often kill the tiny seedlings. In sections where the weather is hot and dry a. lathe shade will be found helpful. If successful, in the fall you will be able to harvest a small bulb for each seed that grew. They now require the same care as other glad bulbs. With good care many of these should bloom the second summer and you will become a confirmed "Glad Fiend".

It will be found that each seedling has developed into something different. Most will be inferior to existing varieties. The clever breeder, with luck, may be able to pick one or two good ones from several thousand seedlings. The ratio is not high, but the thrill when you do get a good one is great.

Note: Sports are not developed from seed but appear as mutations or freaks that develop in natural bulb division.

## Remarks

We are probably the only growers who make a definite effort to list all top winners and believe we offer the the most complete list of winners in the U. S. A.

This year the "Bulb Buyers Guide", a new feature, will help you pick the top winners. It lists the 101 varieties that led the Parade of Beauties at the shows, as compiled from the latest complete reports. Several fine new glads are not on this list because their newness and higher price has prevented their being widely grown or exhibited, even tho they are winning in most of the shows where they have been shown. When stocks of these are more widely distributed, their winnings will be much greater. A suggested rule for the bulb purchaser is: Any variety costing over 25 c that is able to win 5 or more awards may be as good as, or better than cheaper varieties winning many prizes. Also a variety that can win firsts and championships in shows all over the Continent is bound to be good in your own garden.

## CATALOG FEATURES

WINNINGS: Using the NEGS and other reliable reports of the major shows held in America in 1946 and 1947 and tabulating only first prizes we find that at least 409 varieties were able to win 3 or more lst prize awards. Many of these are listed in this catalog. The variety name is preceded by the number of prizes won.

ORIGINAIOR: Because in a few cases two or more varieties have been given the same name and to aid those interested in following the work of certain breeders, we are listing the Originator's name. It follows the variety name.

DATE OF INTRODUCTION comes next. A candid opinion here may be of help: Because a variety is a few years old does not necessarily mean it is inferior or outdated.

Indeed these tried and true beauties are usually :inper dependable than many of the new expensive variotics, which often have beon put on the market only bocaus? they were "Somebody's Baby" or because the introducom was unaquainted with the fine varieties already available. As proof of the this, check the winnings of Crinkles, originated by Kunderd and introduced in 1916. Minuet by Joe Coleman in 1922 and still the leader in its class, Mother Machree 1927 won plenty of prizes last Yoar, Picardy 1931 winner of more prizes and championships than any othor. There is a long list that would be longer if we were not so prone to discard the old in favor of the new. This docs not meen that there are no good new glads, but mercly that all new ones are not necessarily the best. Where competent judges are used, the ability to win is a very good criterion.

THE CLASSIFICATION ITUMBER designating the size and color group into :rhich the variety has boon placed by the National Classification Cormittee follovs the date of introduction. It is used and recognized by most Gladiolus Societies in the U. S. and Canada. On the show table, varieties compete in these size and color classes. Turn to Bulb Buyers Guide, page 27 for complete explanation.

3iLB SIZES: liost gladiolus growers supplying the retail trade usc threc bulb sizes. LARGE BULBS (indicated by L in this catalog) are sorted so that tho minimue is liz inches in diameter; hovever nost are much larger. It usually takes two years to grow a bulb to this size from a bulblet, altho a percentage of certain varic ties, with good culture, will attain this sizo the first year. Bulbs threc years old or over are no longer considered young bulbs. MEDIUI (M) sized bulbs measure $3 / 4$ to $1 \frac{1}{4}$ inches in diameter and usually produce about as good flowers as the larger size but generally take longer to bloom. SMALL bulbs (S) or planting stocle those measuring less than $3 / 4$ of an inch in dianctg. While this size often produces a fairly large pergantage of bloom in certain varieties, they are
usually much laice, smaller, often not quite up to par in color and ruffled varieties sometimes fail to show much ruffling. The advantages of buying medium or small bulbs are; lst in price as they usually sell for $3 / 4$ to $\frac{T}{4}$ the price of large bulbs. 2nd they produce more bulblets per bulb tian larger sizes there the bulk of the strength goes to produce a fine flover. 3rd purchasing yearling bulbs enables the erower to have voing vigorous bulbs of good size for the next year. BULBLETS (B) are the tiny fellows clustered in the roots. These grow into planting stock or larger with good care but scldom bloom the first year. Germination of bulblets not always sure.

DESCRIPIIOIG of most varieties re our intressions of the way they grow here in Utah. Blooming ciates were tabulated for several years with the conclusion that they were not accurate enough to use in timing for a future show date. Some varieties varied as much as three weeks in our variable Utah veather. Usually most varieties bloom in from 80 to 100 days. Those frequently blooming in less than 80 days are designated as early and those taking over 100 days as late.

PARENTAGES AND PROGENY: A leading feature of our catalog is the listing of the parents, if know, and the more famous progeny. Parents are listed on the next line below the variety name and the progeny list follows the description. The numbers following the progeny's name, thus Minsirel 6 is the complete lnow rinnings since 1940 for this variety.

It should be realized, some varieties that are exceptional on the show bench may be good parents or may not. Also some varieties are able to pass to their offspring fine qualities that are not apparent in their owm makeup. It has been quite definitely proven by livestock breeders and others that the ability and value of a parent is best proven by the records of the progony of that parent. Or as the Bible states "By their fruits ye shall lnow them" Wreept for the fer vsieties that are the rosult of sclf pollenization (natural or artificial) Wo lmov tha all. glads have ivo parents, even tio one or both may be unlmown.
flso that a good glad may get most of its good qualities from bit one of its paronts. Thilc realizing that in all probebility somo of the new unproven varictios may be just as good or botter brecders as the bost of those older ones on thich we already have rocords. Thjs in no way peduces tho valuc of the Proven Psrents. Picardy, Emilc Aubrun, Apricot Glow, Maid of Orleans, and others will be useful for many years. It must be realized too that the picture is never comlete. INCw varieties are being used each yoar those proceny will soon pile up an over increasine nutbor of rinnings. wone wosc narer onos that show pronise mex re nominate the folloving: Rod Charm, Corona, Ulizetheth the Gueen, Whitc Gold, ifyrna and Ivy liobertson. Cno :ionders if any variety tioll ever catch up rith Picardy as most present day winners have Picardy in thoir pedigroc.

# Bulb Buyers Guide 

(see chart on page 29)
With literally thousands of gladiolus varieties on the market (NEGS and NAGC each iisted over 2500 varieties in their 1948 classification lists) and hundreds more coming from the hybridists each year, it becomes increasingly difficult to know what to buy. Naturally, there is no better method of measuring an unfamiliar variety's worth than to check its record on the show bench.

However, too many glads that are able to win a prize or two in their heyday, oftimes in small shows against little competition, are being described hences forth as top winners. At today's more important shows, competition in most classes is keen enough that very few inferior blooms win even a third ribbon. With this in mind, we started, several years ago and intend to continue, to list the current winnings of the leading varieties that won at the larger shows in the U. S.A. and Canada.

Show schedules of the larger shows where the five size classes and the twenty five or more color classes are used, make it possible for well over 100 specimens to win lst prizes in each division (Single spike, three spike, etc.). After tabulating reports of nearly 50 State, Regional, National and International shows, there were 409 varieties that won three or more first prizes during 1946 and 1947 ( 1948 reports not all in at time of tabulation). This still makes quite a list to select from.

In an attempt to narrow the field still more and further aid the buyer, we present this year, the BULB BUYERS GUIDE of the leading winners in each size and color class which, including the three ties; cuts the list to 101 varieties. Other purposes of the Chart are; 1. To encourage introduction and sale of better glads in all size and color classes by graphically showing which varieties are todays leaders.
2. To discourage the flood of mediocre varieties in already overcrowded classes
3. To encourage the retention of such wonderful old varieties as Crinkles, Pleardy, Minuet, Margaret Fulton, etc., at least until we have something defin itely better. Too many of us are led to supplant these fine varleties with new ones simply because they are new and described with bigger words.
4. To encourage the growing, showing and use of more colors, sizes and types. Some classes have few if any qualifying varieties. (See Supplemental Information on the following pages.)
5. To have a concise list of recognized leaders for use in comparison and evaluation of any variety, old or new. This should be of particular interest to the hybridist, who must decide whether to pull that pretty seedling or carefully tend it, with the hope of its future introduction. Many a beauty, better than any disemminated variety in 1ts class, has been pulled and thrown into the ash heap because its owner had no way of knowing its value.
6. To aid the florist and cutflower grower in selecting the best varieties for their use, for, contrary to othe belief of many, the leading winners in a class are nearly always the best cutflowers also. Example: Red Charm, Picardy, Minuet, Leading Lady, Silver Wings, Elizabeth the Queen, Spotlight, Margaret Fulton, etc. 7. We will be glad to hear of other uses you may find for the Bulb Buyers Guide.

Using NEGS, NAGC and other show reports of the last two years, 1946 and 1947 ( 1948 reports not a11 in at time of compilation) and considering only varieties that won a total of three or more first prizes, the top winner in each class is shown.

Both the number designating the color and the color name are given to describe the color classes, with the letter L. standing for Light and D. for Deep ( 10 L 。 Yellow means light yellow and 12 D 。 Yellow means deep yellow and so forth). (Continued on back of Chart)

The size classes indicate floret size as follows: 100 min Mature (Florets smaller than $2 \frac{1}{2}$ inches in diameter), 200 mmall (Above $2 \frac{1}{2}$ inches thru $3 \frac{1}{4}$ ), 30000 Medium (Above $3 \frac{1}{4}$ thru $4 \frac{1}{4}$ inches), 400 large (Above $4 \frac{1}{8}$ to $5 \frac{1}{2}$ inches), 500-Giant ( $5 \frac{1}{2}$ inches and larger).

The number preceding the variety name indicates the number of competing varieties that won three or more lst prizes in this class. The number following the variety name indicates the number of lst prizes it won to reach top place. ## SECTIONS IV

SMALL FLOWERED WINNERS (Classes 100 and 200)
These varieties naturally produce florets of $3 \frac{1}{4}$ inches or less in diameter. They are used extensively for bridal bouquets, small floral pieces, table decoractions, sprays, corsages, etc. They are often called baby glads. Their beauty when used alone or with other flowers is unsurpassed. Other advantages arc; more bulbs per dollar, more spikes per bulb, earlier blooms from most varieties and less care as the wind never tips them over. 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## GLADS ARE EASY TO GROW

1. Dip 'em- 3 hours, 1 teaspoonful Lysol to 1 quart of water, then plant immediatly.
2. Plant 'em- 4 to 6 inches deep in fertile soil, where they will get full sun.
3. Irrigate 'em- Regularly and liberally as needed.
4. Dust 'em- When up 6 inches high and every 10 days thereafter with 5\% DDT.
5. Use 'em- Wherever a beautiful bouquet is needed.
6. Dig 'em- 8 to 10 weeks after they are thru blooming, unless they were planted late, then dig before severe frost.
7. Cut off tops- Same day as dug.
8. Store 'em- In a cool dry place, avoid freezing. No sand, No soil, No muss, No fuss.
9. Clean 'er- 6 weeks after being dug or when thoroly dry, remove old roots and any adhering soil, leave husks on.
10. Dust 'em- 1 tablespoonful $5 \%$ DDT per 100 bulbs and return to storage.
