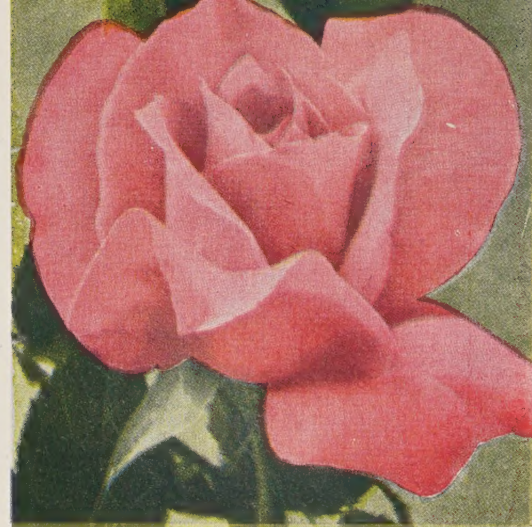

CECILE BRUNNER (Known also as Mignon and the Sweetheart Rose). If rose gardeners everywhere were asked to name their 10 favorite roses, Cecile Brunner would be included—it is so universally loved. Its small, exquisite pink buds are perfectly formed. We have admired it in low growing borders, in groups among the other roses, and in the great masses of pink bloom given so bountifully and repeatedly by the climbing form. We consider Cecile Brunner among the six best roses. Each \$1.25.

PINKIE (Pat. 712). A new Polyanthus rose entirely different from any other. A perfection of form not heretofore known in baby roses.
