From Holland we import the world's finest Tulip, Narcissus, Crocus, Grape Hyacinth and Fritillaria bulbs so that our customers may enjoy a magnificent color display in their gardens in early Spring. All bulbs offered below are the top (largest) size and the very best of the Holland crop.

Darwin Tulips

Unsurpassed for color brilliance, these popular Darwins have large rounded flowers borne on tall stems. They are especially decorative when planted in groups in the shrub or evergreen border or in perennial beds.

Charles Needham—Brilliant scarlet.

City of Haarlem—Deep red with steel blue base.

Dillenburg—Salmon-orange. A new breeder tulip blooming at the same time as the Darwins.

Eclipse—Deep, blood-red with white margined blue base.

Golden Harvest—Deep lemon yellow.

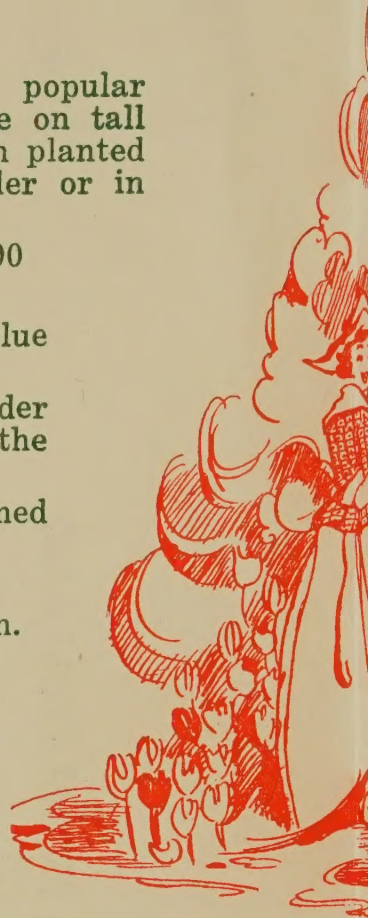
La Tulipe Noire—Rich, velvety black-maroon.

Pride of Zwanenburg—Carmine-rose.

Princes Elizabeth—Bright rosy pink.

The Bishop—Rich deep violet.

White Giant—Large, pure white.



Early Single Tulip

\$1.60 per dozen \$11.50 per 100

Kaiserkroon, the outstanding early Tulip, comes into bloom about ten days earlier than the Darwin varieties. Bright red, heavily edged with deep golden yellow.

Cottage Tulips

Flowers are long and oval shaped on tall sturdy stems and offer an interesting contrast to the Darwins. They begin blooming a little later than the Darwin varieties.

Advance—Orange scarlet, dark blue base.

Barbara Pratt—Cherry pink, creamy yellow base.

Mrs. John T. Scheepers—Pure yellow. Long, oval-shaped flower.

Ossie Oswald—Cream white petals, edged with pink.

Fritillaria

Several bell-shaped flowers on a single two-foot stem, each flower resembling an upside-down lily.

Large selected bulbs, 55c each

Imperialis Aurora—Orange red.

Imperialis Crown-Upon-Crown—Carmine red.

's This Fall

Because these bulbs must be planted beginning in October, we suggest that you plan now to plant several of these choice varieties. They will bloom next Spring and continue blooming many seasons thereafter. The long-stemmed Tulips and Narcissi are especially fine for cutting and bouquets.



Narcissus or Daffodils

Every home should have some of these long-stemmed flowers in perennial beds or in group plantings in the shrub or evergreen border.

Clamor—Creamy white petals with yellow center.

King Alfred—Deep golden yellow of intense uniform color throughout. Wide trumpet deeply frilled and recurved.

Mrs. E. H. Krelage—The white counterpart of King Alfred described above. Pale primrose on opening, changing to white.

Twink—Alternating soft yellow and deep orange petals.

Crocus

These flowers herald the first signs of Spring, often blooming before snow leaves the ground. Be sure to establish some Crocus corner to be observed in early Spring.

Mammoth Yellow—Yellow.

Mont Blanc—White.

Purpurea Grandiflora—Deep purple.

Queen of the Blues—Light blue.

Muscari, Grape Hyacinth

A beautiful Spring flower having spikes closely set with small round bells. Grows about five inches high and does well in partial shade or full sun.

Alba—White.

Armeniacum—Dark blue.

Heavenly Blue—Light blue.

Planting Instructions

TULIPS: Plant 5 inches apart with top of bulb 4 inches below soil surface.

NARCISSI and FRITILLARIA: Plant 12 inches apart with top of bulb 4 inches below soil surface.

CROCUS and GRAPE HYACINTHS: Plant 2 inches apart with top of bulb 2 inches below soil surface.
