## Color in Your Spring Garden

SPRING-FLOWERING bulbs are just about the most satisfactory things that you can plant. They give you plenty of cheerful color outdoors just at the time when you think you cannot bear another duII, gloomy day, and they require no care in the way of weeding, dusting and spraying. The forethought necessary to see that they get planted in the fall is all that is needed. After their glorious burst of bloom is over, spring bulbs then gracefully retire from the picture, yielding their space to the annuals that you may choose to replace them, or to the perennials and shrubs that need more time to come into fuII growth and bloom.
This catalog offers plenty of variety in the way of Tulips and Narcissus, with the charming miniature bulbs to be planted in great drifts. As a foretaste of spring, we also offer many very fine bulbs for indoor growing. Thus it is possible to enjoy spring bulbs for several months of the year.
Daffodils and Crocus may be planted outdoors between September and mid-October, Tulips in Iate October, and Hyacinths from September to December. Be sure to plant the bulbs at a uniform depth. The easiest way to do this is to remove all soil from the bed to the depth required, set the bulbs, then carefully replace the soil. In using a trowel or dibble for the job, great care should be taken to see that the base of the bulb is pressed frrmly into the soil.

After the ground is frozen to a depth of 4 to 5 inches, put on a cover of straw or leaves and do not remove it until early spring. Tulips and Hyacinths should be taken up each spring after blooming but Daffodils may be left in the ground for three or four years at a time. In any case, the foliage should be allowed to mature, either where they have flowered or after the bulbs have been taken up. Crocuses should not be placed where grass is kept clipped. To obtain best effects with them and other small-flowering bulbs it is essential to use them in large quantities.

Lilies demand good drainage. This may be secured by placing a quantity of sand below each bulb or by mixing peat or humus with the soil. Tall varieties should be planted where they receive protection from high winds; all enjoy partial shade.

## Pre-cooled Bulbs

The bulbs are dug as usual, cured for two to three weeks, graded and then placed in a temperature of $50^{\circ}$ Fahr. from six to eight weeks. Storage at this temperature makes normally late-flowering varieties early and early sorts mucb earlier and easier to force; in fact, they require only six to eight weeks from planting to full bloom. Pre-cooled bulbs should be potted promptly on receipt and kept in a cool place for proper root-action. On or about November 25, sample pots or flats should be removed to greenhouse or frames to see if they are ready to grow buds and foliage.

## FOR FALL PLANTING

All Lilies do not like the same conditions. The one universal requirement is absolutely perfect drainage. The loose, scaly bulbs which Lilies produce are susceptible to rot in wet soil, and it will pay to go to some pains to be sure that the ground for them
is properly drained. When Lilies are well established in the garden, it is well to feed them with a top-dressing of manure after the tops have died down in the autumn. It is better to omit manure from the Lily-bed before planting.
