SEEDS and other materials are forwarded as ready, and are offered subject to arrival or harvest. Minimum size acceptable order is Two Dollars on plants and bulbs. Remittances should be by money order or postal note when possible, but we will accept personal checks in cases where it is inconvenient to get a postal order. Please do not use personal checks in paying for any order of less than two dollars value. If you send actual cash, register the letter. All seeds are quoted postpaid, but plants and bulbs are offered for express shipment, collect for shipping charges. If you want plants or bulbs by mail, add to your remittance for postage and mail packing on the basis of 10% for shipments east of the Mississippi, and of 15% for points west of the river. Safe arrival in good, growable condition is guaranteed of bulbs and plants shipped during the months of September, October and November, and again during the months of April, May and June. During the remaining months plants and bulbs are guaranteed as to arrival only, and not against freezing or heating in transit. We shall, though, always pack with every protection and precaution. Even during the winter months, express shipments usually go through safely.



AUTUMN SEED-SOWING

Seeds of certain hardy perennials, and of many bulbs, shrubs and trees, seem to need a period of exposure to low soil temperatures in order to put them in shape to germinate. The best way to handle such seeds is to sow them in open ground seedbeds, or in cold-frame, in late autumn, October or November, but in regions with mild winters, or elsewhere whenever the ground thaws for a few days, the sowings may continue during December, January and February with excellent results. Of course seeds of house plants may be sown any time of year, usually under glass in a sunny window or greenhouse. We list at least 1000 different kinds of seeds that may be sown to advantage during the autumn months, either out of doors or under glass. See our GENERAL CATALOG. No. 53 for descriptions and offerings of them.

EREMURUS OR FOXTAIL LILY



The majestic Desert Lily, with magnificent flower spikes that bear hundreds of bright, star-shaped blossoms in pink, rose, primrose, crange, yellow, copper or white, will grow eventually to a height of four to eight feet. Blossoms that are in suggestion of pink Water-lilies, in shades from blush to near rose. It grows to only four inches, but the flowers are, for this, of quite extraordinary size, and there are many of them open at one time. THE LOVELY LILY OF PERU



ALSTROEMERIA AURANTIACA

Lily of Peru is an old name for ALSTROEMERIA, and the flowers do indeed rival the Lilies in beauty, though they are actually neither Lilies nor all of them from Peru. They are handsome plants, making great sheafs of blossom splendor. The roots are brittle, tangled tubers that must be kept in soil to prevent drying. At our Old Orchard Nursery we find Alstroemeria to be quite soundly winter-hardy. We mulch the plantings with straw in late autumn, parting this in spring to let the stems through, but not removing it. There is nothing on the Nursery more decorative than the Alstroemerias when they are in full bloom. In very cold regions the roots can be dug in autumn and cellar-stored in sand. HARDY BULBS AND NEAR-BULBS

For Autumn Planting

Kinds here offered are for delivery during the autumn months. While we try to keep adequate stocks, some kinds are sure to be sold out before others. If, then, you order toward the end of the season, won't you give two or three alternates at the end of your order in case some kinds are gone.

Kinds here are garden-hardy at Philadelphia unless contrary statement is made. Also of course, most of them are hardy much further North. If you are in doubt as to winter-hardiness of any new kind in your particular climate, just give a good mulching of straw or litter the first year and it will probably come through all right.

All bulbs will be the full blooming size natural to the particular kind, but note, please, that some kinds are naturally tiny, even though their flowers are not.

LILY OF THE ALTAI—It is IXIOLIRION MONTANUM, literally, I suppose the "Ixia Lily of the Mountains", a quite delightful blue-flowered Amarylliad that ranges in the wild from Turkestan to the Mongolian Altai. 


