





With the mounting cost of living making inroads on every family budget, a home-garden is a real economy measure and the fresh, health-giving vegetables that you get from it are much superior to any you can buy. Besides, gardening is good exercise in the open air, which will help to make you feel your best.

ASPARAGUS

Equally good results may be secured by planting seed or roots; seed is cheaper but from one to two years' time is saved by starting with roots.

Sow seed early in the spring, in shallow drills 12 to 15 inches apart, and when the plants are 4 inches high, thin out to 3 inches apart; transplant to the permanent bed the following spring.

An Asparagus bed should be deeply dug and plenty of manure worked in. Set the plants so that the crown is about 3 inches below the bed-level, in rows at least 3 feet apart and 1½ to 2 feet apart in the row. Barely cover at first, filling in as the plants grow. Do not cut the first year.

BROCCOLI

Resembles cauliflower except in color. Suitable for home-garden, market, or freezing. For an early crop, sow the seed in a hotbed in March and transplant seedlings in the open ground after frost. For late crop, sow the seed in the open ground in April and transplant in May or June. Days to maturity are figured from the time the plants are set in the garden.

An ounce of seed will produce about 3,000 plants

True Italian Sprouting. 70 days. A distinct variety with large, solid heads that stay green. Many sprouts develop from the leaf-axils after the heads are cut, and each terminates in a small head which is also edible. Pkt. 15 cts., oz. 50 cts., ¼lb. \$1.50.

FRENCH ARTICHOKE

This highly prized salad can be grown in our climate, provided the plants are given light protection over winter. Start the seed indoors and give the same treatment as you would tomatoes, transplanting to the garden in May. The plants are perennial.

Everyone Can Grow Beans

DWARF GREEN-PODDED AND WAX BEANS

Although the pods of Wax Beans are considered more attractive than those of the green-podded sorts, there is no difference in quality, and personal choice, or market demand, must decide which to grow; both are delicious and both yield bountiful returns from limited space. Home gardeners will want some of both types. As soon as the ground warms up, plant the Beans $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 inches deep and 2 to 3 inches apart in rows 2 to $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet apart. Later plantings should be covered $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 inches deep. For a constant supply, plant every two weeks from May to August.

For Increased Yield Inoculate This Seed with LEGUME-AID.

A pint of seed will sow 150 feet of furrow; 1 to $1\frac{1}{2}$ bushels, depending on variety, will be required for an acre when the seed is planted in drills.

Sure-Crop Stringless Wax. ★ 53 days. Also known as Yellow Bountiful. The pods are of good size, broad, thick-flat, and bright yellow in color, entirely stringless and of fine quality. Top Notch Wax. 50 days. Small, compact plant with creamy

Wax- and Green-podded Pole Beans

Do not plant until the weather is really warm, then cover 6 to 10 Beans 2 inches deep in hills 3 to 4 feet apart, thinning out to 3 or 4 plants to each pole.

A quart of seed will plant 100 to 150 hills; from 12 to 16 quarts will plant an acre, depending upon the size of the Beans

Asparagus, or Yard-Long. 72 days. Pods round, slender and 2 feet or more in length. Generally grown as a novelty. ½pt. 45 cts., pt. 75 cts., qt. \$1.25.

NOTE: One pint of Beans weighs about 1 lb., 1 quart about 2 lbs., and 1 bushel, 60 lbs.

Bush Lima Beans

Never plant Bush Lima Beans until the weather is really warm. Plant on edge, with the eye down, 4 to 5 inches apart and 1 inch deep, in rows $2\frac{1}{2}$ to 3 feet apart; thin the plants to 8 to 10 inches apart.

A pint of seed will sow 100 feet of furrow; a bushel will sow an acre

Baby Fordhook. 70 days. A thick-seeded, small Lima Bean of excellent quality which remains green a long time. Extraheavy cropper; especially suitable for canning. ½pt. 35 cts., pt. 55 cts., qt. \$1.00, pk. \$6.15, bus. \$22.80.

Burpee Improved. ★ 75 days. The large bushes bear loads of big, broad pods, each containing 4 or 5 Beans of the largest size and finest quality. ½pt. 40 cts., pt. 65 cts., qt. \$1.20, pk. \$6.45, bus. \$24.00.

Pole Lima Beans

These take longer to bear than the Bush Limas, but yield larger crops and continue to bear for a longer period. The seed is usually planted in hills, at least 3 feet apart each way, dropping 4 to 6 Beans to the hill. Set poles 8 to 10 feet long in each hill to support the vines.

A quart of seed will plant 100 hills; 20 quarts will plant one acre

Carpinteria. 90 days. Large pods, containing 3 to 5 Beans which are very thick and mealy and retain their green color even when ripe. ½pt. 40 cts., pt. 65 cts., qt. \$1.20, pk. \$6.45, bus. \$24.00.

Challenger. ★ 92 days. A vigorous grower, hardy, and very productive. Pods are 5 to 6 inches long and filled with 4 or 5 thick, plump Beans of delicious flavor. ½pt. 40 cts., pt. 65 cts., qt. \$1.20, pk. \$6.45, bus. \$24.00.

King of the Garden. ★ 88 days. Broad pods 5 to 6 inches long, containing 4 or 5 large, flat Beans. Probably the leading Pole Lima Bean for both home and market-gardeners. Allow only two vines to each pole. ½pt. 40 cts., pt. 65 cts., qt. \$1.20, pk. \$6.45, bus. \$24.00.

Leviathan. ★ 85 days. A general favorite, being early and productive, bearing loads of giant pods, well filled with large tender Beans. ½pt. 40 cts., pt. 65 cts., qt. \$1.20, pk. \$6.45, bus. \$24.00.

Edible Soy Beans

Bansei. 90 days. A very popular variety of vegetable-type Soy Beans. Early and extremely productive. They are delicious when eaten green or dry. Seeds are bright green while young and yellow when mature. ½pt. 25 cts., pt. 40 cts., qt. 65 cts., pk. \$3.30, bus. \$11.40.

CHICORY

Large Rooted. 65 days. Grown for its roots, which may be cooked and served like turnips. Roots 12 to 14 inches long, 2 inches in diameter at top and tapered. Pkt. 10 cts., ½0z. 30 cts., oz. 50 cts., ½lb. \$1.50, lb. \$5.00.

Witloof or French Endive. 150 days. A delicious winter salad easily forced in a cellar or frost-proof shed. The roots are grown during the summer and fall in the same way as parsnips. Dig them in the fall before severe freezing weather sets in and plant the roots in soil in a box or trench in a cellar or shed. BEETS

Sow seed as early in the spring as possible, in drills 15 to 18 inches apart, covering about 1 inch deep, and thin the plants to 2 to 3 inches apart. Plantings every three weeks until mid-July will furnish a supply of fresh Beets until late fall. Late in June make a large planting to produce Beets for winter use. Harvest before frost and store in pits outdoors, or in a dry cellar. For an extra-early crop start the seed under glass.

An ounce of seed will sow about 100 feet of drill; 6 pounds an acre

Crosby's Extra-Early. ★ 55 days. Dark red skin and deep red flesh; very uniform in shape and size. Pkt. 10 cts., oz. 20 cts., 1/4lb. 65 cts., lb. \$2.00.

MANGEL-WURZEL or CATTLE BEETS

Generally used for winter feeding of poultry and livestock. Sow the seed in April or early May in rows 2 to 3 feet apart and when the plants are 2 to 3 inches high, thin them out to stand 8 to 10 inches apart. Harvest before frost and store in pits outdoors or in a dry, frost-proof cellar.

Four to 5 pounds of seed will sow an acre in drills

Golden Tankard.★ Large, long roots unusually high in feeding value. Oz. 20 cts., 1/4lb. 50 cts., lb. \$1.50, 5 lbs. \$7.00.

CABBAGE

Early Cabbage should be started under glass in February or early March, and transplanted to the open ground as soon as the weather is suitable. For late Cabbage sow the seed outdoors about May 1. Plants should stand 1½ to 2 feet apart, according to variety. Number of days shown indicate days to maturity from the time the plants are set in the garden. Allow about 40 days to produce plants from seed.

Do not make the first sowing until the soil is warm and comparatively dry—the middle of May is usually the earliest it is safe to sow Corn in this section. Plant every 2 weeks until early July. It can be grown in hills or in rows. Hills are placed 2 to 3 feet apart each way, dropping about six seeds in each hill and, when the plants are about 8 inches high, pulling out all but the three or four strongest. Rows are spaced $2\frac{1}{2}$ to $3\frac{1}{2}$ feet apart and the plants thinned to stand 12 to 15 inches apart in the rows. In planting, cover the seed about 2 inches deep. In order that the ears may develop perfectly they must receive plenty of pollent from near-by stalks; consequently, it is always best to plant Sweet Corn in several short rows, side by side, rather than in one or two long rows. If you want to enjoy Sweet Corn far sweeter and richer than any you have ever been able to buy, grow it yourself and pick it just before it is to be cooked.

Prepare hills 4 to 6 feet apart, digging up the soil to a depth of a foot or more and mixing in plenty of manure or compost. Leave the soil in the hills loose and a little higher than the general level of the garden. Sow eight to ten seeds in each hill and thin out all but the strongest three or four plants. Do not disturb the vines after they have started to spread. If the striped beetles interfere with the development of the young plants, spray them with Nicotine Pyrox or dust with Rotenone Dust. 

EGGPLANT

Start the seed in March, in hotbeds or boxes indoors. Push the seedlings along with plenty of light, heat, and moisture, and when they are about 3 inches high, transplant them to 3 to 4-inch paper pots or dirt-bands. Set out in the garden about June 1, spacing 2 to $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet apart each way. Disturb the roots as little as possible in transplanting, and water freely. Days to maturity are from the time the plants are set in the garden. Allow about 50 days to produce the plants from seed.





LETTUCE

By starting seed for the first crop in the hotbed or in flats in the house in February or early March, and by carefully choosing varieties which will furnish a succession of crops in the garden, one may have fresh Lettuce for the table from May to November. Make the first sowing outdoors as soon as the ground can be put in shape, making the seed-bed as fine and mellow as possible. Scatter the seed in shallow furrows at least 15 inches apart, and cover lightly. As soon as the plants are big enough, thin them out to stand 3 to 4 inches apart. Then, when they begin to touch each other in the row, use alternate plants, leaving them 3 to 12 inches apart. Cultivate constantly.





Sow the seed after the soil has warmed up in hills 5 to 6 feet apart, digging the soil to a depth of a foot and mixing in plenty of manure or fertilizer with the bottom soil. No more than 3 or 4 strong plants should be left in each hill. Since Muskmelons require a long growing season, it is a good plan to start the seed in a hotbed or box indoors, using dirt bands or pots, and setting them in the garden after the soil has become warm.

RADISHES

Start outdoors as soon as the ground can be put in shape and sow seed of any of the quick-growing round or olive-shaped sorts, not too thick, in drills $\frac{1}{2}$ inch deep and 1 to $\frac{1}{2}$ feet apart. Thin out the seedlings promptly to stand about an inch apart in the rows. If not thinned out they will only produce tops and not develop a bulb. After putting in seed for the first crop, make additional sowings every ten days to two weeks, but for the later crops, which will ripen in warm weather, use the long varieties.

For late summer and fall use, sow the Summer and Winter Radishes which are larger and slower growing but will, unlike the early round Radishes, thrive in hot weather. The Summer Radishes may be sown any time up to August 1. The big Winter Radishes should be sown late in June to attain full size before frost. One ounce of seed will sow about 100 feet of drill;

RHUBARB

If you start with roots, plant them with the crown about 1 inch below the surface. Give water, if needed, while the plants are producing and dress with manure every year after the cutting season is over.

SPINACH

Spinach is a cool-weather crop and may be sown as soon as the ground can be made ready in the spring and followed with successive sowings every ten days up to the middle of May. NOTE—The time from sowing of seed to cutting of plants varies considerably with the season of the year in which sowings are made. Days given apply to spring sowings.



TOMATOES

The seed should be sown indoors in late February or March, in shallow boxes or pots placed in a warm, sunny window. As soon as the little plants are strong enough, thin or transplant them to stand 3 to 4 inches apart; then when they are about 3 inches high transfer them to small paper pots or dirt-bands. To secure extra-strong, stocky plants, transfer them again, when 6 to 8 inches tall, to larger pots. When all danger from frost is past, set them out in the garden, spacing them about 4 feet apart each way.

Treat the seed with Semesan to prevent damping-off of seedlings. Use Transplantone when transplanting the plants to the garden. (See fertilizer pages.) To guard against blight, spray or dust the plants with a copper fungicide frequently during the season; arsenate of lead or DDT will kill the Tomato worms.

Days to maturity are figured from the time the plants are set in the garden.







Asters prefer an open, sunny situation and they respond amazingly to fertilizers and good cultivation. It is advisable to change the location of the Aster-bed each year if you want large flowers and lots of them. For early bloom, start the seed in a window-box or hotbed, in March, giving the little plants plenty of light and water as required, and thinning 3 to 4 inches apart, or transplanting them when a few inches high to small pots. Set them out after danger from frost is past. For solid beds of color, set the plants 8 to 10 inches apart, but if large flowers and long stems are wanted for cutting, plant at least 1 foot apart in rows $1\frac{1}{2}$ to 2 feet apart. The seed may be sown outdoors in early May with good results except that the plants will bloom later.







The next best time to sow is very early in the spring, in February or March, starting the seed in a box indoors or in a coldframe and setting the plants outdoors the latter part of April. If set out in a spot that is shaded part of the day, where the soil is deep and moist, and the flowers picked daily, the plants may be kept blooming all summer.



Summer-Howering BULBS

In planning a season-long garden, the summer-flowering bulbs are too often overlooked. They are useful in a number of waysfor supplying color in midsummer when many perennials are out of bloom, for filling gaps in the border and for furnishing flowers for cutting. All are of easy culture, and many of them may also be grown indoors.

Tuberous-rooted Begonias are currently very popular again, as gardeners discover their striking beauty. When their basic needs are supplied, they pay for themselves many times over. 

Everybody loves Strawberries and they are never as good as when freshly picked in your own garden. By all means have a Strawberry-patch if you have room.

Strawberries are easy to grow in any good well-drained soil.

Set the plants as early in the spring as the ground can be prepared. If the ground has not been recently manured, mix a little bone-meal in the soil under each plant when planting or top dress around the plants with a fertilizer high in phosphorus and potash just as soon as the plants start to grow. Keep the plants cultivated and free of grass.

Our plants are "New-ground plants" from a famous plant-growing district

and being strong and well-developed will go right to work. The varieties we offer were selected as the best in their class and we know they are dependable

and profitable.

In general, plants are set in rows $3\frac{1}{2}$ to 4 feet apart and $1\frac{1}{2}$ feet apart in the row. In home-gardens or where space is limited, the rows can be $2\frac{1}{2}$ feet apart. Set the plants with the bud just at the surface of the ground. Strawberry plants should be set early in the spring so they can become established while the soil is still cool and moist. Frequent cultivation will produce a better crop of berries.





CLOVERS

MEDIUM RED. Most popular Clover for short rotations. When grown with timothy it usually makes two good hay crops. Plants grow 2 feet or more in height. Sow seed in late winter on winter grains or on a firm seed-bed with spring grain. Sow 8 to 10 pounds with timothy, or 15 to 18 pounds alone.

MAMMOTH RED. Also called Sapling Clover. This Clover cuts a heavier first crop of hay, does better on poorer, drier soils, and is more persistent than Medium Red. Valuable for the grower who needs maximum organic matter to plow down.

ALSIKE. A favorite with timothy on acid soils, thin soils, and for wet sites. It may be sown in spring or late summer and is perfectly hardy. Flowers are sweet-scented and attractive to bees, are larger and more pink than White Clover. Adapted only to short rotations. Sow 8 to 10 pounds to the acre alone, or 3 to 6 pounds in mixtures.

SWEET CLOVER. The biennial form is most popular for soil improvements, pasture, or hay. It does best on sweet (neutral) soils and will grow luxuriantly on land too poor for Red Clover or alfalfa. It reseeds itself the year after sowing if not cut. Annual forms of this legume do not do well this far north. Seed should be inoculated. Sow 10 to 20 pounds to the acre, the heavier rate if seeded alone.

CRIMSON. Popular in southern part of region for greenmanure crop and soil improvement. Often sown in corn at last cultivation for winter cover-crop. For hay, plants should be cut in pre-bloom stage. Seed 20 pounds to the acre any time after April 1. Plants are annual, requiring reseeding each year.

LADINO. A giant form of White Clover with heavy stems which hug the ground and take root at the nodes (joints). Very popular, nutritious, and high-yielding when properly used as pasture for poultry, dairy cattle, beef, sheep, and hogs. A favorite as a cover-crop in sod orchards. Requires fertile soil and good management. Generally sown with other pasture grasses at the rate of 2 pounds per acre.

WHITE DUTCH. A small, low-growing White Clover used principally in lawn and pasture mixtures. Less productive than Ladino for hay and pasture. Succeeds in nearly all types of soil and is quite persistent. Use 3 to 5 pounds to the acre in mixtures.

WILD WHITE. A dwarf variety of White Clover, hardy and excellent for permanent pasture. Handle like White Clover.

ALFALFA

Alfalfa is of importance as a forage crop because of its high nutritive value, its palatability, productiveness, drought resistance, and long liveability. There is no other forage crop that will produce such an abundance of high-class protein feed. For all classes of livestock it is considered the best hay obtainable. It requires a well-drained neutral or alkaline soil and high fertility. Alfalfa is used alone and in mixtures with other grasses. It is usually seeded in the spring with fall- or spring-sown grains, but in some sections late summer seedings are popular. It will provide two or three cuttings of hay in a season, and also makes excellent pasture for all kinds of livestock. Seed should be inoculated. From 12 to 15 pounds of seed are usually sown to the acre when grown alone; half this quantity in mixtures.

Northwestern Common. Grown successfully and entirely satisfactorily in this area.

Grimm. Generally considered longer-lived and better adapted to severe winter weather.

Ranger. A particular strain of Alfalfa that is highly resistant to the bacterial wilt disease. Where bacterial wilt is a serious factor or where the farmer expects to leave the Alfalfa stand a few years, it is much superior to other strains.

TIMOTHY

Description of this old familiar hay-making grass is unnecessary here. Its feeding value is not quite equal to red clover or alfalfa, but it fits in well with almost any crop-rotation program and for this reason is probably the most extensively grown of all the grasses. It can be sown in the spring or fall and may be sown alone or with alfalfa, red clover, alsike clover, or with other grasses. If sown alone, 12 to 15 pounds are usually sown to the acre; with other grasses 3 to 6 pounds to the acre.

KENTUCKY BLUEGRASS. One of the best-known perennial grasses for permanent pasture. Requires rich soil and stands heavy close grazing. It starts early and furnishes grazing well into the fall but tends to be "dormant" during dry hot summer weather. Add 6 to 8 pounds to the acre to mixture of clovers and other grasses.

RED TOP. This grass is well adapted to soils that are inclined to be wet or acid. It is not so palatable as Kentucky Bluegrass nor is it so permanent. Alsike or Ladino clover do well with Red Top. Under fertile soil conditions Red Top will be replaced by heavier grasses. Use 2 to 4 pounds to the acre in mixtures.

PERENNIAL RYE GRASS. A very rapid grower producing pasture in six to eight weeks and lasting several years. Adapted to fertile moist soils and stands close grazing; should be seeded only in mixtures. Use 4 to 6 pounds to the acre in mixtures.

DOMESTIC RYE GRASS. A quick-growing grass that is valuable for pasture and relished by all livestock. For a winter cover-crop seed can be sown at the last cultivation of corn or after the harvest of an early crop. Makes good late fall pasture when used as cover-crop in corn. Broadcast seed at the rate of 20 to 25 pounds per acre.

ORCHARD GRASS. This is a long-lived bunch-type grass which produces maximum summer grazing. Does best in combination with long-lived legumes like Ladino clover and alfalfa. It makes good hay if cut in pre-bloom stage and makes heavy yields of silage. Use 4 to 6 pounds to the acre in mixtures; 12 to 14 pounds when seeded alone.

ALTA FESCUE. A very productive, deep-rooted perennial grass that makes excellent pasture. It withstands dry weather and has high feeding value and palatability. Sow 10 to 12 pounds to the acre, or 5 pounds in mixtures with other grasses.

KENTUCKY 31 FESCUE. Adapted to a wide range of soil and climatic conditions. Makes an excellent pasture grass and can be sown alone or in mixtures with other grasses. Because of its dense root system it makes an excellent winter cover-crop. Sow about 20 pounds to the acre or 10 pounds in mixtures with other grasses or legumes.

SUDAN GRASS. A high-yielding, quick-growing annual grass most valuable for summer pasture, but will make good hay when sown with soy beans and cut when soy beans are well formed. It can be pastured when 15 to 18 inches tall and it is very drought-tolerant. Grows to a height of 5 to 9 feet. Sow 35 pounds to the acre broadcast; 25 pounds drilled.

MILLET. A quick-growing annual generally used for an emergency hay crop or pasture. For hay it should be cut while the plants are in bloom. Sow in May or early June at the rate of 30 to 40 pounds of seed to the acre.

DWARF ESSEX RAPE. Furnishes quick and inexpensive pasture for hogs and sheep. Sow 10 pounds of seed to the acre if sown broadcast; 5 pounds if drilled.

LESPEDEZA. Popular in southern states for hay, pasture, and seed. Annual types persist only through natural reseeding.

SORGHUM or AMBER CANE. Used principally as a summer fodder for cattle. Growth is rapid. If carefully cured it will make an excellent dry fodder. May be sown in drills about 30 inches apart, at the rate of 5 to 6 pounds of seed for an acre. If sown broadcast, about 75 pounds of seed are generally used.

CANADA FIELD PEAS. Used for hay and pasture as well as soil improvement. Sow as early as possible in the spring, either alone or with oats. When sown broadcast alone, sow 2 bushels to the acre, or with oats 1½ bushels of Peas and 1 bushel of oats.

WINTER or HAIRY VETCH. One of the best legumes, largely used for soil improvement. Because of the great length of Vetch plants, it is best to furnish a support for the plants by sowing rye, barley, or oats with it. When drilled use 1 bushel of grain and 20 to 30 pounds of Vetch to the acre.



SOY BEANS

A good soil-builder when plowed under for green manure. Makes excellent hay or silage but is little used for pasture except for hogs. Sow when ground is thoroughly warm, in May or June. If used for hay, cut after the pods form. Use 2 bushels to the acre broadcast; $1\frac{1}{2}$ bushels when drilled. Seed should be inoculated.

We offer two varieties—Wilson Black and Lincoln. Both are suitable for hay, silage, or soil improvement. Lincoln. Stalk is large and bushy and a heavy producer of both foliage and beans. Seed is yellow. Wilson. Not quite so rank a grower as Lincoln. Does well on most any type of soil. An excellent variety for green manure. A very popular variety in this section.

OATS

Alfalfa, red clover, permanent grass and clover mixtures can all be satisfactority sown with Oats. Sow during April or early May at the rate of 2 to 3 bushels by weight to the acre.

CLINTON. Since its introduction several years ago, Clinton has become the leading variety and is now being grown by practically all farmers in this section. It is resistant to both crown rust and stem rust, also root rot; has medium-tall, stiff straw and is early maturing. Kernels have thin hulls and are plump and meaty. Clintons are well suited for combining, as their exceptionally strong straw will stand erect long after they have ripened.

WINTER BARLEY. Good feed substituted for corn; provides excellent winter grazing. Wong is the most popular variety. It is semi-beardless, a heavy yielder and has good stiff straw.

SPRING BARLEY. Valuable either as a grain crop or as a nurse crop for clover or alfalfa. Wisconsin 38 is the highest yielding variety, a six-rowed type with smooth heads. Requires 2 bushels of seed for an acre.


