We are very pleased to present to you our first listing of exquisite miniature choice hardy bulbs for the rock garden and flower border, including corms and tubers. We have spared no labor in describing as clearly as is humanly possible, the cultural requirements of the different bulbs we are offering. They are written for your convenience. Please read them. You may find the exact information concerning the cultivation of certain bulbous plants that have taxed your ability in the past, or that have failed to grow to your expectations. We hope that you will derive as much pleasure in reviewing these notes on the different species and varieties as we curselves have had in describing them to you.

We are indebted for a good deal of this information to Mr. Jean Thibodeau, who has for the past two years, worked and checked on the descriptions contained in this catalogue. Mr. Thibodeau has devoted his entire life to the study of miniature material and has astonishing success with the material described. We are proud to add him to our staff.

To grow hardy bulbs with success, does not necessitate a wide knowledge of them, once their general requirements, which are very few, are understood. The most essential requirement, is proper drainage of the ground in which they are planted. Failure to adhere to this principle, most always leads to disaster. This can be confirmed by observing that all bulbs in general, grown in their native habitat are in well drained ground. Most of the bulbs we are offering are presumably to be grown in rock garden soil where the drainage is unusually good.

A little bone meal, mixed well below the bulbs, is the only safe fertilizer to be used at planting time. We recommend no other fertilizer be used at any time.

We are very desirous that you succeed with the bulbs we are offering. We have noted the planting depth, and have made special notes where required. This should help the amateur a great deal.

## GUARANTEE - REMITTANCE - SHIPPING CONDITIONS

We guarantee our bulbs to be of a very fine quality, true to name and in excellent condition when dispatched, but, like every other nurseryman, we cannot guarantee or assume responsibility for the flowering results, which are beyond our control. In order to give an unconditional guarantee, it would be necessary to greatly increase the price which would be an imposition to most buyers.

A cordial invitation is extended to anyone who wishes to review our stock.

Unpack and open bags immediately. Plant as soon as possible.

## ALLIUM (FLOWERING GARLICS)

Do not let the name deceive you. Very few emit the famous scent unless their foliage is bruised. They like a sunny situaticn. We cannot recommend them too highly. They are good perennials for the adornment of the flower border. The small varieties are the finest for the rock garden. Plant four inches deep, three to four inches apart.

## Allium Azurem

A very charming species from the Altai Mountains, where so many beautiful bulbous plants are native. The flower umbels are produced on 24 inch stems. As its name denotes, they are of a charming sky blue color. Plant in groups of six or more in the flower border. It also makes a charming accent in the rock garden.

## Allium Moly

Known as the golden garlic. The umbels are of a brilliant golden yellow, and are produced on 12 inch stems. Due to its shortstature, there is no finer bulbous yellow flowering plant for the rock garden. They are stunning naturalized. They are a dash of yellow to the flower garden.

## A. Ostrowskianum

A very charming species and one of our favorites among the flowering garlics. The umbels are a beautiful deep rose. They are six inches tall. June and July flowering. ## BRODIAEA

This is a delightful California flowering bulb. It is fairly hardy in the East. They are best planted in late fall. Select a sunny situation. They require a good sandy soil. They are well worth the trouble to prepare a special place for them. Plant four inches deep, three to four inches apart in groups. After the ground has frozen an inch or two, cover with salt hay, straw or cranberry cover. Remove cover in early spring.

## B. Congesta

This variety produces small umbels of beautiful bluish lilac flowers. It is a charming and delightful dwarf, 12 inches tall.

## B. Grandiflora

This charming variety is without an equal in the rock garden, being only six inches tall. They are effective in groups in the sunny flower border. Flowers are a delightful bright blue. Flowers in June and July.

## CAMASSIA ESCULENTA

This beautiful race of bulbous American plants are planted far too little. The long graceful spikes of starry flowers of a good rich blue form a striking and arresting sight; planted in groups of twelve or more. The spikes attain a height of two to two and a half feet. They are stunning in the flower border. Can be used as a special accent in the rock garden planted in groups of six. They prefer a moist ground during their growing season. They should be left undisturbed. Plant six inches deep, six to eight inches apart and always in clumps.

## Miniature Narcissi

These miniature narcissi are delightful subjects for the rock garden. Little use of them is being made today, although many species and hybrids are available. The smaller bulbs should be planted four to five inches deep and one inch apart. The larger bulbs, six inches deep, and three to four inches apart. They all like moisture, not stagnant, during their growing season.

## N. Bulbocodium

The hoop petticoat narcissus, has an exquisite miniature yellow cone shaped trumpet. The petals are small. Rush like foligae. It is as beautiful as it is quaint. Six inches tall. Plant in a moist position in groups of a dozen or more.

## N. Cyclamineus

This specie is unique and one of the daintiest of all the miniatures. The flowers are golden yellow throughout, of great substance. It varies slightly in size. The trumpet is usually about one inch long and has a small serrated rim. Its name is derived from the fact that its petals are completely reffected back like a cyclamen. Plant in drifts and in moist location. A little shade is desirable as it prolongs the life of the flower. In good condition will last from two to three weeks. It is a very early bloomer. We are fortunate in being able to offer this fascinating little golden jewel at the attractive price.

## N. Beryl (Cyclamineus hybrid)

## SPECIUS TULIPS (BOTANICAL)

These delightful colorful small bulbs are a great asset to the perennial border, in front of foundation plantings, in front of dull walls, and for the rock garden. Their flowering season extends from April to June. In most cases, they are found on mountainsides in full sun which ripens their bulbs during summer. For best results, plant in full sun, in a well drained soil. They intensely dislike a soggy, wet soil. Plant smaller bulbs of this species, six inches deep and three to four inches apart. They are most effective in clumps of six to twelve. Kaufmanniana, Fcisteriana and other large bulbs, are best eight inches deep and four to six inches apart. We are offering a splendid collection to choose from.

## Batalini

A very choice and remarkable species, somewhat like Linifolia, but its color, when fully opened, is butter yellow. On sunless days, the closed bud has fascinating charm. It is similar to a rosebud. It is six inches tall, very desirable, and a must for the rock garden. Scarce.

Likes soil that contains leaf mold. Plant at once, do not delay for one day.

## E. Dens-canis Albus

This variety produces creamy white flowers with chocolate zoned center. Richly mottled foliage. Height rour to six inches.

This is the most delightful and largest of the group. The flowers are produced three to four on a stem that is three to four inches tall. Beautiful light blue color with slight variation in shades.

Crocus are the jewels of the early spring. Most all the colors found in precious stones are represented in this genus. There is white, silver, amethyst, violet, ruby, lilac, butter yellow, golden yellow, pencil striped varieties. Being early flowering, they are the most visited by the honeybees, who feed on the pollen. Plant in the sunny border, in clumps of twelve or more, for the Dutch variety. The species we recommend most highly for the rock garden. They require a sandy loam. Plant three inches deep, two to three inches apart.

If you have had disappointment with this genus, do not despair. If you follow the instructions given, you should be rewarded by beautiful chequered flowers. They are well worth the little care they demand. Plant in lightly shaded places, they dislike the mid-day sun. Plant four inches deep, in loamy leaf mold, three to four inches apart. Color is rosy purple, chequered darker sometimes with greenish color. The bell shaped flowers are usually produced two or three per stem.

## ERANTHIS HYEMALIS (Winter Aconite)

## FALL FLOWERING BULBS

## Colchicum

Unless these bulbs are ordered by September 15, it would be advisable to wait a year. After that date, they make fairly rapid growth and will begin flowering in transit. If, however, you are within driving distance of our nurseries, the small variety that we offer is particularly exquisite. They also go under the name of Meadow Saffrons, but it is an error to call them autumn crocus. The Colchicums have no relation other than flowering about the same time. They belong to the lily family, while the fall crocus belong to the iris family. They are quite often cffered in Metropolitan newspapers under all sorts of weird names such as Mysteria, etc., called the Wonder Bulb. It is true that you can stand the bulb on the window sill and it will quickly come into bloom without water or soil. This of course wrecks the bulb. For best results, plant outdoors where they will receive at least three to four hours of sunshine. They appreciate a gcod, well drained soil. Cover the tops of the bulbs with two to three inches of soil. Place them three to four inches apart. Plant in groups of six or more.

## C. Autumnale Minor

This is the miniature of the colchicums. Flowers are produced in quick succession and are a fascinating rosy purple. They are appropriate in the rock garden, front of border or in the foundation.

## AUTUMN CROCUS

The autumn crocus are delightful flowering bulbs. They should be planted as early as they can be secured. Late August and early September is the best time to plant them. They will flower without being planted, the same as the Colchicums, but if you value them as garden plants, this practice weakens them. They are exquisite planted in groups or drifts of twelve or more. Cover corms three inches deep, two inches apart, in the full sun.

## C. Zonatus

Very showy species of delightful rose lilac color with an orange zone at the base.
