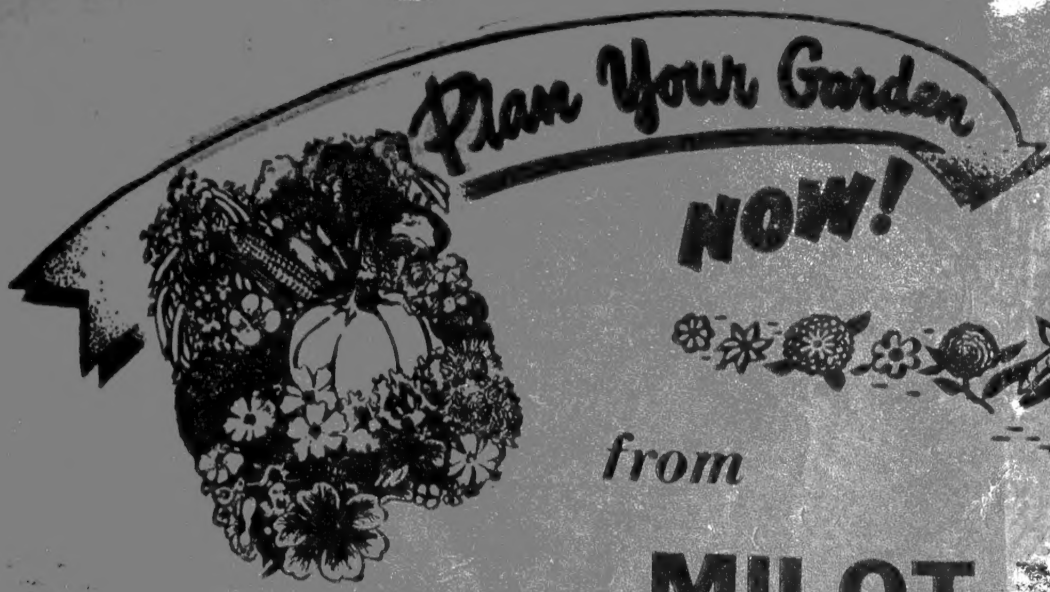

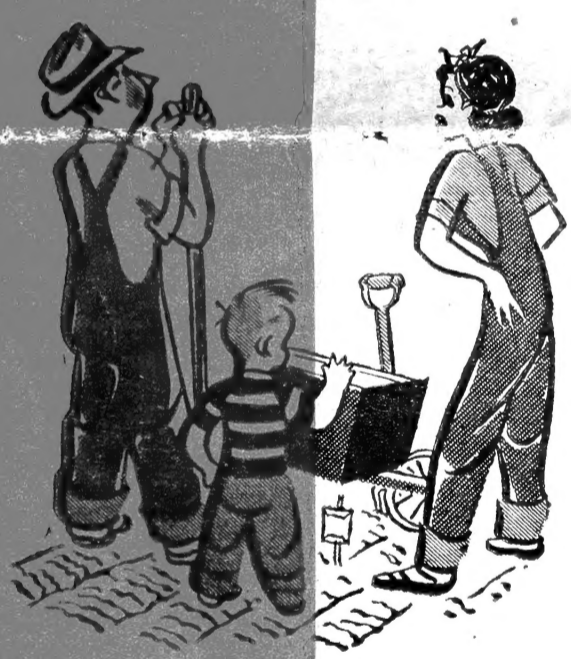

GROWING INSTRUCTIONS FOR GLADIOLUS

Plant in good loamy soil about 4 inches deep as soon as frost danger is past. Plant about 6 inches apart in rows a convenient distance apart.

Treatment—Due to the presence of thrip in all parts of the U. S. it is advisable to treat before planting regardless of where purchased. Soak the bulbs in a carco-X solution three hours and then plant. Solution of four teaspoons per gallon of water. When bulbs are six inches high dust with a 50% D.D.T. powder or spray, whichever is most convenient. This should be done about every 10 days until they show color.

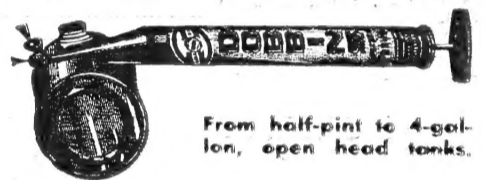
