The following seedlings in 2½ in. pots were offered last year and we still have a few left in the crosses listed. These plants average 5 to 10 inches high and are priced at \$3.00 each.

No. 35 C. ALESIA ALBA This hybrid is a strong growing white with colored lip. The flowering season is Spring.

No. 36 C. ALICE PEARCE (C. Mossiae "Reineckiana" X C. Princess Royal alba) A Spring flowering white with a highly colored lip. Flowers have a very fine form.

No. 37 C. CATHERINE PATTERSON (C. Enid alba X C. Mrs. Fred. Knollys alba) Winter blooming whites with colored lips. This hybrid usually has very large flowers.

No. 38 C. MILLE LOUISE PAUWELS (C. Edithae X C. Intertexa "Juliette") An Early Spring blooming, strong growing, Pure White.

No. 39 C. YVONNE ADAIR (C. Clementine Goldfarb X C. Pegeen Fitzgerald) A rapidly growing Mid Winter blooming Pure White Hybrid. The flowers are large, have a heavy texture and usually each lead produces 2 to 4 blooms.

No. 203 C. ENID ALBA X C. ALBOR A White with Colored Lip hybrid producing large flowers, Variable bloomer.

No. 204 C. SUZANNE HYE X C. ALBOR Spring and Winter blooming, white with colored lip.

No. 205 BC. HEATONENSIS (B. Digbyana X C. Hardyanas) Both parents of this cross are very productive, vigorous and extra fine. Flowers will probably be pale green to cream colored.


Bletilla Hyacinthina (Chinese Terrestrial Orchid) 6 to 8 fls. per stem, about 2 in. across. The blossoms last well out and are excellent for corsages. They may be grown in the garden or in the house. Any good garden soil is suitable, but the addition of leaf mould or peat moss is beneficial. They will grow in full sun, but will grow best in about half shade. Bulbs are hardy in all situations if a good mulch is used in the coldest climates. Bulbs 50¢ each, 3 for \$1.25, 1 doz. \$4.50. All bulbs offered are top size and will flower this spring.

All Cymbidiums & Cattleya hybrids offered are divisions of the variety described. In the Cymbidiums we do not consider those in 4 in. pots as flowering size. Practically all Cymbidiums will require larger pots than those listed. Only a few plants are available in each size, so please if possible list a second choice when ordering. All plants are guaranteed to be in good condition.




