

AUTUMN SEED-GROWING

Seeds of many hardy perennials, bulbs, shrubs and trees need exposure to low soil temperatures in order to germinate. They are best handled by sowing in open ground seed beds or frames, from late October, on through early winter, germination expected in spring. This includes seeds of Lilies, Primulas, Gentians, Irises, Aconitum and the some hundreds of others marked in our General Catalog #61 with the cultural key letters KT, YT, or Y. We suggest that you order seeds of these groups now. House plant seeds, key letter W, may be sown under glass year around. If you do not have General Catalog #61 already, please write us for a copy now. It will come guickly will come quickly.

THE RARE FRANKLINIA

The FRANKLIN TREE makes The FRANKLIN TREE makes a handsome, large shrub, thriving under Azalea conditions, and winter-hardy at Buffalo. It blooms in late summer and autumn, big, wax-white blossoms, one petal oddly cupped, centered each with a golden tassel. One of the few autumn, blowing shrubs. It can be tumn-blooming shrubs. It can be trained to a single stem as a small trained to a single stem as a small tree, but left to itself it will make several branching stems. Foliage becomes scarlet in late fall. 




