Expected Blooming Periods

All blooming periods marked below are based on pinched plants grown on raised benches at 50° F. nights. In order to better describe the many varieties listed, we have divided them into five groups: E, early varieties that flower by Dec. 15; M, midseason (often called winter-blooming) varieties that bloom from Dec. 15 to Jan. 15; L, those blooming after Jan. 15; S, spring bloomers that are very late and should be planted to follow chrysanthemums at the earliest; and HW, hot-weather varieties for June, July, August and September flowering only.

Latest Information On New Varieties And Culture

The following information consisting of sowing, benching and blooming dates of Single Stem Snapdragons, has been collected over a period of nearly ten years. Single Stem Snap culture is not new with us and we believe you will find this information quite accurate; HOWEVER we do not recommend single stem culture for all growers or all seasons, it works fine in close timing for quick crop rotation, for a fast catch crop and is the only method of producing high quality Snaps during the summer and early fall months of June, July, August, Sept., Oct. and November and it is easier to time the blooming period with this method. We believe our dates will prove better than 90% correct for the months of May, June, July, Aug., Sept., Oct. and Nov., but during the balance of the year the weather is the controlling factor. Experiments conducted by Dr. John Seeley at Penn State University show that the use of supplimentary lights will speed up the crop about 2 or 3 weeks without affecting the quality, however Dr. Seeley has recommended that single-stem culture will give the same speed up and is more economical.

The Snapdragon is a cool temperature crop, its labor requirements are low and the cost of propagating material is unusually small in comparison to the crop value. These things should be kept in mind when planning

production.

HELP IN CHOOSING VARIETIES

With the large number of new varieties being introduced each year most growers must depend on their seedsman for recommendations. If you desire any information, just write and tell us when you wish to bench your Snaps, the desired blooming dates, colors, also if you are growing for the wholesale market or for your own use and we will be very glad to help you work out a schedule and recommend the proper varieties for your own situation.

This should enable you to plant each bench with varieties that will bloom and cut off at about the same time and thus clear your benches evenly for the next crop. Often growers bench several different types in one bench and then find that one or two varieties are holding up the whole bench and they are finally forced to throw the late types out in

order to have the bench cleared for the next crop.

For early Snaps to bloom from Dec. to Feb. 1st, we recommend the hybrids. The Hybrid varieties will also bloom ahead of open pollinated varieties at any season and should be used for fast crop rotations. The open pollinated varieties are excellent for mid-season and spring crops, but much care should be used in choosing the varieties you grow. For blooming from late May to mid-September we recommend Rockwoods' Crystal White, Lavender Rose, Summer Pink No. 1, Summer Yellow No. 1, Lavender Bronze, Patsy Ann (pink) Sunshine (yellow) and Navajo (red), these varieties will give you an excellent spike during the hot summer months with close-set florets and will not easily shatter, if the Bees are kept off.

BEES

The best way to prevent Bees from entering the greenhouse and pollinating the Snaps, causing florets to drop or shatter, is to screen the vents. Some use old Aster cloth or cheese cloth and find it very satisfactory. Wire screen is easily applied and need not be too tightly applied, as the Bee does not seek out small openings from success has been reported in the use of a Parathion schoke fumigator—when the Bumble Bee comes in, close the vents and use one small smoke bomb to a house and leave the vents closed for 5 or 10 minutes, as it is the Bumble Bee that does the most damage and he travels very short distances and can soon be eradicated.

SEED GERMINATION

We recommend the following soil mixture; 1 part good soil, 1 part peat and 1 part sand, to which is added a small amount of Super-Phosphate. This mixture should then be steam sterilized, then placed in flats, leveled and marked in rows and sprinkled from the top and the flats placed either in a shallow pan of water or in a constant water bench. Allow the soil to become well soaked, but not muddy, then sow the seeds thinly, water lightly to establish good contact with the soil and cover with paper, glass and paper or wet burlap to reduce evaloration. NOTICE - before sowing Snap seed treat with Semesan dust, take an amount equal to the size of a Tomato seed and place it in the seed envelope and shake well, be certain that the seeds are completely covered with the dust. The flats must never be allowed to become dry. Remove the cover as soon as germination starts (3 to 8 days). During hot weather place the flats in a cool place and you can even stack one on top of the other, however after the 3rd day they should be inspected each morning and as soon as the white sprout shows, move them into the light. To get even germination during the cool months you must remember that Snaps need an even temperature and they should be placed in such a place. For the Hybrids we suggest a minimum temperature of 55° to 60° F., open pollinated varieties 55° F and the Hot Weather varieties 62° to 65° F. In a 12"x20" flat limit seeds to ½ packet, as overcrowding produces weak seedlings and will help damp-off to start.

Another method of sowing is to prepare the flat as above, level and mark rows and soak flats well, sow seeds in rows or they may be broadcast and covered with just enough screened Spagnum moss to hide the soil screen the moss by rubbing through a $\frac{1}{4}$ " mesh hardware screen, DON'T use the dust from bottom of bale, you want the rather "stringy" material) then water lightly with a very light spray or syringe.

Vermiculite is a wonderful germinating medium, however as soon as the seedlings appear you should start to feed with a dilute soluable fertilizer, as there is no food value in the vermiculite. Continue to feed regularly until transplanted from this.

The brick method also is very successful. Place sterilized mixture of $\frac{1}{2}$ peat and soil on top of bricks that are first placed in a shallow pan of water, the soil should be 1" deep on top of the bricks, sow on top of soil and use no cover.

As soon as seedlings appear with any method, feed with a dilute soluable fertilizer (teaspoonful to 1 gal. water) this will hasten growth and give sturdier plants.

BENCH PREPARATION

To prepare for transplanting add 2 or 3 pounds of super-phosphate per 100 square feet of bench, this amount should be sufficient for one year. Then the bench should be cultivated, leveled roughly and then topped with shredded peat moss ½" to 1" deep (a bale should cover 200 to 300 sq. ft.). Use the light colored less decomposed peat. This peat should then be mixed into the top layer of soil so that it will not move when watered; then level the bench for planting and steam sterilize, maintain 180° F. for one hour. Bench the following day and water well after benching. The use of peat will assure the grower that fertility and salt levels will not injure the plants, as the peat acts like a sponge and absorbs excess nitrates.

TRANSPLANTING AND SPACING

Select plants of uniform size and quality, if this is not done the ben h will mature unevenly and will take as much time to cut off as a pinched crop. We prefer the use of seedlings not over 2" tall and we recommend that they be given a light application of liquid feed (1 teaspoon to gal. of water) about two days before transplanting. Handle carefully and to assure success during hot weather after transplanting a few rows go back and water each individual plant. Always grasp seedlings by the leaves, never the stem, this will prevent injury. After transplanting, the seedlings must be shaded to guard against wilting. DON'T PLANT TOO DEEP, as this causes stems to rot.

For benching from Sept. 15th to early Feb., we suggest a 3"x6" spacing, that is, space the plants 3" in the rows and the rows 6" apart, this will allow room for watering, feeding or cultivation during their growing season. For benching from early Feb. to early Sept. we recommend a spacing of 3"x4" or 2½"x5", these spacings will yield satisfactory quality and give the best returns during their respective seasons. Wider spacings will give added weight to your Snaps, but the major part of this is grass, the closer spacings are more profitable to the grower.

Precision pinching is a pinch just above the 1st set of true leaves (not the seed leaves). For this pinch we recommend a spacing of 6"x6". Random pinching will allow an average of 3 to 4 stems per plant (just above the 2nd set of true leaves). Space 6"x8" for this pinch.

For a double pinch or higher pinch than 2 sets of true leaves, a spacing of at least 7"x8" should be used.

APPROXIMATE NUMBER OF PLANTS REQUIRED FOR VARIOUS SPACINGS

- 3 "x6" requires 800 plants per 100 sq. ft. bench space
- 3 "x4" requires 1200 plants per 100 sq. ft. bench space
- 2½"x5" requires 1150 plants per 100 sq.ft. bench space
- 6 "x6" requires 400 plants per 100 sq.ft. bench space
- 6 "x8" requires 300 plants per 100 sq. ft. bench space
- 7 "x8" requires 260 plants per 100 sq. ft. bench space

FEEDING

We recommend the use of soluable fertilizer, as it is easier to control the crop and there is very little danger of crop injury. During the winter months when growth is slow and watering infrequent, we suggest that the plants be liquid fed with every third watering. During the bright spring, summer and early fall months when growth is rapid, we suggest that they be liquid fed with every other watering. Stop feeding when buds are visible, as fertilization from this point on will only produce excess grass and perhaps soft stems. A nitrate level of 50ppm (Spurway test) is recommended.

DRY FERTILIZER. One application of 4-12-4 at 2 lbs. to 3 lbs. per 100 sq. ft. of bed after plants are well established.

Yellowing or bronzing of lower foliage indicates lack of feed. Too much fertility causes soft growth, hollow stems and excess development of side shoots or grassiness.

TEMPERATURES

The best quality is produced at a cool temperature with allowance for lots of ventilation. Temperatures above 50° F. will mature the crop faster, but for each degree above 50° there will be a drop in quality. Night temperatures between 45° and 50° will assure good quality and most economical returns.

SUPPORTS

We find the use of adjustable supports an excellent method. Two sets of supports are ample for any uniform crop, make these adjustable and raise them as the plants grow.

For cloth house culture and summer Snaps in the greenhouse, 1 set of supports is sufficient, these should be raised every few days.

SECOND CROPPING

It is possible to practice second cropping after the first crop is cut off. Cut every other plant off at ground level which will leave a 6"x6" spacing, feed at once and they will produce a fine second crop. Another method that was successful in one range last spring was to take a putty knife and dig out every other plant and replace the soil, these plants were then placed in another bench at 6"x6" and both crops flowered with high quality spikes with the transplanted plants blooming about a week or ten days later than those in original bench.

SKIPS

A drop in temperature from 50° to 40° or lower for two or more nights when the buds are showing will cause skips in the flower spike, if plants are at low light intensity as during the dark winter months. Cyanide gas will also prevent normal development of buds.

DISEASES

We have noticed considerable plant loss the past few years in our visits to many greenhouses, this less has been caused in the most part by Verticillum Wilt, also Rizoctonia Stem Rot has brought about high losses in other ranges. To control these diseases we advise you to follow the recommendations printed in circular No. 423 "Diseases of Commercial Florist Crops" printed by the Penna State University, College of Agriculture, Agriculture Extension Service, State College, Pa. Their recommendation follows below.

Control of Wilts: Treat seed with Semesan dust, take on the end of a toothpick or knife blade, Semesan dust equal in volume to a Tomato seed, place dust in seed packet and shake thoroughly so that the seeds are coated evenly with the dust. Plant seed in sterilized soil or vermiculite. Transfer seedlings to sterilized soil, taking care to prevent recontamination. Pots, benches and flats when NOT sterilized may be sources of contamination with the wilt organisms.

We suggest that this seed treatment be used on a trial basis only, as Semesan will retard germination.

POWDERY MILDEW

The leaves and often the stems become covered with white mold-like growth. CONTROL: Avoid excessive humidity, keep from splashing water on the foliage and allow plenty of ventilation. Spray with Milder, 4 ors. per 100 gals, and repeat in 5 to 7 days, apply when temperature is below 90° F. and when foliage is dry. More than two sprays may cause injury. We have also observed good results from the use of a spray consisting of % oz. Baking Soda to 1 gal. water. Mildew may be prevented by dusting with Sulphur or spraying at 7-10 day intervals with wettable Sulphur, 2 lbs. per 100 gals. DO NOT APFLY SULPHUR AFTER THE FLOWER BUDS START TO OPEN.

DOWNY MILDEW

The undersides of the leaves and the stems become covered with patches of purplish-white mold-like growth. Keep foliage dry and humidity low, destroy all infected plants. Spray with Zineb (Parzate or Dithane Z-78) 1 lb. to 100 gals. at 5-10 day intervals.

RUST

Rust fungus appears as reddish-brown powdery pustules on leaves, stems and seed pods. Rust spores are spread by air currents or careless watering. Where rust has been prevelant, follow a good spray program and start when plants are 4" high.

CONTROL: Grow plants from seed only. Use Parzate, 2 lbs. per 100 gals.

SYMPHILIDS

These pest continue to plague the grower, the last few years have brought our attention to the damage they do and the cause is so often unknown to the grower. An infestation will damage the roots, causing the plants to stand still or grow poorly and sometimes die. They damage the plant by eating the root systems. Make several inspections if they are suspected, dig up several half sick plants and carefully break apart the root ball. Symphilids are ½" to ½" long and pure white with 12 pairs of legs and move very fast when thus exposed.

CONTROL: Lindane can be used in beds where plants are growing without disturbing the crop. Use 5 ozs. of a $25\,\%$ wettable powder to 1,000 sq. ft. of bench.

The benching dates are shown in the first column, as they are the dates that control the blooming dates. Blooming dates given are the date you should be starting your big cut. If fall weather is brighter and warmer than usual, Snaps will bloom prematurely.

FOOTNOTE — (2) From this group use only Rockwoods Hybrid Pink No. 1, Rockwoods Hybrid White No. 5, 2nd Rockwoods Hybrid Yellow No. 10.

‡For summer timing — Rockwoods Crystal White, Lavender Rose and Smokey Bronze mature together; Summer Pink No. 1, Patsy Ann, Summer Yellow No. 1; and Sunshine will bloom ten days to two weeks later than dates given.

We suggest that white and pink only be grown during the period when Chrysanthemums are plentiful, as experience has shown that these two colors are in best demand at that season.

Rockwoods Hybrid White No. 5 and Hybrid Yellow No. 10 are excellent varieties to bloom in the period from early Sept. to Dec. 1st.

A SUGGESTED TABLE FOR GRADING SNAPDRAGONS STANDARD GRADES FOR SNAPDRAGONS

Material to be marketed under S.A.F. Standard Grades shall have reasonably straight stems, uniform, clean foliage free from insect and disease injury. The foliage shall be removed from the lower 1/3 of the stems.

Each bunch shall contain the indicated number of stems. Only one color or variety shall be included in a bunch of graded material.

Each bunch shall bear a label of the specified color, imprinted S.A.F. Grade SPECAL, S.A.F. Grade FANCY, S.A.F. Grade EXTRA or S.A.F. Grade FIRST, as the case may be, together with the name of the producer.

In addition, graded material shall conform to the following specifications:

UTILITY The term Utility is not a grade within the meaning of these standards. Material which does not grade because of crooked stems, foliage injury or abnormal growth may be marketed under the designation UTILITY (White Label).

UNCLASSIFIED The term Unclassified is not a grade within the meaning of these standards but is provided as a designation to show that no definite grade has been applied to the lot.




