## HARDY FERNS

"that thrive where other plants fail to grow"

Hardy Ferns are a very useful and beautiful group of plants. Often there are corners in the garden where sufficient sun does not strike, and flowering plants do not succeed. Such places can be beautified by the use of Hardy Ferns.
ADIANTUM pedatum. Maidenhair Fern. The most graceful of all our Hardy Ferns. The Maidenhair Fern, spreading fan-like, dainty foliage on slender, polished, nearly black stems, attains a height of 12 to 18 inches when grown in rich, shady, moist but well-drained locations. The roots, wiry, black and creeping near the surface, should be planted not more than one inch below the surface and protected with leaf-mold. Plant eight inches apart for a massed effect, and once established they will increase from year to year. A most distinct and beautiful Fern.

ASPLENIUM platyneuron, Ebony Spleenwort. One of the small evergreen Ferns ( 4 to 6 inches). The Ebony Spleenwort with its narrow, rigid, little fronds is one of the most versatile of the Hardy Ferns for the rock garden or the front of the Fern border. For its native surroundings it seeks stony ground near large roots of trees, boulders and ledges in full sun, partial or deep shade. It will also thrive luxuriously in good, well-drained soils with plenty of leaf-mold and shade. Do not cover the crowns of this little Fern, but plant firmly at ground level, six to eight inches apart for a massed effect.

ASPLENIUM trichomanes, Maidenhair Spleenwort. This delicate little Fern, with narrow evergreen fronds 3 to 6 inches long, naturally grows on large boulders, cliffs and very rocky soil. There is sometimes a question as to how it can survive in the tiny crevices with practically no soil at all. It is easily adapted to rockeries and Fern borders. Though it survives in doubtful conditions, it is benefited and thrives on an abundance of leaf-mold and adequate moisture. They are most effective planted about 6 inches apart in little colonies of 10 or so, if possible, with the crowns at the surface.

ATHYRIUM felix-femina. Lady Fern. A large, showy and vigorous growing Fern. Attains a height from 2 to 3 feet when planted in good moist soil in either sun or shade. One of the best for general Fern culture, it is very effective in the back of the border about 18 inches apart. Do not cover the new buds when planting.

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ATHYRIUM pycnocarpon, Narrowleat Spleenwort. A charming Fern 1 to 3 feet high. Deciduous. Easy to grow in rich shady places.

ATHYRIUM thelypteroides, Silvery Spleenwort. The fronds of this Fern are a soft dull green when full grown 12 to 18 inches. The name comes from the abundance of white fruit spores on the backs of the fertile fronds giving a silvery sheen when waving in the wind. This Fern thrives in a moist, shady place. Its root is coarse, thick, creeps near the surface and should be covered with not more than an inch of soil. Plant one foot apart.

BOTRYCHIUM virginianum, Rattlesnake Fern. The triangular, deeply-cut frond of this Fern is spread horizontally on a thick succulent stem, 6 to 10 inches high, from a fleshy root. The fruiting stalk carrying the spores in a terminal cluster is a continuation from the main stem above the leaves. It is best planted in rich moist soil with an abundance of leaf-mold in dense shade, preferably under deciduous trees. Plant deep and in small groups.

CAMPTOSORUS rhizophyllus, Walking Fern. This Fern, an evergreen, gets its name from its manner of growth that suggests steps. The leaves, 4 to 12 inches long, are heart-shaped at the base. Prefers dry, shady places, thus making it suitable for rock gardens.

For a carpet effect plant 8 inches apart with the crowns just at the surface.

It propagates by underground rootstocks; and, if planted in a rich, porous soil, it will soon form a beautiful mass.

Light green in color, its finely cut foliage on graceful fronds blend into an interesting ground cover when planted about 1 foot apart with the crowns at ground level.

It is nearly evergreen, and the fertile leaves are even more finely cut, making a very delicate and lace-like pattern. The Climbing Fern is found in every rare Fern collection. ONOCLEA sensibilis, Sensitive Fern. This sturdy Fern grows about 12 inches high, its coarse, deeply-cut leaves giving a contrast in leaf texture when grouped with other Ferns. An erect fruiting frond that remains all winter stimulates interest in this Fern. Thrives in wet places in either full sun or shade. The root is coarse and creeping and should not be covered with more than an inch of soil.

OSMUNDA cinnamomea, Cinnamon Fern. A streng and vigorous grower, the fronds exceed a height of 3 feet when grown in rich, moist soil. An excellent Fern for backgrounds. Plant 18 inches apart and leave the crown exposed.

full sun and dry soil, but prefers a little moisture and some shade. This is another large Fern growing to about 3 feet and should be considered for large plantings. Plant 18 inches apart and leave the crown exposed.

CALOPOGON puchellus, Grass-pink Orchid. Deep pink Orchid flowering in June. 1 ft . Prefers to grow in bogs and wet places.

## HARDY BULBOUS PLANTS

The plants of this group grow from bulbs or tubers. For best results they should be planted in fall or early spring when the plant is dormant. ORDER EARLY.
ARISAEMA dracontium, Green Dragon. Later flowering than the following. Easily grown in a shady woodland garden. $\quad 50 \mathrm{c}$ each. 3 for $\$ 1.00$. 10 for $\$ 3.00$. ARISAEMA triphyllum, Jack-in-the-Pulpit. An ideal plant to mix in with Ferns in a moist shady location. ## HARDY WILD FLOWERS and GROUND COVER PLANTS

For rock gardens, borders, bog plantings or, along woodland paths we believe you will find your needs among the following.
ACTEA alba. White Baneberry. White flowers in racemes on 2 foot stems, followed by a cluster of waxy white berries on red stems. Plant in a rich friable soil in shade.

## CLUB MOSSES

These primitive evergreens are all popular as ground covers. With a little consideration they will grow well transplanted to your garden. The plants will come to you as runners or clumps as noted. Spread the runners out and cover them and the roots with a mixture of leaf-mold or peat moss and some soil. Plant in open woods or full shade.
