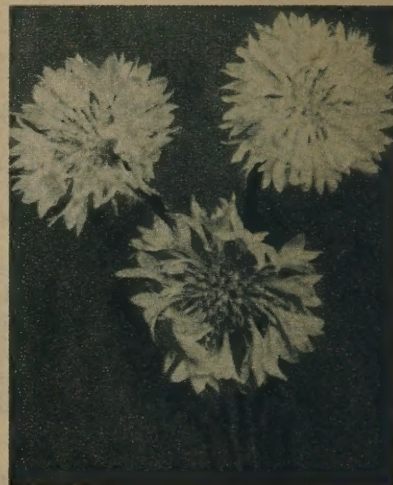

A FEW SUGGESTIONS

The Sweet Pea plant or vine succeeds best in cool, moist, yet well drained soil. To secure the longest possible season of bloom the seed must be planted early. The best mode of planting is the trench method. The trench is dug two feet deep and two feet wide, and filled nearly to the surface of the ground with a mixture of well rotted manure and rich soil, with a six-inch layer of soil at the top. Soaking seed in water over night before planting will hasten germination. The seed should be sown, two inches deep, at the rate of one ounce to twenty feet. During dry weather the ground should be thoroughly soaked once or twice each week. A light spraying of the vines in the evening during hot weather will be found beneficial, and the earth should at all times be kept loose about the plants to a depth of two inches. Sweet Peas should be cut early in the morning and the more closely the flowers are kept cut off the longer will be the period of bloom. Remember, the vines quickly wither, if allowed to produce any great amount of seed. Spray thoroughly and often to prevent infection by aphids.

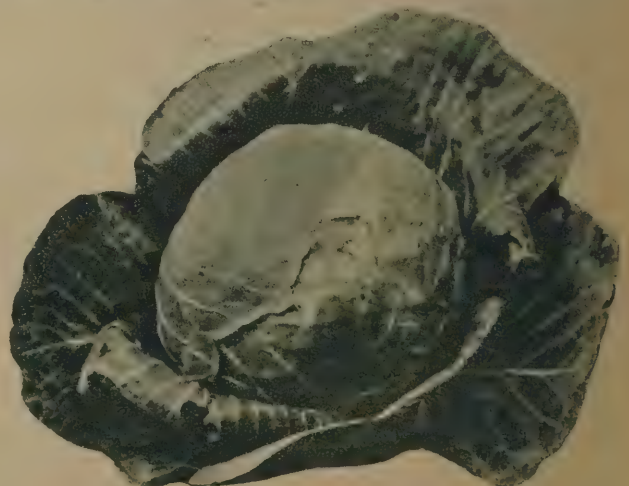

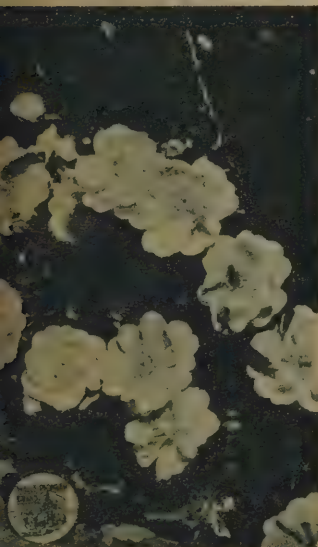
