TERMS OF SALE—Please read before ordering.

PAYMENT—Cash, Check or Money Order. No C.O.D. Orders accepted. Orders for less than \$3.00 cannot be accepted. This amount is for value of plants.

POSTAGE, PACKING AND SPECIAL HANDLING CHARGE—For postage and packing inclose 35c plus 20c for Special Handing for increased postage, packing and handling costs or a total of 55c, on all orders besides the cost of plants, (which only pays part of the shipping costs - we prepay the balance). We have found that it is very important to have your plants sent by Special Handling as this service gives first class handling and routes your package the most direct way only and travels with the same schedules as first class mail. This may save a delay of one to several days which could mean very much in the condition of your plants.

SPECIAL DELIVERY—This service gives first class handling, routes your package the most direct way and assures immediate delivery. 1 to 4 plants, 35c; 5 to 24 plants, 45c; over 25 plants, 60c. Special Delivery includes Special Handling so do not remit for Special Handling when using Special Delivery.

AIR PARCEL POST—Is most satisfactory for extra long distances, but is expensive. 6 plants, \$2.03; 12 plants, \$3.31; 24 plants, \$6.62.

SALES TAX-2% must be included on all Kansas orders only.

RAILWAY EXPRESS—Large orders can be made by Railway Express. Transportation charges are collect. Such shipments are more expensive than parcel post especially on small orders. Damage from heat or freezing is covered by insurance. Deliveries are prompt within local delivery areas, but serious delay may occur to addresses outside of the delivery areas.

FOREIGN SHIPMENTS—Special arrangements have to be made for shipments out of the limits of the United States.

SUBSTITUTION—If not advised otherwise, we will substitute only similar varieties. These will be sent subject to your approval. If you advise us not to substitute we will not do so. We attempt to keep a complete stock of the varieties listed in this catalogue. As there are many factors entering into the production of plants, occasionally we are unable to supply certain varieties ordered. When this does happen, we can usually supply equally good or even better varieties and we always give extra value. It is to your advantage as well as mine to allow substitution, so please give second choice. A refund is made if substitution is not authorized or suitable varieties are not available. You will be notified of approximate time shipment will be made should we not be able to fill your order immediately.

THE PLANTS YOU RECEIVE—Are young healthy plants grown in 2¼" pots 4" to 8" tall, and are in a healthy growing condition, shipped to you in the soil in which they are growing, expertly packed.

The height of plants vary with different varieties but all geraniums are flowering size and most are in bud when shipped. Each plant is labeled with the variety name. All names will be true to the best of our knowledge.

I personally select all plants to be shipped and use every method, old and new, to assure safe delivery. We insulate our boxes not only in cold weather against freezing but during the summer against heat. We ship the year around except 15 days before Christmas and extremely cold periods. The plants are guaranteed to reach you in good condition, beyond that we cannot take responsibility for how they grow. Notice must be given within ten days after receiving plants for adjustment in case of damage during transit. We assume liability only to the extent of replacing the original order. Our plants have been shipped to every part of the United States, Alaska, Canada, and as far as Hong Kong.

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CULTURE OF GERANIUMS

GROWING POTTED PLANTS

Repot our 21/4" plants in 3-inch pots. Do not use too large a pot as Geraniums bloom best when a little potbound. It is better to repot the plants, increasing the size of pot 1-inch each time. A 4-inch or 5-inch pot is usually large enough for indoor plants.

SOIL—Potting soil should be of a texture to give good drainage and aeration, but of sufficient body to allow firm potting. It should be slightly acid about PH 6.0 to 6.5. A good mixture is 3 parts of a good garden soil, 1 part peat moss and 1 part coarse sand. The soil should be slightly moist when potting. Allow at least ½-inch space at the top of the pot for watering. To the above mixture, add a 4-inch pot of Bonemeal or Superphosphate to a bushel of soil or a teaspoon to a 5-inch pot of soil.

LIGHT—During winter, geraniums need all the sunlight they can get, otherwise they will draw up and not bloom. Place as close to the glass as possible but not touching the glass with the leaves. When plants fail to bloom it is a sure sign they are not getting enough sun.

TEMPERATURE—The ideal temperature is about 60° F. to 70° F. during the day and 500 F. to 550 F. during the night.

AIR—Plenty of air is essential and a good airing during the winter is beneficial. The dry air of heated homes that is so hard on most plants is good for Geraniums.

WATERING—Plants should be well soaked and then allowed to become reasonably dry but not arid before watering again. More damage is done by under-watering than by over-watering. Young plants, some of the Fancy-Leaved and Dwarf varieties are most easily damaged by lack of water. The first sign is the lower leaves turning yellow and finally drying up. During heavy growth more water should be given and when this is done the plant should be fed.

FEEDING—Feeding is not necessary unless the plants have stopped growing which is indicated by duller green than normal and by small flowers. Although when plants are making heavy growth and taking lots of water plants should be fed. A good well balanced water soluble fertilizer such as Instant Vigoro, Ra-pid-Gro or Plant Marvel is good. Application should be made according to manufacturer's direction.

GROWING GERANIUMS OUTDOORS

SOIL-Geraniums will do well outdoors in any good well-drained garden soil that is not too rich. If soil is heavy to 3 parts soil add 1 part peat moss and 1 part sand. SUN—Geraniums like lots of sun, but in the climates where the sun is intense shade during the hottest part of the day so as to produce much finer blooms.

WATER—The soil should never become completely dry. It is better to give one or two good waterings a week than some every day.

BED SPACE—For a beautiful bed allow 8'x8"; on strong growing varieties 12'x12". To get bushy plants pinch the tops of each plant.

FERTILIZER—Bonemeal or superphosphate mixed in the soil at the rate of 10 lbs. per 100 sq. feet will be beneficial. If plants need additional fertilizer some of the soluble plant food is good but do not overfeed. Geraniums do not require heavy fertilization.

CONSERVING MOISTURE AND KEEPING PLANTS COOLER—A mulch of 1-inch peat is very important here in the midwest to hold the moisture and keep the soil cool. The best pots for use outside are glazed pots which hold the moisture much better. If they are not available painted pots will help. You can also keep your plants much cooler by covering the outside with aluminun foil which in itself is a good insulation but don't forget to punch a hole in the bottom for drainage. Potted plants put in a pot one or two sizes larger and Terra-Lite or peat moss put in between both pots is a good insulator to keep your plants cooler and conserve moisture. This is especially good for Fancy-Leaf and Dwarfs.

LADY WASHINGTON GERANIUMS
GROWING POTTED PLANTS INDOORS—Use the above culture for other geraniums except the following hints for better results.

Grow cool at night temperature of 40 to 50 degrees to grow a good stocky plant. A rank grown plant will hardly ever bloom. Make growth early with normal plant culture. Avoid using long lasting fertilizer which would keep the plant at rapid growth into the flowering season. Feeding should stop 10 weeks before flowering time, which is in the spring for the early flowering varieties, or until buds are well formed then feeding may be resumed. Keep plants on the dry side when buds are being formed as delayed blooms are usually caused by rank growth. At budding time keep the PH up to 6.0 to 7.0. Keep the nitrates low and don't force with heat and give all the light you can. To keep bloom from shattering don't remove blooming plants from a warm room into a cooler or drafty one. Cool grown plants seldom shatter.

When the weather is warm enough, plant outside and give plenty of room as they

will develop into large plants and use culture of other geraniums.

Exquisite—(Cook) Double, beautiful clear rich salmon with slightly darker center, which holds its color well in hot weather. Medium-sized florets and flower heads. Good dark zoned foliage. Compact plant. A good pot or garden variety. \$1.50

Inferno—(Cook) Single, large intense fiery satiny scarlet florets, throat of two upper petals crimson veined, on enormous flower heads. Foliage dark green on strong plant. Plant should be pinched and kept low on nitrates. \$1.50

Cook's Dark California Beauty—Double, rose-pink with all the good features of its parent California Beauty and several shades darker with petals more cupped and double, white center which usually doesn't show because of its doubleness. Large blooms with flower heads stand well above its dark green foliage. Very free flowering. Medium-sized free branching plant. An excellent pot or bedding plant. \$1.50

Double - Semi-double

White

Gardenia—Double, satiny white - very free blooming, fast growing and compact. Texture and form of flowers different from other white varieties. 50c

Verite—(Springfield White) Double, large flowered white, larger than Mme. Buchner. Very free flowering. 40c

Mme. Buchner—Double, pure white flowers makes this the most popular white. An early, free flowering, compact plant. 40c

Snowball—Same as Mme. Buchner except both plant and flower are larger. Preferred in southern states and dry areas. 40c

Gregerson's White—Semi-double, pure white. Excellent low branching, strong grower, large flowers and free bloomer. 40c

Madonna—Double, good sized flowers. Large plant with small wood and wavy foliage. 40c

Salmon

Lullaby—Double, soft salmon apricot. Very free flowering and compact. Very beautiful. 75c

Monterey—Double soft salmon coral marked with deep coral with white center. Large flowers in large clusters. Very beautiful when at its best and well worth a little extra care. 50c

Festival—Double salmon apricot very free and large flowered in good clusters. 50c

Welcome—Double fiery Salmon-Coral. Low, bushy, free branching and flowering. An excellent pot plant. 50c

Palmiers Salmon Supreme—Semi-double, light clear salmon which is one of the leading geranium varieties. Makes an excellent pot plant. Excellent foliage with serrated edges. 40c

Picardy—Semi-double, free flowering, clear salmon-pink and a fast grower. 40c

Beaute Poitevine—Semi-double, large flowered, soft pinkish-salmon. An old-timer that holds its popularity. 40c

Bode's Salmon Supreme—Double, rich pinkish-salmon. Medium large irregular flowers are freely borne on a plant that is distinctly Salmon Supreme type. While this variety seldom grows to two feet the first season, it is nevertheless the fastest geranium offered and excellent for bedding purposes, especially where the season is short. Bode's Salmon Supreme is a cross of Salmon Supreme and Salmon Ideal. 50c

Mme. Landry—Semi-double, rich clear salmon on a strong dependable plant. Beautiful zoned leaves and blooms that do not shatter. Fine for bedding and pots. 40c

Salmon Ideal—Semi-double, big deep salmon-apricot blooms. Sturdy plant with zoned foliage. 40c

Enchantress—(not Fiat Enchantress which it pre-dates) Very strong growing, bright dark salmon double. Excellent bedder for hot areas. 40c

Elizabeth Bode — Semi-double, enormous reddish salmon. A new color to the salmon group with every feature of its parent, Improved Richard. 50c

Pink to Dark Rose

Large Pink Barney—Semi-double, rosepink with white center. Very profuse bloomer even when quite small. A wonderful variety for beds as it makes a large low branching plant covered with medium sized blooms. A good pot plant. 40c

California Giant—Semi-double to double rose with white center and very large flowers produced freely. A large slow growing plant. 40c

Berthe De Prisilly—Double, clear light pink with a little white in the center of the florets. Flower heads are good sized and the blooms hold their color well. Plant is compact, although fairly large and rapid. Wood is medium. Good pot plant and an excellent bedder. 40c

Marie Wilkes—Double light pink with slight orchid shadings, some white in center. Large flowers. Plant of moderate growth. 50c

Pink Abundance—Double, bright reddish rose-pink, a shade difficult to place in sequence. It is lighter than other rose shades, but the salmon is stronger. Plant is strong and ultimately large. Excellent as a bedder or pot plant. 40c

California Beauty—Semi-double to double, pink or light rose blooms with white center. Plant is very compact, blooms close above foliage. Exceptionally free flowering. 40c

Pink Giant—Semi-double, enormous flowers of lavender-pink with white eye on a low growing stocky plant. One of the best lavender-pinks or strong-pink variety. 50c

Anna Vincent—Semi-double, very deep bright rose with white center. Huge flowers on a strong low plant. This is one of the best varieties of this color. A choice variety. 50c

Jean Viaud—Semi-double, lavender-pink with white center. While flower is not quite as large as the two preceding varieties, it is difficult to distinguish the difference. Plant is slightly larger than Pink Phenomenal. It makes a good fast pot plant or excellent bedder. 40c

Old Rose—Semi-double soft tone of light old rose with some white in center with large flowers. Bushy small plant. 60c

Reverie—Double orchid pink. Excellent large flowered free bloomer. Strong compact plant. 50c

Pink Phenomenal — (Phenomenal Pink) Semi-double, rose with white center. Large flowers and strong plant. Slightly deeper color than Pink Giant. 40c

Pink Barney—Full double, deep rose-pink with small white center. Plant is compact foliage is waved and soft. Delicate for bedding purpose, but very profuse bloomer as a pot plant. 40c

Edna—(Pink Better Times) Double, dark lavender-pink with white center. The variety we offer is McAdams original strain carrying the name Edna and is a shade brighter color than most Pink Better Times offered. The plant is typical Better Times, from which it sported. 50c

Irvington Beauty—Semi-double, soft rose with salmon cast. Very heavy bloomer with good sized flowers. Plant is low branching, pubescent foliage. Fine pot plant. 40c

Mrs. Richard Gloede—(Thomas Meehan, Los Angeles Beauty) Double, clear rose with salmon cast. This splendid plant makes a good pot plant and excellent bedder. 40c

Measure's Beauty—(American Beauty)—Double, very large, clear rose, about the same shade as Mrs. Richard Gloede, but less salmon cast. Enormous blooms on a large plant. 40c

Springfield Shell Pink—Strong compact grower with a profusion of medium-sized flowers. Double. One of the most prolific bloomers. 40c

Frances Perkins—(Mrs. Perkins) Semidouble to double, pink or light rose-pink with white center. Practically identical with California Beauty except that flowers are larger and stand well above the plant.

Salmon Pink

Magnificent—(New) Fiat Enchantress X Mme. Janlin Cross. Strong Mme. Janlin growth. Exceptionally free bloomer of the Fiats give us an enormous flower in great abundance. 200 buds per flower head are common on out-door grown plants, and flowers of 8 and 9 inch diameter are common in cool weather. In 4 inch pots, 4 and 6 inch flowers are regular. Old florets disappear beneath younger ones, so that the center of flower is fresh until all buds

have blossomed, creating a flower of exceptional lasting quality. Apple Blossom pink. Feed and water well during flowering, as tremendous amount of growth goes into bloom. 50c

LaFrance—(Peach blossom) Full double, light salmon-pink, center of florets are medium salmon pink, outside edges of petals are very light, making an attractive flower. 40c

Inspiration—Semi-double, cream flushed with light salmon or shrimp. Extremely large flowers in medium cluster. A good pot or garden plant. Very free flowering. Excellent for corsages, the buds being very beautiful. One of the finest light colored varieties. 75c

Dreams—Full double. Good sized flowers of a beautiful rich shade of clear salmon pink, or salmon coral with a fine waxy quality. Free flowering. 50c

Mrs. Lawrence—Full double, small shrimppink flowers borne in masses on a medium sized very compact plant. 40c

Jean Oberle—(Apple-blossom) Double, very light-pink, shading to dark center. A very narrow outer edge is bright carmine. 40c

Always—Double, soft delicate pink with enormous flowers. The petals are edged with bright pink. 50c

Fiat Enchantress—Semi-double, soft salmon pink with a beautiful grayish-green foliage appearing soft because of splendid pubescence. Plant is delicate for outside planting, especially in areas of extreme heat. One of the finest pot plants. 40c

Irene—(New) Semi-double large flowered clear red. Wonderful free bloomer. Good pot or bedder. 50c

Glory—Double Orange with small white center. Very large flowers. Medium plant and very free flowering. Excellent pot plant outstanding in color and form. 75c

Jules Vasseur—Double scarlet with white center. Large flowers, strong plant. Similar to Double Dryden but the white center is larger. 40c

Bode's Scarlet—(New) Pink Fiat X Michells Sensation cross. Very free blooming characteristic of the Fiats. Plant makes rapid growth to medium sized compact plant with many branches, each with bloom. Flowers are medium scarlet and semi-double. Foliage is well zoned and flowers hold well above foliage. Plants in 4 inch pots often have 4 or more flowers. 50c

Scarlet Irvington—(New) Non-reverting sport of Irvington Beauty and has the same fine plant as its parent. Flowers are semi-double brilliant scarlet, a little lighter than Radio Red. 50c

Orange Richard—Semi-double, clear bright orange. This is the only good orange used extensively. Plant is typical Alphonse Ricard but somewhat smaller and lower. 40c

Bountiful—Full double flowers of coral salmon during cool weather and salmon pink in hot weather. This Mme. Landry and LaFrance cross is especially robust and excellent as a bedder. Bountiful is especially good where geranium culture is difficult. 40c

Teddy Roosevelt—(Improved Lawrence) Semi-double, shrimp-pink, medium-sized flowers. Excellent plant for pot culture. Foliage is light green without zone. 40c

Mme. Jaulin—(Appleblossom) Very large, semi-double flowers. Bright salmon-pink in the center and soft cream on the outer edges. During warm weather the colors are reversed. Makes a superb plant for pots. Its hardiness gives many growers good reason to prefer it to Fiat Enchantress. 40c

Fiat—(Pink Fiat) Semi-double, salmon pink of exceptionally brilliant hue. Large flowers on a self-branching plant. A profusion of bloom makes this a leading pot plant. 40c

Light Lawrence—Semi-double, typical Improved Lawrence flowers and plant. Florets bloom out white, changing to bright, light pink. Good pot plant or bedder. 40c

Reds

Improved Richard—Semi-double, regular, light brick-red or soft orange-scarlet. The very large flowers are borne on a good solid compact plant of fast but not tall growth. Improved Richard is very hardy and excellent for pots and bedding. 40c

No. 102—Semi-double, bright orange with white eyes. Bushy plant. Identical to Bode's Scarlet except probably a brighter orange. 40c

General Grant—Double, orange-scarlet, strong free flowering plant. A good bedder and pot plant. 40c

Red Landry—Semi-double, soft orangescarlet. Large flowers on a good bushy plant of fast, but not tall growth. One of the best year round bloomers. 40c

Mitchell's Sensation — Semi-double, very large flowers of brilliant scarlet. The reverse side of the petals is much lighter. Very hardy, makes fine pot plant. A very profuse bloomer. 40c

Red Fiat—Semi-double, orange scarlet on a medium sized plant. Free bloomer. 40c

Sandra Irene—Full double, very brilliant clear red, robust low plant with bright green foliage. This variety makes a beautiful pot plant. 40c

Missouri—Double, brilliant clear red, bushy low plant. A fine pot plant. 40c

Scarlet Castelane—(New) Clear scarlet sport of Marquise de Castelane. Plant, flowers and blooming habits are identical with Castelane except for the total absence of the ruby red cast, leaving the color clear bright scarlet. 50c

Avalon Red—A plant sport of Radio Red with no characteristics of the parent having been sacrificed by hybridizing. Avalon Red is huskier, larger wooded and larger flowered than Radio Red. Both varieties are rapid growers and heavy feeders. Will not stand over-watering. 40c

Red Barney—Full double, clear bright dark red. A small low plant with wavy foliage. An excellent pot plant. 40c

Wyona—Semi-double scarlet, almost identical with Red Fiat but about a shade darker and much better bloomer under adverse conditions. Taller than Red Fiat and equal to Helen Mitchell. Wyona is compact and makes a good pot plant. 40c

Polly Red—The same color and flower as Red Fiat, possibly slightly darker and brighter with the same plant and size. However, the flowering qualities are much better, being more profuse and willing to bloom well in any locality. 40c

Improved Red Fiat—Larger bloom than Red Fiat and more regular, a free bloomer. 40c

Helen Mitchell—Taller than Red Fiat or Polly Red, the flowers are also much larger and slightly more regular. Color is the same orange-scarlet. An excellent bedder. 40c

Radio Red—Double, rich clear red, sometimes quite dark. The medium-sized flowers are borne in great profusion. Tall, small wood with light green foliage and no zone. A popular variety. 40c

Seabright—Semi-double, very large flat florets forming good-sized flowers. A good strong pot plant and excellent bedder. A small percentage of the flowers sport to serrated or carnation type petals. 40c

Alphonse Ricard—Strong growing, semidouble scarlet with good blooming habits. 40c

Michael Buchner—Double, orange-scarlet medium-sized flowers. This variety is excellent on the desert. 40c

Olympic Red—Semi-double, very large heads of clear light red. Good sized. Compact and a favorite pot plant. Olympic Red requires more water and food than most geraniums. 40c

Double Dryden—Double, bright, light red with white center. Good pot plant or bedder. The white center gives the illusion of being lighter in color than the actual one. 40c

Reds with Crimson or Ruby Tones

ABC Red—A perpetual blooming, self-branching, dwarf plant with bright red flowers. Early and very free flowering. 50c

Springfield Vermilion—Double light crimson or vermilion. Large flowers which are somewhat two-toned and wavy. Medium plant. 40c

Hartman—Full double, bell-shaped, light crimson red flowers on a compact, dark leaved plant. 40c

Royal Times—(New) Double, clear light American Beauty Red. The color of this fine new variety varies from darkest crimson-pink possible to a vivid soft crimson. The plant is identical with Better Times, its parent, and grows equally well. 40c

Anna Bluedorn—Semi-double, dark red with slight crimson cast. Compact, stocky plant of average size. The foliage is an excellent green with some zone. 40c

Better Times—Double, dark crimson with scarlet splash in center. Exceptionally free bloomer on a low growing plant. Compact. Foliage is medium green and very meat. Most popular dark red. 40c

Marquise de Castelane—Double, big round flowers of rich crimson. Medium large plant. 40c

Ruby King—(New Ruby) Double, large flowered ruby or crimson red. Tall plant with slender wood and medium green foliage. Flowers are borne on long slender tough stems. Is good as pot plant or bedder. One of the finest dark reds. 40c

William Jones—Double, rich crimson. Large flowers on medium large compact plant. A choice variety. 50c

Pride of Camden—(Camden Nutt) Full double, dark velvety crimson red which with S. A. Nutt is the darkest of the geraniums. Quite large plant with small straight wood. Camden is a very early bloomer. 40c

S. A. Nutt—Double, very large flat florets forming large flower heads. S. A. Nutt is as large as Camden but with slightly heavier wood, a rounder leaf and less pubescence. Flowers of S. A. Nutt are about the same size as Camden but are made up of fewer, but much larger florets. Although the base color is about the same as Camden, a velvety sheen gives the illusion of its being darker. Camden is the earlier bloomer. 40c

Plants are 4 to 8 inches tall, grown in 21/4" pots, and are shipped with soil they are grown in.

Purple Crimsons

Magenta Ruby—Double, good sized flower of dark purple crimson with a splash of scarlet in the center of the florets. This is the only really hardy crimson-purple we know of. Same plant as Better Times, it should be much better known than it is.

Marquise de Montmort—Double purple crimson with a little white in center and good sized flowers. Medium sized plant with very dark green foliage. Especially good winter bloomer. 40c

De Querille—Double, purple crimson with a little white in center. Somewhat like Marquise de Montmort, but slightly redder or darker flowers. 40c

Gypsy—Double, dark rich crimson or wine with small white center. Large flowers on a low compact plant. This is the darkest, double rich crimson. 50c

A. M. Mayne—(Springfield Violet)—Double, deep purple-crimson, with large flowers, sometimes violet. Beautiful flowers of a very rare color. 40c

SINGLE - ZONALS

More exotic color shades than double types.

White

Marguerite DeLayre—Good clear white of medium growth. 40c

Carmel—A picotte type, white with a narrow margin of bright red around the outer edge of the petals. 50c

Salmon

Barbara Hope—Flowers almost identical with Honeymoon, but possibly a darker color. The plant is large and the leaf zone not so dark. 60c

Maryanne—Single, soft light coral-red with zoned foliage in summer. During cool weather flowers are orangish-pink and foliage of very dark green with blochgreen zone. 50c

RARE, UNUSUAL AND ODD GERANIUMS Cactus or Poinsetta Flowered

A rather interesting section of the zonals is the poinsetta flowered. These are often called the cactus flowered geraniums and are somewhat more tender than other zonals. Petals are long and narrow, sometimes straight, sometimes twisted and rolled. These plants will make an interesting addition to your collection.

Starlet (New Cactus Flowered)—Double flowers of glowing rose salmon. Low, bushy and very free blooming. An especially good pot plant. 75c

Star of Persia (New Cactus Flowered)—Double flowers of a deep crimson-purple, a rich coloring close to that of the geranium A. M. Mayne (Springfield Violet). Strong grower, with double, larger flowers than any other in this class. A new color in the Cactus. 50c

Noel (White Poinsetta)—Most beautiful of the cactus flowered. The curved-petaled double flower is dignified by being pure white. A good plant. 50c Pink Poinsetta—Very double flowers. Narrow, flat petals of soft pink. Strong plant. 50c

Poinsetta—Long petaled double, brilliant red. Well grown plant produces flowers of exceptional beauty. Odd appearing wood. Leaves often more fan-shaped than typical geraniums. 50c

Hulda Conn—Full double salmon flower. Smaller and darker than Morning Star. Very free flowering. 50c

Southern Cross—Large double, beautiful reddish coral. Very fine plant with zoned foliage. 75c

Morning Star—Splendid double, brilliant light salmon which often has a decided yellow tone. Plant is low and very much self-branching. 75c

Silver Stars—Pure white single with long narrow petals which curve backward. The flower heads are very large for this type. 50c

Bird's Egg

A very popular collector's item, yet fine geranium even without the novelty of petals being striped with tiny carmen dots like those found on a bird's egg. Free blooming.

Single Cerise Bird's Egg (New)—Single cerise, with considerable speckle, but petal and speckle color are too much alike to be showy. 50c

Single Rose Pink—Excellent flower with good speckles. 50c

Single Coral Bird's Egg (New)—Single, large-flowered coral with good speckles. This is the most beautiful of the new development of this once almost lost class. 50c

Single Light Pink—Almost white. The speckles show up well. 50c

Double Lavender Pink—Fine double, large flowers. Plenty of speckles even though flower is very double. Strong plants. 50c

Carnation - Flowered

In these geraniums, the margin of the petals are toothed so that the flowers somewhat resemble small Carnations, Sweet Williams and Pinks.

Mme. Thibaut—Single white florets with notched petals. As the florets age, they turn pink. An attractive flower is fairly large. Plant is low with glossy foliage. 50c

Jeanne (Carnation, Sweet William)—Single salmon flowers with deeply notched petals borne profusely on a fast growing plant. 50c

Cerise Carnation—Double, large flowered, well notched petals of beautiful cerise color. Very robust. This variety is still in the scarce novelty class. 50c

Rosebud Varieties

The Rosebuds are the most beautiful of the novelties. The florets of all four varieties are extremely double, tiny rosettes which never open wide, so they resemble clusters of tiny half-opened roses.

Appleblossom Rosebud—Very double, white with distinct rose-red edging, green center. Strong plant. Early bloomer. Very unusual. 50c

Magenta Rosebud (Rosette)—Very double. Cerise-red rather than magenta. Strong plant. 50c

Pink Rosebud—Very double, rose-red to cerise, on the inside petals, considerably lighter, sometimes pink on the outside. Strong plant. 50c

Scarlet Rosebud—Very double. Brilliant scarlet. Seems always to be in bloom. Strong plant. 50c

New Life Geraniums

New Life (Flag of Denmark, Stars and Stripes, Peppermint Stick)—Double, miniature florets, seldom a half inch in diameter which are curled and twisted. Petals are white and red striped, half and half, or all red and white. The many florets make up a very nice sized head. Compact plant with well zoned foliage and very free flowering. 50c

Single New Life—Single florets of scarlet are stripped and penciled with white. Occasionally flowers may be all scarlet or all white with pink center, or part of a flower may be of one kind and part another. No two are alike. The flowers are round, medium freely produced on compact bushy plant. Sports freely to New Life Phlox. 50c New Life Phlox—A compact growing, free flowering novelty. The florets are light pink with a salmon or coral center. 50c

OTHER NOVELTIES

Mr. Wren—One of the most striking novelties offered. Flowers are single, white or sometimes very light pink with inner twothirds of the florets solid scarlet. The novelty of the flowers is the appearance of the petals, which look as though the scarlet had been laid on with a narrow brush in three or four strokes, each ending at a different length on the white. 50c Madder Rose—Not the Madder Rose of England (Rosebud) but a typical zonal geranium. Flowers are purple cerise and quite double. Each floret is borne on an extra long pedicel (tiny stem separating the floret from the stem) and stand somewhat separated in the flower head. Attractive and a scarlet color. 50c

Fraicheer—Double white with narrow red margin on the outer edge of petals, a picotee type. 50c

Phlox (Bright Eyes)—Single white on very light pink with half of each floret bright pink or sometimes very light red. Low compact plant. 50c

Dahlia Flowered (Formally listed as 101)—Individual floret resembles a double Unwin Dwarf Hybrid Dahlia, hence the name. Very double clear red, very dark. Each floret is the size of half a dollar with over 35 small petals with slight white eye. Medium size bloom that does not shatter. Free blooming plant is robust and a strong grower with dark green leaves. I do not know if this is an old variety that the name has been lost, or a sport or a seedling. It was found in our geraniums. 75c Carmel—A picotte type, white with a narrow margin of bright red around the outer edge of the petals. Very popular. 50c

Will Rogers—Positively enormous flower made possible only by the ability of the flower stem to make short branches immediately below the flower head. The color is a vivid purple crimson, probably better described as the darkest red possible in geraniums so far. Each floret has a small splash of intense scarlet in the center which accents the rich color. The plant is heavy wooded and has soft grayish-green foliage. 50c

OTHER UNUSUAL, ODD AND RARE VARIETIES

The zonal and Ivy crosses and Species varieties.

Zonal and Ivy Crosses

Most of this group are not crosses of simple origin. They are richly colored flowers with waxy appearance.

Alliance _(Victory)—Full double light orchid-pink with cerise blotches similar to those found in ivy-leaved geraniums. One of the most beautiful of this class. Plant is compact while young, spreads as it becomes larger. Very fine for pots and totem poles, trellis or porch boxes. Foliage is grayish and pubescent. 50c

Pink Alliance—A bright pink variety of Alliance and equally as beautiful. 50c

Ramona—Full double dark vermillion to crimson flowers, often rose-blush. Compact and good pot plant. 50c

Irma—Small double, salmon-apricot flowers with a small white center in each floret. The color of this variety is found in no other geranium. Plant is upright with glossy foliage and small green wood. 50c

Memories—Semi-double, very large pale orchid flowers which stand well above a bushy compact plant. 50c

Scarlet Beauty (Horton's Glory, Scarlet Bedder)—Semi-double scarlet flowers. Very similar to ivy-leafed variety, intensity. 50c

E. H. Trego (Louise)—Enormous double, brilliant scarlet flowers. Borne on a loosely upright plant. A good pot plant. 50c

Species Varieties

A very interesting group are garden hybrids of wild species varieties. Most of them have kept the basic feature of the wild varieties, yet are acclimated to garden culture. Some of the species grow from so called tubers or fleshy roots, such as Echinatum or cactus stemmed geraniums. Dormant during summer months. During this period they should be kept fairly dry. Growth starts in fall or winter.

- P. Park Beauty—Small nicely lobed, dark green leaves with large black blotch filling the center. Bushy spreading plant, medium size, single, orange-salmon flowers freely produced. An attractive and interesting plant. 50c
- P. Ascetosum—Silver green scalloped, cupped leaves, narrow petaled fluffy salmonpink blooms. Trailing habit. 50c
- P. Echinatum (Cactus or Sweetheart Geranium)—Sometimes referred to as cactus-stemmed geraniums because of soft spines on stems. Leaves are gray-green. Fleshy stems are thick and much branched. Small beautiful orchid-like blooms borne in clusters. Bloom is white, turning to light pink, blotched crimson on upper petals. Makes a beautiful corsage. 60c

- P. Gibbosum (Knotted Stork's Bill, Evening, Scented Geranium)—Spreading plant with odd stems that are swelled at the joints account for the common names. The habit of the small greenish yellow flowers to be pleasingly fragrant in the evening accounts for the other common name. Foliage is five-lobbed, gray-green. Pinch well and stake for a pot plant. 50c
- P. Scandens (Climbling Geranium)—Light green glossy folage, slightly zoned. Huge jumbles of single lavender flowers. Well shaped plant in the garden. As a pot plant wil climb if encouraged. 50c
- P. Fulgidum (Old Scarlet Unique)—Large gray green plants with soft, deeply cut foliage and an abundance of bright red flowers, blotched on upper petals with black. 50c
- **P. Frutetorum**—Often listed in fancy-leaved class. A spreading plant with dark green foliage with well defined zone. Beautiful with a profusion of bright salmon single flowers above dark foliage. Pinch well for pot plant. 50c

Fancy-Leaved Zonals

The Fancy-leaved Geraniums are those varieties of Zonals which have an unusual coloring on their leaves and unusual markings as well. The markings vary from dainty borders of white to brilliant com-

binations of yellow, scarlet, crimson and brown. These varieties are grown mainly for their attractive foliage although some varieties have fairly good flowers.

Silver-Leaved Geraniums

Silver Leaf S. A. Nutt—Double velvety red flowers with silvery green leaves bordered and frequently striped with ivory white. Heavy bloomer, 75c

Attraction—Slightly silvered bright green leaves with an ivy border. Small single scarlet flowers. A bushy plant. 60c

Mountains of Snow—Silvery green leaves with a pure white border. This variety has the broadest and whitest border of all. Small single brilliant flowers. 60c

Mme. Wm. L. Languth—Silvery green leaves bordered with white. A faint leaf zone. Medium sized double flowers of light crimson-red equal to many zonals. 60c

Mrs. Parker—Silvery green leaves with fairly wide border of white. Slow growing, compact plant that is free flowering with double light rose flower. 60c

Little Trot—Silvery green leaves with large cream edge. Plant is seldom over 9 to 12 inches. Flowers are small, single, rosy-pink. 60c

Mary Ann—Cup shaped. Silvery green leaved, edged cream flower is single and soft orange-red. 60c

Mme. Salleron (Mme. Salleroi)—Dwarf, not over 6 inches, cream edged, silvery green leaves rise from basal stems. Does not bloom. Fine pot or border plant. 60c

IVY-LEAVED GERANIUMS

(Pelargonium Pelatum)

Ivy Leaved Geraniums are all low growing plants varying from compact slightly form to long trailing plants. All varieties are unsurpassed for their abundance of bloom. They make beautiful pot plants, hanging baskets, window boxes and ground

covers. Excellent as a potted plant when trained on a trellis or totem pole as philodendron or with philodendron to give color.

PLEASE NOTE: The number within parenthesis after the variety name, is: **Leopard** (23) is the number of petals found on each floret. (See page 14)

Golden Tri-Color Geraniums

Pink Happy Thought—Bright green leaves with a large irregular, light yellow to ivory center, faintly zoned with splashes of brown and orange. Small, single light rosepink flowers. Much like Happy Thought in foliage, but has more slender stems and an almost trailing habit. 60c

Mrs. Pollock—Double, green leaves edged bright yellow with a wide zone splashed scarlet, crimson and brown. Small double orange-scarlet flowers. 75c

Pollock No. 137—Hardy and attractive plant with bright green leaves with a wide zone splashed scarlet, crimson and brown. Small single orange-scarlet flowers. 60c

Lady Cullum—Very similar to Pollock No. 137, but with more yellow cast. Light red, single flowers. 60c

Happy Thought—Bright green leaves with large irregular light yellow center, shading to ivory, faintly zoned with irregular splashed of brown and orange. Single red flowers on a compact strong plant. 60c

Skies of Italy—Beautiful maple-shaped leaves with a strong brown zone splashed red edged yellow. To color nicely, grow on low nitrate diet or let plant get potbound. 60c

Gold-Leaved Geraniums

Crystal Palace Gem—Yellow to yellow-green leaves with an irregular central blotch of green. Contrast of the yellow border and the green center is very attractive. Small single scarlet flowers. 60c

Gold Rush (New) - (Jubilee crossed with Happy Thought)—Low, wide but compact plant with bright yellow leaves occasionally showing faint zone, but often the leaf is pre-cut with areas of yellow and areas of a green and reddish mixture. Flowers are single red. Hardiest of the gold-leaved. 75c

Pink MacMahon—Yellow to yellow-green leaves with a small pale rust-red zone. Varies in color, but generally is paler yellow than the others. At times the leaves develop spots near the edges and between the veins. Single light pink flowers. Compact rather slow growing plant. 60c

Verona—Leaves are a green or yellowish green without zone when in good growth and quite yellow when stopped. Flowers are a nice single rose. 60c

Bronze-Leaved Geraniums

Magenta MacMahon (New)—Identical with Marshal MacMahon except blossom is Magenta instead of red. Very beautiful when covered with the Magenta blossoms. 75c

Alpha—Semi-dwarf with small shiny yellow-green leaves deeply serrated with narrow rust zone and thin hard stems. Single scarlet flowers very freely produced. 60c

Marechal MacMahon—Yellow green leaves with zone of rust-red to brown. Leaves are bright yellow-gold under favorable conditions. Small single scarlet flowers. 60c

Bronze Beauty—Yellow-green leaves with a fine broad zone varying from rust-red to brown. Zone is broader than in any of the other bronze-leaved geraniums. Tall strong plant. Small single light salmon flowers. 60c

Other Fancy-Leaved

Distinction (One-in-a-ring)—Small, somewhat yellow leaves, toothed and ruffled on plant with single cherry-red flowers. 60c

Variegated Ivy Geraniums

L'Elegante (Sunset Ivy Geranium)—Formerly listed incorrectly as Mme. Margot. (5) - Large lilac white. Green shield shaped leaves have creamy edges which turn Magenta-pink under any adverse conditions. Adverse conditions suitable to color foliage can be created easily without injury to plant by favoring the dry side a little or placing in full sun for a time. Normally L'Elegante appreciates a little shade or

cold moist location. Small wood. A beautiful and very popular variety. 60c

Duke of Edinburgh (Mme. Margot) Formerly listed incorrectly as Sunset—Pale rose flowers with bright cream or pale yellow leaves and green small wood. This variety is quite different from L'Elegante with much larger leaves and stands the sun well. 60c

Variegated Scented Geraniums

Lady Plymouth (Variegated Rose) - P. Graveolens Variegatum — Excellent light yellow plant with healthy appearance. Probably the most popular scented geraniums. About half the size of Old Fashioned Rose. Superb pot or garden border plant. 60c

Variegated Prince Rupert (French Lace) P. Crispum Variegatum—Small ruffled leaves with yellow edges. Very beautiful. 60c

Join the International Geranium Society.

Silver Leaf Rose (Grey Lady Plymouth) P. Graveolens Marginalis—Almost equal in growth with its green form Old Fashioned Rose. Very narrow silver edge. Nice. 40c

Peach (Gooseberry-leaved) - P. Crispum Variegatum—Very distinct rich odor pleasing to all. Plant is upright with foliage close to the stem and compact. Foliage is green and variegated in a pretty hit and miss fashion. Flowers are pale orchid. 40c

Snowflake - P. Adcifolium—An irregularly variegated form of Round Leaf Rose, splashed with yellow. Lavender bloom. 40c

Trinket (New)—Dwarf, double, large salmon apricot blooms. One of the finest dwarfs developed by David P. Case, International Geranium Society's President. Also Firefly and Fleurette. \$1.00

Mr. Everaarts—Semi-dwarf, double, rose with white center. Very free flowering with large flowers on medium clusters. Compact green-leaved plant. 75c

Emma Hossler—Semi-dwarf, double light rose pink with white center. Very free flowering with large flowers with medium clusters. Compact green-leaved plant. 75c

Little Darling (Kleiner's Liebling)—Dwarf, small single, rose flowers with a little white in the center. Blooms freely. Small zoneless green leaves. Bushy and compact. Good edging or pot plant. 75c

Black Vesuvius—Miniature, the most rare and smallest miniature. Single orange-scarlet flowers are surprisingly large for such a small plant. Small dark purplegreen to almost black leaves with a darker zone. Very slow growing. \$1.50

Mme. Fournier (dwarf)—Single scarlet flowers freely produced. Small dark purple-green leaves with a dark zone. 75c

Mme. Salleron (Mme. Salleroi)—Dwarf, not over 6 inches, cream edged, silvery green leaves rise from basal stems. Does not bloom. Fine pot or border plant. 60c

Little Trot—Dwarf, seldom over 9 to 12 inches. Silvery green leaves with cream edge. Flowers are small, single, rosy-pink. 60c

Alpha—Semi-dwarf with small shiny yellow-green leaves deeply serrated with narrow rust zone and thin hard stems. Single scarlet flowers very freely produced. 60c

Pigmy—Miniature, single, cherry red flowers in profusion, on a tiny plant with miniature, light green, zoned leaves. Smallest plant next to Black Vesuvius. 75c

Rober's Lavender Rose (19)—Full double, rosettes about the size of an open Cecil Brunner Rose. Light lavender with a bluish cast on edges. Shield-like foliage on small wood. An extra good bloomer. 40c

Gringore (22)—Double cerise to cerise-purple on a strong compact plant. Slightly darker than Charles Monsolet. 40c

Pansy Geraniums

Little Tim (Pansy Geranium)—Compact low plant with lots of tiny (½ inch) with purple lower petals and dark purple upper petals. 75c

Chickadee (Pansy Geranium)—Lavender flowers. Upper petals deep violet blotches. Lower petals, violet eyes. Medium sized pansy flowers. Attractive. 60c

SCENTED-LEAVED GERANIUMS

The Scented-Leaf Geraniums are gaining in popularity every year. They make excellent window pot and garden plants, wonderful foliage for corsages, very pleasing and interesting foliage for flower arrangements, or give you a very pleasant scent or aroma for your home or garden.

Lemon-Rose Scented

Crowfoot - P. Radens - Parent of most of the rose-scented geraniums. Foliage is very deeply but almost just rib stem of bluish gray. Profuse clusters of tiny lavender flowers. 40c

Dr. Livingston (Skeleton Ross) - P. Denticulatum—Tall light green plant with skeleton foliage and a splendid lemon-rose scent. 40c

Old Fashioned Rose - P. Graveolens—Big plant, the best known of this class. Is the variety most often used in flavoring jellies and preserves for fifty years during the last century. It was one plant that was found in almost every home. Large leaf on a rangy plant. 40c

Lady Plymouth (Variegated Rose) - P. Graveolens Variegatum — Excellent light yellow plant with healthy appearance. Probably the most popular scented geranium. About half the size of Old Fashioned Rose. Superb pot or garden border plant. 60c

Snowflake - P. Adcifolium—An irregularly variegated form of Round Leaf Rose, splashed with yellow. Lavender bloom. 40c

Attar of Roses - P. Capitatum—Not upright, but a compact mound about two feet high. Small lavender flowers in groups. 40c

Camphor Rose - P. Graveolens—Identical growth and flowers of Attar of Roses except that this has strong camphor fragrance. Small orchid flowers, purple veined. 40c

Rober's Lemon Rose - P. Graveolens - Cultivar—Very fine and popular. Leaves are deeply cut and have neat narrow margin of leaf around each rib structure. Cluster of flowers are small and orchid color. 40c Graves Staghorn Rose - P. Graveolens - Cultivar.—Similar to Rober's but larger plant with wider leaf margins around ribs.

Round Leaf Rose - P. Adcifolium—Semiprostrate plant with round foliage. Quite different from the general rose group. 40c Silver Leaf Rose (Gray Lady Plymouth) - P. Graveolens Marginalis—Almost equal in growth with its green form to Old Fashioned Rose. Very narrow silver edge. Good. 40c

Crispum-Lemon Scented

An excellent group of fine pot or garden plants. Stems grow upright with stiff crinkled leaves radiating closely from the stems. The illusion is that of a miniature juniper tree. The flowers are all light fushsia. Size is 3/4 to 11/2 inches.

Fingerbowl Geranium - P. Crispum Minor —Tiny stemless dense leaves. 40c

Variegated Prince Rupert or French Lace - P. Crispum Variegatum—Small ruffled leaves with yellow edges. Compact growth. Leading scented variety. 60c

Prince Rupert - P. Crispum—Largest of the group and the best known. Fine pot plant. 40c

Oak-Leaved

The following cultivars of P. Quercifolium. The Oak-Leaved are all pungent scented and have many uses in which they are not matched by other plants.

Sharp Toothed Oak - P. Quercifolium pinnatifidum—Purple marked medium sized leaf. Pale pink flowers deeply marked rose. 40c

Staghorn Oak - P. Quercifolium—Deeply cut seven-lobed foliage with purple veining on spreading plant. Dark lavenderpink flowers. 40c

Village Hill - P. Quercifolium Hybrid—Similar to Fair Ellen. Very free bloomer. 40c

Skelton's Unique - P. Quercifolium—Similar to Trailing Oak with less cut leaf and darker center. Dark green leaves with brown zone. Deep orchid flowers marked purple. 40c

Fair Ellen - P. Quercifolium—Well shaped plant with nice green foliage that has a chocolate brown center. Leaves fine lobed. Lavender flowers spotted purple. 40c

Prostrate or Trailing Oak - P. Quercifolium Prostrate—Excellent for pot make up, especially to fill around base of larger plants. Low growing with oak-shaped leaves having light brown zone. Deep orchid flowers. 40c

Flowering Scented

This group contains recognizable scents or those classified as pungent. They are grown much more for the flowers, for decorative effect or make up value.

Fern Leaf - P. Filicifolium — Same as Pheasant's Foot but more deeply cut foliage. 40c

Rollinson's Unique—Minty-pungent. Plant is quite like Mrs. Kingsley but foliage is less curly and flowers are much larger and darker color. Cerise-purple. It is preferred for indoor pot plants. 40c

Shrubland Rose—Fast large shrub grows to $2\frac{1}{2}$ ft. by first year. Large number of brilliant crimson flowers. Fine background bedder. 40c

Apricot (M. Ninon) - P. Denticulatum—Supposedly apricot, but smells more like the foliage of apricot tree. This variety makes one of the nicest pot plants and is very popular. Florets are brilliant crimson, about one inch across and borne in head of five or six. Foliage is deeply toothed and a bright glossy green. 40c

Mrs. Kingsley - P. Rapaceum—Low spreading plant with bright purple flowers, almost cerise. Foliage is grayish, wavy and deeply cut. 40c

Pheasant's Foot - P. Viscosissimum—Strongly pungent. Dark green finely cut foliage which is sticky to the touch. Leaf has the appearance of a pheasant's footprint. Plant is very trim and upright. Flowers are pale orchid. Popular hobbyist item. 40c

Lady Mary - P. Limoneum—Slightly lemon scented. Excellent pot plant which bears a profusion of pale orchid colored flowers with upper petals of crimson. 40c

Concolor Lace (Shottesham Pet)—Filbert scented, low round light green plant with deeply cut foliage and myriad of small brilliant red flowers, veined maroon. Nice collectors pot item. Best for low (1 foot) borders. 40c

Capri—Large, crisp, crinkled leaves. Free flowering plant with mound-like growth and 2 inch clusters of cerise flowers. Mild scent. Attractive window plant. 40c

Clorinda—Mildly encalyptus-scented. A large plant with dull green foliage and bright rose-pink flowers as large as some show type pelargoniums. Borne in large heads. Very popular for both pot and garden. 40c

Fruit and Spice Scents

Nutmeg - P. Fragrans—Semi-prostrate plant. A criss-cross of small hard wood covered with beautiful round wavy graygreen foliage. Sprays of very tiny white flowers rise above foliage. 40c

Fruity - P. Fragrans Logeei—Apple and Nutmeg cross. Very rich fragrance of ripe fruit. Foliage is brownish green. Flower stems are red. 40c

Apple Cider - P. Fragrans Codyi—Apple and Nutmeg cross. Foliage is light bright green. 40c

Pine - P. Fragrans Turneth—Clean scent more turpentine than pine, which does not seem to lessen its popularity. Green foliage. 40c

Apple - P. Odoratissimum — Very strong clean scent. Round, wavy dollar-sized leaves rise on slender stems six to eight inches from basal stems. Flowers are tiny white blooms similar to Fragrans varieties. 40c

Ginger - P. Torento—Leaf is a little larger and less notched than Lime - P. Nervosum. Always one of the best sellers. Plant grows 14 to 18 inches the first season. Full and round large lavender flower. 40c

Lemon Balm - P. Mellissimum—Fast and rather coarse grower, but one of the best lemon odors. A nice pot variety. 40c

Lime - P. Nervosum—Very attractive low, round plant with saw-toothed foliage and nice lavender flowers. A very free bloomer.

Almond (Pretty Polly)—Attractive light green plant with silvery pink flowers with dark crimson blotches. Fair scent. 40c Bode's Peppermint Rose (New)—Old-fashioned Rose crossed with Pungent Peppermint. Strong growth like Old-fashioned Rose, but more deeply cut grayish-green foliage. 50c

Strawberry (Countess of Scarabough) - P. Scarboroviae—Plant is upright, similar to Crispum, but less stiff, with leaves close to stems. Appearance is reddish green. Flowers are small and lavender-pink. 40c

Peach (Gooseberry-leaved) - P. Crispum Variegatum—Very distinct rich odor pleasing to all. Plant is upright with foliage close to the stem and compact. Foliage is green and variegated in a pretty hit-andmiss fashion. Flowers are pale orchid. 40c Cinnamon - P. Gratum—Similar to Attar of Roses. 40c

Orange (Citronella, Prince of Orange) - P. Citriodorum. Somewhat similar in growth to Lime (Nervosum) with leaves less notched. Blooms well. Medium sized violetlike flowers are orchid blotched with crimson. 40c

Peppermint - P. Tomentosum — Trailing plant with large velvety, very hairy, gray, grape like foliage. Very popular and an excellent trailing pot plant. 40c

Pungent Peppermint - P. Denticulatum—Fine large upright plant with deeply cut gray foliage and very sharp distinct peppermint odor. (P. Tomentosum). 40c

Joy Lucille - P. Tomentosum X Graveolens.—Very large rangy hybrid that makes a good sized pot plant with large fivefingered leaves with velvety texture. A beautiful plant with clusters of small pink flowers and a minty fragrance. 40c

Wormwood (Southern Wood Leaved) - P. Abortanifolium.—A woody appearing plant with attractive, tiny gray leaves. Foliage is excellent in sachets. Small white blooms. 40c

P. Australis—Spicy scent soft light green zonal leaf trailing plant. Small clusters of delicate lavender flowers. 40c



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
