**ADDRESS** all General Correspondence, Payments, Plant Orders, &c., to Clibrans, Altrincham.

Orders for Seeds, Bulbs, Plants, Garden Requisites, or any other class of Nursery Goods, sent to any of our establishments, will receive immediate attention.

**REMITTANCES.**—Accounts due Quarterly and Half-yearly, strictly nett; 5 per cent. discount allowed off the majority of Garden Requisites, Seeds and Bulbs; 2½ per cent. off Plants, Trees, &c., for cash within 14 days after the receipt of invoice. Small amounts may be remitted in stamps. No receipts sent for sums under 2/6, unless stamp is sent to cover postage.

**OCCASIONAL CUSTOMERS.**—In cases of small orders, customers are respectfully requested to send remittances in prepayment.

**NOMENCLATURE.**—Every care is taken to supply goods true to name, but mistakes may occur. We shall be glad if our patrons will communicate with us immediately an error is discovered, and we will then return the amount paid or replace with the true variety, if in stock; but we cannot take further responsibility. **Please note**, goods are supplied on this condition only.

**PACKAGES.**—Crates, Baskets, and Mats are invariably charged at less than cost of material, and in no case when returned can the full amount charged be allowed, as value is depreciated by the journey. We allow their intrinsic value when received here, and in no case will this

exceed two-thirds of invoice price. Material used in the packing of bundles is not returnable. Sender's name and address should be attached to packages when returned, and an advice sent by post.

**CARRIAGE OF GOODS.**—Bulbs and Seeds are sent carriage paid. Plants, Trees, and heavy Garden Sundries, if ordered in cart or lorry loads, will be delivered free any reasonable distance from the Nurseries, or if a railway truck load is ordered, we will make special carriage arrangements, according to amount, distance, &c., but in no other cases can we pay carriage on these unless we charge it in invoice; extra Plants, however, are always added to compensate in part for carriage when not delivered free.

**PLANTS IN STOCK.**—All orders are received subject to the Plants being in stock at the time. When not in stock no substitution will be made unless the customer desires.

**LATE ORDERS.**—In cases of failure when Plants are ordered out of season, we cannot take any responsibility, as such arise through causes beyond our control.

### Where our Plants are grown

HALE, our Headquarters, where our Glasshouses are situated, is 9 miles south-west of Manchester, sufficiently distant from the city to escape the baneful effects of its smoke. Being at a considerable altitude, our plants have the advantage of growing in a clear and pure atmosphere, a condition that is essential to the proper development of their vigour and constitution.

### The Glasshouses

Our Glass Structures are all new, being erected about 5 years ago, when we moved our headquarters to the present site. They total 28 in number, are all span roofed and vary in width from 11 feet to 23 feet. With four exceptions they are all 180 feet in length. A corridor house, 540 feet in length, runs along and connects the houses together along one end.

### Some Novel Features

With a view to adapting our houses as closely as possible to the needs of the plants, and to facilitate attention to them, several novel features have been introduced in our houses. A narrow gauge tramway runs along the entire length of the corridor, connecting with and running through every house. Our water supply is pumped by means of the Windmill (see photo above) to a reservoir on some high ground about half a mile distant; from there it gravitates through a system of pipes to taps in every house. The system of heating is most modern, including overhead hot water pipes in several houses.

### An Invitation

Anyone who is at all fond of plants, or flowers, cannot fail to be interested in a visit to our establishment. In addition to the extensive Glasshouses, there are 300 acres of out-door nurseries. We heartily welcome a visit of inspection by anyone interested. If necessary, arrangements will be made to meet visitors at the railway station, on receiving an intimation a few posts in advance.

## Azalea Indica.

Well-known plants for greenhouse and conservatory decoration. They bloom early in the year, and can be had in flower for some months. **Fine plants set with buds in choicest colours and variety, 2/-, 2/6 and 3/6 each; 21/-, 24/-, 30/- to 36/- per dozen.**

## Azalea, Ghent and Mollis.

Very showy and useful for indoor decoration. If placed in a stove they may be brought into flower early in the year; before the flowers are fully expanded remove to a cooler house, where they will last for a long time in full beauty. The colours embrace a variety of shades in orange, yellow, red, salmon, &c.

# Clibrans' Tuberos Begonias.

Careful fertilisation and selection over a period of many years has resulted in Tuberos Begonias of the highest excellence. Our aim has been to produce dwarf habit, freedom in the production of large flowers in clear and well-defined colours and shades, carried upright on stout stems. In this we have succeeded. We cordially invite inspection when in bloom, from the beginning of July until the middle of September.

**CULTURAL NOTE.**—Begonia Tubers should be started into growth any time from February to March, the tubers intended for bedding being placed in boxes. A mixture of good loam, leaf mould, and coarse sand, with well-rotted manure, is the best compost. Pot firmly, placing the tubers just below the surface of the soil; the potting compost should be moistened before use. Allow plenty of drainage, and place any rough portions of soil at the bottom over the crocks. Water sparingly until the plants are growing freely, and re-pot into larger pots as required. In the growing season, especially during hot weather, water freely, and on no account allow the plants to become dry. Plenty of air and light are essential at all stages of their growth, and when grown under glass the flowering plants require to be shaded from the sun during the hottest part of the day. After flowering, gradually withhold water until the tops, die down, when the tubers should be placed in sand or cocoa fibre, and stored away in a cool dry place. Examine occasionally to see if any signs of decay.

## New Winter Flowering Begonias.

(*Begonia Socotrana* x *Tuberous Variety*).

What was formerly considered an impossibility has now been accomplished. The comparatively small-flowered Winter-blooming species—*Begonia Socotrana*—has been successfully crossed with the large flowering Summer-blooming tuberous variety, resulting in a race of Begonias producing large flowers during the Autumn and Early Winter. Blooming at a period when flowers are at a premium, these interesting and beautiful Hybrids will be found of the greatest value. The new varieties we have raised, and now offer for the first time, are all of the highest excellence. We would, however, draw special attention to "*Miss Clibran*," and "*Clibrans' Triumph*" as being the very finest varieties of this class of Begonias that has yet been raised.

**Cultural Note.**—Cuttings may be struck from April to August in a temperature of 65 to 70 degrees; pot on as required, and, later, place them in a temperature of 60 to 65 degrees. Shade from bright sunshine. Water carefully at all times, but maintain a moist atmosphere throughout the growing period, giving air on favourable occasions. Cuttings struck from April to June will make large exhibition plants in 6½-inch pots; those struck during July will make good plants in 5-inch pots. During Autumn the plants will commence to bloom, and continue to do so throughout the winter. When the flowering period is over, water should be given very carefully, just sufficient to keep them from becoming too dry. Continue this treatment until the plants show signs of starting growth in Spring, when supplies should be increased. The compost best suited for these plants consists of 3 parts loam, 1 part leaf-mould, and 1 part silver sand, for cuttings; for larger plants add a little well-decayed manure.

## Single Geraniums.—Zonal and Nosegay.

These are of the utmost value for Conservatory decoration during the Summer and Autumn, and if properly grown, furnish gorgeous flowers in Winter, and none can fail to appreciate them for decorative purposes from October to January, a season when (excepting Chrysanthemums) there are no plants of easy culture to furnish flowers. Considering their low price, their simple cultural requirements, freedom from insect enemies, and yet strikingly gorgeous appearance and usefulness for cut flowers, as Winter blooming plants they are indispensable.

Plants intended for Winter decoration ought to be grown on during the Summer for that purpose alone. They ought not to be allowed to waste their strength in blooming in Summer or early Autumn. All the buds should be removed, the plants grown in pots out of doors, carefully attended to for water, and the wood ripened in August or September; then remove to a cool, airy house, and a few weeks before bloom is wanted place them in a temperature of 50 to 60 degrees.

By successive potting they flower throughout the greater part of the year, thriving best in a compost of loam, peat, leaf-mould, and sand, and a moist, warm atmosphere, free from cold draughts. Start the bulbs in March and April, in a warm house, and apply weak liquid manure, once or twice a week, when growing freely. Shade from sunshine. After blooming, gradually withhold water, and store away in a dry moderately warm place, care being taken that no damp reaches the bulbs.

Special care has been bestowed on our strain of Gloxinias for many years past. The flowers are remarkable for their upright habit, large size, and the depth and intensity of their colouring. ## Greenhouse Plants.

**CULTURAL NOTES.**—Plants suitable for Greenhouses thrive best in a temperature of 40 to 50 degrees in Winter. All the Soft-wooded Plants of this Section need supplies of weak liquid manure, or a top-dressing of artificial manure, such as our "Ideal" Fertilizer, as soon as they are well established in the pots, if free and continuous bloom is required. The Hard-wooded Plants mostly require peat, leaf-soil, and sand, with a little well-rotted old manure, and do best in the coldest and most airy part of the house. The Soft-wooded Plants require rotted turf, old manure, leaf-mould, and sand, and do best in the warmest part of the house. If either class is wanted for Winter bloom, 10 to 15 degrees more heat is required than is needed to keep them in health without bloom, and a drier atmosphere is essential. From June to September Hard-wooded Plants do well in a cold frame or behind a north wall or fence, if attended to for water, and kept quite free from insects. Soft-wooded Plants at this time are mostly in bloom. The house should be well ventilated, and slightly shaded from strong sunshine. Fumigate or syringe with some insecticide before the insects appear.

## Stove Plants.

In the growing season the heat should be kept to 65° and upwards, and the syringe used freely at least twice daily. Evaporating troughs should be filled, and air given according to the state of the wind and outdoor temperature. A rise of temperature from sun heat (not fire heat) up to 90° will be more beneficial than otherwise, providing the atmosphere is moist; dry heat must be avoided. Most of the plants in this section require peat soil, or a mixture of peat and loam, with a little old manure, sand, and leaf-mould. Liquid manure, or top-dressing with artificial manure, is beneficial to all when well established, if free growth and profusion of bloom are desired.
