### Japanese Chrysanthemums.

FROM the Exhibitors point of view, the "Japanese" are certainly the "Premier" section of Chrysanthemums. The flowers attain a large size and vary greatly in appearance. Some have broad, others narrow petals; in some cases they are straight, in others curled, twisting, and interlacing. In length the petals may vary, according to the variety, from a few inches to eight or nine inches in length, whilst in many varieties the petals, instead of hanging down, are of an incurving character.

A collection of Japanese varieties in bloom is a sight to see and remember. The following pages contain all that is best in this class.



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
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
