Yet I do not give any warranty, expressed or implied, and in case of any error on my part, it is hereby mutually agreed between the purchaser and myself that I shall not at any time be held responsible for a greater amount than the original price of the goods.

Terms: Cash or satisfactory security before shipment. Orders to be sent "C.O.D." must be aceompanied with one-fourth the amount in cash.

Prices: Prices herein are limited to the spring of 1908, and rule only when the number specified is taken; 5 will be furnished at 10 rates; 50 at 100 rates; 500 at 1,000 rates.

Packing: The prices do not include packing, for which I charge moderately. Packing is done mostly in boxes, sometimes in bales or pareels, for which 1 charge only suffient to cover cost. For boxes 8 or 9 feet by $21 / 2$ feet, $\$ 3.00 ; 10$ feet by 3 feet, $\$ 3.50$. Smaller boxes in proportion. Spring packing usually begins about the middle of March.

## HERBACEOUS PEONIES.

Within the past ten years this splendid section of hardy herbaceous flowering plants have been brought into very prominent notice because of the general improvement in varieties of comparatively recent origin. In thesc newer sorts, we have not only immensc blooms reaching in some specimens seven or eight inches in diameter, but the range of color is also so varied that almost every tint of pink, white, red. crimson and even some shades of yellow is comprised in the list. Plant vigor has also been improved and strong stems three feet long are not at all uncommon in some of the varieties. There is also an element of practical, permanent value in the Peony; that is the plants once purchased and planted in suitable soil continue to increase in size and profusion of bloom for years with very little further attention; while they pay an annual dividend in the way of magnificent blooms that are unsurpassed for decorative purposes.
