Yet I do not give any warranty, expressed or implied, and in case of any error on iny part, it is hereby mutually agreed between the purchaser and myself that I shall not at any time be held responsible for a greater amount than the original price of the goods.

Terms: Cash or satisfactory security before shipment. Orders to be sent "C. O. D." must be accompanied with one-fourth the amount in cash.

Reference: First National Bank, Normal, Illinois.
Prices: Prices herein are limited to the spring of 1909, and rule only when the number specified is taken; 5 will be furnished at 10 rates; 50 at 100 rates; 500 at 1,000 rates.

Packing: The prices do not include packing, for which I charge moderately. Packing is done mostly in boxes, sometimes in bales or parcels, for which I charge only sufficient to cover cost. ## Herbaceous Peonies.

Within the past ten years this splendid section of hardy herbaceous flowering plants have been brought into very prominent notice because of the general improvement in varieties of comparatively recent origin. Foster. situated at Normal, Ill., have been inspected according to the provisions of an Act to prevent the introduction and spread in illinois of the san fose scale and other dangerous insects and contagious diseases of fruits, approved and in force April 11. 1899, and that 110 indications have been found of the presence of the San Jose scate or other dangerous insects or plant disease.
