# A few Hints on the Culture of Roses.

HEN the Plants are received from the Nursery, they should, if the weather is not frosty, be unpacked at once and the roots and tops wetted; if the ground is ready, plant at once, taking only a few at a time out of the shelter, so that the whole lot may not be exposed for any length of time to cold drying winds.

SITUATION.—A place apart from other flowers should be assigned to Roses if possible. Oblong beds not over 4 feet wide are the best, as the flowers may be cut and examined without treading on the beds. The situation should be an open one, though not exposed to high winds or currents. A south-east or south-west aspect is best, the beds being situated so as to receive the morning sun; roses like a free circulation, but are injured by cold draughts; on the other hand, closeness is apt to generate mildew.

SOIL.—That which they especially delight in is a rich fibrous loam that feels greasy when pressed between the fingers; where this is not to be lad the soil should be improved—if light, by the addition of loam or even clay well worked in; where heavy, good drainage and the addition of charcoal in small quantities will help it, but in such places drainage is most important. The ground should be deeply trenched, well rotted animal manure being plentifully added; if the soil be old garden soil, add good fresh loam, rich and yellow; if heavy elay, some burned earth, road sand, or leaf-mould should be added. For Briars the loam if somewhat adhesive in quality will be all the better.

PLANTING.—Choose a fine day for the operation; rather than plant when the ground is very wet lay the plants in for a day or two and wait. Dwarf or Bush Roses should be planted with the collar of the bud, or point of union with the stock, at least two inches below the surface of the soil. Standard Roses should not be planted too deep—a few inches depth of soil above the roots is sufficient; but firmly stake each tree to prevent the wind rocking it, this last operation is essential to success. When planted amongst other subjects in the borders, a hole should be made about 18 inches deep, and large enough to contain half a wheelharrowfull of a compost of two-thirds strong turfy loam (if it can be procured from an old pasture it is preferable) and one-third well decomposed animal manure, in the midst of this the tree should be planted and trodden in firmly; a little sandy mixture near the roots induces fresh fibre.

TWATERING.—Should dry weather follow planting let the trees have a good soaking of water, and syringe the tops; especially is this necessary with those planted in spring. Large numbers which die every year from the effects of drying winds would be saved if care was taken in watering and syringing as here recommended. When coming into bloom, if weather is dry, give a good soaking once or twice a week, and at this time liquid manure may be used with advantage.

MANURING.—Roses are gross feeders, and will take almost any amount of manure. A layer six inches deep of half decayed hot-bed, laid on the beds in November and forked in the following Spring is an excellent dressing; eow or pig manure when available is also good.

PRUNING.—This should not be done at the time of planting. If the trees are planted in the Autumn, March is the best month; if Spring planted, April will be sufficiently early; the latter month is also the best for pruning the Tea-scented and Noisette kinds. The strength of the shoot must determine the extent of the shortening—if vigorous, leave it much longer than that which is weak; as a rule the stronger kinds should be left 12 to 18 inches long with 5 to 6 eyes, the weaker growing 6 inches with 2 to 4 eyes; these remarks apply mostly to Hybrid Perpetuals. Tea-scented and Noisette Roses should only have the weak growth thinned out and the strong shoots topped. The Summer varieties of Moss Roses should be only sparingly pruned. Do not let established plants of any kind of Rose become crowded with branches, but carefully thin out all small and unripened wood. In all cases prune to a bud pointing outwards.



With this in view we have entirely re-arranged our Rose List, putting the Hybrid Perpetuals Tea-Scented, Noisettes, and Bourbons in one section, and the Miscellaneous Garden and Old-Fashioned Roses in another, and placing all varieties in alphabetical order, but attaching to each the family or class to which it belongs, so that the principal feature of the old arrangement is still adhered to.

As now compiled, an order can be made out with greater facility, and we venture to think the List will be found most useful to keep permanently for reference.

#### ABBREVIATIONS.

- H.P. Hybrid Perpetual.—This is our finest family of Roses, owing its origin to the crossing and intermixing of Hybrid China and Hybrid Bourbon with the China, Bourbon, and Tea-Scented varieties. The Hybrid Perpetuals bloom freely throughout the Summer and Autumn, and all arc highly fragrant as well as exquisitely beautiful in all colours of the rose, yellow alone excepted.
- T. Tea-Scented.—This important class of Roses, distinguished from all others by the delicious fragrance and delicate tints of the flowers, should be more largely grown. For producing buds for bouquets or button-holes they are unequalled. They succeed admirably grown in the warmest and sunniest parts in the garden and abundantly supplied with water during the hot months. For planting out in conservatorics or for cultivation in pots they are particularly suitable, and when only protected with glass produce flowers in great quantities far into the winter months.

The whole of our Tea-Scented and Noisette Roses are worked upon the seedling or cutting briar, which has been proved to be by far the best and most lasting stock for them.

- H.T. Hybrid Tea.—A recently introduced race of Roses, being seedlings from Teas, but more or less partaking of the Hybrid Perpetuals with which they have been hybridised; all are very free flowering, and fine Autumnal Roses.
- N. Noisette.—The Noisettes are a fine class of Roses, blooming mostly in very large clusters throughout the Summer and Autumn, and are generally very free bloomers. Many of them make very fine Pillar Roses. In pruning them the old wood should be thinned out and the new wood left nearly full length.
- B. Bourbon.—This is a charming family of Autumn-blooming Roses. They are free and continual bloomers, bright in colour and fine in form, with bright shining foliage. For beds they are unrivalled, for when established they seldom receive any injury from the winter. Require rich soil and moderately close pruning.

STANDARD ROSES are upon stems from 3 to 4 ft. in height. HALF-STANDARDS are upon stems from 2 to 2½ ft. in height, BUSH or DWARF ROSES are either upon their own Roots or Budded a few inches higher.

Where the price of a Standard is not affixed, the variety cannot be supplied as such this season.

Varieties printed in larger type are those recently introduced; the descriptions given are those of the raisers.



# LORD PENZANCE'S NEW HYBRID SWEET BRIARS.

These lovely hybrids, raised by Lord Penzanee, form quite a distinct break from any class of rose yet in commerce, being a cross between the common Sweet Briar and various old-fashioned garden Roses, Austrian Briars, &c. The foliage of each variety is as sweetly seented as the common Sweet Briar, and the flowers are varied in colour from pale yellow to crimson.

They are perfectly hardy and most vigorous in growth, and should not be pruned, as the flower is produced upon the preceding year's wood. The shoots should be thinned out only, those remaining being left at full length. We offer this season a few standards; grown in this way the long weeping shoots are exceedingly attractive when in flower.

# SINGLE ROSES.

SINGLE ROSES are highly decorative in the flower garden, and so beautiful for Vases and Bouquets in the cut state that every garden should possess some of the varieties. # CARRIAGE OF ROSES, FRUIT TREES, ETC.

GEORGE COOLING & SONS pay carriage on all Orders for ROSE TREES (excepting Plants in Pots) of 21s. in value and upwards to any Railway Station in England, and on Orders of 42s. to Scotland and Ireland. FRUIT TREES are sent Carriage Free when the order amounts to £3 in England, and £5 for Scotland and Ireland. In all smaller orders than the above we add an extra plant or plants to compensate for carriage.

ROSES IN POTS, ORNAMENTAL TREES, SHRUBS, &c., we cannot undertake to send Free of Carriage, but will in all cases add liberally to the number ordered to compensate.

DWARF ROSES up to about 12 in number may be sent in one package by Parcels Post, and we will forward in this manner if any of our customers wish.

Customers in ordering will much oblige by giving instructions as to the most direct way of forwarding, name of station, &c., to ensure prompt delivery.

A Discount of 5 per cent allowed off all amounts above 20s. paid within 14 days' date of invoice. All Accounts due, without deductions, at Midsummer and Christmas. Post Office Orders, to be made payable to George Cooling & Sons, at the Head Office, Bath. Cheques crossed "Prescott & Co." A remittance or reference is respectfully requested from those sending their orders for the first time.

The full price allowed for all packages if returned carriage free and in good condition within a month.

Plants will be so packed that they may stand a journey of a week or ten days without injury. Should the packages arrive at their destination during a severe frost it will be advisable not to unpack them, but to keep them cool and moist, out of reach of frost, until a change of weather takes place.

Failures sometimes take place in the removing and transplanting of all kinds of trees. This may occur through a variety of circumstances, such as severe frost and drought, cold north-easterly winds in spring, want of the usual care in planting, and other causes for which it is impossible for the nurserymen to be accountable. The greatest care is taken to supply healthy and strong plants of everything required; and if on receipt any are broken in transit, or not satisfactory, we shall be pleased to make every compensation; but complaints received months afterwards cannot be taken into consideration.

#### FOREIGN ORDERS.

We take special care in the selection of Roses and other Plants and Trees for exportation, and our system of packing has proved most successful; only well ripened plants and most suitable varieties are chosen, and every care is taken to secure their safe arrival.

FOREIGN PARCELS POST - Parcels of Roses may now be sent by post to British Colonies and to most Foreign Countries,

N.B.—Foreign and Colonial Orders must in all cases be accompanied by a remittance; this should include sufficient to cover cost of packing and carriage when latter has to be paid in advance.



SHOWING THE DIFFERENT STYLES OF TRAINING.










