READ THIS PAGE BEFORE ORDERING

ORDER EARLY: The amount of nursery stock in the country is estimated to be about 30 per cent of enough to supply the normal demand, and the demand this year is much heavier than usual. It will be necessary to order early if you are to get any stock for this Spring's planting. Over half of our supply of Raspberries was sold last Fall, Grapes and Currants are almost all sold and all other stock is being sold rapidly even before this catalog is printed. Do not delay but order at once and we will do the best we can for you.

HOW TO REMIT: Remit by money order, bank draft, registered letter or personal check. Postage stamps accepted for small orders.

DISCOUNT: I offer my usual discount of 10 per cent for orders received before March 1st, and 5 per cent for orders received before April 1st. It will be practically necessary to take advantage of the discount this season as my stock will be pretty well sold by March 1st.

EASY TERMS: In order that everyone may send their order early even tho they cannot spare the entire amount, I will book orders that are accompanied by 25 per cent of the amount of the order. The balance may be sent later or stock will be sent C.O.D.

ABOUT SHIPPING: All orders of 20 lbs. or more will generally ship cheapest by express. If wanted by mail add 10 cents for each 100 Strawberry Plants or 25 Raspberries.

GUARANTEE: I guarantee all stock true to name and free from disease. Should any prove to be otherwise I will refund the money or replace free of charge. But I cannot replace for any other reason stock sold at the prices listed herein.

CLAIMS: When you receive your stock examine it carefully. If damaged or delayed in transit call the attention of your express agent to the fact, and enter claim for the amount. If stock is unsatisfactory from any fault of ours advise us at once. I cannot entertain any complaints not made at once on receipt of stock.

RASPBERRIES

Raspberries are probably the most reliable of all berries to raise. They are pretty sure to mature a good crop and the market is never fully supplied with them. Plant on good, well-drained soil and cultivate often. Fertilize with chemicals. Some wood ashes may be used. As a rule, it will pay best to use manure on some other crops. Avoid planting Cuthbert and Herbert on river banks or in frosty hollows. June and Marlboro are best for these locations. A field of Cuthbert should yield profitably for ten years or more and the early varieties and black-caps are good for about five years.

CUTHBERT. The fine old stand-by. Berries late, very large and finest quality. Does best on uplands or hillsides. A very vigorous grower and succeeds on poorer soils than other varieties. 25 for \$1.00; \$3.50 per 100; \$30.00 per 1000.

MARLBORO. Very large, early and productive. Practically identical with Ruby. Price same as Cuthbert.

HERBERT. Berries of immense size and best quality. Extremely productive. Ripens in midseason. Very popular in Northern New England and New York because of its extreme hardiness. Supply of plants very short. 25 for \$1.25; 100 for \$4.50; 1000 for \$35.00.

IDAHO. The most productive and largest red raspberry. Perfectly hardy. Fruit rather acid for eating fresh but good for jelly and jam. Price same as Herbert.

GOLDEN QUEEN. Exactly like Cuthbert except in color. Sold out.

ST. REGIS. The much advertised ever-bearer. A widely planted commercial variety south of New York City but should be planted for home use only in the North. The earliest raspberry. Price same as Cuthbert.

OHTA. An extremely hardy variety grown considerably in the Middle West and also south of the commercial raspberry belt. Very good quality but a light yielder. 25 for \$1.50; 100 for \$5.00.

ERSKINE PARK. This widely advertised variety is of no great value for home or commercial planting, but should be of much interest to plant breeders. Very hardy, vigorous and a splendid plant-maker. It blossoms much more than St. Regis in the Fall and its only fault is its failure to bear berries of value. Price same as Ohta.

JUNE. I believe this variety is the finest commercial variety there is available today. Earlier than Marlboro and nearly as Early as St. Regis. Cane very vigorous, handsome and thornless. Perfectly hardy. Berries of largest size, good quality and fine for shipping. This variety is a very heavy yielder and should not be omitted from the home garden or commercial field. I offer a fine lot of plants at wholesale prices. Price same as Herbert.

EMPIRE. I have discarded this variety as it makes too weak a plant to be of much value.

PERFECTION. A fine commercial variety but inferior to June. Discarded.

BLACK AND PURPLE RASPBERRIES

COLUMBIAN. The most popular purple variety. Supply of plants so short that I cannot sell more than 400 to one customer. \$1.50 per 25; \$5.00 per 100.

ROYAL PURPLE. Later and firmer than Columbian. Bush more erect. Very hardy. Not over 500 to one customer. Price same as Columbian.

PLUM FARMER. The leading black raspberry. I have a fine lot of plants. \$1.00 for 25; \$3.00 per 100; \$25.00 per 1000.

CUMBERLAND. Large, jet black. Later than Plum Farmer. Short supply of plants. Sold out.

GREGG. The old standard. Considered the sweetest by many. Sold out.

HONEYSWEET. Supposed to be a cross between Plum Farmer and Gregg. Described by originator as very large, sweet and glossy; black in color. I have not fruited Honeysweet yet, but have several hundred plants which I offer at 25 for \$1.50; \$5.00 per 100.

BLACKBERRY PLANTS

Culture same as raspberries.

ELDORADO. About the finest quality blackberry, berries large, long and very sweet. Early. Cane hardy. Some nurseries have sent out thousands of an inferior variety as Eldorado which accounts for the disappointing results many have had. I have a short supply of true Eldorado which I will sell while they last at \$1.50 per 25; \$5.00 per 100.

SNYDER. One of the hardiest and heaviest yielding varieties. Quality only fair but it is planted the most of any variety in the North because it is the surest cropper; not over 500 in one order. 25 for \$1.00; \$3.50 per 100.

BLOWERS. A giant in cane and fruit. Where it succeeds, Blowers should be the most profitable blackberry. Berry immense, jet black and good quality. A tremendous yielder but requires a long season to ripen both fruit and wood. Should not be planted north of Central New England. 25 for \$1.00; \$3.50 per 100; \$30.00 per 1000.

GOOSEBERRY PLANTS

Currants and gooseberries will grow in almost any good soil. They are rank feeders and like a lot of stable manure.

Because of certain restrictions, I cannot ship currants and gooseberries to sections outside of New England, New York and New Jersey.

DOWNING. Most popular gooseberry. Color green. Quality best. Medium size. 30c each. \$2.50 for 10.

RED JACKET. Color pale red. Larger than Downing. Price Same.

OREGON CHAMPION. Color yellowish-green. Immensely productive. Sweet. Price same as Downing.

CARRIE. Bush vigorous. Not very thorny. Very productive, the bushes being literally covered with dark red berries of medium size and fair quality. Price same as Downing.

CURRANTS

Currant bushes are extremely scarce this season and I have only a limited number to offer.

PERFECTION. Considered the largest and best red currant. 3 yr. plants 35c each, \$3.00 for 10.

RED CROSS. Large, sweet and early. 2 yr. size, 25c each, \$2.25 for 10. One year size, 20c each, \$1.80 for 10.

STRAWBERRIES

SENATOR DUNLAP. An all round variety. Grows anywhere. Quality good. Season early to mid season. 50c for 25; \$1.00 per 100; \$7.50 per 1000.

CHESAPEAKE. A very fancy high quality variety. Makes few runners. Season late. Plants at 100 rates only. 50c per 25; \$1.50 per 100.

McALPIN. Very large, light red berry of fine quality. Excellent for home gardens. Late. 50c per 25; \$1.00 per 100; \$8.00. per 1000.

FIRST QUALITY. A long, pointed, very sweet berry of high quality. Midseason. Price same as McAlpin.

WILSON. I offer the genuine old time Wilson. A good yielder of large round berries which have a most delightful aroma and flavor. Plant a few Wilson. You will enjoy them. Price same as McAlpin. Wilson is an imperfect variety. Plant with McAlpin or some other perfect, flowering variety.

BIG JOE. I have not yet fruited this highly recommended variety but can offer a few thousand plants at the same price as McAlpin.

SAMPLE. The great market berry of New England and New York. Very large and uniform. Immense cropper. Sample is an imperfect variety and should be planted with Dunlap or some other perfect flowering variety. Price same as McAlpin.

WARFIELD. Considered to be about the hardiest strawberry and planted extensively in the North. Berries medium size, dark red and good quality. A heavy cropper if plants do not get too thick. Fine for canning. Imperfect. 50c for 25; \$1.00 per 100; \$7.00 per 1000.

GLEN MARY. Exceptionally heavy yielder of very large berries. Will bear alone but does better if planted with another perfect flowering variety. Short supply of plants. 50c per 25; \$1.00 per 100.

PROGRESSIVE. The most widely planted everbearing variety. Berries same size and shape as Dunlap. Quality fine. Bears before the common varieties in the Spring and continues bearing until freezing weather in the Fall. Not a heavy cropper but very fine for home use. BE SURE TO PLANT PROGRESSIVE EARLY and fertilize heavily. 75c per 25; \$2.00 per 100; \$13.50 per 1000.

SUPERB. This everbearer as a rule does not bear as much in the Fall as Progressive, but the berry is much larger. Superb bears an immense crop in June and is worth planting for the Summer crop alone. This last season it bore a larger Fall crop than Progressive. My supply of plants is very short. 75c for 25; \$2.50 per 100.

POT-GROWN STRAWBERRY PLANTS

We do not recommend ordinary layer plants for Summer and Fall setting but if you will set pot-grown plants in August and Sept. and care for them you can get a nice crop the following Spring.
