When they are iu full growth a dressing of our "Real Manure," 2 onnees to the yari, will do wonders for them, especially if well watered in, shonld the weather be dry, Soot sown broadcast in slowery Weather will help to"keep dnwn the mildew and also encoirage growth. For what are termed Tripoli or Winter Onions, sow early in Angust and transplaut the following spring. As soon as the fruit is formed, plant them out in ordinary good soil, 12 inehes from plant to phant, pinch ont all side shoots, and preserve the large leaves; if fruit fails to form, apply pollen at once, so that the plants bear fruit from boltom to top. Pick fruit as soon as ripe, and never select any other than fruit finll of seed ; ill-formed ones are disappointing, and oftenget sedsmen and gardeners in bad repute on this aceount.

CULTURE. -The secd may he sown in a slight heat at the eml or March, and slifted from the pots about the midale of May, when select :m open piece of ground and throw out holes trom 2 to 3 leet square and I toot deep, which should he at lease le feet apart, the soit thrown out heing nsed to raise the sides. A layer of ilry leaves or litter should be spread over the bottom, and afterwards a suflicient quantity of ordinary good soil, wherein a small portiou of leaf soil and spent manure has been mixel, to relill it. The plants being hardened off, should receivi' at the time of planting a goml watering, and be shaded and protected as long as necessary. Planted ofl' in this manner they make firmer and shorter jointed growth, are moro prolific, less water required, and not so liable to go off when in full hearing, as often happens under a more forejg treatment. Keep all green ly away, if eoddled in i honse, they aro almost sure to be attaeked. If so, the most effeetual means must be adopted by placing them in a lofty position and finmigating. As soon as the first root appears at the dranage loole, let Hem be shifted intact and without injury into their Hlooming pots, makiug we that every pot is well drainerl, for no plant is more liable to become sickly and yellow in wet sour soil than the Calveolarin. As soon as the pots becone yell filled with roots, give liquil manne once a week, mud stake out and finmigate thoroughly just before they show flowers, and the result will he a prand sight. Apply soot and bone meal to give darker foliage.
