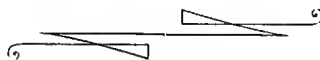

Artemesia saccorum viridis (Summer Fir).—A new ornamental foliage plant, introduced from China. It is an annual, and forms pyramid bushes from 3 to 5 ft. in height. As a pot plant it is very pretty, and may be successfully grown in groups and borders similar to *Kochia scoparia*. The colour of the finely pinnated foliage is a rich dark green. The cut branches last a long time and may be used for wreaths, decoration, &c.

Celosia Thompsoni magnifica nana.—After long and careful selection the three varieties now offered have proved sufficiently constant and will doubtless be very much appreciated. Of dwarf compact habit, they are very effective for bedding.

Clarkia elegans fl. pl., Scarlet Queen—The flowers are extremely double, and present when opening a glowing salmon orange which changes to an intense orange-scarlet; very distinct and remarkably pretty variety

Cyclamen Eileen Low—The colour is a lovely shade of *Rose du Barri*, a tone of colour which so appeals to those of artistic taste, but the great attraction lies in the distinct blush-white margin and blush-white crest on each petal. 1s. 6d. and 2 6

Cyclamen persicum giganteum, Victoria—The lovely margins of the fringed flowers displayed in the softest and richest colours give to this variety a most enchanting appearance, ranging from white with rose, rose with scarlet, and crimson with violet. 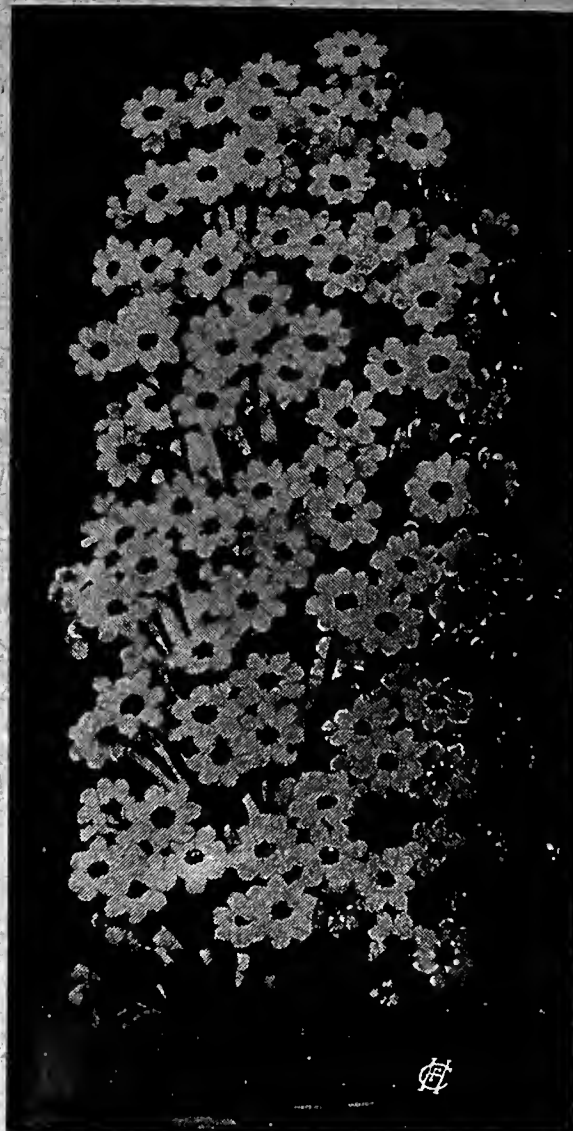

They vary in colour from the purest white to red and bluish tints, sulphur to golden yellow, beautiful salmon shades, and even varieties with different coloured zones. The brilliancy and rich diversity of colours have been much admired and as highly recommended as the original ... 1 6
- Dianthus mirabilis fl. pl. albus**—Beautiful constant pure white variety of the large-flowering double Japan Pink. The flowers have a bizarre form, their deeply lacinated petals terminate often in fine thread-like fringes ... 1 0
- Eschscholtzia Fire Flame**—The plants grow compact, generally upright, and produce flowers in the utmost profusion, which are wonderful in colour, being a rare combination of lemon-yellow and rosy crimson (not in stripes, but in a perfect blend); a really beautiful novelty. ... 1 0
- Gaillardia grandiflora Sibylla**—Splendid large-flowering perennial Gaillardia, with bright crimson-red flowers, the petals of which terminate in white to light yellow points, contrasting thus in a peculiar manner with the dark red centre. Very effective for large groups or planting amongst trees and shrubs. ... 1 0

- Geum coccineum fl. pl. Mrs. J. Bradshaw**—The flowers, which are of the brightest scarlet, are borne on strong stems, and measure 2½ to 3 ins. across, are nearly double, with large waved petals of great substance. They retain their colour in the most brilliant sunshine, and stand well in water ... 1s. 6d. and 2 6
- Godetia grandiflora carminea fl. pl.**—The plants grow to a height of about 26 ins., of pyramidal habit. The numerous fine double flowers measure from 2 to 2½ ins. across, and of a bright carmine colour, broadly edged with rose ... 1 0
- Linaria macedonica speciosa**—Handsome hardy perennial Toadflax from the Orient. The individual flowers, crowded in dense racemes, are 1 in. across, and nearly 2 ins. long including the spur, and present a clear citron-yellow with orange-yellow spot on the lower lip. If sown early it blooms freely the first year ... 1 0
- Lotus peliorhynchus atrococcineus**—Amongst the rich-flowering greenhouse plants of easy culture the pretty trailing *Lotus peliorhynchus* ranks with the foremost. The variety now offered will be a welcome addition to this class of plants. The flowers are very deep scarlet, which contrast well with the fine linear glaucous foliage ... 1 6
- Myosotis stricta grandiflora Fairy Queen**—A splendid addition to the pyramidal section of Myosotis. The flowers are light porcelain-blue, borne on slender but vigorous stems, and covered with its lovely-coloured flowers of really large size ... 1 0

- Pansy Solfataræ**—The large flowers measure about 3 ins. across, and are of a delicate sulphur-yellow or primrose colour, each petal being marked with a very large deep blue blotch 1 6
- Primula Malacoides**—This pretty introduction is quite hardy when grown in a sheltered position out of doors, but is seen at its best when cultivated as a pot plant in a cool greenhouse. The flowers are of a delicate shade of lavender, produced in whorls on tall graceful spikes in great profusion 1 0
- Pyrethrum, Comet-Flowered** (*Roseum hybridum grandiflorum*)—A selection of the useful and extremely free-blooming perennial Pyrethrums. The flowers are large, either single or semi double, and of the most bizarre form, the petals being rolled, twisted or sometimes entangled together. The colours range from pure white through flesh colour and rose to brilliant carmine and blood-red, in choice mixture 1 6
- Schizanthus retusus trimaculatus albus**—New attractive variety of this showy annual, 1½ to 2 ft. in height. The petals of each flower bears on white ground a large pure golden yellow, somewhat lighter veined spot edged with pure white, thus presenting a three-blotched flower of characteristic marking 1 0

- Bertrand Deal**.—A lovely pale rosy lilac of immense size 10 seeds, 6d.; 20 seeds 1 0

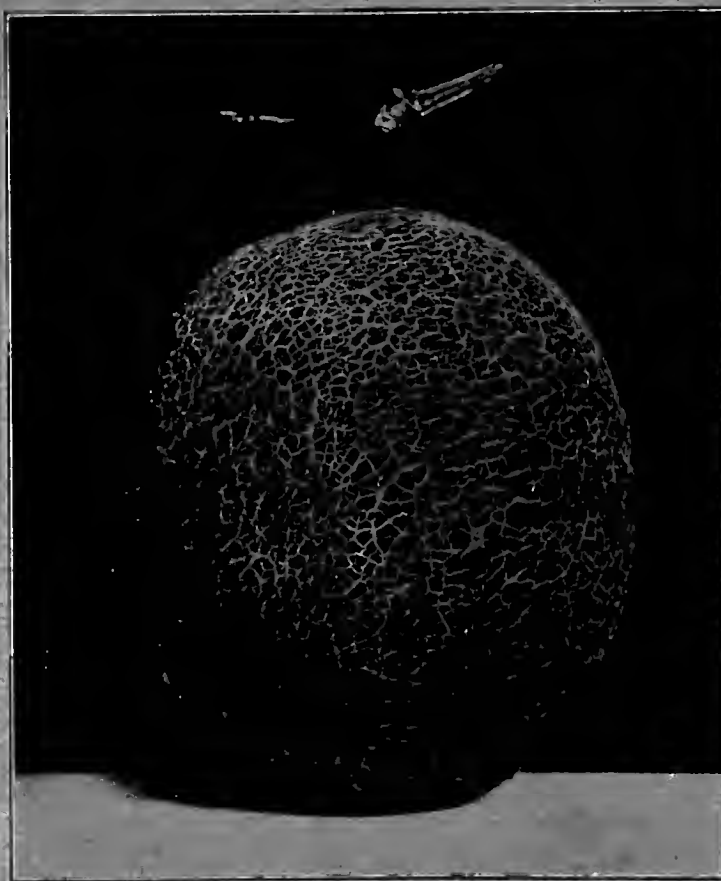

CULTURE.—The earliest varieties may be sown about the second or third week in November, or first week in December, another sowing in January, and continuous sowings in the order they stand, every three weeks, up to the end of July. Sow in rows 4 to 7 feet apart (according to height, which varies wonderfully); when about 5 or 6 inches above ground, thin out if required, and properly stick. By sowing seeds of some of the early kinds in July, a late picking of Peas may be had until the frost sets in. The general height is here given of the various kinds of Peas, but of course, the season and richness of the soil will cause a difference. Our "One and Only Wash" is a complete eradicator of *Mildew* wherever it touches.

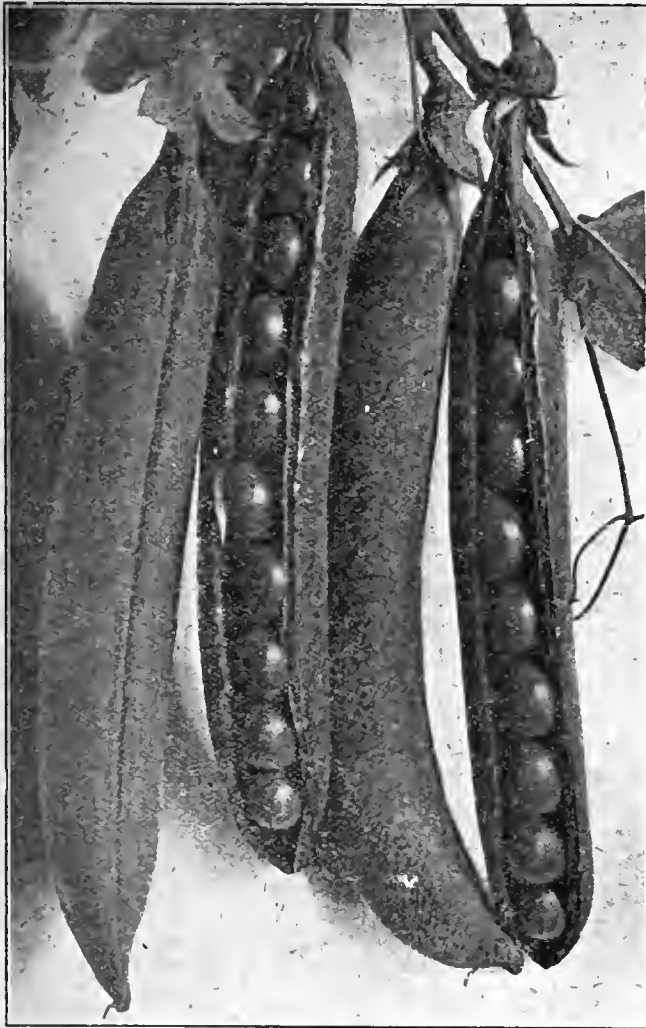

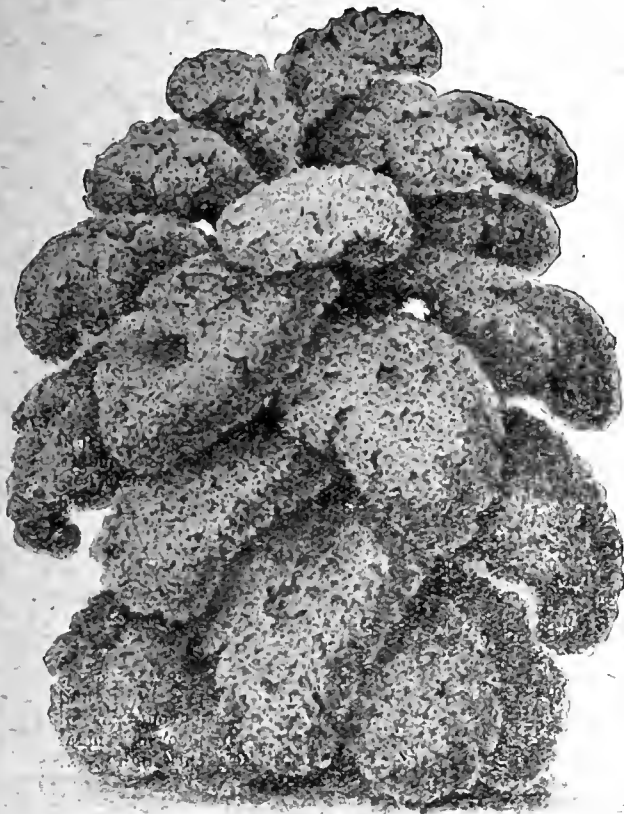
ASPARAGUS (Seed).

CULTURE.—There is no vegetable more delicious. Choose the highest and lightest ground in the kitchen garden, and stake out in September as per diagram, dig out to a foot deep, lay it on each side in the pathway, then wheel in 3 inches of good manure, fork this in about another foot, and if dug over deeply two or three times so much the better; on the top of this place a fair coating of rich soil and soot, and over this 3 inches of soil from out of the alley, then place one plant to every 9 inches, spreading the roots well out, covering them over with the finest soil, free from stones. For the top covering have 6 inches of light friable or even sandy soil. The first year make one cutting only, if the plants are three years old, the following winter add more fine soil, so that there is something like 9 inches of earth above the crown of the plants. Asparagus beds made in this way with a good coating of manure and a fair amount of salt and soot every other-year cannot fail to give abundance of this succulent vegetable until the peas make their appearance.

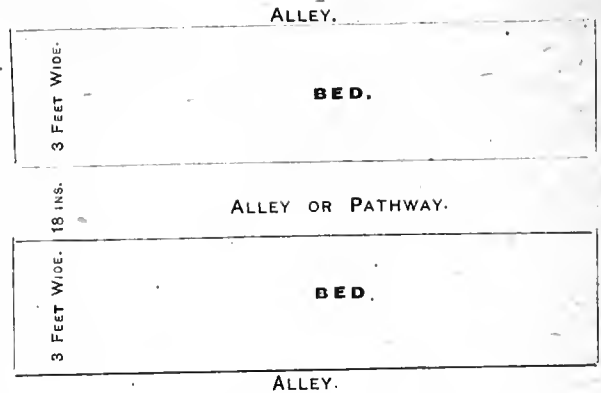

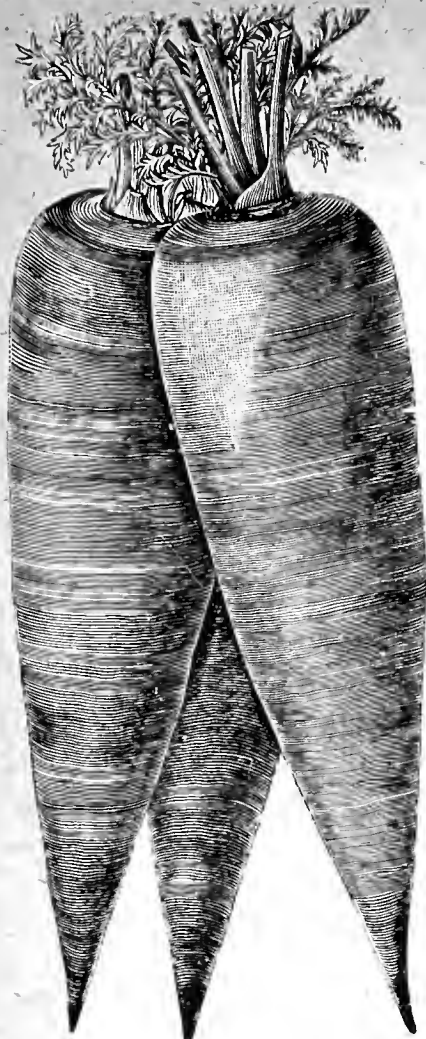

CELERY.

CULTURE.—In February sow in heat; March and April in open border. Plant in April, May and July, from 2 feet 9 inches to 3 feet between the trenches. A coating of mineral manure to the bottom of the trenches with rotten dung from an old hot-bed, and well water in dry weather. However large Celery may be, it is of little value if disfigured by the ravages of garden pests. It is of the utmost importance that soot, burnt ashes, or even fine soil is banked closely round the stems; too much soot can hardly be used, both to keep away the celery-fly that works its way in and deposits its eggs between the two skins of the leaves, and also to keep slugs from injuring it.

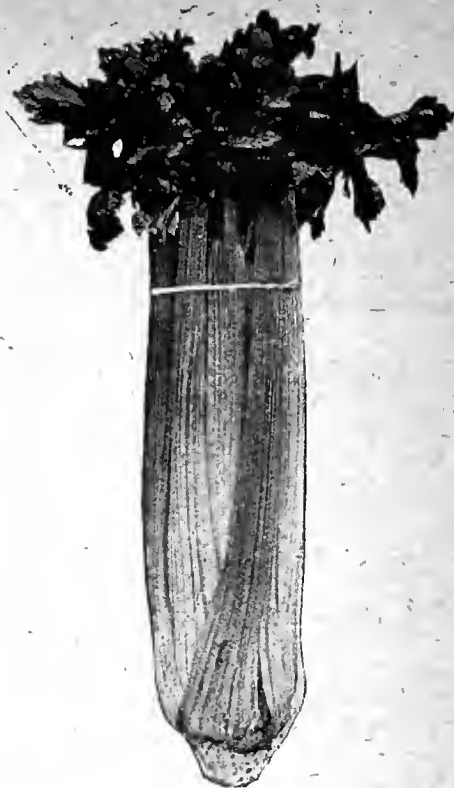

CULTURE.—The ground should be double dug in October or early in November. The ground can then be left in its rough state until early in January, when a good dressing of soot may be spread over the surface, which is not only a preventive for the maggot, but a valuable stimulant for the Onion throughout the different stages of its growth. Nothing more should be done until the end of February or March, when (weather permitting) the beds should be pointed over, well raked, and rolled or trodden down firm, and the seed drilled in rows 1 foot apart, which leaves ample room for a draw-hoe, which cannot well be used too often, if care be exercised to avoid any injury to the tops. As soon as the Onions are up and well established thin out to 9 inches apart, and during an early stage of their growth a liberal top-dressing of spent mushroom bed manure would be beneficial in keeping the ground moist and cool in hot, dry seasons, and saving a considerable labour in watering. When they are in full growth a dressing of our "Real Manure," 2 ounces to the yard, will do wonders for them, especially if well watered in, should the weather be dry. Soot sown broadcast in showery weather will help to keep down the mildew and also encourage growth. For what are termed Tripoli or Winter Onions, sow early in August and transplant the following spring. Onions may be grown on the same piece of land for years if good tillage is kept up every season. By sowing the Tripoli or autumn Onions early in August, and transplanting the seedlings in due course, followed with a sowing, weather permitting, of *Early Eight Weeks* in February, and then again with the spring varieties, it is possible by this method to have Onions throughout the year.

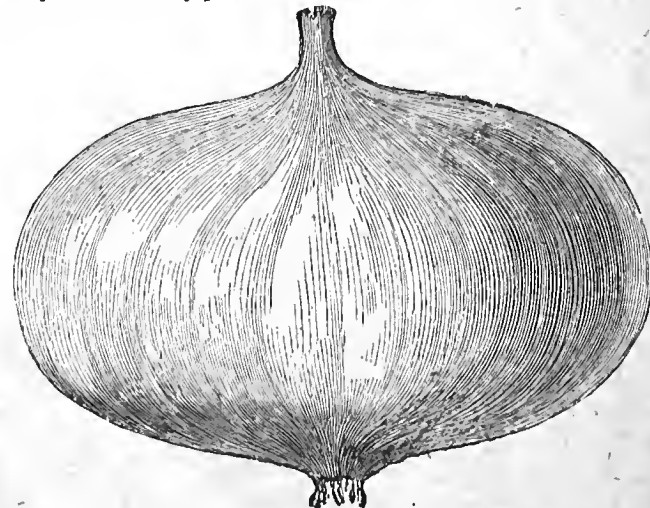

CULTURE.—Sow about the second week in February, or first in March, or as early as the ground is in a fit state to receive the seed, choosing a light deep-trenched soil if possible; and if required for exhibition, make a hole 3 feet deep with a crowbar, push this round so that the hole is largest at the top, fill with fine soil, and finish off with dibbling in three seeds. After germinating leave the strongest seedling, assist them when in full growth, make four holes a foot deep in the soil and about 5 inches away from the plant, which can be occasionally filled up with liquid manure. They should be allowed to remain in the ground as long as the weather permits, and when lifted should be carefully placed in sand.

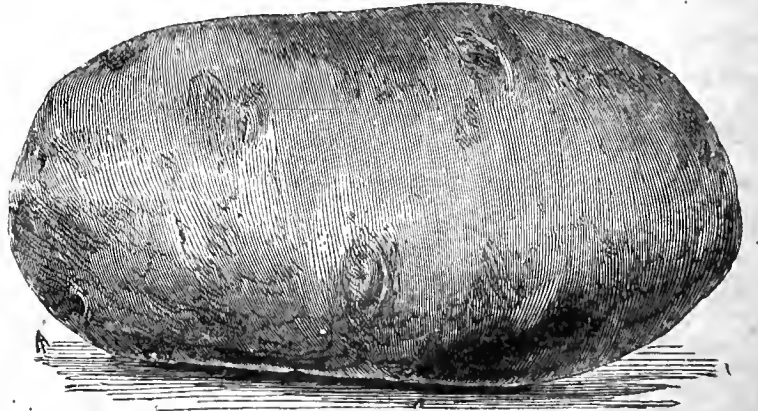

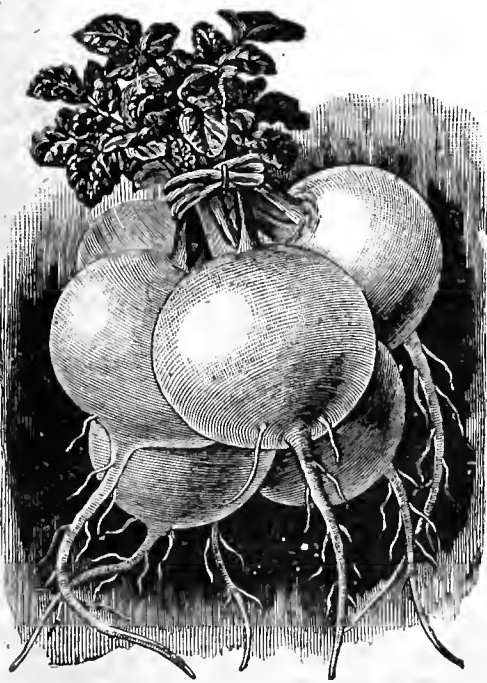

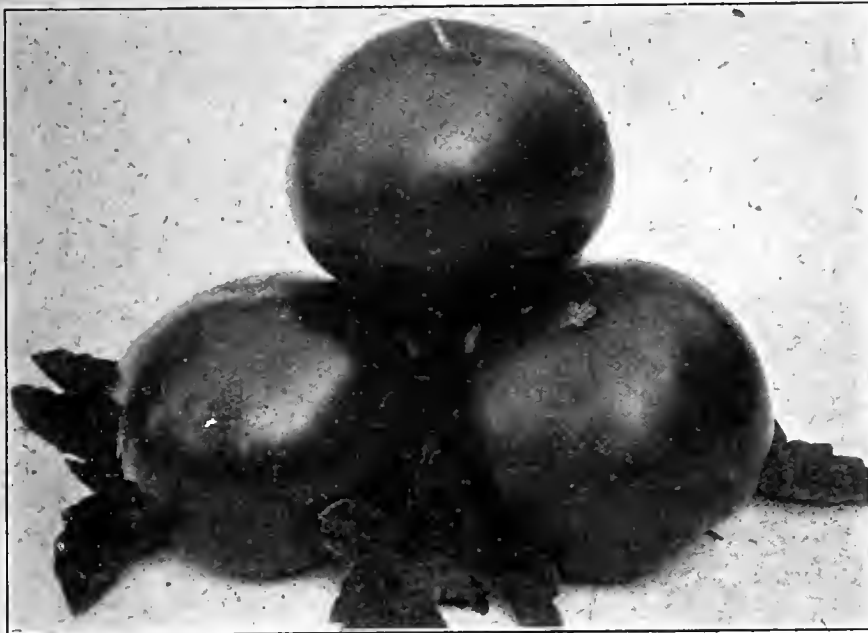

TOMATO, or LOVE APPLE.

CULTURE—Sow in February or March in heat, pot, and gradually harden off, so that they may be ready to plant out the latter part of May to a sheltered location. For indoor purposes, get good plants in 4 or 5-inch pots; when they show a truss of flower they require fertilising or setting with a camel-hair brush. As soon as the fruit is formed, plant them out in ordinary good soil, 12 inches from plant to plant, pinch out all side shoots, and preserve the large leaves; if fruit fails to form, apply pollen at once, so that the plants bear fruit from bottom to top. Pick fruit as soon as ripe, and never select any other than fruit full of seed; ill-formed ones are disappointing, and often get seedsmen and gardeners in bad repute on this account.

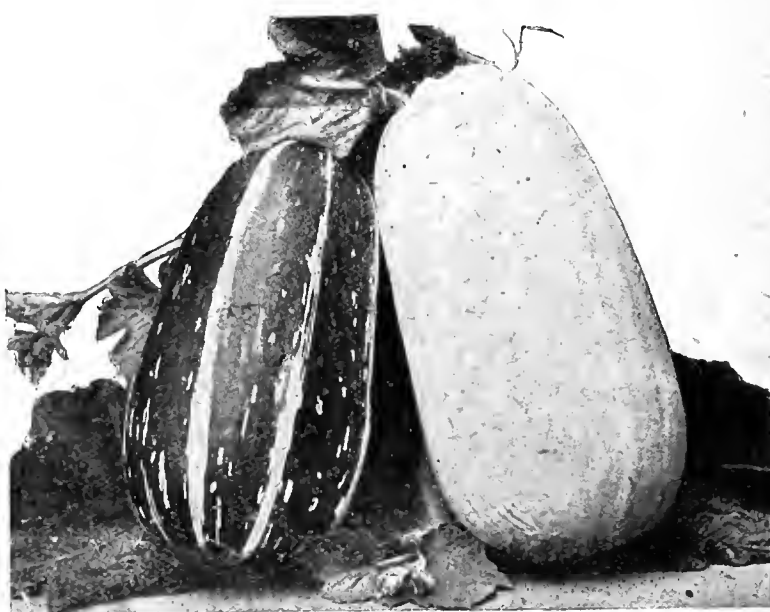

VEGETABLE MARROW.

CULTURE—The seed may be sown in a slight heat at the end or March, and shifted from the pots about the middle of May, when select an open piece of ground and throw out holes from 2 to 3 feet square and 1 foot deep, which should be at least 12 feet apart, the soil thrown out being used to raise the sides. A layer of dry leaves or litter should be spread over the bottom, and afterwards a sufficient quantity of ordinary good soil, wherein a small portion of leaf soil and spent manure has been mixed, to refill it. The plants being hardened off, should receive at the time of planting a good watering, and be shaded and protected as long as necessary. Planted off in this manner they make firmer and shorter jointed growth, are more prolific, less water required, and not so liable to go off when in full bearing, as often happens under a more forcing treatment. They can also be grown with success outdoors by putting in a few seeds the first week in May, where they are to remain,

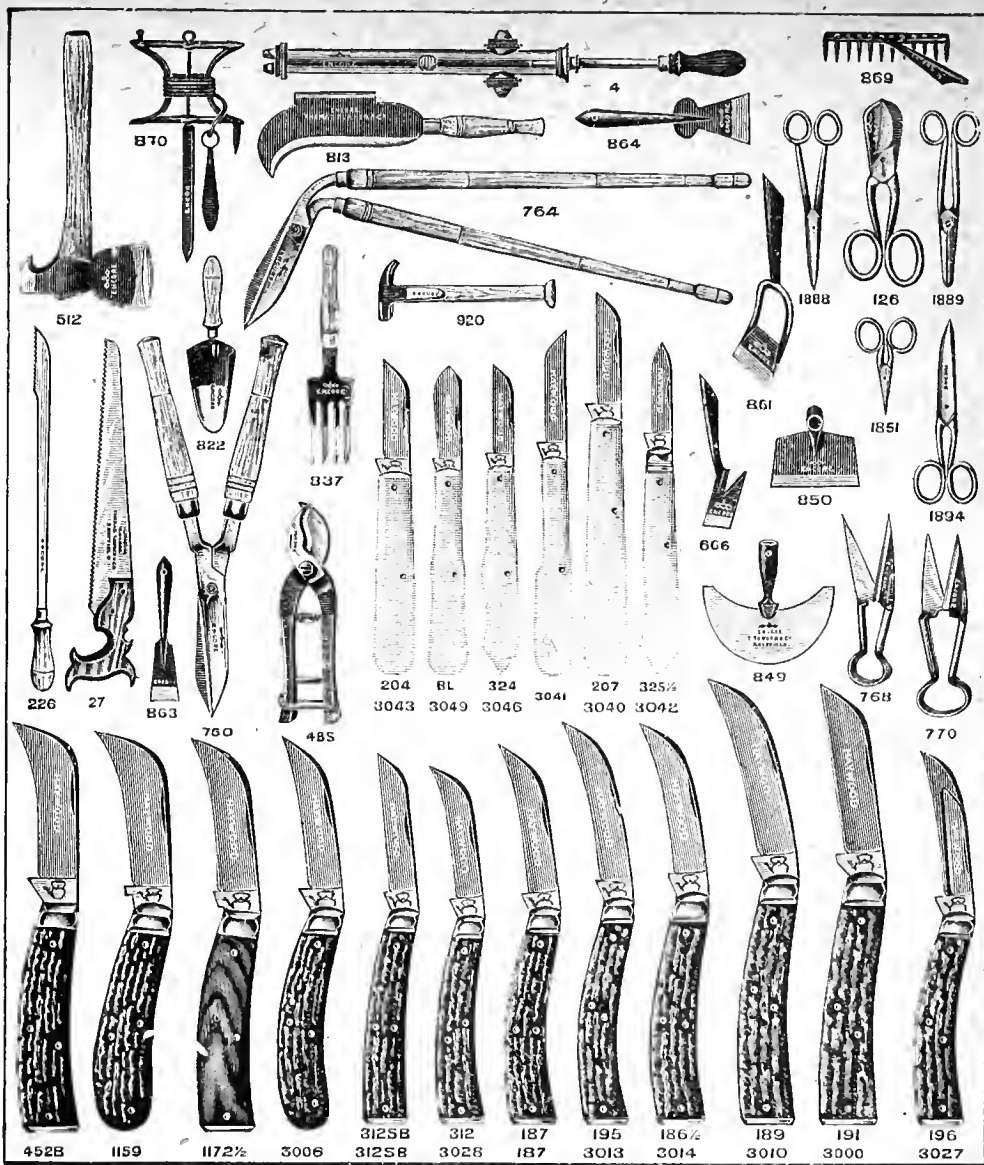

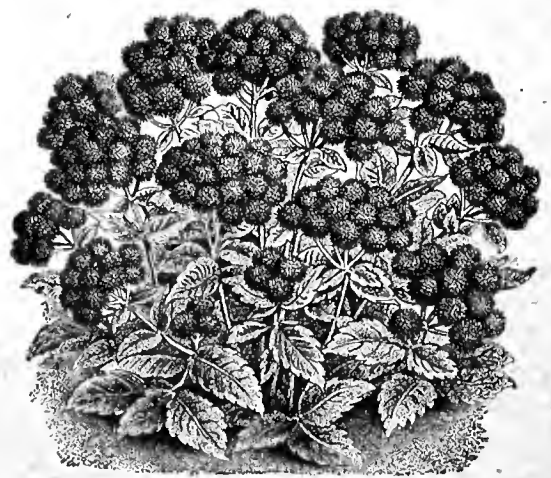

HARDY ANNUALS may be sown from February till the end of September; March, April and May are the best months for general summer display; June and July for autumn blooming; August and September for spring flowering. **HALF-HARDY ANNUALS**—Sow from the beginning of March to the end of May; place in a frame on a gentle bottom heat. When sowing from the middle of April to the end of May they may be easily raised without artificial heat, and by selecting a warm, sheltered situation, and covering them with a hand-light till they are strong enough to bear transplanting.

BIENNIALS AND PERENNIALS—The most select and tender varieties for summer and autumn blooming may be sown in a gentle heat in March and April, and pricked into pots until fully established, and then potted off singly, or transplanted into the open ground, as required. The hardier varieties may be sown in the open ground, in prepared beds in June and July, and when strong enough transplanted to where they are intended to bloom the following year.

HERBACEOUS PLANTS are those Perennials which lose their stems annually, whilst the roots continue alive in the ground.

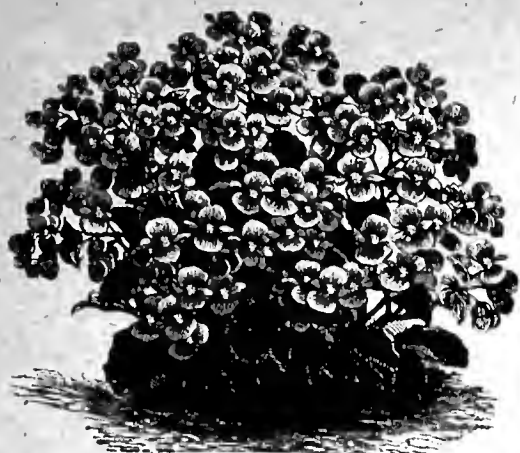

CULTURAL DIRECTIONS.—Sow Aster Seed in February and March in pots, or on a spent hot-bed in drills, 4 inches apart. Soon after the plants are up prick out into a cold frame, or under hand-glasses, 3 to 4 inches apart, from whence they can be planted out when 4 inches high. Select showery weather for planting, when the ground is in good working order; plant out in rows 1 foot apart each way. To grow Asters to perfection a rich deep soil is indispensable, and during dry weather they should be watered, and a top dressing of well-rotten manure applied early in August. Be very particular that they are always thoroughly free from insects when they are planted out, otherwise the leaves will become curled, and vigour and protection lost for the season. If required for exhibition the buds should be thinned, and the plants well watered with liquid manure. During the last fortnight cover with glass.

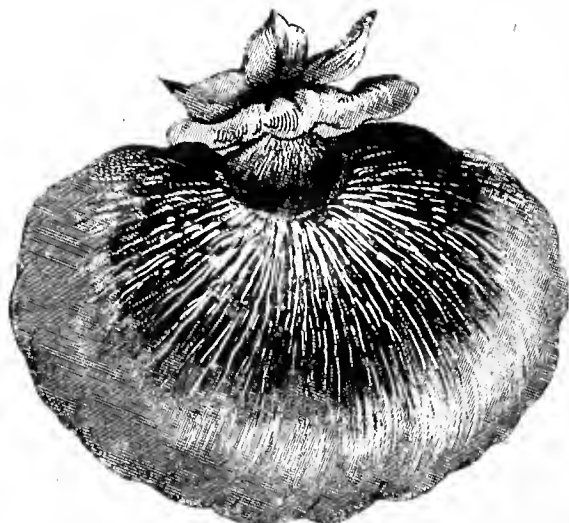

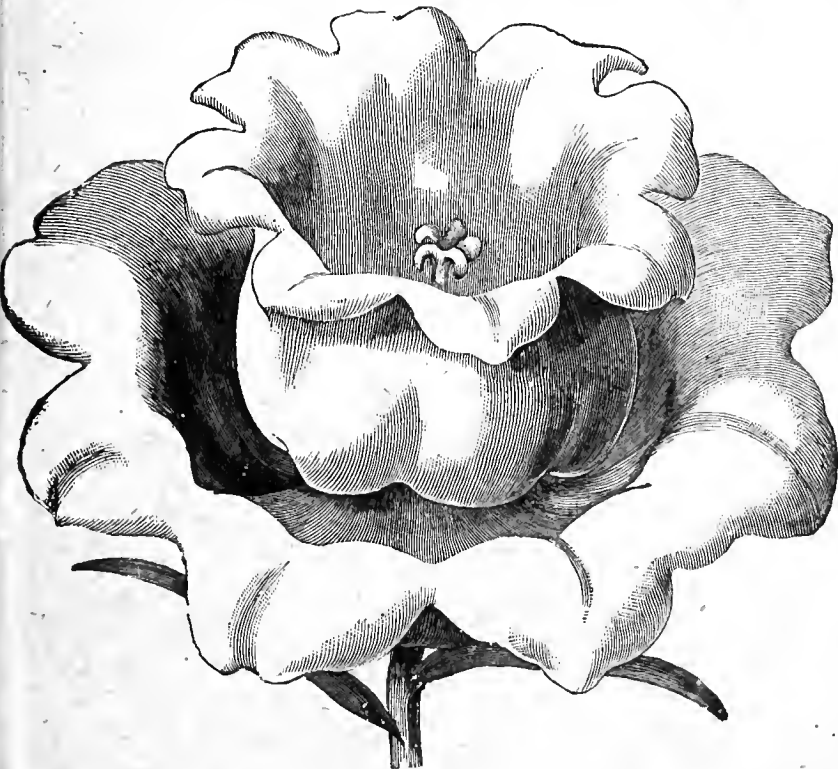
CALCEOLARIAS.

AWARDED THE GREAT SILVER CUP.

Sow in August, and from the moment they are up do everything to keep them growing. Rain water is absolutely necessary. Let them be carefully shifted from the small pot to the 5-inch. Let the night temperature and moisture be such as to cause a nice refreshing dew to stand on the surface of the leaves every morning. This wards off insects and gives vigour to the plant, but it should be dispelled during the day by the admission of air. Keep all green fly away, if coddled in a house, they are almost sure to be attacked. If so, the most effectual means must be adopted by placing them in a lofty position and fumigating. As soon as the first root appears at the drainage hole, let them be shifted intact and without injury into their blooming pots, making sure that every pot is well drained, for no plant is more liable to become sickly and yellow in wet sour soil than the Calceolaria. As soon as the pots become well filled with roots, give liquid manure once a week, and stake out and fumigate thoroughly just before they show flowers, and the result will be a grand sight. Apply soot and bone meal to give darker foliage.

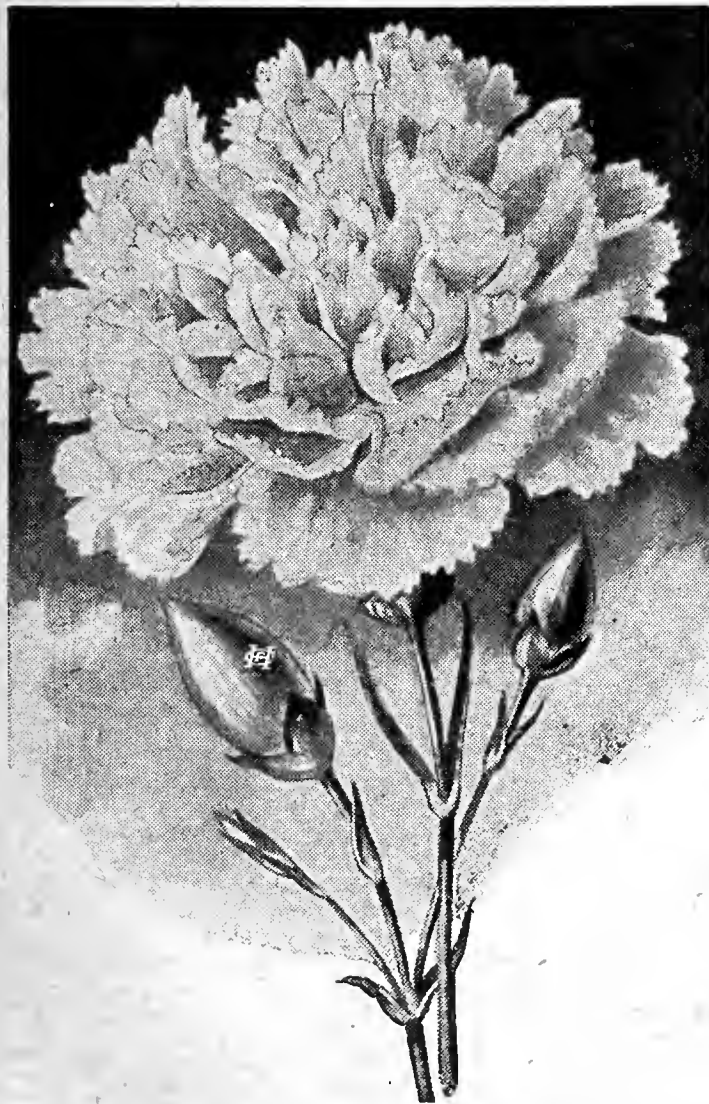

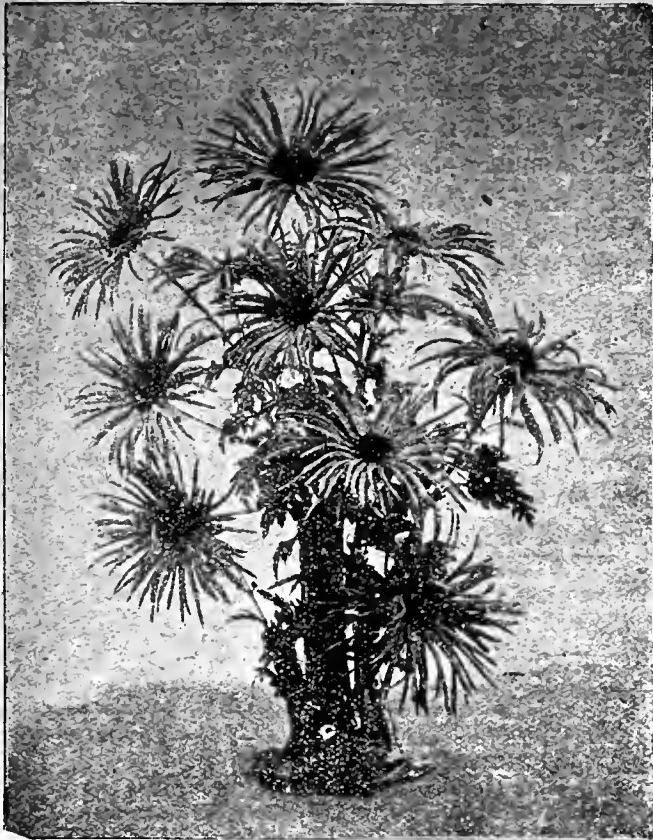

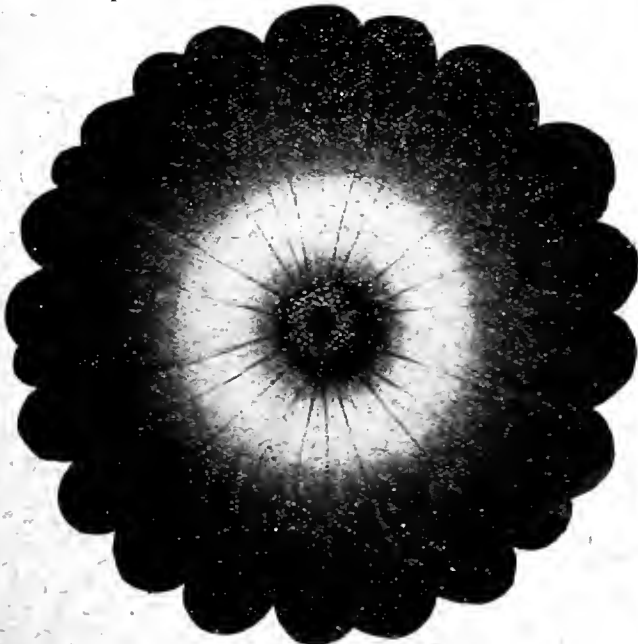

The secret of growing well is to grow fast, never allowing them to receive a check, either from being pot bound, dryness of root, or attack of insects, the cooler they are kept the better, just preventing frost reaching them, and giving abundance of air. If the green aphid is not kept thoroughly away there will not be a bloom worth seeing. Of course at all times the keenest observation of extreme temperature must be made for cold, cutting draughts or a too glaring sun.

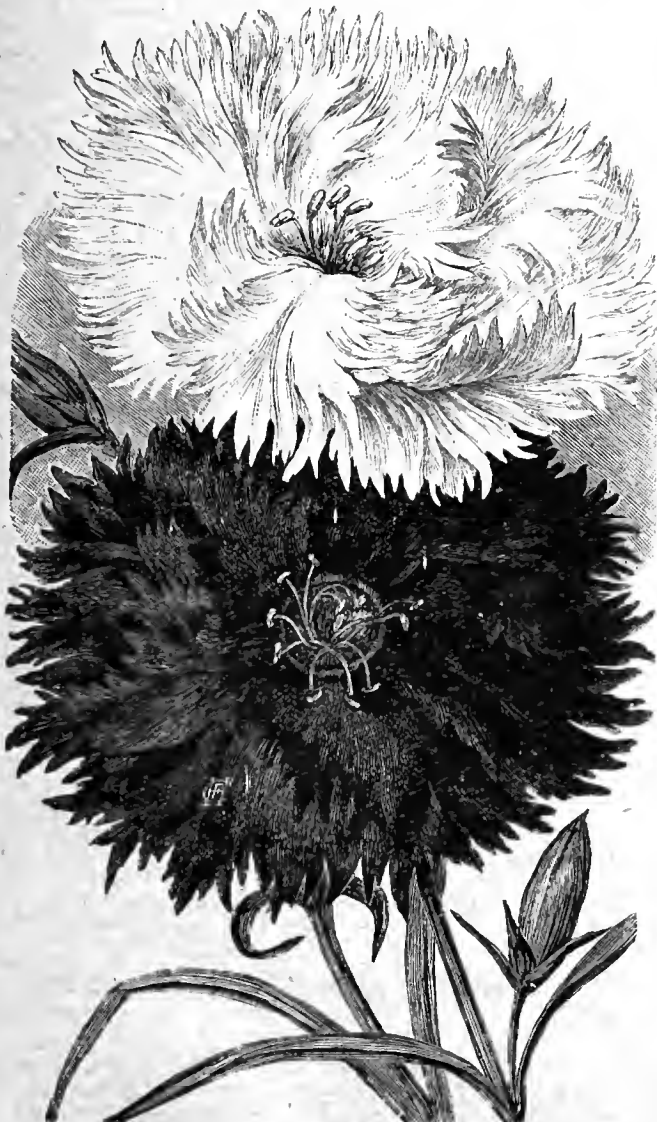

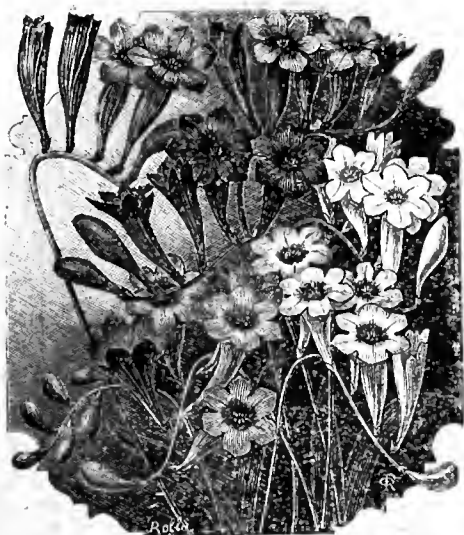

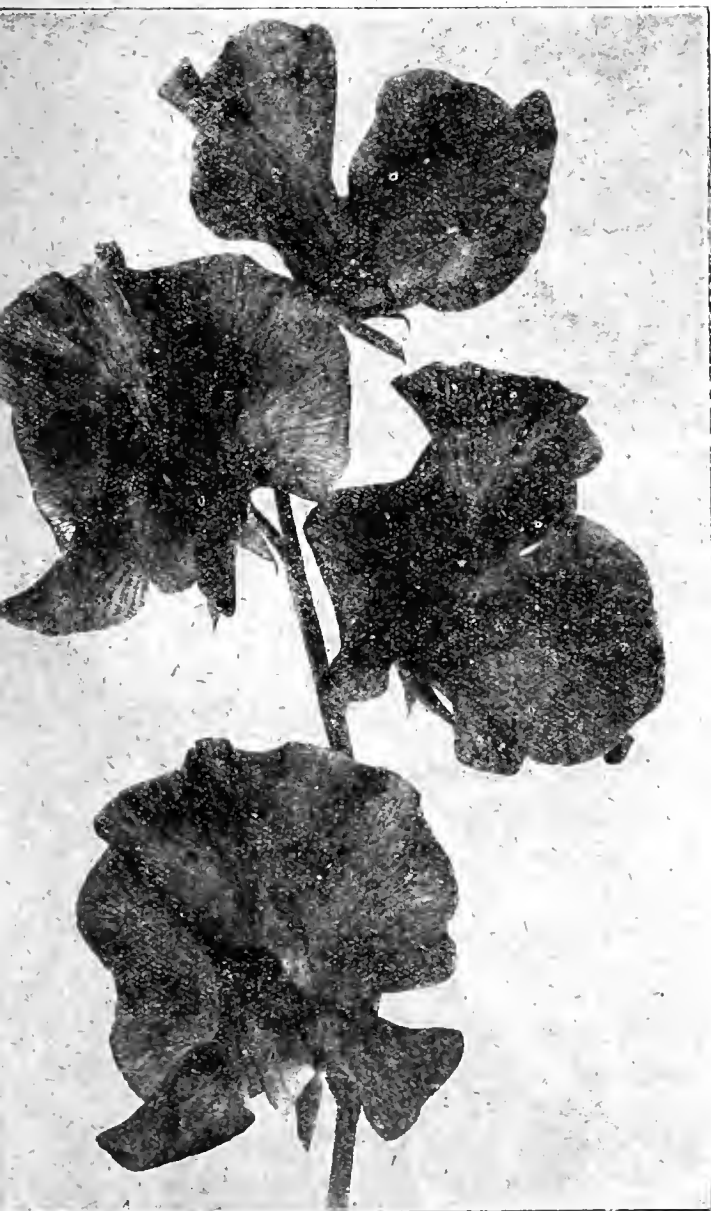

They are of easy cultivation and thrive almost anywhere, and if sown early ensures still greater success and certainty. So as to obtain the largest and finest blossoms a trench should be opened about 1 foot deep, and put in 3 inches of well-rotted manure, followed with 4 inches of soil, and well incorporated or mix, then proceed to sow the seeds over this, 3 inches apart along the row, and covering with earth to the depth of an inch. This should be done as early as the ground can be conveniently prepared in the spring, and as the young plants grow, fill up the trench around them with good soil.
