## ARTICHOKE (Globe).

CULTURE. - Sow in March or April in drills, 18 inches apart, and tranglant 3 feet apart each way; or seed can be sown in agentle heat, pricked off into small pots when large eloogh, gradually hardening thom until the end of May, and then plant out in the beds alreaty prepared tor theni, The first season they will only produce a partial crop; but as it is a percunial, after being once planted, the heds continue to bear for several years. So as to seeure fine heads they require good treatment; the soil shonk be rich, deep, and moist, and protected in winter by placing straw, bracken, or other dry materinl closely romid the stems. It is advisable to cut the plants lown after the heads are taken.

## ASPARAGUS (Seed).

CULTURE.-There is no vegetable move deticions. Choose the highest and lightest ground in the kitchen garden, an stake ont in September as per diagram, dig ont to a loot deep, lay it on each side in the pathway then whel in 3 inches of good manure, fork this in about another foot, and if dug over deeply two or three times so much the hetter ; on the top of this place a fair coating of rich soil and soot, and over this 3 inches of soil from ont of the alley, then plaec one plant to every 9 inches, spreading the roots well ont, covering them over with the finest soil, free from stones. For the top covering have 6 inches of light friable or even sandy soil. The first year make one cutting only, if the plants are thre years ofd, the following winter add more fine soil, so that there is something like 9 inches of carth above the crown of the plants. Asparagus beds male in this way with a good coating of mannre and a fair momat of salt and sont every other year camot fail to give abmunce of this sueculent vegetable until the pats make their appearance.

We strongly reconmenil a sprinkling of nitrate of soda which will lee foum to work wonders. It is advisable to cut the heals as soon as they attain the medium size.

The gronnd can then be left in its rough state until early in Jannary, when a good dressing of soot may be spread over the surface, which is not only a preventive for the maggot, but a valuable stimulant for the Onion throughout the different stages of its growth, Nothing more should be done matil the end of Febury or Murch, when (weather permitting) the beds should be pointed over, well raked, and rolled or trolden down tirm, and the seed drillet in rows l foot apart, which leaven ample roon for a draw-hoe, which eannot well he nsed too often, if care be exereised to avoid any iningy to the tops. As soon as the Ouions are up and well established thin out to 9 inehes apart, and during an early' stage of theirgrowth a liberal top-lressing of spent Mushroon bed mannre woulf be beneficial in keeping the ground moist and cool in hot, dry seasons, and saving a considerable labour in watering. When they are in full growth a dressing of onr "heal Manure," 2 ounces to the yard, will do wonders for them, especially if well watered in, shonld the weather be dry. Soot sown broadeast in showery wenther will help to keep down the mildew amlalso enenrage growth. For what are temed Tripoli or Winter Ouions, sow early in Angnst and transplant the following spring. Onions may be grown on the same piece of lam lior years if good tillage is liept uf every season. By sowing the 'lripoli or antum Onions carly in August, and transphating the secellings in due course, followed with a sowing, weather permitting, of Eurly Eight Wephs in Fehrary, and then agan with the spring varieties, it is possibleby this methon to have Onions thoughout the year.

Keep all green Hy away, if coddled in a house, they are almost sure to be attacked. If so, the most effectual means must be alopted by placing them in a lolly position and fumigating. As soon as the lirst rout appears at the draiumge hole, let them be shifted intact anil without injury into their blooming pots, makiug sure that every pot is well drained, for no plant is more lable to become siekly and yellow in wet somr soil than the Calecolaria, As soon as the pots becone woll filled with roots, give liguid manure ouce a weck, and stake out and fungate thoronghly just before they show flowers, and the result will be a grand sight. Apply soot and hone meal to give darker foliage.
