



ON THE RAISING, GROWING, CLEANSING, AND TESTING OF SEEDS.



TESTING VARIOUS VARIETIES OF GRASS FOR LAWNS, PUTTING GREENS, &c.

The prominence we have given to our Trade Mark "Tested Seeds" over so long a period has repeatedly given rise to the question, "What do you mean by Tested Seeds?" Believing that the raising, growing, testing, &c., of Seeds will be a matter of interest to our Customers, we take this opportunity of giving an illustrated explanation of some of the methods that were employed leading up to the introduction to the gardening world of such well-known Peas as TELEPHONE, STRATAGEM, DAISY, MICHAELMAS, ANTICIPATION, MAVFLOWER, HARVESTMAN, INTERNATIONAL, QUITE CONTENT, &c., &c., a process which frequently involves seven to eight years of patient observation and labour before a new introduction can be placed with confidence before the attention of our Customers.

We have selected culinary Peas as our illustration because they are more easily identified in a photograph, but analogous methods have to be pursued in the improvement of all varieties of Vegetables and Flowers, a work which we have made—and still continue to make—a special feature of our business. Indeed, it is now a matter of history that our House has been responsible for some of the most important improvements in Vegetables and Flowers far too numerous to mention here.

Let us assume that one of our Experts has observed a promising seedling, produced from crossfertilisation the previous year in our experimental grounds : its merits and characteristics are carefully noted in our Garden Registers. Possibly it may produce an extraordinarily large pod, like QUITE CONTENT, or it may be earlier, later, taller, more prolific and compact, &c., than any other variety shown in our comparative trials to be in commerce.

The produce of the plant is then carefully harvested and sown the following spring, when it again goes through the same routine. may be for six or seven years, to secure constancy and fixation of its special characteristics; the produce by this time may have increased to several bushels, when it is ready to be, sown for a crop. Ground that is particularly suited to the variety is carefully selected, and the Seed is sown. In the early summer, when the plants are in maturity, our Experts. who have watched the character of the Pea ever since it was a seedling in our experimental grounds, examine every plant, eliminating any that show a weakness or lack of uniformity; the crop is then harvested, stacked, and threshed, and eventually comes to our warehouse to be cleaned, hand-picked, and finally tested for germination. The subsequent processes of testing we have pleasure in illustrating with notes on the next page.

Number ten is familiarly called in our warehouse the "Dreadnought," and stands sixteen feet in height.

No weed, however nimble, or light seed can possibly escape its vigilance; it is fed by an electric elevator, and its duties are exacting.

In the first instance the seed travels into a large drum at the top of the machine, and is brushed by rapidly revolving specially prepared lambs' skins, all small portions of husk and earth that may adhere to the seeds at the time of harvesting being removed. The Seed then descends by gravitation (when all dirt, dust, and light seeds are drawn away by forced draught) on to sieves which, by an eccentric movement, take out all the "smalls." The whole combination is driven by a powerful electric motor, which also gathers the dust from and around the machine by suction, ready to be carted away and destroyed.

The Peas are now cleaned and graded, but some are stained or injured by inclement weather or by the attacks of insects, which probably weakens their germination; these must be picked out by hand.




The Roots are ready for use in the Summer Salads.

The Cultivation of Beet.—The round varieties required for early use should be sown under eover in February. The main crop should be sown the last week in April on ground that has been well trenched and manured. Let the rows be about 18 inches apart, thin them to allow about 9 inches between the plants, and keep the soil well-stirred with the hoe during summer.

The Cultivation of Broad Beans. - Early Mazagan and Dwarf Fan Beans may be planted in November, and a second sowing made in February, the rows being about 15 inches apart; to SALAN be followed by the Long-Podded and Windsor varieties to secure a succession. The later sorts should C. be about 6 inches from plant to plant, 805 and 3 feet from row to row. This crop succeeds best on deep rich soil in an exposed position. On light and dry soils it generally gets attacked by the black blight and spoils. When the points suffer from this pest it becomes imperative to pinch them out and burn them.





The Cultivation of French Beans.—Sow in pots under glass for forcing from December to April, and about May in the open borders, followed by two or three successional sowings at intervals of a fortnight. The rows ought to be from 2 feet to 2 feet 6 inches apart. and the plants thinned to about 1 foot apart. They are rather delicate, and should not be sown out of doors until the warm weather sets in.

The Cultivation of Runner Beans.—Runner Beans should be planted out of doors during May, followed by successional sowings at intervals of a fortnight; by this means an abundant supply is provided until the plants are destroyed by the autumn frosts. Care should be taken when planting that sufficient space is allowed between the rows (say 3 feet), and 12 inches from plant to plant in the rows, and the plants should be well watered in dry weather or the flowers will drop off. If slugs are troublesome during the young stage of growth, dust over with soot and lime.







The Cultivation of Broccoli.—For the earliest crop a sowing is requisite the beginning of March, and a little protection may be necessary for the seed-beds. Successional sowings should follow up to June. Prick out into a prepared bed when strong enough, and when thoroughly established in summer transplant to permanent quarters, the earliest kinds first, to produce a constant supply of heads, according to the variety, until Cauliflowers are ready in July the following season. The soil should be deeply dug, well manured, and in good tilth and firm before transplanting.



The Cultivation of Cabbage,—By a little careful arrangement Cabbages can be had almost all the year round. An early variety sown in the spring will come into use in the summer; a main crop variety sown in the spring will come in during summer or autumn. Sowings made during July of a quick variety like the Colecuort will come into use during autumn, whilst sowings made towards the end of August will be fit for cutting in the spring. July sowings of a Cabbage intended for spring cutting often bolt, whereas the same variety sown at end of August stands well. Cabbages require a rich, deeply dug, and well-drained soil; when planted out they should stand 15 to 20 inches apart, according to habit and growth of the variety.





FORCED HEADS OF CHICORY.



It is only on the Continent one can appreciate the delicate piquancy attached to salads, as they seem to understand them better than we do here. Chicory is a leading ingredient in French salads, and the plant is so easily cultivated that it should be more popular here. The seed is sown in late spring, in a sheltered position on a nice soil, very similar to Carrots, the plants thinned out to about 9 inches apart, and left to grow on until the end of the summer, when the growth will die down, leaving a root somewhat like a Parsnip. These are taken into a shed and kept in a heap of soil away from frost, and transferred to a hothouse when needed to produce their blanched heads during winter. They may also be grown in boxes

Mustard and Cress.-Two of the most popular salad plants in cultivation, being in season all the year round. They are both cultivated in a similar manner. *Cultivation.*—Use boxes of good fine soil, make the surface flat, and sow the seed rather thickly over the

top, just pressing it in to the surface, but without using any covering material. After sowing, water it well. Place the box in moist heat, and cover with boards or thick paper until the seed germinates. Use shallow boxes half filled with soil. Frequent successional sowings should be made all the year round. Good results may be obtained out of doors in the summer by preparing beds of fine soil in the same way as recommended for boxes, and covering the seed when sown with boards or mats until it germinates. Use, -Cut as soon as ready with a sharp knife. (See Illustration above.)

Watercress may be successfully grown if sown in rows in a shady border and well watered. See page 110.



If intended for cold-frame culture the plants must not be put out until all danger of frost is past. Sow again in September for winter use on a hot bed.





Keep a moist buoyant atmosphere during growth and give air freely when fruit is ripening, checking the supply of water to develop flavour. 

The Cultivation of Onion.- The ground cannot well be too rich for this crop, nor the soil in too fine a condition. February and March are the chief seasons for sowing. The soil must be made firm before the operation is undertaken in either beds or drills. The seed should be sown thinly and covered lightly, the drills 12 inches apart, and the young Onions thinned out to about 6 inches apart, according to the variety. In very dry weather a good watering is very beneficial.' Growers of Onions for exhibition generally transplant, and this is also a sure means of checking the onion grub, so troublesome in some districts. Some of the larger growing varietics are generally sown in autumn and transplanted in spring, when under fair conditions enormous exhibition specimens are obtained.

Everyonc should enjoy the pleasure of a salad several days a week, at all events during the summer season, with but trifling expense. American Land Cress may be sown at any time during spring and summer out of doors. It is a useful variety tasting something like water cress.

The soil should be rich and light, and the bed $4\frac{1}{2}$ fect wide, with an alley on each side. Sow seed in shallow drills across the bed, 9 inches apart, and rake over the surface. When the leaves have grown an inch or two, cut off for use as required. Price 6d. per packet.

Chicory .--- The majority of people know Chicory as an adulterant of Colfec, but few are aware of the part it plays in the salad bowl, to which it adds a pleasing flavour. Chicory is so easily grown and so useful, that it should receive more attention from amateurs who desire to grow salads. This plant is sown in late spring in the open ground, and thinned out to about a foot apart to grow through the summer, well watered in dry weather. With the change to a colder season, the leaves decay and nearly all drop off. The roots arc then lifted, and a few at a time placed in boxes of rich sandy soil, leaving crown well above the surface. After a good watering these boxes arc stood in a perfectly dark place, and in a few weeks, according to the heat, some nicely blanched leaves will be fit to gather. More roots, kept in a cool place until wanted for bringing along in heat, may be similarly treated.

As the growth matures in spring, gently draw away the soil round the bulbs when they have become established, and if they look sickly, apply soot to the surface soil for maggots, and use the hoe for weeds. Lift, dry, and store crop as soon as ready, probably the end of June. For exhibition, twenty-five cloves or bulbs should be placed on a large plate, and sec that they are firm, of medium size, ripe, of good colour, and nice small necks. There are two types, the Mammoth and the ordinary Shallot.





Cultivation.—Sow seed in February and March, and transplant into pots to harden off; afterwards plant out against a south wall in good soil; or they may be planted in a warm border, and carefully staked to keep the plant and fruit from straggling on the earth. If cultivated in pots the treatment should be the same, with the addition that liberal waterings of manure and rain-water will be found necessary, especially during the hottest part of the summer.

SEED POTATOES.

THE ADVANTAGES OF PLANTING A RELIABLE CHANGE.

It is generally admitted that one of the most fruitful elements of the potato disease is supplied by a repeated growth year after year of the same stock of potatoes on the same land.

Another danger frequently recurring is the gradual undermining of the constitution of the potato by injudicious selection, alternately resulting in a weakly impoverished stock that too readily succumbs to the earliest attacks of the potato murrain.

Too much importance cannot be attached to this subject, and a change of seed is positively essential if a thoroughly reliable and superior crop is expected.

Our stocks have been grown and selected with the utmost vigilance, and under normal conditions of soil and situation will produce first-elass erops.

Our crops are especially grown for seed purposes, that is to say, they are not over-fed for the sake of producing enormous tubers. They are kept true to name and description, and are not lifted until thoroughly ripe.

We go to this trouble and expense with a view to make our potatoes as diseaseresisting as the season will permit.

We grow potatoes in England and Scotland, on the ehalk in Kent, on the sand in Bedfordshire, on the rich warp-lands in Lineolnshire, so that we possess the advantages of supplying a distinct change of seed to every eustomer.

We do not list several of the rank-growing new varieties which need too much space in ordinary gardens, neither do we eatalogue others in which we can find no merits.

One of the constantly recurring questions put to us by our eustomers each year, is, "which may be considered the best varieties of potatoes for First Early, Mid-Season, and Main Crop, respectively?" To answer this, it would be necessary to be aequainted with the characteristics of the soil in every garden and the tastes of every grower. Some potatoes take more kindly to a particular soil than others, but those who have tried several of our well-knowr varieties have proved which potato suits their soil and culinary requirements, and acting on the axiom of "find a friend to keep a friend," continue to grow the same variety year after year.

This practice is a good one providing that a constant change of seed tubers is maintained, though it tends to increase the list of popular varieties from the number of which it is difficult to make a selection of the best.

Many years of elose observation, however, of potato eulture under varying soil and elimatic conditions, together with the results of our own trials at Raynes Park and Forest Hill (which this year amount to no less than 261 plots, also 60 seedlings), have enabled us to mention the three undermentioned varieties as the best and most suitable for general purposes.





NOTES.—The finest mixture (at 35s. per bushel) is a term used to describe the texture of the turf when grown, and is the very best for pleasure lawns, and lawns devoted to games of skill where the ball is required to run accurately, and for every purpose when best results are required.

The fine mixture (at 30s. per bushel) will also produce a first class turf of coarser texture than the finest; it is most reliable but is intended for ground which may not be worth the heavier expenditure.

To ascertain the nature of the soil, take a handful of damp soil and compress it in the hand, if it binds tightly it can be ealled a heavy soil, if it binds but not tightly it is a medium soil, if it does not bind at all it is a light soil.

QUANTITY OF SEED REQUIRED.

One bushel of seeds weighs 25 pounds. 





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MUDDY LAWNS.





A typical piece of worm infested, soft, muddy turf. Requires brushing and rolling daily from September to June, which means damaged turf, roots bruised and exposed, fine grasses smothered, and ultimate bare patches.





Cuiture .- Sow in well drained pans from January to March (or in the autumn), fid the pans with soil consisting of a mixture of half peat and half leaf mould, with a small quantity of pulverised charcoal and silver sand silted very fine, to within half an inch of the rim; water with fine rose, then sow the seed thinly, taking care sand since very line, to within an an inclust of the line, water with line to see, then sow the seed thinly, taking care not to cover it with soil; place in a temperature of 75 deg., and cover the pans with a piece of shaded glass, gradually removing the same as the seedlings progress. When large enough to handle, prick off into pans at about one inch apart, then pot off into single pots. Many will soon att in the requisite strength to go into 5-inch or 48 pots, and will bloom in August and September of the same year. The potting-off soil should consist of one-half good learn, one-half fibrous peat, with a good sprinkling of sand and broken charcoal.

one of the compact evergreen shrubs; it has a light grass-green feathery foliage, which changes as the summer advances to a rich cuimson. It is a perfectly hardy annual and can be sown in the open ground; it is a rapid grower and flourishes on all soils. The best method is to sow the seed under glass, pot the seedlings off singly, and ultimately bed out or plunge the pots in which they are growing. It will be seen by the above picture that these round shrub-like plants (often called the Mock Cypress) are most effective when planted amongst flowers, such as Begonias. 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



Nasturtiums, both climbing and dwarf, are of the easiest culture, and anyone desirous of having a display of the most brilliant flowers, without any trouble beyond sowing the seed, should select this delightful family, as they will give off their best efforts through the brightest of the summer, merely needing the seed-balls picked off. If these are permitted to mature, the beauty of the plant is soon lost.

Although the colours of the dwarf varieties contain many more shades and tints than the climbing section, both may be grown near the ground if the situation requires it, but the Climbing Nasturtium shows off its best features when elimbing over a fence or clambering up rustic woodwork.



In early spring the seed should be sown in frames or in boxes for summer and autumn blooming, and later on sowings may be made about July out of doors in a partially shaded place, transplanting in October or November into where they are intended to flower the following season. The final position should be an open one, and the plants not less than 6 inches apart. There should be no check in their progress either by cold winds, very hard frosts, or long droughts. Nor should they be watered during the hottest months with very cold water. We have classed each type so that Pansy lovers have an opportunity of securing a large and varied choice, all representing the very best strains in cultivation.



CARTERS GARDEN PRIMROSE.

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CARTERS SCABIOUS.

This bright-flowering plant is usually treated as an annual in our gardens. During recent years it has been greatly improved both in habit and range of colours, and is fast becoming one of the most popular of border flowers. When given plenty of room and the seed-vessels are kept regularly picked off, it will last through the whole of the summer. Owing to its sweetness the bees are very fond of it and its floral favours also attract all the most beautiful types of butterflies to the neighbourhood. Sow the seed in heat in February and March in a pan or small box, and transplant the seedlings three inches apart in larger boxes; harden off as spring advances, and set out in the border towards end of May.

They may also be sown where intended to grow.

Culture of Schizanthus in Baskets. - Seed should be sown in July, August, or September in well-drained boxes or pans in a compost of three parts sandy leam, one part leaf soil, one-sixth part silver sand, all run through a 1-inch sieve. The boxes should then be filled with the mixture to within 3-inch of the top and given a good watering in preparation for the seed, which should be sown evenly and covered with sufficient soil to bury the seed. Then place the boxes n a cold frame or greenhouse, covering them with paper to keep the light from them until the seedlings appear, when the shading may be removed. Bright sunlight must be avoided at this stage. When the seedlings are ready to pot, they should be placed singly in thumb pots, well drained, and returned to the frame or greenhouse close to the glass; water should not be given for a day or two if the soil is in a moist condition, but a light syringing is beneficial on bright days. When the plants are two inches high, take out the points to encourage lateral growth, and as this advances place neat little stakes to the plants. When the pots are full of roots they should be transferred into 48's or 50's and returned to the greenhouse for the winter. Plenty of air must be given at all times, and the temperature should be 50° by day and 45° at night. About the end of February the p'ants will be ready for baskets. The number of plants depend on the size of the basket; 12-in., 15.in., 18.in. are the most suitable sizes of baskets. A 12-in. will take six plants, five round and one in the centre, and the other sizes in proportion; the baskets should be well lined with moss and filled with a compost of three parts fibrous loan, one part well-rotted manure and silver sand, with a little dusting of bone meal. They should now be suspended below a greenhouse roof and allowed to grow freely, fastening the growth to the baskets until they are covered ; the tips can be pinched for a little time to make them uniform; at this stage a little artificial manure will be beneficial until the plants show flower, when it can be discontinued and only clear water applied



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WALLFLOWERS.

The Wallflower is a very old friend in English gardens, but is not grown to the extent it deserves. Now that so many improved forms and bright colours are available, it should be found a place where any collections that so many improved forms and bright colours are available, it should be found a place where any collections of spring-flowering plants are brought together. For quite two months, April and May, it adds its best charms, and makes beds and borders quite cheery by its presence and fragrance. The spindly straggling plants too commonly met with are only a mere apology for the effects well-cultivated examples, such as plants from the following highly selected strains, are catable of achieving. The double varieties, although very pretty when well grown, do not always come up to the high standard anticipated, and only occasionally give that real solid satisfaction that can be relied upon with the singles. For real usefulness we recommend the following are off the ground in convenient time for summer bedding. The seeds may be sown from April to August in a partially shaded but airy place. If sown on poor firm soil plants of stubby growth and hardy nature will be produced whilst those sown later in rich ground are often killed in winter. All may be transplanted to blooming quarters from August to November, according to circumstances.

DOUBLE SWEET-SCENTED TUBEROSES. BEAUTIFUL PURE WHITE FLOWERS.

The Sweet-scented Double White Tuberose (POLIANTHES TUBEROSA) has become exceedingly popular. It possesses both a character and a perfume distinct from any other flower, and can be induced to bloom at various scasons. At one time they were only obtainable from the South of Europe; now they are specially cultivated in different parts of the world, and can easily be forced into bloom for the Easter festivals. Those who do not cultivate these flowers for winter decoraspring, when they will come into flower during the summer. The double-flowered Tuberose may be had in succession by potting the tubers and standing them in a cold frame, covering them 4 in. deep with cocoanut fibre refuse ; but they will start much more quickly and with greater certainty in a gentle bottom heat. Loam and welldecayed manure, in about equal parts with a little coarse sand, is the most suitable compost in which to grow them. The pots may be taken out of the frame as soon as the flower stems appear above the leaves; they are then staked and removed to the greenhouse, and placed near the glass.
