

BULBS FOR HOUSE AND GARDEN CULTURE.

CULTURE OF BULES.

For House.—The culture of bulbs is very simple; they may be potted during September, October, November or December, watered well, and placed in a cool cellar or some dark room, and allowed to remain from four to six weeks; they may then be brought to the light for blooming. We advise potting the bulbs as early as possible, especially if flowers are desired as early as New Year's, for the longer time they can have to make roots the better they will bloom. By bringing out a few pots at different times a succession of bloom can be kept up all winter. If they are kept in a cool place while in bloom, the flowers will keep perfect a long time.

For the Garden.—Nearly all kinds of bulbs are very valuable for out door culture as they come into bloom earlier than any flower and make a grand display. Crocuses and Snowdrops are the first to make their appearance, and these charming little flowers are quickly followed by Tulips, Hyacinths, Narcissus, etc., so that the garden may be filled at a very low cost with the choicest flowers through the early spring months. For planting bulbs in the garden, September and October are the best months. The soil, if poor, should be liberally supplied with well rotted manure, and the bulbs planted about three inches deep and from four to six inches apart each way. Before cold weather sets in, the beds should be covered with straw or leaves to protect them during the severe winter months. While this is not absolutely necessary, it is advisable to do so, as it preserves the vitality of the bulbs. The covering should be removed when bulbs begin to make growth in the early spring. After they are through flowering, the leaves soon turn yellow and die; the bulbs are then ready to be taken up and stored away for planting again the next season.




