## NEW ASTERS.

New Early Branching. A distinct advance in the class of Branching Asters offered last scason for the first time. They come into lloom about two weeks earlier than the late Branching varieties, and also differ in having fewer branches and are almost free of side buds, the whole strength of the plant being given to the few extra large fowors which are borne on long stiff stems. We offer two colors only: Early Branching White, and Early Branching Rose. Per pkt. 10 cts.

Giant Antirhinum or Snapdragon.

Vick's Mikado Pink. GIANT ANTIRHINUM OR SNAP. DRAGON.

## FLOWER SEEDS.

We give special attention to our Flower Secds and aim to handle only the best strains to be procurcd, both of home and foreign growth. We do not offer a long list of varieties, but only the best and most generally known, and those we know are best suitcd to the amateur. We offer no seeds of ${ }^{4}$ inferior quality, at cheap prices, nor do we give asy premiums, preferring to give the value in the best seeds procurable at lonest pricas. Many of the varieties are of our own growing and most careful selection, while others are from specialists in this and forcign countries.

## GENERAL RULES.

Many of the failures with Flower Seeds are due to the lask of proper conditions, such as sowing too deep, too carly, too late, in improperly prepared soil, etc., and while it would be impossible to give explicil directions in our limited space, we give a few general directions, which, if followed, will give only good result. For all sceds which should be started early in the housc, such as Carnation Marguer:te. Cocliscomb, Colens, Canna, Helio. trope, Pctunia, Verbena, \&c., the best plan is to sow in shallow boxes, pans or anything of convenient size and having good drainage. Thesc should he filled about half their depth with broken crockery, coal ashes, or any material which will allow the water to dran away frealy. The upper half should be filled with nicely sifted soil composed of about one-lhird sand, one thlrd leaf mold or well-rotfed manure, and one thirl good garden soil. Press the soil down level and firm and water thoroughly scveral hours before sowing the seeds. When ready scatter the secds thinly over the surface and cover them with finely sifted soil to a deplh of about four times the diameter of the seeds. This means with very fine seed such as Petunia, a covering of about one-thirty-second of an inch, while with such large seed as Canna, a covering of nearly an inch would be necessary. After covering, firm the soil again and water just enoagh to reach the seeds. The best plan in watering is to place the box or pan in a larger ressel contaning water enough to reach about half the depth of the box, and leave until the soil is saturated; the box can then be covered with a panc of glass or papers to hold the inoisture. When the seedling; appear all shading must to removed and they must now have pleaty of light and air. The soil at no time nusi becone dry, as this is the most critical time, and any lack of atteation at this time may mean an entire failure. When the seedlings are large eaough to handle they should be transplanted iato similar loxes or small pots and kept in a light, airy situation until tine to plant out in the open ground.

For all hardy annuals such as Alyssmm, Candytuft, Mignonette, Poppies, etc., the simplest plan is to sow the se ds directly in the open ground. When the soil is in good working condtion, it should be well dug and tho surface raked finc. Sow the seeds evealy and thinly, preferably in rows, so that they may more easily be kept clean. The same directions for cover. ing the seeds should be followed as described above. When the seedings are about an inch high they should be thinnel out. giving each plant plenty of room to grow.
