Introductory.

TERMS. My terms are strictly cash with the order.

HOW TO SEND MONEY. Remit by Post Office Money Order, Express Money Order, or Registered Letter.

FREE BY MAIL. We pay postage on all bulbs, plants, etc., except where large plants are sent; we then ship by express. But of course we can always send larger plants for same money by express, purchaser paying charges. We add *gratis* plants to help pay charges when shipped by express. We would always advise customers to order by express when convenient. We can send plants with perfect safety by mail, if time in transit does not exceed six or eight days.

OUR MODE OF PACKING IS VERY COMPLETE. We first pack plants in damp moss or cotton, then wrap in oil paper, and lastly pack all in a strong wooden box made especially for the purpose.

PLANTS BY EXPRESS. Plants shipped by express are packed in light baskets or open boxes with soil on the roots, and tops exposed unless in cold weather; we then place a light covering over the tops to protect them from the cold. Plants shipped in this manner go through nicely and in most cases look as fresh as when started, hardly checking their growth. All plants shipped by express, unless otherwise ordered.

ORDERS for less than one dollar will not be filled unless 15 cents additional is sent to pay postage, as it is quite as much trouble to handle, and requires nearly as much postage to mail a 50 cent order as one for \$2.

A GREENHOUSE AT YOUR DOOR. To all lovers of flowers we wish to say that it makes no difference in what remote section of our country your lot may be cast, We can reach you by mail or express with our choice collection of plants as easily as though they were grown at your own door. All plants guaranteed to reach you safely and in good condition.

TREATMENT OF PLANTS ON ARRIVAL. Plants shipped by express suffer very little, if any, in transit. More care and precaution have to be taken with plants sent by mail, as the soil necessarily has to be washed off the roots to lessen the weight. On arrival, place them in lukewarm water for about an hour, leaving the paper and moss undisturbed. After potting or planting, shade for two or three days.

SUBSTITUTION. It sometimes occurs that stock of some varieties become exhausted before the season closes, in which case we shall take the liberty to substitute others of same color and price, being equally as good if not superior to the ones ordered. Should any of our customers object to this course they will please so state in their orders.

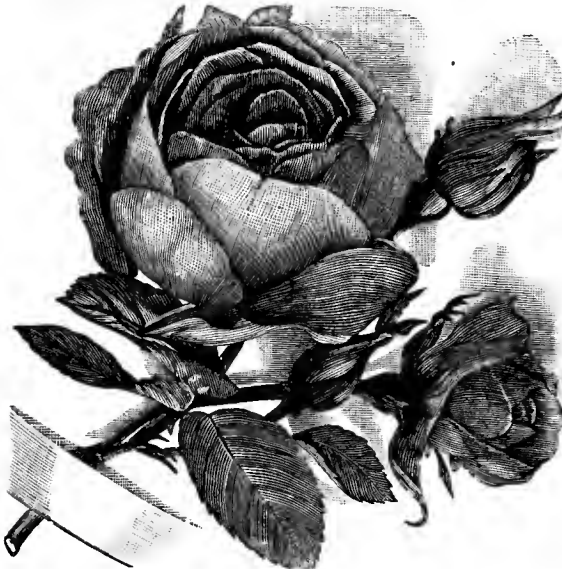

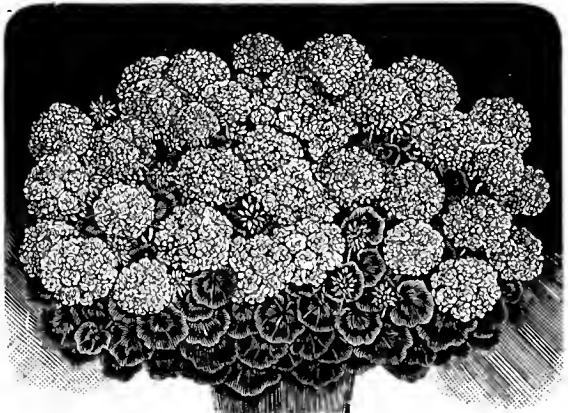

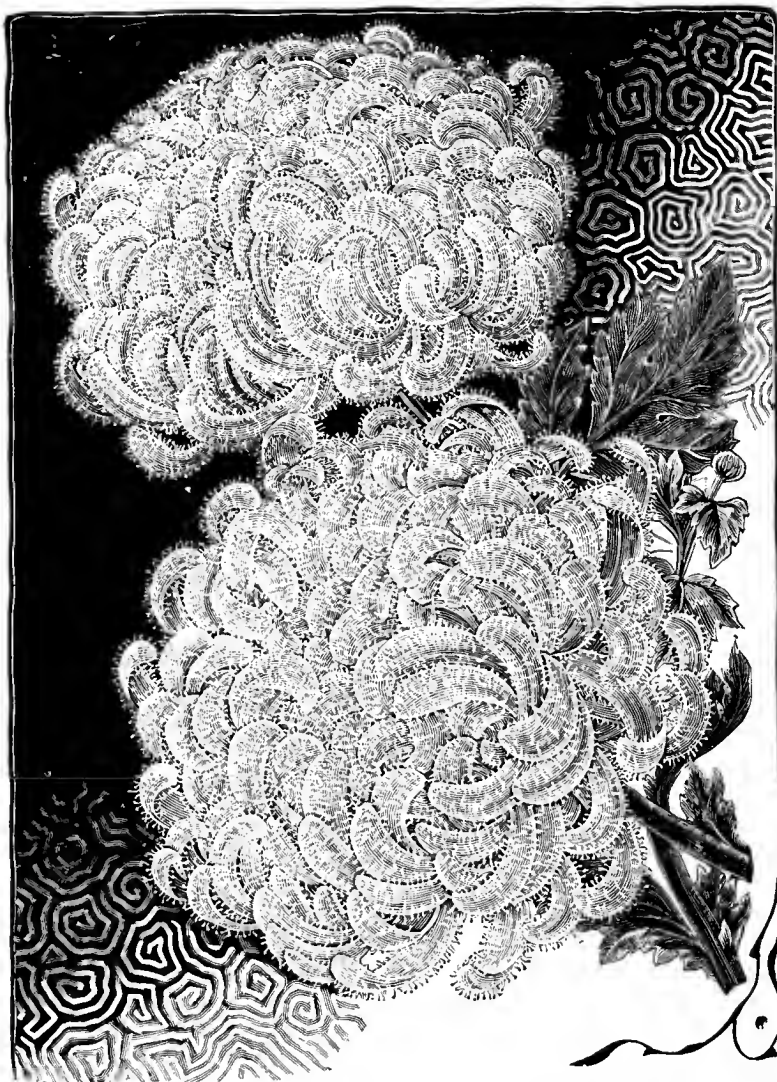

THE TRUE CHINESE SACRED LILY.

This is the one great winter blooming bulb which is more eagerly sought after than any other where it is known, the main reason being the ease with which it is brought into flower. The bulbs are very large and each sends up several spikes which bear clusters of large perfect waxy white blossoms with yellow center and a delicious fragrance, which is not excelled by any other flower. The Chinese method of blooming them is as follows: Fill a bowl or some similar vessel with pebbles and sand, in which place the bulb, setting it two-thirds its depth so that it will be held firmly; then fill with water to top of pebbles and place in a warm sunny window. The bulbs will at once commence a rapid growth and bloom in five or six weeks. The bulbs have so much vitality that they can be started as late as April 1st, by being kept perfectly dry up till that time. By obtaining a half dozen and starting them at intervals, you can have them for many months in growth. Extra large bulbs, 35 cts. each; two for 60 cts.

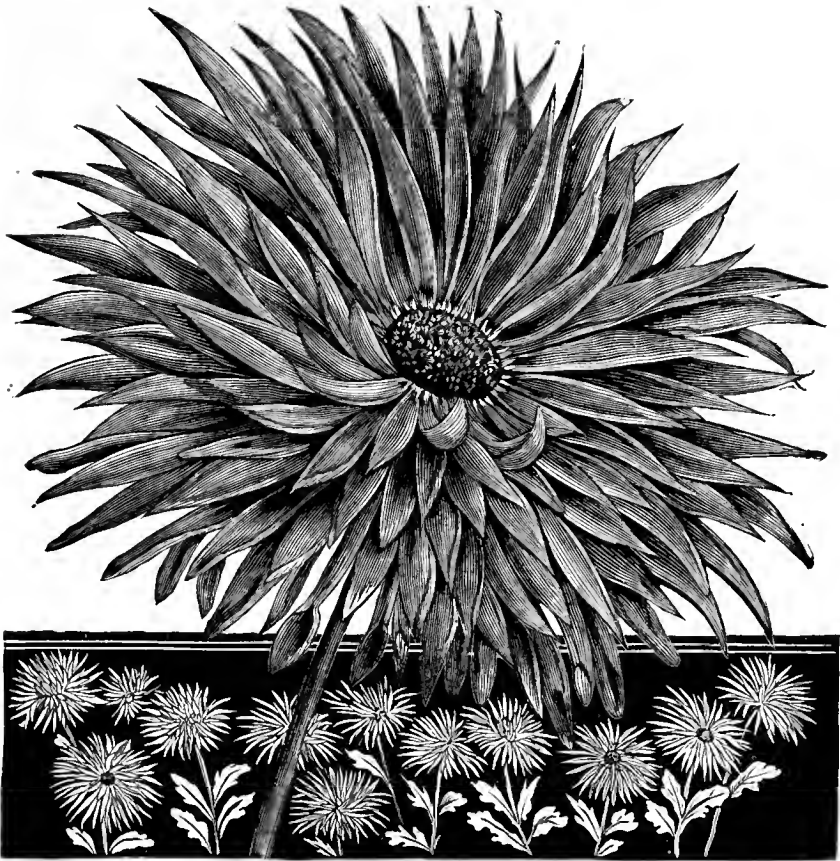

CHRYSANTHEMUMS.

The popularity of the Queen of the Autumn seems to be on the increase each season. They are the most useful fall and early winter blooming plants, as they are perfectly hardy. Few people have any idea of the immense improvements made in the color as well as in the forms of this class of plants. No collection of hardy plants is complete without them. Below are listed only the very best, and those of special merit.

Culture.—Don't expect large perfect flowers in poor soil, from dried up, withered plants. Chrysanthemums must be fed copiously with water and have a good mulching of rotten cow manure, etc.; then you can expect to have perfect flowers and plenty of them.

JAPANESE CHRYSANTHEMUMS.

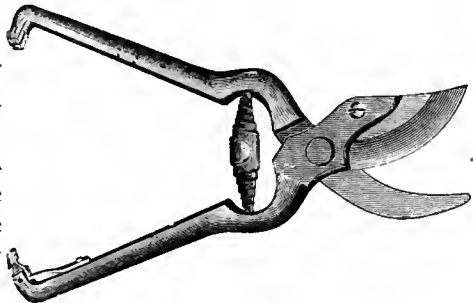
