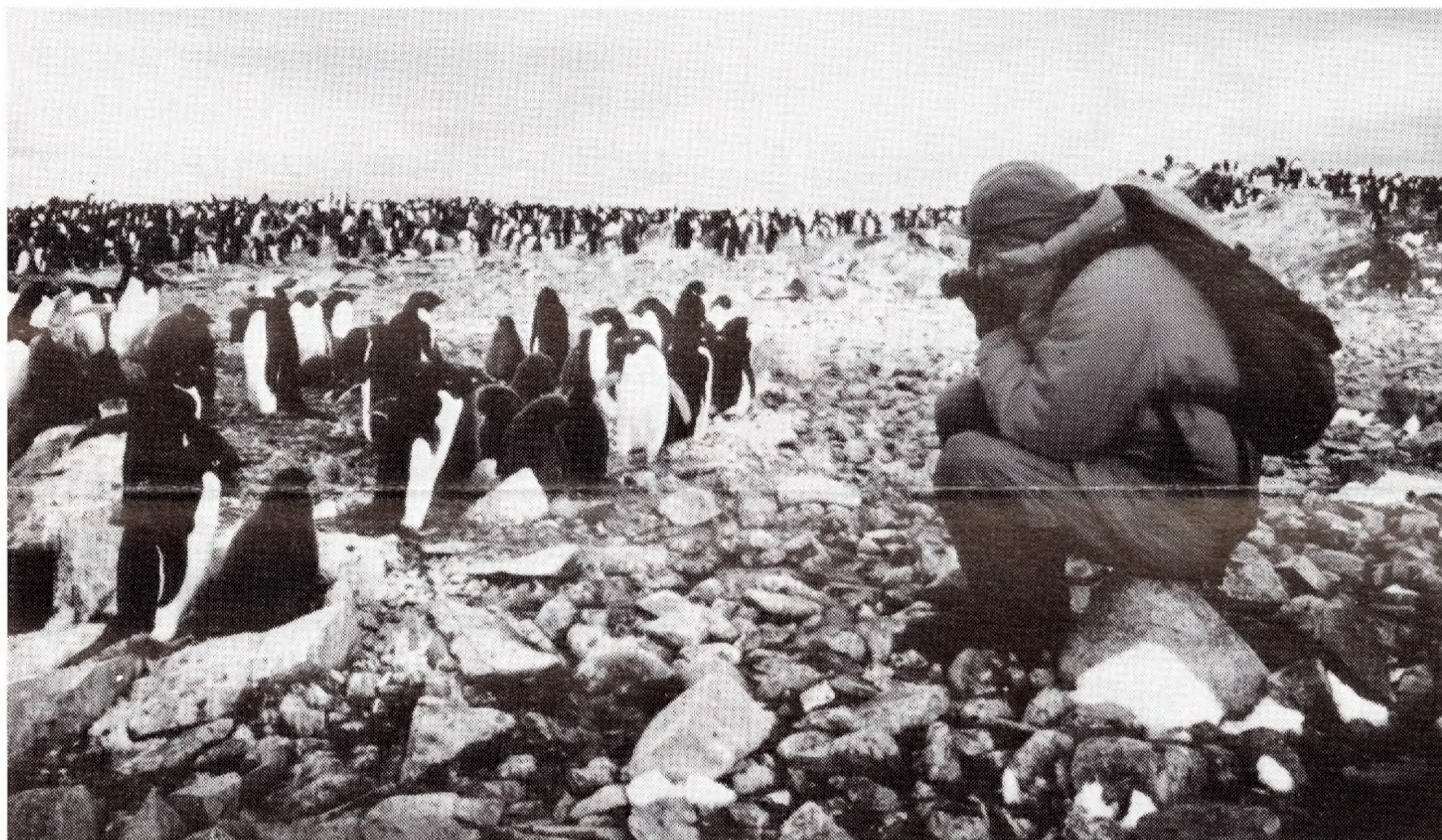

Dr. John McCosker, Director of the Academy's Steinhart Aquarium, has led four natural history tours to the Antarctic and has visited the Southern Ocean on several occasions in search of sharks. His lecture will focus on the raw natural beauty of the last continent and the myriad of wildlife that live on the harsh surface and in the cold seas. With the increase in resource exploitation and the upcoming expiration of the International Antarctic Treaty, it is imperative that the world community understand what is at stake before protection is reduced or eliminated. Dr. McCosker's slide-illustrated lecture will include the experiences that Academy travelers have had on the continent and on the ice in

Antarctica, perhaps the last outpost for heroic exploration.

Dr. Jack Horner, Curator of Paleontology at the Museum of the Rockies, is a renowned authority on dinosaur behavior. As this year's Lilienthal Lecturer, Dr. Horner will discuss the theories and methodology employed by paleontologists in interpreting the fossil remains of dinosaurs to learn more about what these animals looked like, what they ate, what types of environments they lived in and how they behaved. He will also discuss dinosaur nests, eggs and young, and how the growth rate of different

dinosaurs influenced their behavior. Dr. Horner has been a research assistant at Princeton University, a museum scientist at the American Museum of Natural History in New York and is currently an Assistant Professor of Geology at Montana State University. Stars, like people, live out their life cycle in a fairly predictable way. From birth, through middle age, to death, a star will follow an evolutionary path to becoming a white dwarf, neutron star, or even a black hole. On March 6, the Morrison Planetarium's Exploring the Universe series presents Dr. Susan Lea, Professor of Physics and Astronomy, San Francisco State University, who will use the special environment of the planetarium to illustrate "Stellar Graveyards: The Death of Stars."

Preview of Coming Attractions

When the Rainbow Touches Down, our special exhibit of 96 paintings by Native Americans from the Southwest, is currently on display in Lovell-White Hall. These works, from the Leslie Van Ness Denman Collection, will be on view through Sunday, February 25.

Vanishing Deserts, originally scheduled to open on March 3, has been rescheduled to allow a longer venue and will open in February, 1991.

On February 17, Desert Dedication will open in Hohfeld Hall through May 27. This collection of desert paintings by naturalist Robert Stebbins reflects a life-long interest in the California desert and the artist's concern for the preservation of this fragile region.

Opening in San Francisco Airport's North Terminal in late April is a special exhibit, "The West: Views From the California Academy of Sciences," a retrospective that highlights the Academy's history and its contributions to scientific research. On display is a sampling of the more than fourteen million specimens from our eight research departments. This is the second cooperative effort between the Academy and the Airport. The first Academy Airport show was a tremendous success, measured by the number of times airport personnel had to clean fingerprints from exhibit cases. "The West: Views From the California Academy of Sciences" will be on display through July 30.

On July 7, the Academy commemorates the centennial of the founding of Yosemite National Park with two concurrent exhibits. "Yosemite 100," a multi-media show developed by the National Park Service and the Academy. Also showing in Hohfeld Hall is "John Muir: The Yosemite, Photographs by Galen Rowell." This collection of photographic works by Rowell, Ansel Adams, Joseph LeConte and others are enhanced by writings taken from John Muir's original journals.

Young Audiences

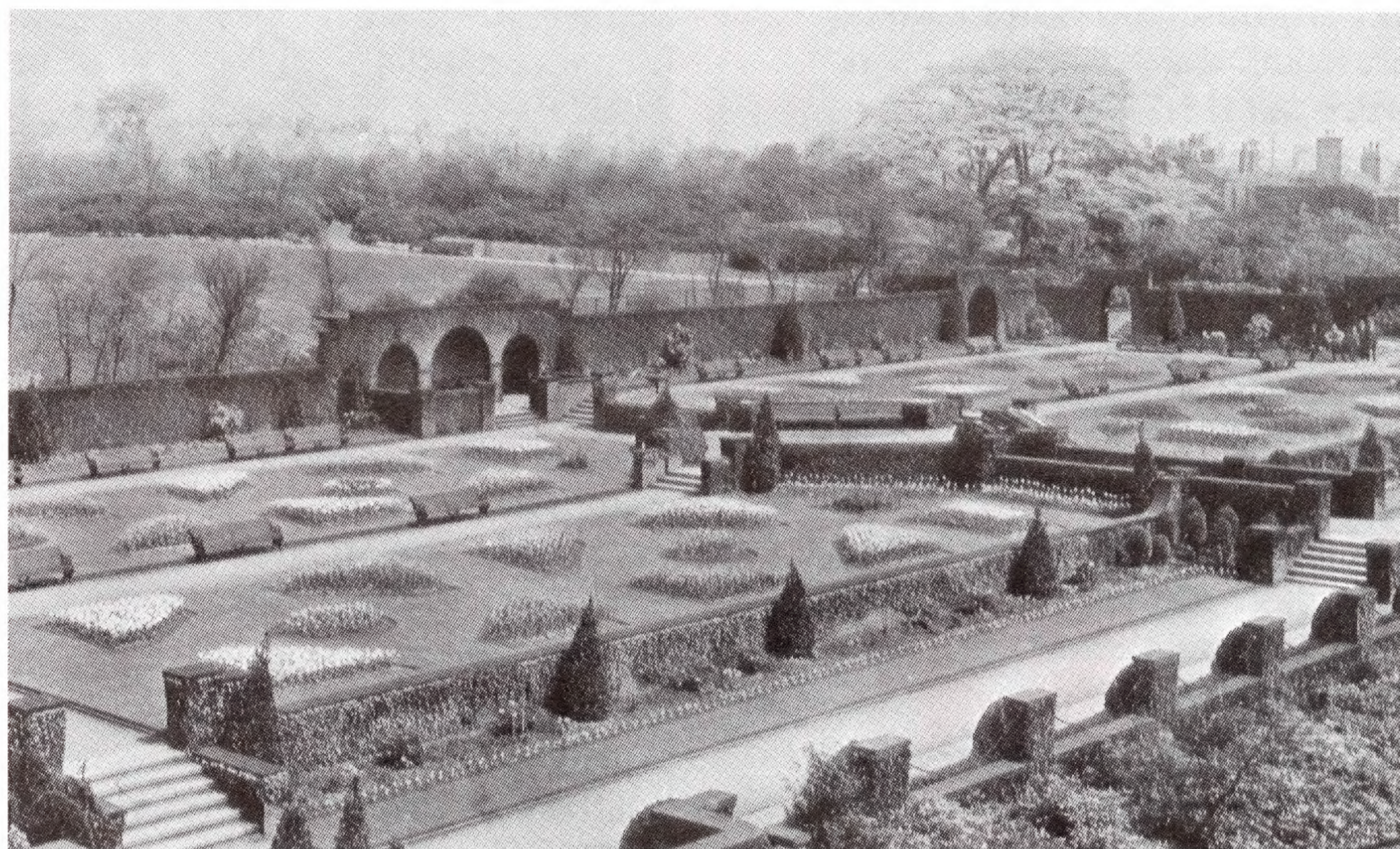
Sunday, March 25 1:00 p.m.
