

"South Africa's Wildlife Experience"

The wildlife of South Africa is remarkable rich both in kinds and numbers of animals; diverse in the wide range of species within a single family; and unique in the number of species which are endemic to the subcontinent. During the July Members'Meetings, Jacques Verster,

Director of the Southern African Nature Foundation which represents the World Wildlife Fund in 10 countries in Southern Africa, will share some of his country's treasures. His slide/lecture will highlight the diversity of wildlife and cover current and future wildlife conservation and management actions being undertaken by the Foundation.

Mr. Verster is a native of South Africa and served for three years in the South African Embassy in London before returning to his homeland to assume the role of Director of the S.A. Nature Foundation.

### It's an Indian Summer!

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
The Academy's three Native American exhibits continue throughout the summer. HOPI KACHINA: Spirit of Life, the Academy's own nationally touring exhibit, uses more than 150 kachina dolls to illustrate two key Hopi ceremonies. Muralsize photographs of actual ceremonies, scale models of pueblo villages, audiovisual presentations, and kiva murals from the Awatovi ruins, all combine to enhance the feeling of being on the Hopi Mesas. The exhibit continues through September 1 in Lovell White Hall. A beautifully illustrated black and white and color catalog is on sale for \$12.

Continuing through July and August halfhour guided tours of HOPI KACHINA: Spirit of Life will be given at 11:00 a.m., 1:00 p.m. and 2:00 p.m. every day of the week EX-CEPT Monday. Meet in Hohfeld Gallery I, just outside the Morrison Auditorium.

A new exhibit in Cowell Hall is Pioneer Venus, a display of paintings by Richard Guidice showing the valleys, highlands, plains and mountain ranges of Venus based on the recent photos taken from the Pioneer Venus Orbiter spacecraft. One of the paintings show the Maxwell Montes massif, the highest point on Venus, which is higher than Mount Everest.

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Morrison Planetarium's unique sky theater has expanded its schedule of The Universe Unveiled for summer. Come and explore quasars, nebulas, galaxies and exploding stars every day of the week at 12:30, 2:00 and 3:30 p.m.; extra shows on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday at 11:00 a.m.; Wednesday and Thursday evening at 7:30 p.m. The Universe Unveiled will continue through Labor Day.

The planetarium continues to present Exploring the Skies of the Season, a tour of the current night sky over San Francisco. You can see this weekend program at 11 a.m. each Saturday and Sunday.

Lights Fantastic, the all new light show which opened at the Morrison Planetarium in June, has added extra shows for the summer. This new dimension in audio-visual entertainment which uses colorful lumias, liquid lights, planetarium and other special effects including lasers can be seen on Sunday, Monday and Tuesday at 5:00, 7:30 and 9:00 p.m., and on Friday and Saturday at 5:00, 7:30, 9:00 and 10:30 p.m.

Admission is \$3.50 for adults for all performances; \$1.50 (Sunday, Monday and Tuesday) and \$1.75 (Friday and Saturday) for senior citizens and children under 10. Tickets for all performances are available through BASS outlets and remaining tickets go on sale at the planetarium box-office one-half hour before showtime.

Indian Dance Festival (The Courtyard) Saturday, July 12 2:00-3:00 p.m.

To enrich the enjoyment of a visit to the Academy's three Indian exhibits an Indian Dance Festival has been planned. The program will include an



introduction of the style of music and dance, war dances, intertribal dancing and a round dance, followed by a question period. The performance, which lasts an hour, will include a troupe of eight dancers and six singers.

Peru's World (Wattis Hall of Man) Saturday, July 26 2:00-3:00 p.m.

Peru's World, a slide/sound show on the three regions of Peru, will be presented on July 26 to complement the Peruvian exhibit in the Wattis Hall of Man. Emphasis will be on the music and dress of the Quechua Indians, and a presentation of musical instruments and artifacts (blow gun, alpaca blankets, necklaces, and the 'manta') will be given by Rob Ortner, after the slide production.



Temple Dances of Ancient India (Wattis Hall of Man) Sunday, July 27 2:00 p.m.

Two ancient dance forms from South India will be presented by K. P. and Katherine Kunhiraman, a husband and wife team who studied at the Kalakshetra Institute of Fine Arts in Madras, South India. Their company, Kalanjali, was formed in 1975 after the Kunhiramans' arrival in this country in order to share the beauty of classical Indian dance and their performances have brought rave reviews from local critics.

The dances are highly dramatic and require highly stylized hand gestures and footwork that is mathematically prescribed. Today in India there exist seven classical dance forms, two of which will be performed by the Kunhiramans. One is Kathakali, a dance drama based on stories from Hindu mythology and usually performed in temple courtyards, and the other is Bharatanatyam, the oldest classical dance in India. This form was originally a solo dance performed in connection with the rites of worship and has only been seen publicly within the last one hundred years. Three musicians and a vocalist all in traditional costume will accompany the dancers.


