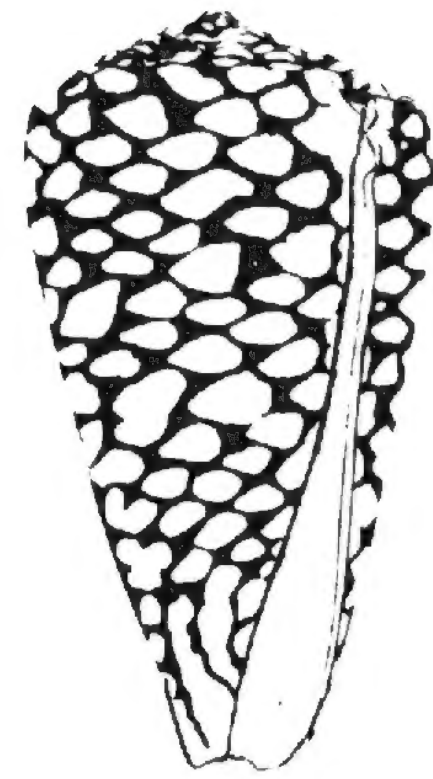

Subject

"Dangerous Marine Creatures: Things That Bite, Sting and Poison"



Turkeyfish, venomous sea snakes, cone shells, sea urchins, Portuguese men-of-war, sharks and puffers are familiar names to most divers, fishermen, boaters and beachcombers. All of these creatures are to be treated with utmost respect as they have the ability to sting, attack, poison and in some cases, cause death.

Bruce Halstead, M.D. has spent 35 years on research throughout many parts of the world on the subject of dangerous marine animals. Most of his research has been under sponsorship of the Army, Navy and Air Force and the National Institutes of Health. Some of this work has involved such international agencies as the World Health Organization which has been concerned with the survival of isolated military personnel working where they might encounter these animals.

Join Dr. Halstead at his slide/lecture when he will discuss some of these organisms, the interesting nature of their venom organs, and the effects they produce in human beings.

Dr. Halstead is well known for his three volume work entitled *Poisonous and Venomous Marine Animals*, and has been familiar with the Academy since he was a child working and learning in the Ichthyology Department.

As usual, your membership card will admit you to the Academy's main entrance at Cowell Hall, and through the Wattis Hall entrance for the matinee presentation. Please be prepared to show your card at the auditorium door for the afternoon meeting.

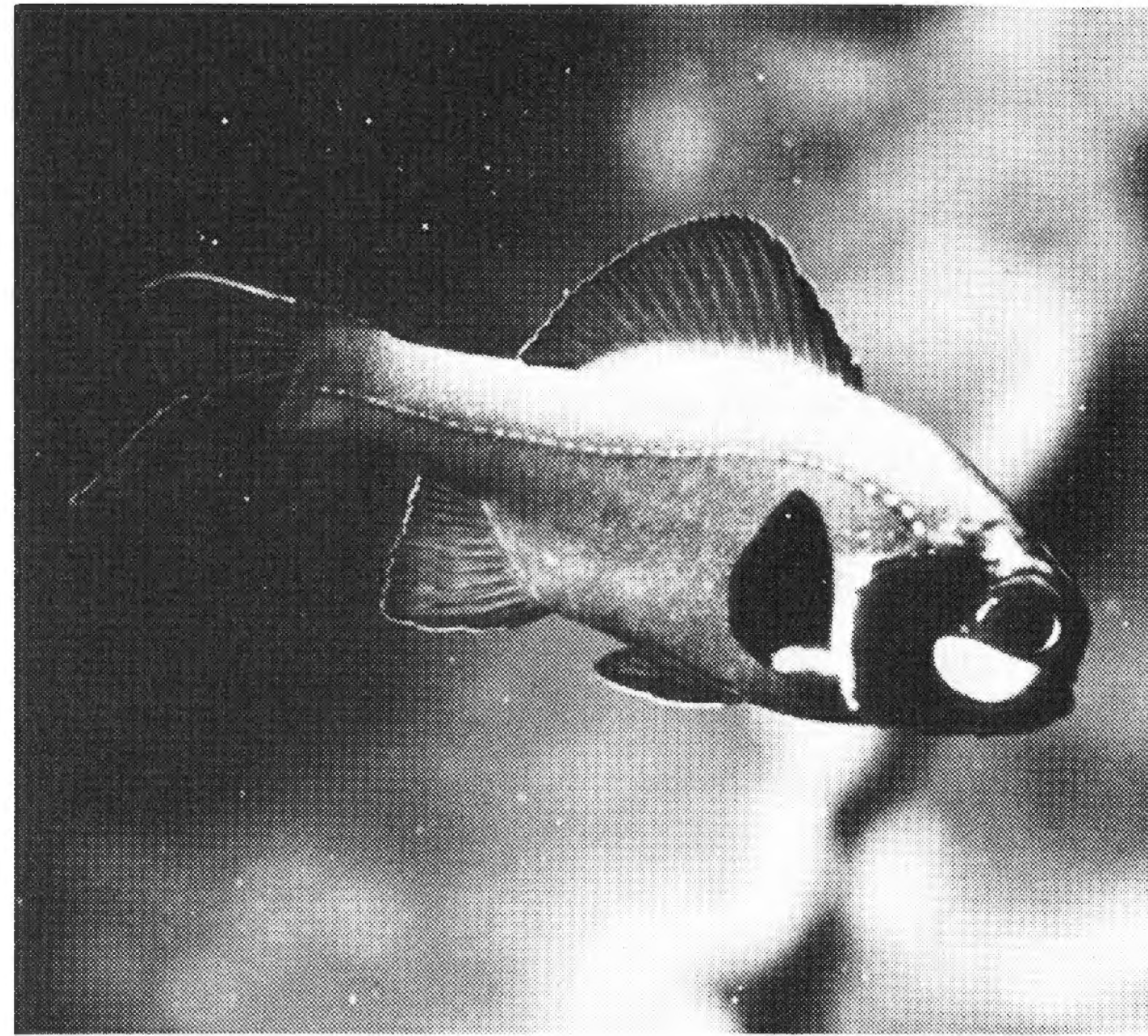

Photoblepharon from first expedition

In 1975 scientists from the Academy's Steinhart Aquarium led an expedition to Grande Comore Island in the Indian Ocean in search of a coelacanth, the "living fossil." Though a living specimen of "old fourlegs" eluded the group, two dozen *Photoblepharon* ("eyelid light") made the long journey back to San Francisco to become the first flashlight fish ever put on public display.

The name flashlight fish refers to the glowing bean-shaped light organ located beneath the eyes of these small animals. Because they live at dark depths of 200 to 400 feet, these fish have developed blinking green lights to find and possibly attract food and to communicate with each other. Researchers at the Academy and at Scripps Institution of Oceanography are studying their glowing lights, which is caused by symbiotic bacteria, and at the same time aquarium visitors have a chance to see these strange bioluminescent creatures.

In tank #1 at various times you can see three different kinds of flashlight fish, as well as Pinecone Fish first given to the aquarium by the Emperor of Japan.

The National Parks of Brazil

The lush vegetation of the world's tropical rain forests are home to nearly half of all the flora and fauna species on earth, but because of forest disruption in many countries millions of these species could become extinct before being described by scientists. One country where there is less chance of losing this precious and fragile ecosystem is Brazil where fledgling national parks are preserving the finest habitats of the tropics.

In 1982, Walt Anderson, naturalist, artist and photographer, well known to Academy members, led the first safari ever offered to the national parks of Brazil. In this special slide/lecture he will highlight the emergence of the Brazilian national park system, and explore the problems and promises of wildlife conservation and habitat preservation in this rapidly developing, ecologically diverse nation.

King Range Backpack

April 24 - 28

Northern California's King Range Beach is a remote and beautiful 24-mile stretch of pristine black sand. Academy members will hike the area, north to south, between the Mattole River and Shelter Cove, encountering marine mammals, birds, intertidal life, coastal plants and wildflowers. Anyone capable of hiking five miles a day, carrying approximately 30 pounds in a backpack, can handle this trip. Cost is \$185 per person. Belize for Scuba Divers

May 7 - 14

Some of the richest and most pristine dive sites in the Caribbean lie off the coast of Belize (formerly British Honduras), south of Mexico on the Yucatan Peninsula. Sixty miles out to sea at Lighthouse Reef are dozens of dive sites where the top of the drop-off is a mere 30 feet below the surface. Led by Academy marine biologist, Brian Gibeson, members will stay aboard the comfortable *Isla Mia*. (This trip is limited to 14 divers). Cost is \$950 plus air fare. June 18 - July 3

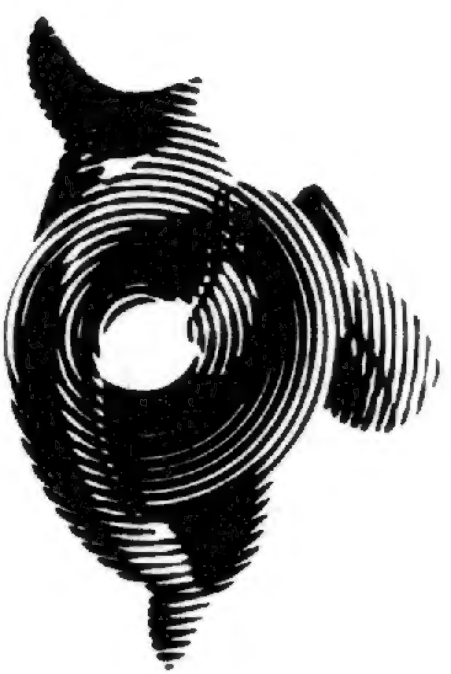
