The Laysan Albatross



For most people albatrosses exist only in the imagination or as drawings in bird books. The birds themselves are rarely seen by humans, since they inhabit the remotest parts of the globe. The Laysan albatross, one of two species in this family that occurs in the waters off North

America, populates the seldom visited leeward islands of Hawaii.

Frans Lanting spent two summers on assignment for GEO magazine documenting albatross life history on these islands. Join him when he will present some of the unique scenes he has captured on film — the bizarre courtship rituals, a young albatross learning to fly and the humorous coexistence of people and albatrosses on Midway Island.

Frans Lanting is a professional photographer and writer whose work has appeared in many publications in North America and Europe including Life, GEO, Audubon, National Wildlife and Discover. Some members will have seen the photo exhibit Flight which was on display at the Academy in October 1981. It was a celebration of birds' flight by Frans Lanting and David Cavagnaro.

Northwest Passage Voyage

August 19 - September 27, 1984

A "first" in the history of adventure voyages will be made when the M.S. Lindblad Explorer carves out a path from Greenland across arctic waters through the Yukon and Alaska to reach Yokohama. The Explorer is a one-of-a-kind vessel, specially designed with a doubly reinforced hull, bow thruster, and powerful engines to travel safely and easily through the pack ice of the polar regions.

Passengers joining this 36-day voyage will embark in St. John's, Newfoundland, and head north via Greenland into Dundas Harbour and Resolute Bay. The ship will then head west to Prince Leopold Island, on through Bellot and James Ross Straits, and to Gjoa Haven. "Northwest Passage" participants will also explore Queen Maud Gulf, Perry River, Victoria Island, Banks Island, Kendall Island (Northwest Territory) and Herschel Island (Yukon). The Explorer will then reach Point Barrow on the northern-most tip of Alaska. From here the ship sets off through the Bering Strait to St. Lawrence Island. The remainder of this historical voyage will be filled with intriguing visits to Pinnacle, St. Matthew and Attu Islands before reaching Kushiro (Hokkaido), and Yokohama. Some of the world's finest naturalists and scholars will share their knowledge of the history, culture and wildlife of this area. Costs for the extraordinary voyage will range from \$15,000 to \$20,000 per person. This is a fund raising activity for the Academy; a portion of the listed cost will be taxdeductible. 
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
