Sky Shows

The Christmas Star returns to the Planetarium on Friday, December 5, with some suggestions for the identity of the legendary "star" said to have heralded the birth of Jesus of Nazareth nearly 2000 years ago, and a glimpse at the life and death of stars in our universe.

The Christmas Star can be seen through January 4 at 2 p.m. on weekdays and hourly from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. on weekends. There will be extra shows during Christmas Week from December 22 through 26, however, the **Planetarium will be closed on December 25.**

Exploring the Skies of the Season, the popular night-sky show, continues on Saturday and Sunday at noon, featuring a look at the current constellations, planets, and phase of the moon. December's sky lights up with the brilliant constellation Orion, as well as the Geminid and Ursid meteor showers. Extra 12:30 p.m. shows will be added during Christmas week, except on Christmas Day.

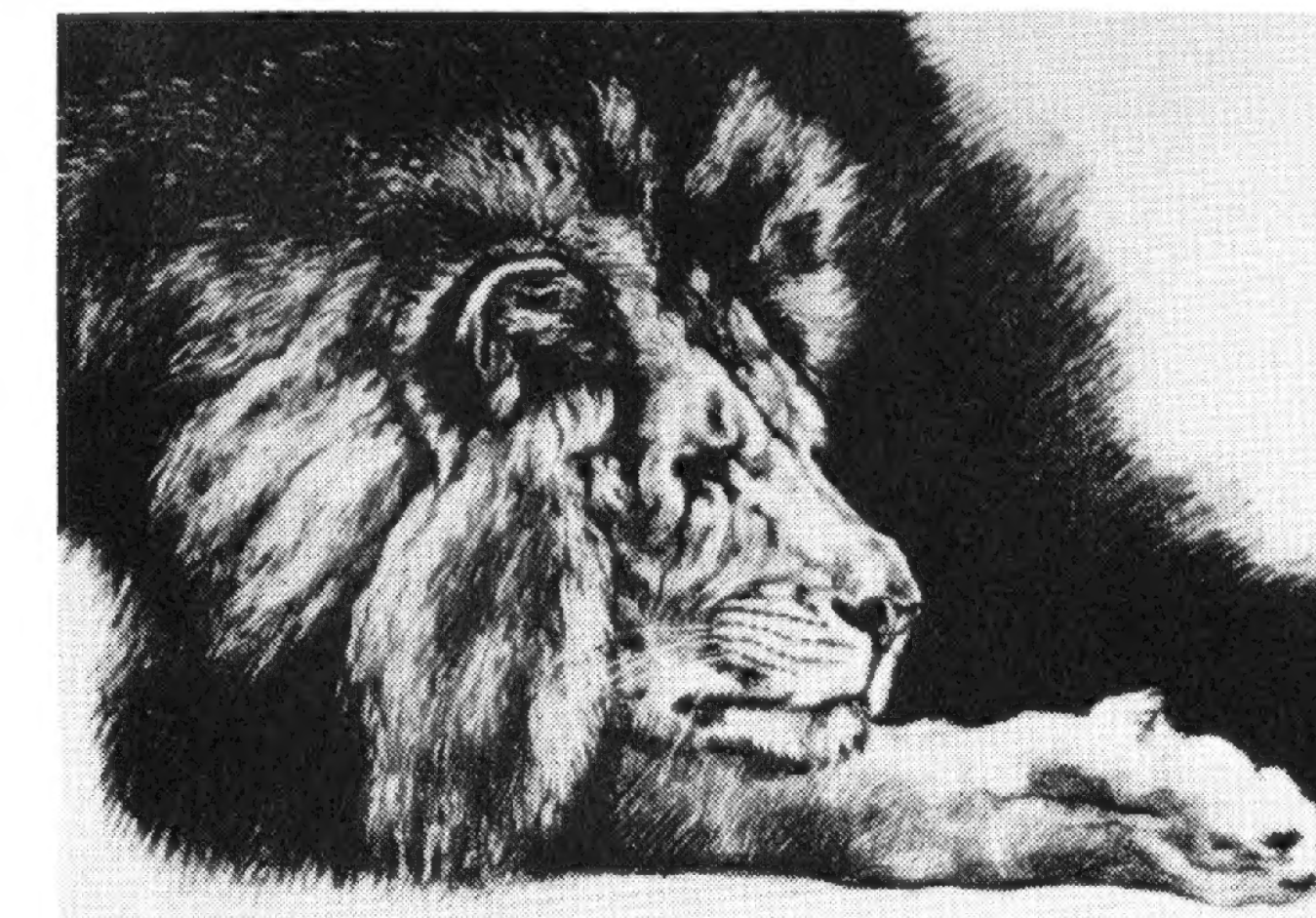

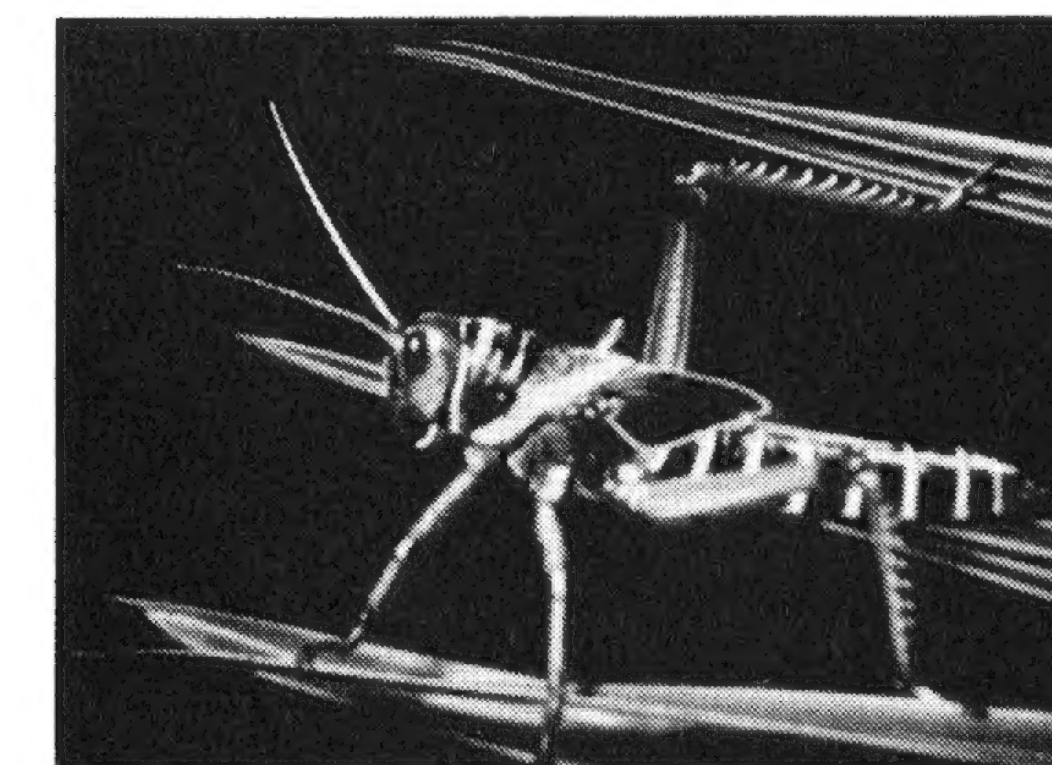
Special Exhibits



Nativity Folk Art will be on display in Wattis Hall from December 9 through the holiday season. *Creche* scenes from around the world demonstrate how artists from various cultures have interpreted the Christian story of the birth of Jesus of Nazareth. From the tiny *pesebre* from Mexico that can fit in the palm of your hand to the terra cotta *Nacimiento* scene with figures in tradition Pueblo Indian costume, these scenes reflect the beautiful diversity of folk art around the world. The Nativity scenes will be on display through January 4 in Wattis Hall of Man.



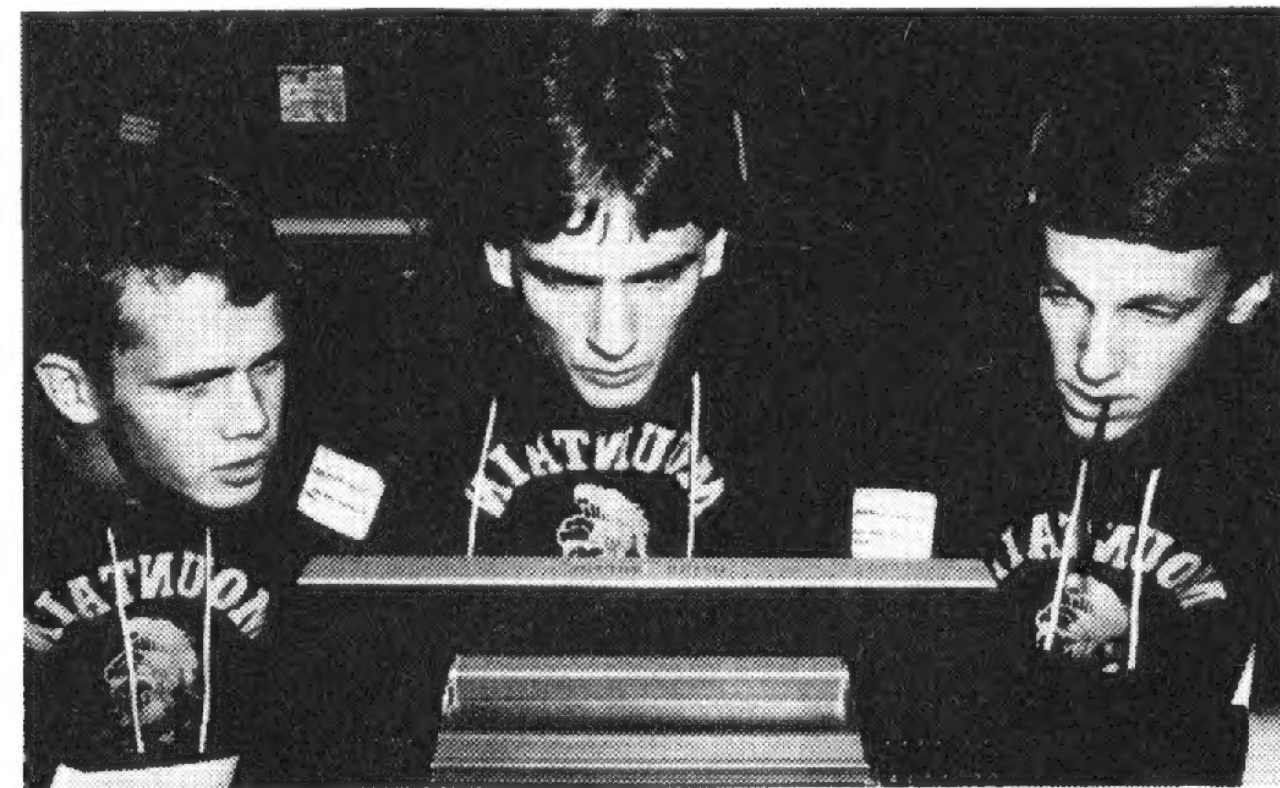
Animals: The Best of '86 displays the winning entries in the annual juried competition of the Society of Animal Artists. Delicate sand pipers, commanding African elephants and a range of other animals are sensitively depicted in their natural surroundings by some of America's foremost animal artists. More than 80 paintings, drawings and sculptures will be on display through February 1 in Lovell White Hall.



Lifelong Safari presents dramatic photographs by Dr. Edward S. Ross, taken during his long career traveling throughout the world in search of the tiny insects, Embids, that are the focus of his research. Clusters of stink bugs gather in patterns like a kaleidoscope and a praying mantis becomes Godzilla-like through Ross's powerful lens. The native people and terrains are recorded with the same grace and power in this exhibition that can be seen in Hohfeld Hall through May 3.

The Chimpanzees of Gombe Stream reveal their individual personalities and habits in color photographs on display in Lower Cowell Gallery. Dr. Jane Goodall is continuing her studies of this group of primates in Tanzania, but their pictures remain at the Academy only through January 11.

Marathon of the Minds, an interactive fiction competition, kept 60 young minds racing at the Academy on November 8 and 9. Beginning at 7 p.m. Saturday night, teams of students from 20 Bay Area high schools worked virtually nonstop, pitting their logic and creative problem solving skills against the latest computer program by Infocom. Twelve hours later at 7 Sunday morning, the students from Amador Valley High School in Pleasanton and Contra Costa Christian High School in Walnut Creek worked their way through verbal mazes and subtle clues to tie for first place, earning a computer for each school. Special Lecture

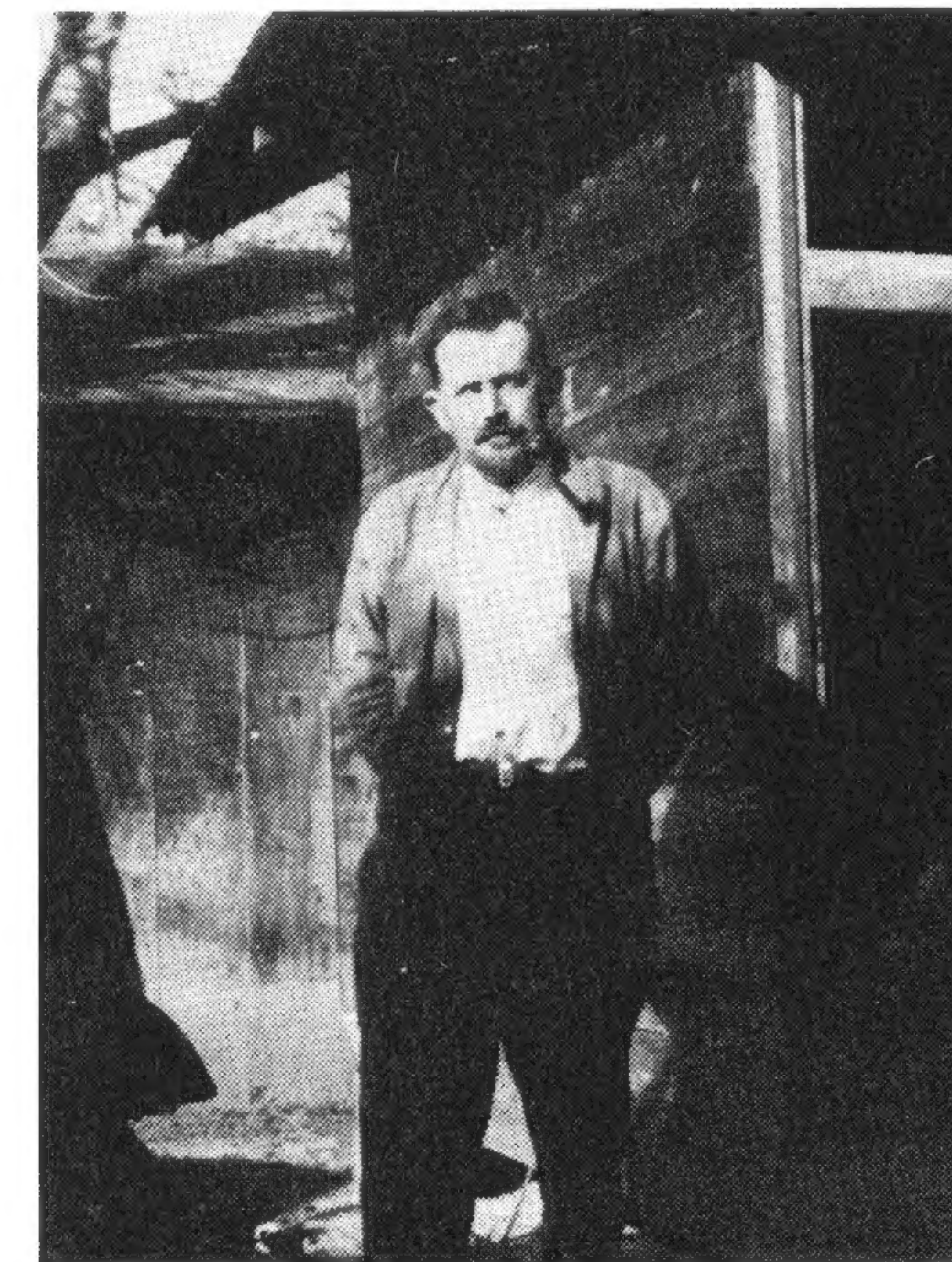
The Discovery of the Biblical City of Dan
Dr. Avraham Biran

For twenty years teams of archeologists have excavated at the site of the ancient city of Dan that once marked northern-most border of biblical Palestine. Under the direction of Avraham Biran of the Hebrew Union College in Jerusalem, work at Tel Dan has yielded a wealth of information about the early history of the area. Discovery of an intact, triple-arched gate from the Bronze Age city of Laish, which once stood on the same site, gave scholars new insights into the construction techniques and defense systems of the era. Dr. Biran will discuss the significance of recent findings in this informative and enjoyable slide/lecture.

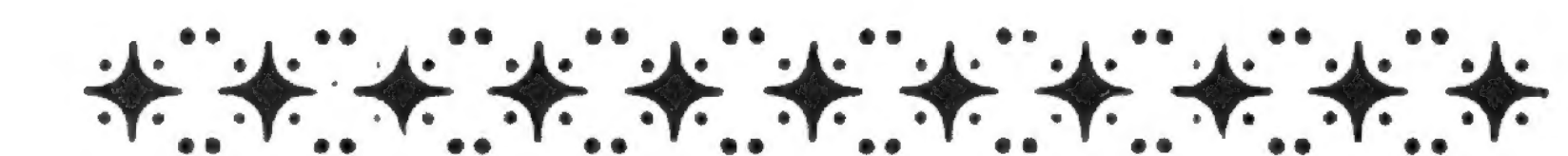
Traditional Arts

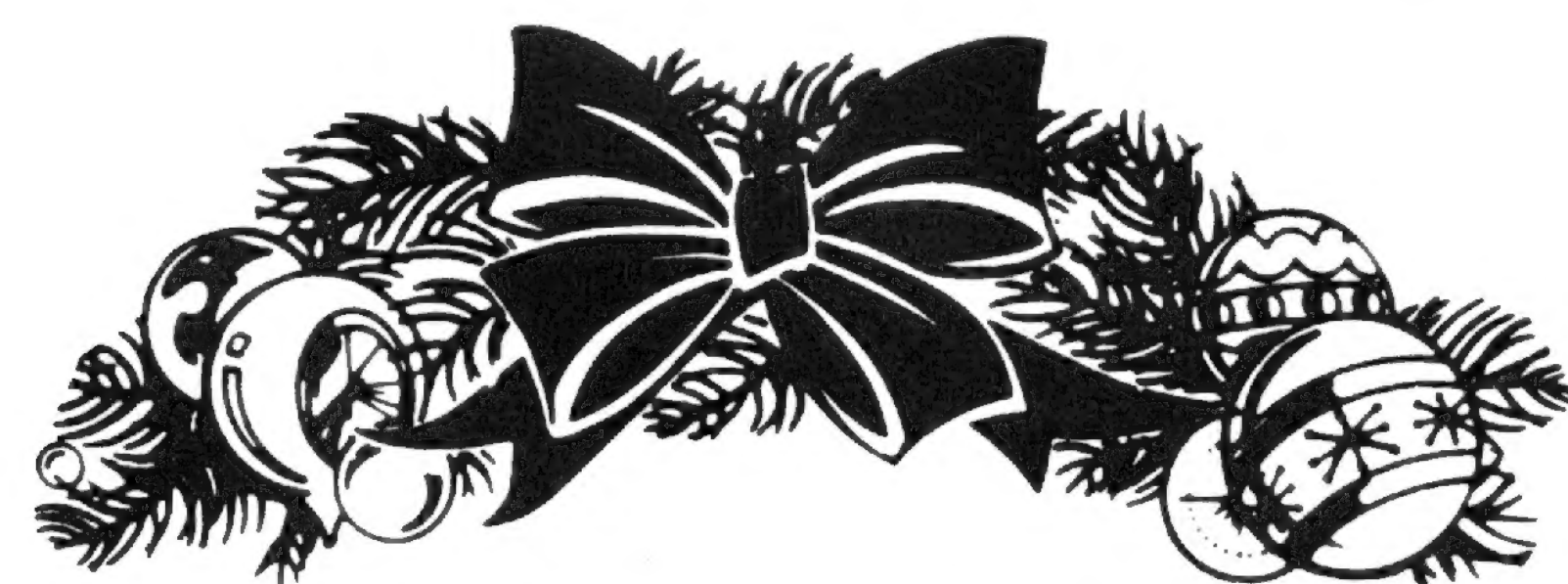
Diving Beneath the Ice in Antarctica



Even for the most experienced diver, dropping through six to nine feet of ice into water that is two degrees below zero centigrade is a test of physical and mental courage. Dr. Kathy Ann Miller spent a total of eight months at McMurdo Station in the Antarctic studying seaweeds and collecting sponges and echinoderms for the Academy's Invertebrate Zoology Department in water so pristine that visibility was often 600 feet. In this slide/lecture she will share her experiences in this silent world that has been seen by very few humans.

Dr. Miller earned her doctoral degree in Botany at the University of California Berkeley studying seaweeds. In addition to her work in the Antarctic, she has conducted research in the Galapagos and Channel Islands.

A very special Santa Claus who knows all about children, toys and the Christmas frog will make his annual appearance, spreading good cheer and love of reptiles throughout the Academy.

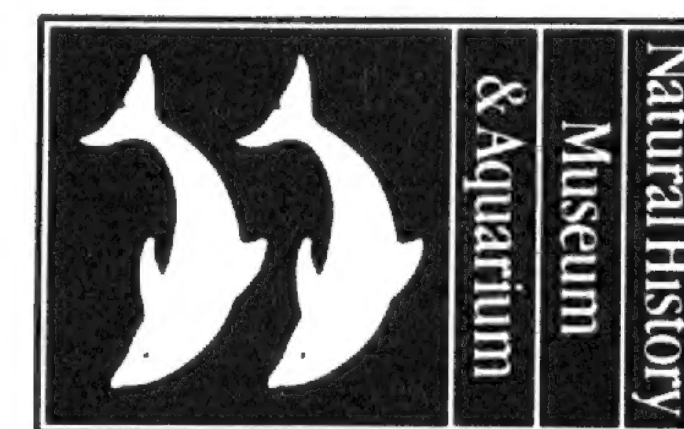
The Nature Company will be open throughout the evening for holiday shopping.

Admission, \$2 for adults and \$1 for children 17 and under, will be paid at the door that evening.



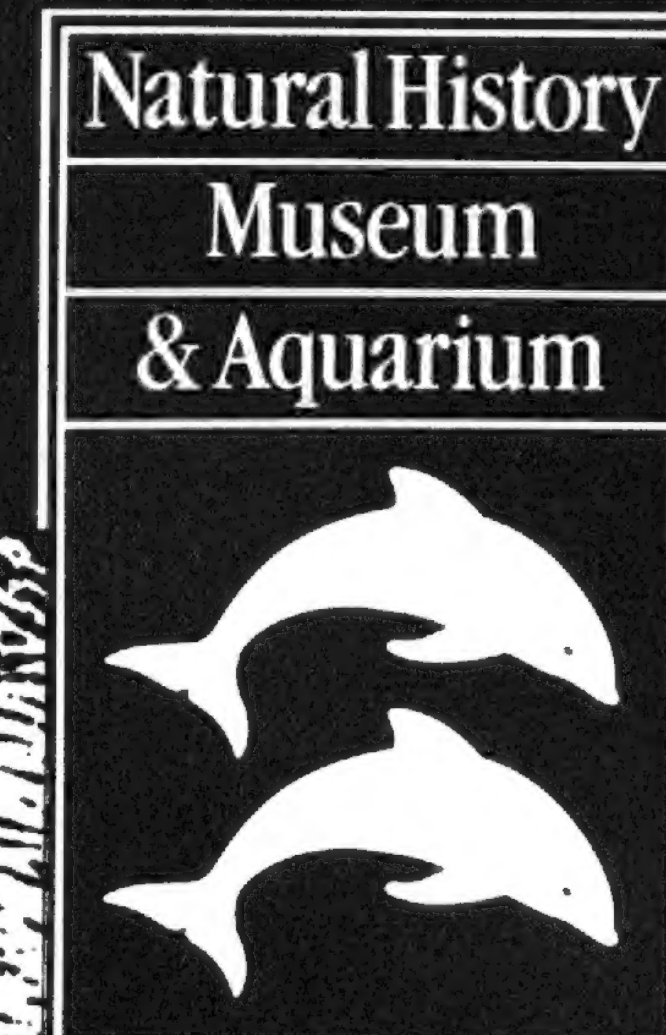
