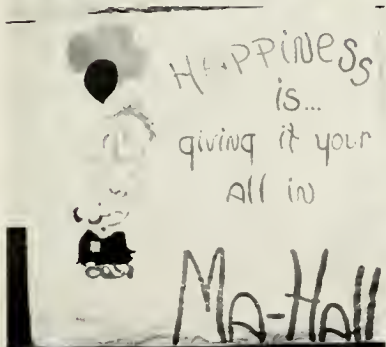

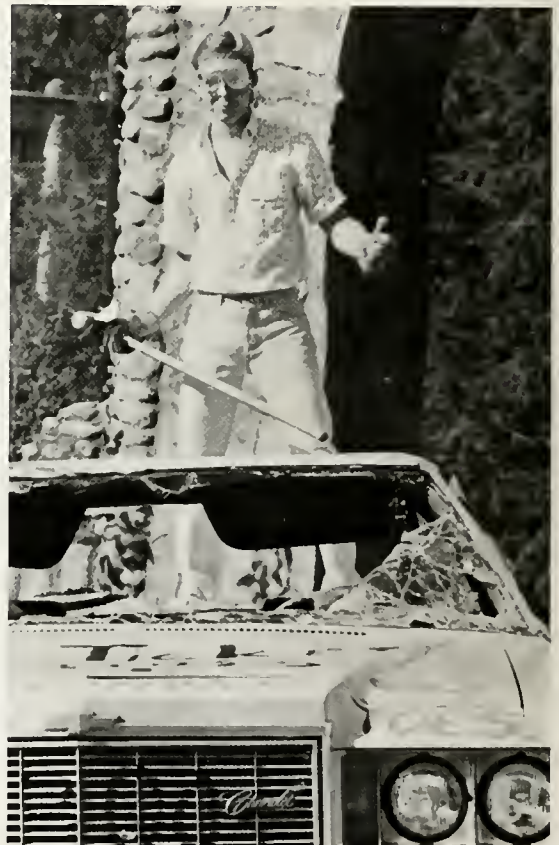
tions are used for cultural and educational purposes.

A Glorious Victory

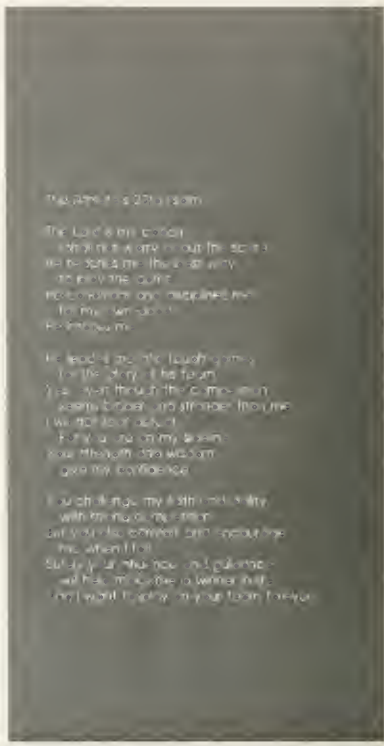

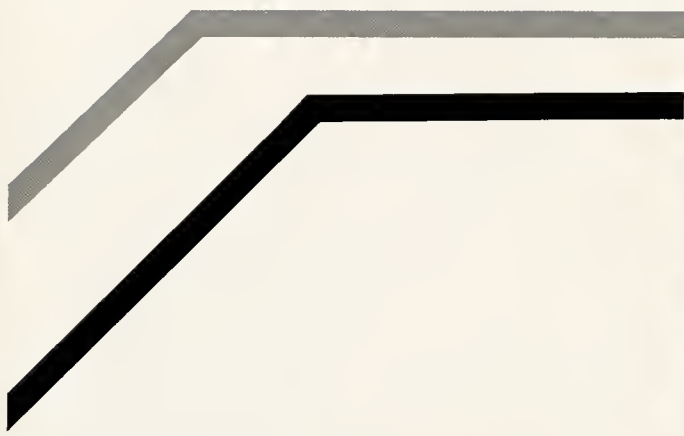

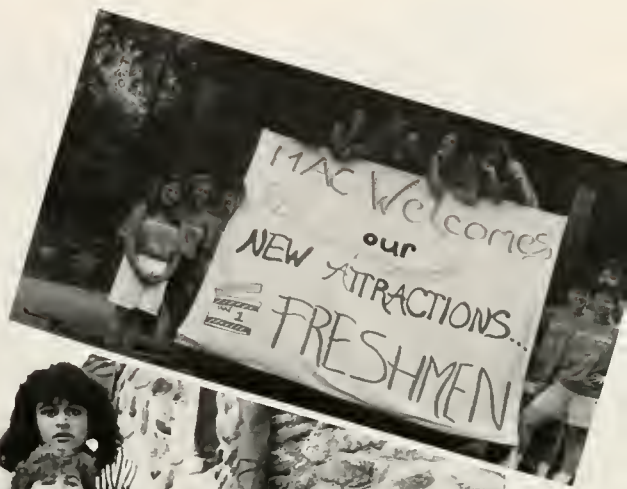
A Major Production

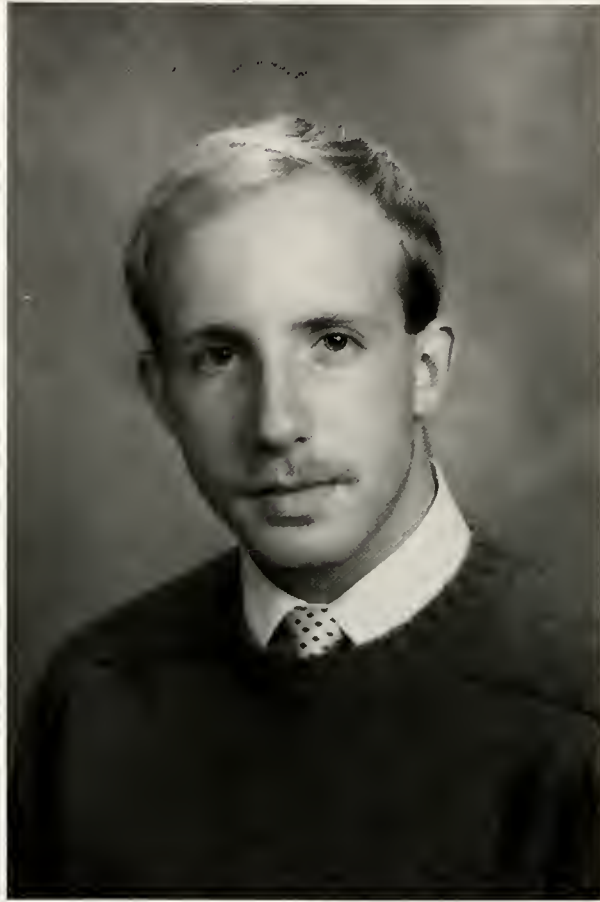

Another common attire exhibiting his carefree attitude was a three piece suit with low top Nike tennis shoes that one could observe at a M-AC dance. Could anyone else get away with that but Bob? One can just hear him saying enthusiastically "Yar!", "Out of hand!", or "Righteous!" and his distinct laugh having a close resemblance to that of Kermit the Frog's on the Muppet Show. 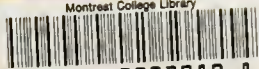
