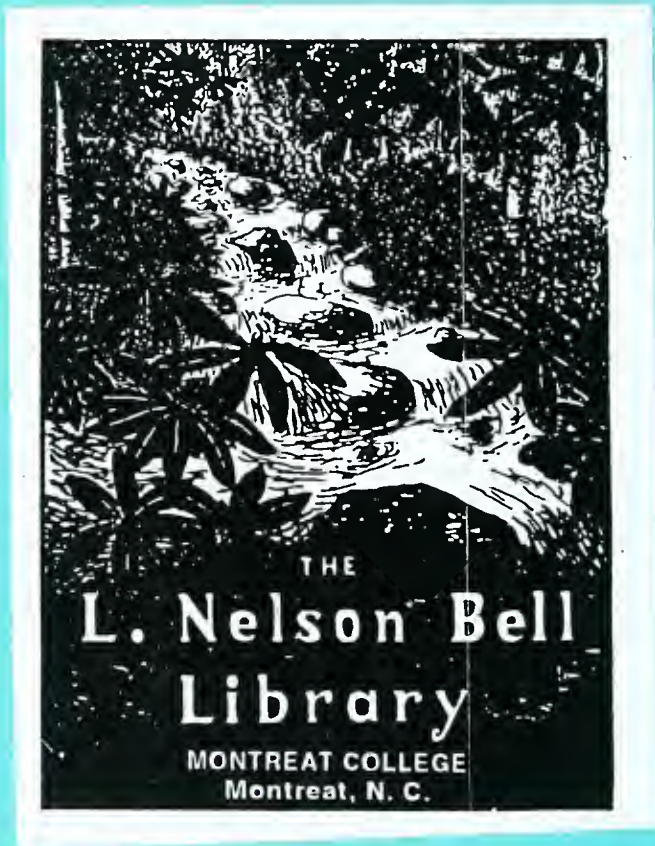

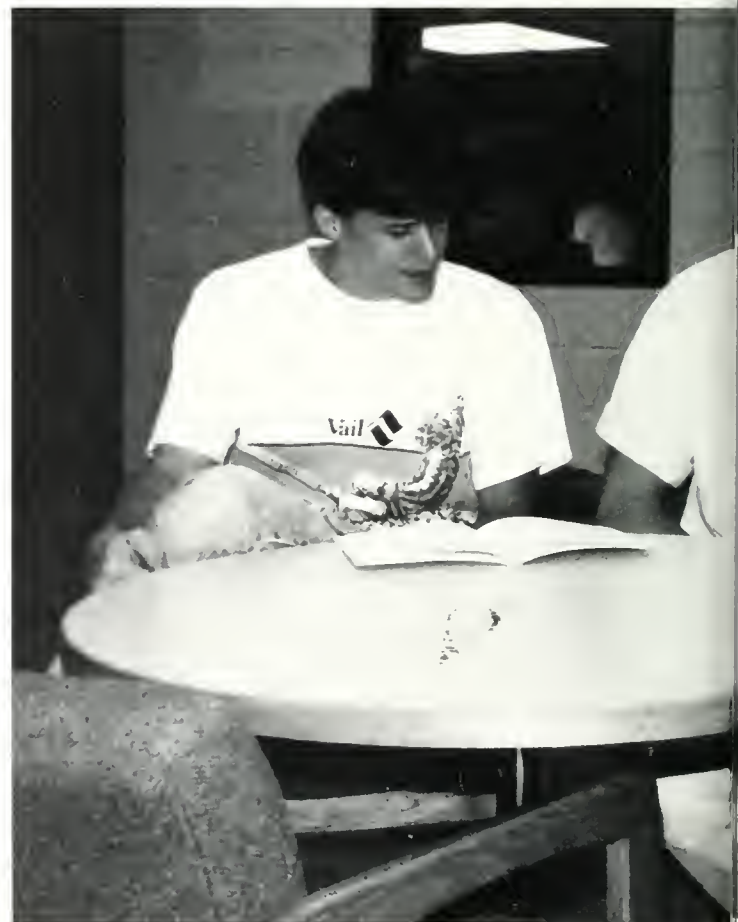
# Freshman Orientation

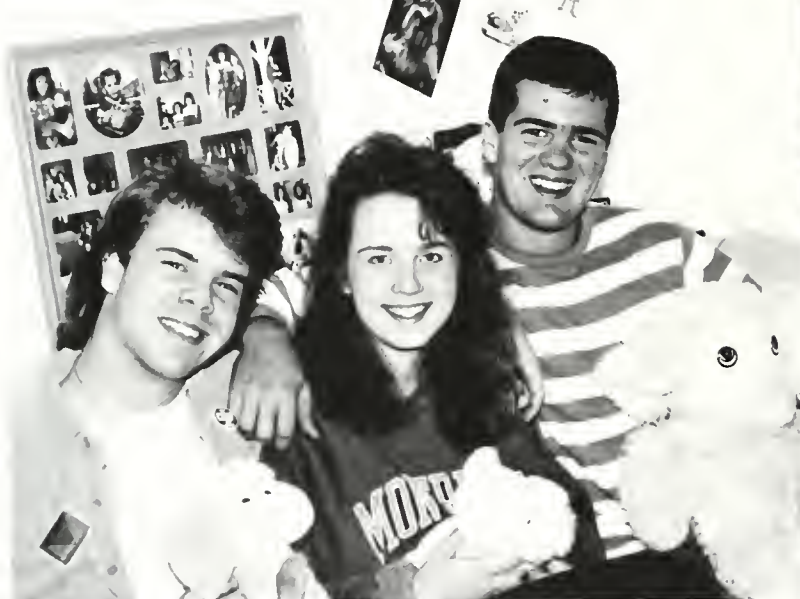

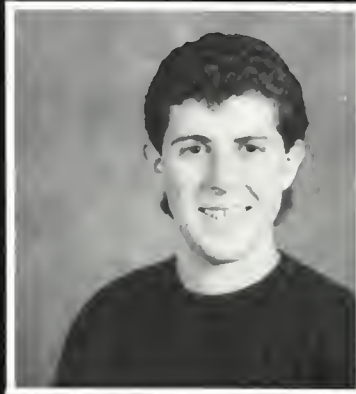

As students became more involved, they began to feel more at home at M-AC.



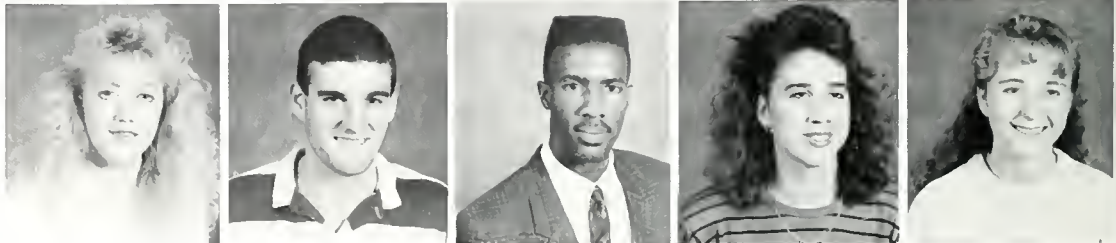

The majority of the students were very pleased with the choices offered. The ice cream bar helped all students out when they were not too sure what to choose to eat.



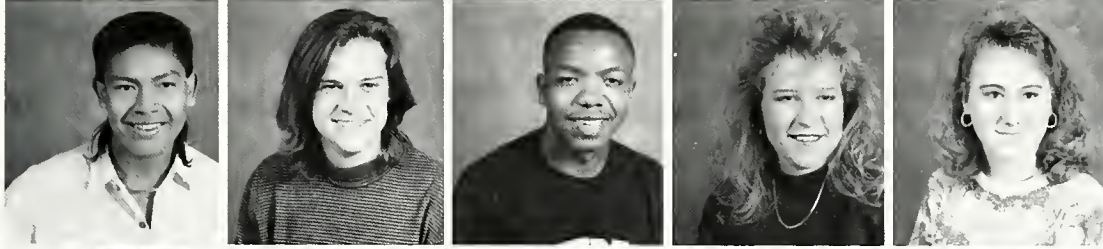

# Grab Your Partner

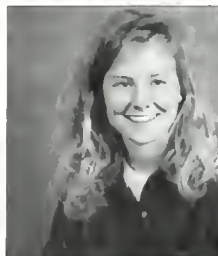

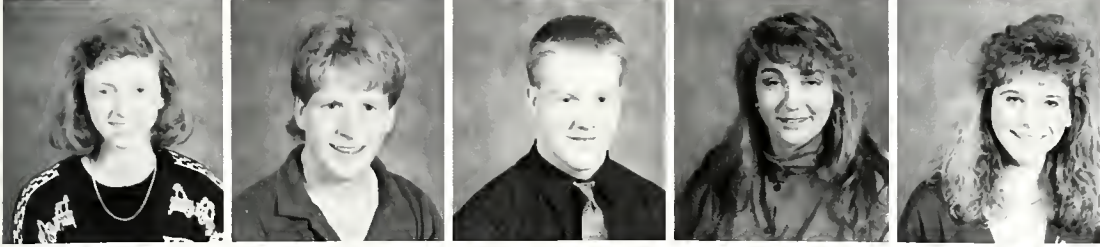

## Carnival Time

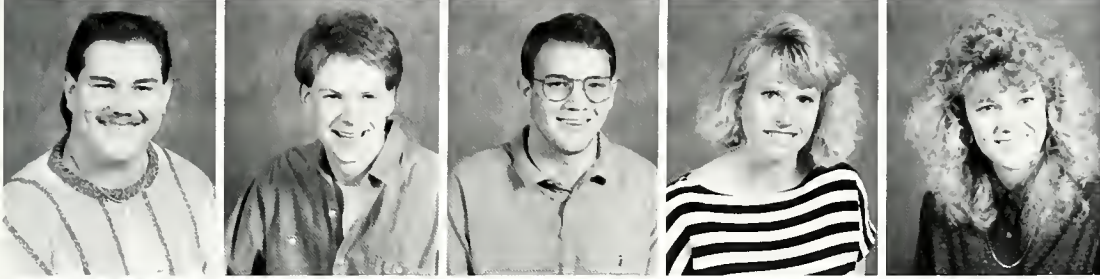

# THE RECREATION DEGREE

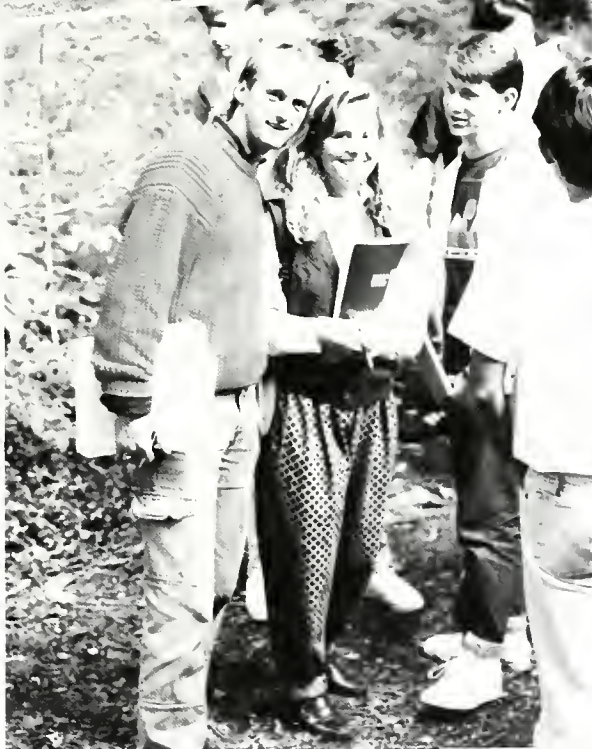
The Bachelor of Science degree in Recreation was established in order to provide a better understanding and knowledge of the outdoors. Because of the location of the campus, this program has become a popular field of

ness degree also educates students to become efficient Christian business people who are motivated to preserving and improving the economic system of our community. The degree was also developed to provide an encouragement for a higher education.





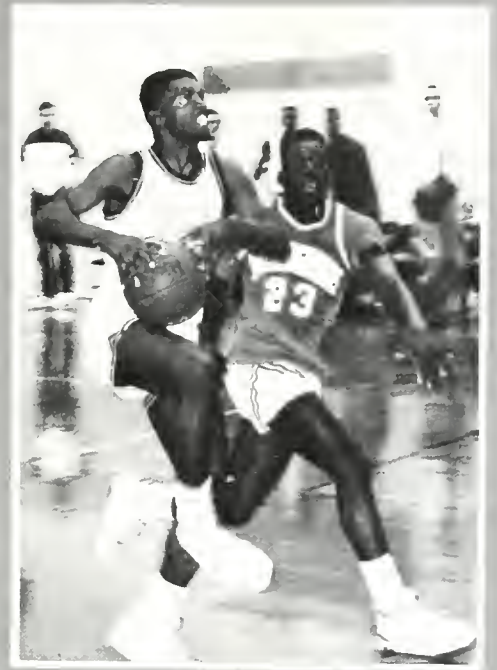

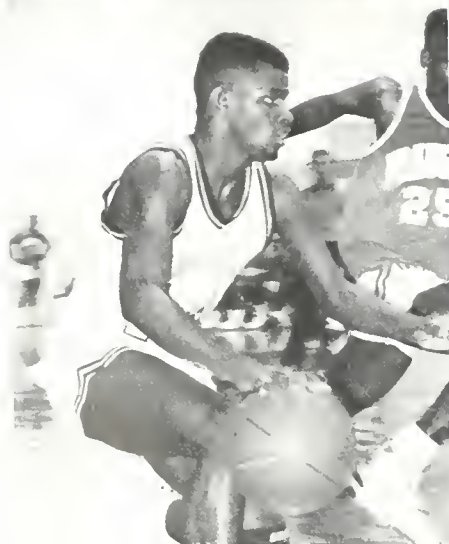




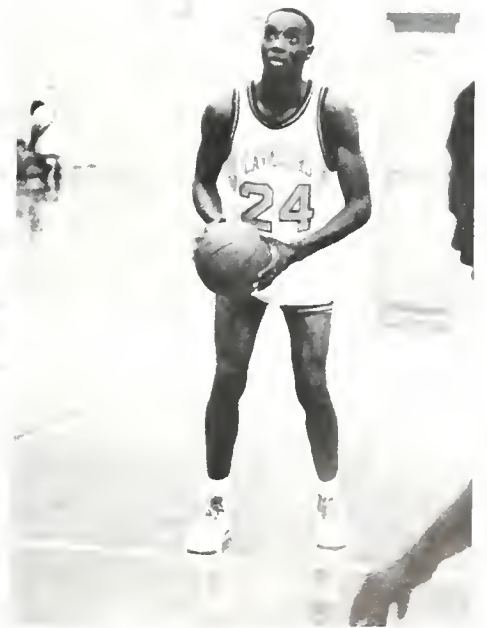
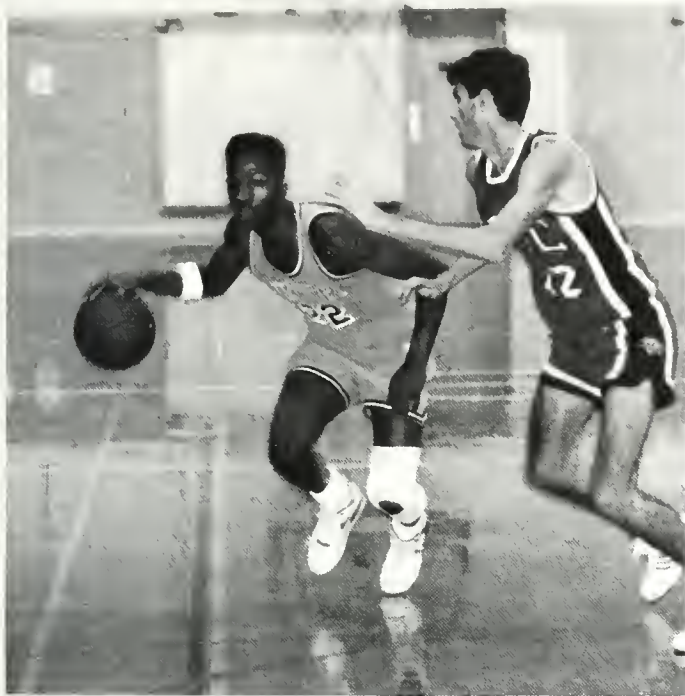
# Basketball

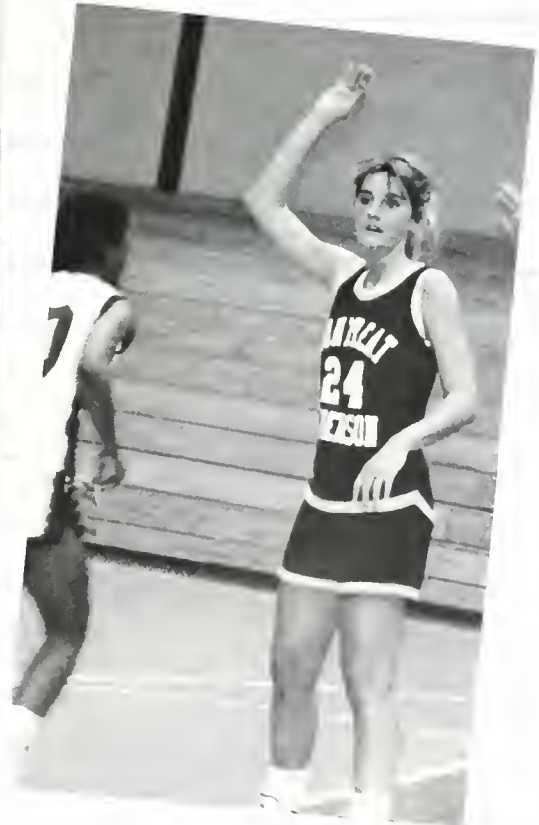

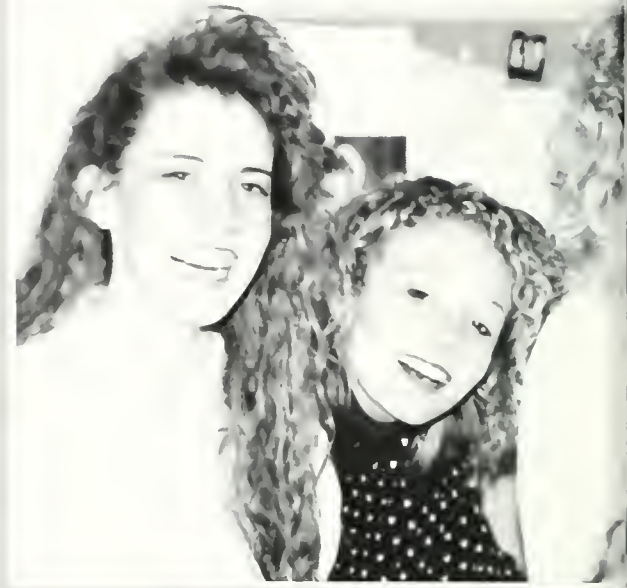

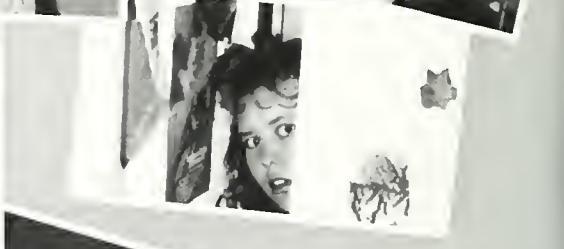
