As we entered Brown for our last year we became aware of many things that we were seeing and doing far the last time. Upon our return we found many things different. The schoal was buzzing with workmen, hurrying to completion, the new wing; and we could see, across the way, the progress being made on the new W. J. Bullock Physical Educatian Building. For the last time we were united as a class, and with the help of Miss Gray, aur advisor, we held our class elections. Eric McKnight was elected to serve as our president this final year, with Ronnie Glasson to serve as vice-president. Shelia Argo and Alan McKnight were chosen to hald the pasitions of secretary and treasurer, respectively. To camplete our slate of officers for this busiest of years, we selected Beverly Maulden and Tommy Allen, to be our representatives in the Council; Phyllis Austin, chaplain; Saundra Logan, social chairman; and Jack Hill, historian.

We selected gold and white as our class calors and the white orchid as the flower. For aur motto we selected "The will ta do; the courage to dare". We elected our superlatives, and we chose; Kim Starnes and Barry Harkey for our mascots.

In the early part of the year, the Key Club accepted Larry Freeman, Tommy Allen, and George Barrier for membership.

From the beginning, the football games played an impartant role in the activities of many students, and this year seemed special, for the games were played in aur new stadium. Leading our team ta second place in the canference were our Co-Captains, Ronnie Hampton, Ronnie Glosson, and Marvin Query. A victorious game set off Hamecaming weekend, and the season climaxed in a $13-0$ victory over Concord, winning back for us the victory bell.

Reigning over Hamecaming festivities was Margie Harringtan, and representing us in the Carrousel Porade in Charlotte was Phyllis Austin as Miss Brown High. On the basis af character, scholarship, leadership, and persanality, Saundra Logan was elected "Miss Hi Miss".

As time passed, others af our class were hanored in variaus ways. The Honor Saciety, Key Club, Quill and Scroll, and Thespian Saciety accepted new members. The year sped by, and before we realized, plans had been made for the senior class play, "The Match-Maker", and the juniors had honored us with the JuniorSenior. Then Senior Day had come and gone, and we realized that it was the last time our gaiety and frivolity wauld be shared.
