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## P R E F A C E.

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THE present Catalogue has been compiled to supply a want frequently and increasingly felt of late by Angling-book collectors, of a more complete and universal register of the literature of their sport. It is the fifth of the series, and includes six hundred and fifty distinct works. The statistics of its forerunners are as follows:—In 1811, Sir Henry—then Mr. Ellis, contributed to the “British Bibliographer,” the first angling-book list on record. It was limited to eighty works, but was enlarged to one hundred and eighty, in a revised edition appended by Mr. Pickering to Boosey’s “Piscatorial Reminiscences,” in 1836. Four years later, Mr. Wilson published, with his sporting treatise, “The Rod and the Gun,” an abbreviated list of one hundred works on Halieutics; and this was followed in 1847, by the “Waltonian Library” of Dr. Bethune, the able and erudite editor of the American “Complete Angler” of Walton and Cotton, in which publication it figured as an appendix. This latter list is one of the best in principle, and most complete in execution, consisting of three hundred works. Finally, in 1856, appeared the “Bibliographical Catalogue” of Mr. Russell Smith, annexed to Blakey’s “Angling Literature of All Nations.” It contained 264 works, deduction being made (as in the foregoing catalogue of Dr. Bethune) of treatises purely Ichthyological.

On analysing the present list chronologically (and omitting the works of Ausonius, Oppian, Elian and Ovid), we find that the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries produced, each, a



single work on Fishing; the sixteenth, 15; the seventeenth, 74; the eighteenth, 133; and the nineteenth, 422 works.

By a second classification, it appears that America has supplied 14; Denmark, 3; Holland, 6; France, 56; Germany, 75; Italy, 9; Norway, 1; Spain, 2; Sweden, 3; and the United Kingdom, 477 works; two facts being brought thereby into broad relief—first, the far greater popularity attending the sport and its literature in our own country than elsewhere; and secondly, the extraordinary numerical increase of Angling-books during the present century, and especially, I may add, within the last five-and-twenty years.

The latter circumstance is attributable, in a great degree, to the higher tone and style adopted by recent writers on the sport as well as to the employment of that wider range of subject of which Walton furnished so excellent a precedent, and which has emancipated such works from the narrow circle of mere professional readers.

In publishing my list, I wish emphatically to state that I have been largely indebted to the former gleaners in the same field, the result of whose labours I have not hesitated to appropriate, whenever, after careful testing, I have found it to be correct in fact, and fair in appreciation. That some unaided search has devolved on me, however, over and above the mere task of collation, will be seen from the important number of surplus works annexed to the register, and which have extended it to more than twice the length of any of its predecessors.

It is my pleasure to add, also, that I have derived much valuable assistance from the co-operation of several gentlemen interested in the question, and especially from Mr. William Heseltine, of Laleham; Mr. Joseph Crawhall, of Morpeth; and the distinguished Angler, Mr. Francis Francis.

The predilection of the fish for their prey, though familiarly known to all who inhabit the district, does not induce the angler to attempt their capture by impaling the living insect. Adepts in the sport have contrived a taking device—*caphosa quædam machinatio*—to circumvent them, for which purpose they invest the body of the hook with purple wool, and having adjusted two wings of a waxy colour, so as to form an exact imitation of the *hippurus*, they drop these abstruse cheats gently down the stream. The scaly pursuers, who hastily rise and expect nothing less than a dainty bait, snap the decoy, and are immediately fixed to the hook." The honour of first pointing out this passage is attributed to Stephen Oliver (Chatto) in his "Scenes and Recollections of Fly Fishing."]

As a specimen of style, this book is *sui generis*, or only to be equalled (suggests Scott) for its stupendous pretentiousness, by the writings of Sir Thomas Urquhart, of Cromerty. It contains abundant proof, however, that in the Academy of Angling its author had taken a high degree, and that he could use the rod, on an occasion, for other whippings than those of pool and stream, his flagellation of "honest Isaac" gives smarting evidence. This latter insult no contemporary voice was raised to vindicate, but Time, with its "revenges," has wrought out an ample and emphatic atonement.

Franck is the first English writer on angling that describes that mystical fish, the burbot (see page 272 of the original work, and 320 of the reprint). "To search for him in Trent," says he, "striving against a stream, is like Queen Elizabeth's Scogen, that, at the sun's meridian (with a candle and lanthorn), sought up and down for an honest man."

There is also an interesting mention, in "Northern Memoirs," page 37 of the preface, and again page 177 of the work (reprint), of three

noted anglers of the time, Merrill, Faulkner, and Ovidham, whom some bibliopoliasts suppose to have written three several angling works, since lost to the world. Others, on the contrary, incline to the belief that in the passages in question Franck merely intended to set up an antithesis (touching the comparative merits of tuition) between the speculative book-writing angler, on the one hand, and the practical experienced wielder of the rod, innocent of ink, but well up to all the dodges and devices of the sport, on the other. He speaks of "collections and manuals," it is true, but there is nothing to show that these were more than the mere occasional memoranda which that class of men are in the habit of jotting down, for their private guidance,—while of Ovidham he says distinctly that his "collections and experiments were lost with himself."

Those who are disposed to give their faith to "lost *Plasiads*" in the constellation of angling authors, will find better ground for their theory in Mr. John Hockenull's "Pleasant Hexameter Verses in Praise of Mr. Barber's Art of Angling," in which he asks—"Markham, Ward, Lauson, dare you with Barker now compare?"

Mr. Agar Hansard exaggerates the extreme rareness of "Northern Memoirs." I believe there are at least five copies of the first edition extant, including the one in the Grenville Library, British Museum.

Sir Harris Nicholas, in his biography of Walton, says, "There is so much resemblance between many passages of Walton's work and Heresbachius' Husbandry, by Googe, which was first printed in 1577, as to render it probable he was indebted to that work for some of his ideas." This may have been the case; but the "Complete Angler" bears a still stronger resemblance, both as regards matter and manner, to Heresbach's former work. "De Venatione, Aucupio et Piscacione," of which it may be interesting to give some account here. The work in question was the fruits of its author's leisure, and was written at his country house during his occasional retirement from the exigencies of his life at court. It consists of a dialogue, in which the interlocutors bear names significative of their different vocations. *Philotherus* opens the conversation with an eulogium of the sport of hunting. *Lagus* follows, and decants on the pastime of hunting the hare, the fox, the badger, and the deer. *Elapporous* passes in review the chase of the stag, the wild boar, &c. *Halieus* takes the greatest share in the colloquy, and treats of the different modes of fishing, and the various kinds of fish. The close parallel between the mechanism of the above and that of Walton's Angler must be evident enough. I am not aware, however, that "De Venatione" has ever been put

into English. I find no trace of it in Lowndes or any other Bibliographical authority; but the original Latin version may very well have fallen into Walton's hands, and contributed to give its present form and fashion to his immortal work.

Barnabe Googe's translation of the "Four Bookes of Husbandry" is so quaint, poetical, and charming, that it must be matter of regret he did not also undertake its companion work. Googe was a poet by vocation, and the author of "Eclogæ, Epitaphes, and Sennettes," newly written 1563, of which only two copies exist. He also produced "The whole Art and Trade of Husbandry, in Four Books,"\* 1614, and several other works, translated and original. Some curious letters concerning his marriage with Mary Darell, of Scotney, in Kent, are printed in the "Reatituta," vol. iv. p. 307-11.]

1. First of the natural fly, which are to be used in May or June only, namely, the greendrake, the stone-fly, and the chamlet-fly, to which I may add the grasshopper, the most excellent of any. After this follows '2. With an artificial or made fly you are to angle with a line (or tawm),' &c. Then follows a list of flies for each month, the same, and in nearly the same words, as Cotton's, in his second part of the "Complete Angler," and the treatise breaks off. From this it is clear that either Cotton copied from this treatise, or the treatise is a synopsis from Cotton's. There is no date to the treatise itself, but it is bound up with an essay on another subject *following* it, dated 1669, seven years before Cotton published his work. The paper following it, as far as can be judged, seems to be later, though in the same handwriting. There is also in the same book a baptismal record of Rob. Noble's children, the first date of which is 1669, the last 1701, with other papers. These throw uncertainty upon the date of the treatise; but if it be older than Cotton's work it accounts for the rapidity with which Cotton prepared his essay; the details on fly-fishing being thus ready to his hand. There are variations, alight indeed, but marked, from Cotton's book, which make the treatise, to my eye, appear more like an original than a copy. It was purchased from Wm. Garret, of Newcastle-upon-Tyne, and is named in his catalogue for August, 1845."

## APPENDIX.

### SPECIFICATION OF THE VARIOUS COPIES AND EDITIONS OF THE BOOK OF ST. ALBANS.

- x. This edition does not contain the "Treatyse of Fysshynge."
- xi. This present boke shewyth the manere of hawkyng and huntynge: and also of diuysynge of Cote armours? It shewyth also a good matere belongynge to horses: with other cōmenable treatyses. And ferdermore of the blaysynge of armys: as here after it may appere. Small folio.

Juliana Berners, or Barnes, to whom the above Treatises were ascribed, is supposed to have been sister to Richard, Lord Berners, of Essex, and prioress of Sopwell, near St. Albans. She is said to have flourished about the year 1460, and is celebrated for her learning and accomplishments.

Besides being the first printed Treatise on the subject in the English language, this work affords us rude representations of the different kinds of tackle in use, and contains directions and remarks which have been copied in some recent Treatises on Angling.

On the first page a wood-cut of birds, and on the reverse a group of men with a hawk, underneath the title above.

And here we ende this laste treatyse whyche specyfeth of blaysynge of armys. Emprynted at Westmestre, by Wynkyn de Worde, the yere of thyncarnacon of our lorde, M.CCCC.LXXXXV.

On the last leaf (d, 8) is the device of Wynkyn de Worde, and on the reverse that of Caxton. This leaf is wanting in the copy in the British Museum.

Copies upon Vellum are in the Collections of the Earl of Pembroke and the Right Hon. Thomas Grenville: and upon paper in the British

Museum; in the late Mr. Douce's Collection, now in the Bodleian; and in the late Mr. Dent's Library. Probably the finest extant upon paper was that formerly in the collection of Mr. Hanrott.

This edition was reprinted in fac-simile, by Mr. Haslewood, Lond. 1810; and the Treatise of Fysshing wyth an Angle, from this edition, was reprinted by W. Pickering, in crown 8vo., with Baskerville's Types. London, 1827.

The first edition was printed at St. Alban's, 1486, containing the Treatises of Hawking, Hunting, and Coat-Armour; and reprinted by Markham, under the title of "The Gentleman's Academie, or the Booke of St. Albans: containing three most exact of excellent Bookes: the first of Hawking, the second of all the proper termes of Hunting, and the last of Armorie: all compiled by Juliana Barnes, in the yere from the incarnation of Christ, 1486. And now reduced into a better method by G. M. (Gervase Markham), London: printed for Humfrey Lownes, and are to be sold at his shop in Paules Church-Yard, 1595." 4to.

To the entente that the forsayd ydle persones whyche scholde haue but lytyll mesure in the sayd dysporte of fysshynge, sholde not by this meane vtterly dystroye it." The only copy known, was formerly in Mr. Haworth's collection, and afterwards in Mr. Geo. Wilkinson's.

There is no date of the year of printing this book, but it appears, from Ames, that Coplande was fined by the Company of Stationers, in 1561, for printing these three Tracts. The present edition of Tottell's differs in its colophon at least from those pointed out by Herbert as printed by Coplande, and except the reversed cut before the treatise of Fishing, accords exactly with Toye's in its contents."

There is probably another edition, by Coplande, yet undescribed—one in Lothbury, over against St. Margaret's Church.
