PREFACE.

The proprietor of the WORCESTER NURSERY, in presenting a new Catalogue to the public, desires to state, that the collection of Fruit Trees, Shrubs, Plants, &c., grown at this establishment, comprises almost every fine variety at present cultivated in New England, the selections having been made with the most careful attention; and, as far as practicable, the buds and scions are taken from those bearing trees which have proved true to their names, and which are worthy of cultivation. And those kinds will be hereafter added which ample experience has proved to be of superior excellence, and to succeed well in this country; and no pains or expense will be spared in obtaining the finest varieties from the best sources.

Persons wishing to ornament their grounds with Trees, &c., and who may not be familiar with the kinds enumerated, by sending a general list of the trees desired of any particular fruit,—as apple, pear, plum, &c.,—are assured, that in the selections we will use our best judgment to make it according to the views and tastes of the applicants.

The annexed prices are for Trees, &c., of moderate size; larger sizes will of course be proportionately higher priced.

Trees, &c., sent from this establishment are selected and labelled with due precaution and care; and, if wished, are packed in mats and straw, (so that they may be safely transported any distance) for which a reasonable charge is made.

It often occurs that the demands for particular kinds of fruit trees are so much greater than anticipated, that it renders those kinds for the moment comparatively scarce, except such as are of small size. In these cases, in order to prevent any delay, it would be well that the orders should authorize, that such kinds may be replaced by others of equal quality.

The proper seasons for transplanting Trees, &c., are the months of March, April, and early in May; and October and November. The best time for Flowering Bulbous Roots, is from October to December.

The Worcester Nursery is of easy access, being situated on the corner of Main and Austin Streets, a few rods south of the Town Hall, and within five minutes' walk of the Rail Road Stations of the Boston, Norwich, and Western Roads.

Orders for Trees, Plants, &c., will meet with careful attention. Catalogues will be furnished gratis to all who apply.
