

# REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

OF THE

# YORKSHIRE PHILOSOPHICAL SOCIETY.

12th FEBRUARY, 1934.

IT is your Council's painful duty to place on record the death of Mr. William Herbert St. Quintin, who had occupied the Presidential Chair since 1913. Mr. St. Quintin passed away on January 21st. For nineteen years he was an invaluable, devoted, and generous supporter of the Society; his donations to the Society's funds and Collections were numerous.

Mr. St. Quintin was an ardent and enthusiastic naturalist and his abilities as such were matched to an exceptional degree by his gentleness, kindliness, and personal charm. His sound advice in all deliberations of the Council was always very highly valued.

Quickly following Mr. St. Quintin's decease, your Council were grieved to learn that Mr. Richard Thompson, the Society's senior Vice-President, had passed away on February 5th, at the age of 90.

Mr. Thompson had been a member of the Society since 1875, and was elected as a member of the Council in 1882 and Vice-President in 1898.

A further loss on February 11th was sustained by the death of Mr. Alfred Procter, the York & District City Coroner, who had been a member since 1884, and on December 27th, Alderman R. H. Vernon Wragge passed away in his eightieth year. Alderman Wragge had been a member of the Society since 1899.

Like most other learned societies this Society has felt the effect of the prevailing economic depression, which has affected its membership and the number of persons visiting the Museums and Gardens. There are, however, signs of an improvement, and your Council trust to the co-operation and assistance of all members to further these. There is need for a much larger membership. Finance. The year commenced with a debit balance of £214 4s. 10d. A sub-committee dealt with the Society's financial position in April last and made various recommendations to the Council to take effect from May 8th, and although these have only been in operation for eight months the income has exceeded the expenses by £181 0s. 8d., thus reducing the deficit to £33 4s. 2d. The overdraft on the Abbey Restoration Fund has been reduced by £54 16s. 9d.; the Million Shilling Fund has increased by £3 13s. 3d., whilst the Reed Bequest shows a credit balance of £78 9s. 0d., and the Society's funds have been augmented by a legacy of £250 from the late Mr. W. H. St. Quintin.

FIELD NATURALISTS' SECTION. The past year has been most satisfactory; a full programme of lectures, exhibit nights and excursions has been carried out. Attendances at these meetings have shown that there is no lack of enthusiasm on the part of this Section, and that there is a steady progress in work done. The Summer Excursions were well attended and many valuable observations in the field were made.

At the Annual Meeting in April, three new Honorary Members were elected—Professor Gilligan, University of Leeds, Mr. C. F. Proctor, Hull, and Mr. A. Templeman, The Geological Museum, London.

At the end of the year Membership of this Section, including Honorary and Corresponding Members, stands at 129, an increase of 5 on last year.

# THE YORKSHIRE MUSEUM.

# REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1933.

DURING the past year considerable progress has been made in the classification and relabelling of the Collections. Nearly all the Collections have now been brought up to date.

Amongst the more interesting additions are the Seachest and Cash Box of Admiral Hawke presented by Lord Hawke, and a model of H.M.S. Berwick, lent by Lord Hawke; a head and fore limb of *Ichthyosaurus communis* presented by Mr. J. Horatio Fraser; two pistols which once belonged to the Young Pretender, Prince Charles Edward, and an iron whip found on Marston Moor, both presented by Mrs. S. A. Charlton of Thirsk.

On June 15th, the Thoroton Society of Nottinghamshire visited the Museum of Mediaeval Architecture and the ruins of St. Mary's Abbey. The members met in the Tempest Anderson Hall, when a short address on the History of St. Mary's Abbey and the Mediaeval Architectural Museum was given by Dr. Collinge.

The Society of Pewter Collectors held their Summer Meeting at York on June 17th, when a visit was paid to the Museum to inspect the Society's Collection of Pewter. Sixty-four pieces were on exhibition, in addition to twenty pieces kindly lent by J. Triffitt, Esq.

The Yorkshire Architectural and York Archaeological Society continues to hold its meetings and house its Library in the Museum.

EDUCATIONAL WORK. During the year 591 children from Schools in the City attended the Museum for study and instruction, and 341 students from the City School of Arts and Crafts.

The number of schools and other organizations which have visited the Museums, exceeds any previous record. (For full list see p. 31.)

During January and February the Keeper made six tours of the Museum on Saturday afternoons, and described various Collections. There was an average attendance of twentyseven visitors, who evinced great interest.

In connection with various B.B.C. Talks special exhibitions were made to illustrate Mr. Charles Elton's "Five Talks on Exploring the Animal World" from April 21st to May 19th, and Miss Grace Hadow's "Six Talks on Local History" from May 26th to June 30th.

Many students engaged in archæological, geological, and zoological research have made use of the Library.

The Collections or Specimens have been studied by Dr. W. J. Arkell, M.A., University Museum, Oxford; Sir J. F. Colyer, K.B.E., F.R.C.S., London; Domingo P. Acosta, Puebla, Mexico; W. Arnold Thorpe, Victoria and Albert Museum, London; Dr. J. Grafton Milne, M.A., Oxford; W. S. Ascoli, Bollington; Henry Collett, London; J. C. Fenton, Cleckheaton; Miss Mary A. Johnstone, Cheadle Hulme; R. H. Edleston, F.S.A., Gainford; T. D. Cowen, Shotley Bridge; Dr. Vernon Wilson, F.G.S., Leeds University; A. M. Haggis, F.L.S., Wellcome Historical Medical Museum, London; Miss Anne S. Robertson, M.A., Glasgow University; D. K. Hughes, York; Miss M. Kitson Clark, Leeds; Dr. J. F. S. Stone, Salisbury; C. N. V. Sutherland, Ashmolean Museum, Oxford; Gilbert Askew, F.S.A. (Scot.), Society of Antiquaries, Newcastle-on-Tyne, and T. Bishop, The Bodleian Library, Oxford.

Turning to the different departments of the Museum:-

ETHNOLOGY. A slight rearrangement of some of the cases has resulted in widening the gangways and at the same time affording a slightly increased space to the Boynton Collection.

Lady Thomson has lent an interesting exhibit in the form of a Road Measuring Wheel. Many flint, stone and bronze specimens found locally have been added to the Collections.

The Collection of Pewter has been cleaned and rearranged.

Geology. The nucleus of a collection of glacial pebbles has been formed, which it is hoped may ultimately become representative of the various Boulder Clays of East Yorkshire. A series of erratics from Brayton Barff, recently presented by Mr. J. W. Stather, F.G.S., is included in the present collection.

ZOOLOGY. The collection is now completely rearranged and its clean condition reflects the greatest credit on Dr. Collinge and his staff who have laboured so patiently on a task which was at once so necessary but extremely difficult because previous neglect had allowed many of the specimens to become almost unrecognisable. There are a number of birds which require replacing, and this work is gradually being accomplished, when new ones are available, and names of desired species will be supplied to interested workers in this department on inquiry from the Keeper of the Museum.

Interesting additions during the year include a fine Badger presented by Mr. Chas E. Elmhirst, and a white Jay the gift of Mr. Alan H. Mackay. In the vicinity of York small colonies of badgers have existed for centuries at Castle Howard, Kirkham, Acaster and Kilnwick Percy, chiefly because of their nocturnal habits and generally harmless nature, their food consisting principally of roots, beetles and grubs, and occasional young rabbits, mice, voles, etc. The handsome blue-winged jays are now more numerous in all the wooded country around York, owing to gamekeepers being fewer in number than formerly, and because of their own wary nature causing their little parties to get out of range of a gun with remarkable celerity and loud screeches. It is rare to see a pure white variety from the usual colouring, hence the welcome extended to the new specimen.

ENTOMOLOGY. Not since the Society acquired the "Allis Collection" of British Lepidoptera, sixty years ago, has such an important addition to the Society's Collection been made, as that of our late President, Mr. W. H. St. Quintin, of his fine Palæarctic Butterflies and Moths, contained in three

mahogany cabinets of sixty-eight drawers. The specimens are in excellent condition, and constitute a valuable addition to the Entomological Department of the Museum.

Some rearrangement is being made to accommodate the growing collection of insects, but it is regrettable that so much valuable material as we possess, cannot be placed in a more suitable room and made available for study by students of Entomology.

All other collections of insects have been maintained in good condition.

ASTRONOMY. All the instruments are in good order, and a number of observations have been taken, and new webs fitted on the Transit Instruments, which have been readjusted. The Observatory is open to members at the close of the lectures when the sky is clear.

BOTANY. The specimens of British Flowering Plants and Ferns in the Herbarium are in fair condition.

The foreign specimens require attention and more room.

The following additions have been made during the year:—Twenty-four specimens of Myxomycetes from Dr. W. T. Elliott, F.L.S., Tanworth-in-Arden; Twenty-four specimens of British Flowering Plants and Ferns from Mr. T. J. Foggitt of Thirsk.

Numismatics. There is nothing of outstanding importance to report in this section. Our few Greek coins have been provisionally arranged, and work is beginning on the Medals. Some welcome gifts have been received, but it has not been possible to make any purchases or to spend anything on the collections. We have, however, acquired by exchange some coins, including the very rare York Groat of Richard III. During the year the collections have been visited by several specialists and officials from other museums who have found our collections to contain valuable material for reference.

CERAMICS. The Collections have been maintained in an efficient state during the past year. A few new specimens have been added to the Collections.

LIBRARY. During the year 35 volumes have been added by purchase, and 24 by presentation, in addition to the usual unbound memoirs. The number of volumes borrowed was 348.

Meteorology. Statistics of Station: Longitude 1° 5′ W.; Latitude, 55° 57′ N.; height above mean sea level, 56 feet.

The rainfall for 1933 was below normal, being 23.02 inches, 2.48 inches below the average for over 50 years. The wettest months of the year were February, March, May, September, October and November, when the totals for the months were: 4.11, 2.06, 2.26, 2.09, 3.33 and 2.70 respectively. July, August and December were the driest months with 0.95, 0.50 and 0.51 inches respectively.

Temperature ranged from 89° F. on August 28th to 21° F. on January 20th; the range of temperature for 1933 being thus: 68.0° F. as against 60.0° F. for 1932. A mean pressure of 1016.4 millibars (1,000 millibar=29.531 inches of mercury) at M.S.L. (corrected for diurnal variations), has been recorded as against 1015.4 millibars for 1932. June gave the lowest mean for the year, 1012.0 millibars, October next with 1012.5 millibars. December was highest, 1023.9 millibars, and January next with 1020.2 millibars. The extreme range was 1.19 inches as compared with 1.96 inches in 1932. The highest reading of the barometer was taken December 3rd at 9 p.m., viz.: 30.763 inches, and the lowest on March 17th at 9 p.m., viz.: 28.909 inches.

Snow or Rain fell to the amount of 23.02 inches or 584.8 mm., as against 24.91 inches or 632.7 mm. for 1932, a decrease of 1.89 inches or 47.9 mm. for the year. The heaviest fall of the year occurred on February 25th, when 30.0 mm. (1.18 inches) fell. The cumulative totals for the years since 1820 are, for the heaviest monthly falls, August 6000.35 mms., October 5753.48 mms., and July 5432.30 mms.

Observations of Winds show that during 1933 we had "strong" winds on 3 days (force 4-7 on scale 0-12), 3 days less than 1932, and "calm" on 4 days as in 1932. The chief winds have been observed as S.(90), N.(83), W.(46), N.E.(30), S.W.(31), and N.W.(32).

Thunder was heard on 10 days, snow or sleet fell on 19 days, as against 6 days in 1932; and there were hailstorms on 2 days, as against 8 days the previous year.

Bright Sunshine was recorded 1379.7 hours as against 1090.2 hours in 1932, an increase of 289.5 hours for the year. The daily mean was 3.77 hours, and the percentage of possible sunshine 31 as against 24 in 1932.

It is urgently requested that any discovery of Archæological interest in the neighbourhood may be brought to the notice of the Keeper of the Museum, or the Honorary Curators, as early as possible.

The Keeper of the Museum will be pleased to give any information in his power, and may be seen daily, Museum engagements permitting.
