

REPORT OF THE COUNCIL

OF THE

YORKSHIRE PHILOSOPHICAL SOCIETY.

Ilth MARCH, 1940.

DURING the crisis of the past year, so far as possible, the general activities of the Society have been continued.

The Council decided in September last that for the present no Lectures or Meetings of the Society should be held, but the situation will be reviewed at an early date in the light of experience.

The restoration of the Nave and Tower of St. Mary's Abbey have been completed, and for the time being any further work has ceased.

The following Lectures were delivered in the Tempest Anderson Hall during 1939 :---

- January 26th.—Children's Lecture—"Rachel (aged 2 and a bit) discovers England." Charles J. Chislett.
- February 9th.—"Through Holland with the Old Masters." Mrs. M. McLaughlan, F.R.G.S.
- February 23rd.—"Science and the Quest for Power." Frederick Addey, B.Sc., F.R.A.S.

March 9th.—"Around North America and Tahiti." Selwyn Driver.

FINANCE.—The Society, in common with kindred institutions, is feeling the effects of the prevailing war conditions. The year opened with a debit balance of $\pounds 10$ 4s. 3d. For the year there was an excess of expenditure over income of $\pounds 88$ 18s. 3d., and after paying $\pounds 58$ 5s. 7d. to the Fabric Fund, and various other items including Additions to the Museum, Library, etc., there was a debit balance of $\pounds 308$ 8s. 0d. on December 31st. In view of this, your Council appointed a Sub-Committee to deal with the Society's financial position, whose recommendations received the approval of the Council. These consisted of a reduction of the staff, curtailment of expenditure in the gardens, general economy in office and printing expenses, and the temporary closing of the Hospitium with the proviso that the same should be opened on request being made. It is hoped that the Society's accounts will balance at the year end.

The Million Shilling Fund stands at ± 56 11s. 2d., and the Reed Bequest shows a credit balance of ± 53 17s. 10d.

"The H. J. Wilkinson Memorial Fund" shows a credit balance of ± 16 15s. 7d.

The Council deeply regret to have to record the passing of the following members :—

MR. H. M. PLATNAUER, on October 1st, at the age of 82 years. He was Keeper of the Yorkshire Museum from 1883 to 1904, and served as a Vice-President of the Society since 1905. He was elected an Honorary Member of the Society in 1935. He was first and foremost a mineralogist, and as such was appointed to the staff of the British Museum (Natural History), before coming to York. He was a prime mover, on behalf of the Yorkshire Philosophical Society, in the steps which led to the calling of a meeting of Museum Curators and others interested, at York on 3rd May, 1888, and ultimately to the establishment of the Museums Association in 1889.

MR. E. R. DODSWORTH, on July 12th, at the age of 81 years. He joined the Society in 1882, and served as a member of the Council from 1897 to 1899. He was elected a Trustee in 1934.

MR. CECIL H. COBB, on November 21st, at the age of 71 years. He joined the Society in 1904, and served as a member of the Council for various periods from 1912 to 1924. He was Vice-President of the Photographic Section in 1912-13, and in 1914 he succeeded the late Dr. Tempest Anderson as President of that Section, which office he held until 1918. He was a valued member of many Committees.

MR. OXLEY GRABHAM, on December 6th, at the age of 75 years. Mr. Grabham was appointed Keeper of the Yorkshire Museum in 1905, and resigned in 1919. He was elected an Honorary Member in 1920. He was a well-known naturalist, and his special knowledge of Zoology, Ornithology and Photography proved of great value to the Society, whose collections are much richer through his generous gifts.

FIELD NATURALISTS' SECTION.—The Field Naturalists' Section fulfilled a very successful programme, and the outlook was exceedingly promising for continued work until the outbreak of War in September caused the holding of regular meetings to be in abeyance.

Two afternoon meetings were held in the late Autumn, but it was found that afternoons were not convenient for the majority of members. It is intended to carry on the activities of the Society as far as possible in the New Year.

We regret to record the death of a former President and member of many years' standing, Mr. V. G. F. Zimmermann, who was very well known for his expert knowledge and interest in Bird Life. His observations on the nesting habits of the blackbird revealed his acute personal research in matters of Ornithology.

We have also to regret the loss by death of Mr. L. Bell, and Mr. T. Hobbs.

A few new members have joined the Section in the course of the year, but it is a matter of urgency for the continuance of full activity in the Section that new and interested active members should be enrolled.

Membership at the close of the year stands at 78 Ordinary Members, 7 Honorary Members, 8 Student Members and 6 Corresponding Members.

Twenty-one Lectures and Meetings were held during the year.

REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1939.

A year of progressive work has taxed the efforts and abilities of the staff. Various changes have had to be carried out in the British Bird Room and the Vertebrate Gallery. Certain specimens have been removed from the different galleries for the duration of the war.

The Yorkshire Numismatic Society held its Summer Meeting in the Museum on June 24th.

The Yorkshire Architectural and York Archaeological Society continues to hold its meetings and house its Library in the Museum.

EDUCATIONAL WORK.—During the year, 581 children from Schools in the City attended the Museum for study and instruction. Loans of specimens have been made to various Schools.

Many archaeologists, geologists, naturalists and others have made use of the Museum and Library.

GEOLOGY.—All the Collections have been carefully examined, and are in good order. An important addition of Yorkshire fossils has been made by the gift of the four cabinets containing the Hon. Sir William Herbert Herries Collection. It has not been possible to examine these in detail as yet.

ZOOLOGY.—The whole of the Zoological collections have been examined and are in good order. Great appreciation is expressed for the magnificent gift of African and other sporting trophies made by Major P. M. Stewart of Burnby Hall, Pocklington. Amongst them is a remarkably fine case containing a lioness stalking a klipspringer antelope, the work of Rowland Ward.

NUMISMATICS.—War conditions have prevented completion of the re-classification, labelling, and sorting-out of duplicates in the Roman collection, and the arrangement of the Yorkshire Bank Notes, both of which would probably have been finished in the Autumn of 1939.

From recent house-demolitions in York the Society has gratefully received a number of coins and medals : a few of these were purchased, but most were kindly presented.

The English coins include :—Ethelred II York Penny (not published in British Museum Catalogue); Henry III Long Cross Penny, York, type 3; Edward I Penny (group iv); Edward IV Quarter Ryal (York).

At Thorpe Willoughby, near Selby, on 12th May, 1939, an earthenware jar (glazed, of Civil War period), containing 1 gold and about 2,550 silver coins dating from Edward IV to Charles I, was turned up and broken by the plough about a foot deep in a field near Thorpe Hall. The Society has acquired 33 coins in all, namely, the gold coin (a Laurel, 1624, of James I), 3 half-crowns, 11 shillings, 10 sixpences, 1 groat, of Elizabeth, James I and Charles I, (the latest date being 1641), and 1 Scottish half-crown, and 3 Scottish shillings of James I and Charles I, all of which are in good condition, also 3 in poor condition, useful as a record only, of Edward VI and Philip and Mary.

Amongst other donations are some Medals and Yorkshire Bank Notes, and a most generous gift of 16 volumes of the British Numismatic Journal, from an anonymous source.

The Society always welcomes news of Yorkshire coin-finds and an opportunity to examine the coins at the Yorkshire Museum for comparison with the Society's collection. Donations of Yorkshire coins, medals and tokens which are not already in the collection are most gratefully received, but present conditions make it difficult for the Society to continue to buy such local coins.

CERAMICS.—The Ceramic Collections have been kept in good order during the past year, although some of the cases require a little cleaning. LIBRARY.—There has been an expenditure of $\pounds 44$ 0s. 5d. on the Library during the year. This includes $\pounds 5$ 11s. 5d. on the purchase of new books; $\pounds 31$ 8s. 6d. on periodicals, and $\pounds 7$ 0s. 6d. on binding. In addition to this, $\pounds 20$ 8s. 2d. has been expended on books which have been purchased out of the Reed Bequest.

During the year 39 volumes have been added by purchase, and 50 by presentation, in addition to the usual unbound memoirs.

The number of volumes borrowed was 124.

It is urgently requested that any discovery of Archaeological interest in the neighbourhood may be brought to the notice of the Keeper of the Museum, or the Honorary Curators, as early as possible.

The Keeper of the Museum will be pleased to give any information in his power, and may be seen daily, Museum engagements permitting.


